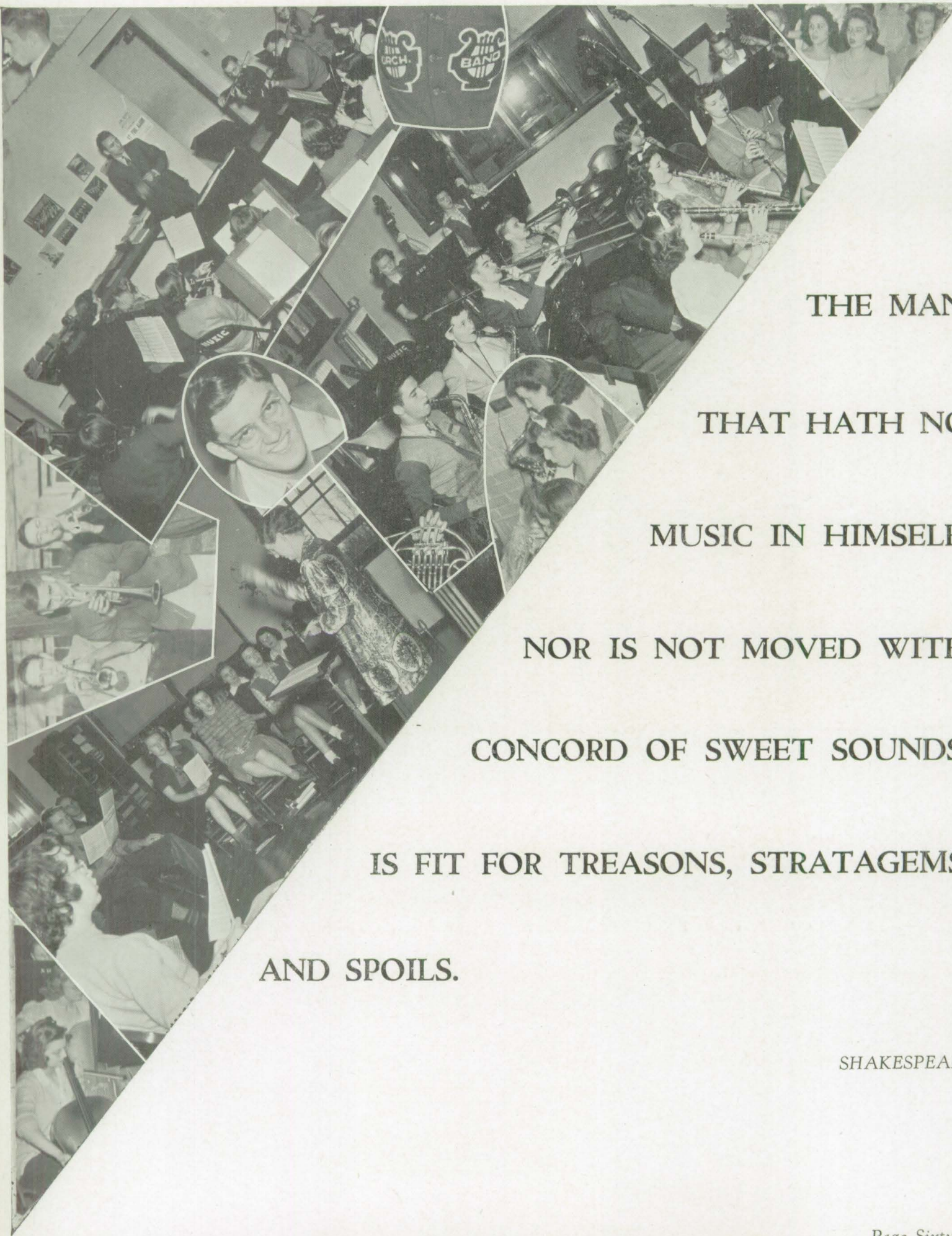
FROM YEAR TO YEAR

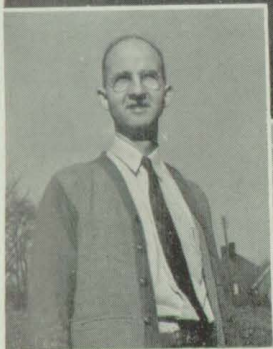
THE SUNSHINE SOCIETY

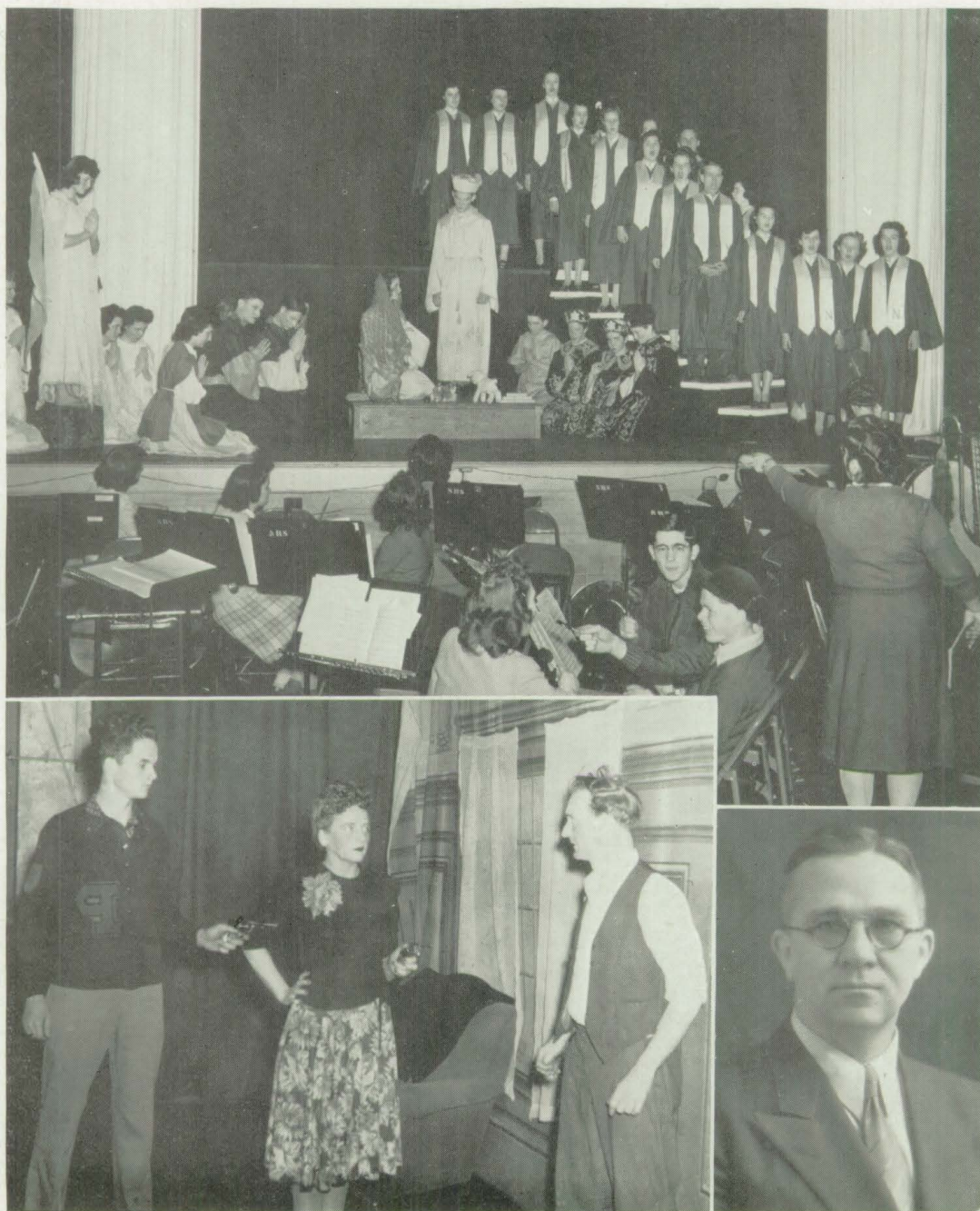

CONVOICATIONS



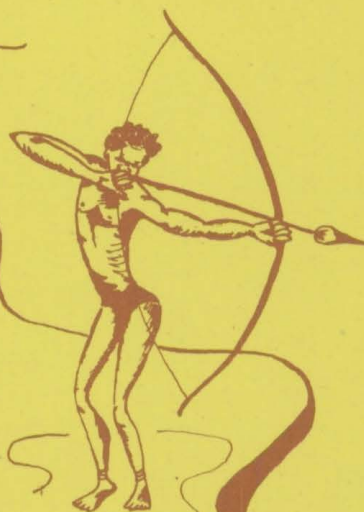

Losing to Kokomo in the Big Four Tourney by a margin of points, the Trojans came back with every



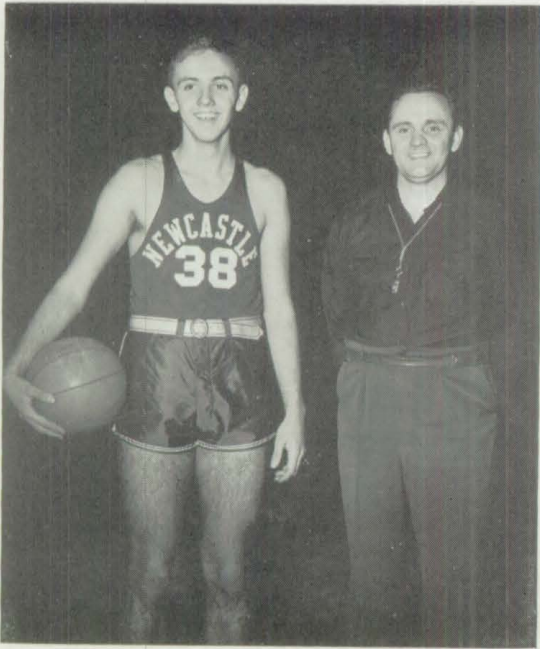

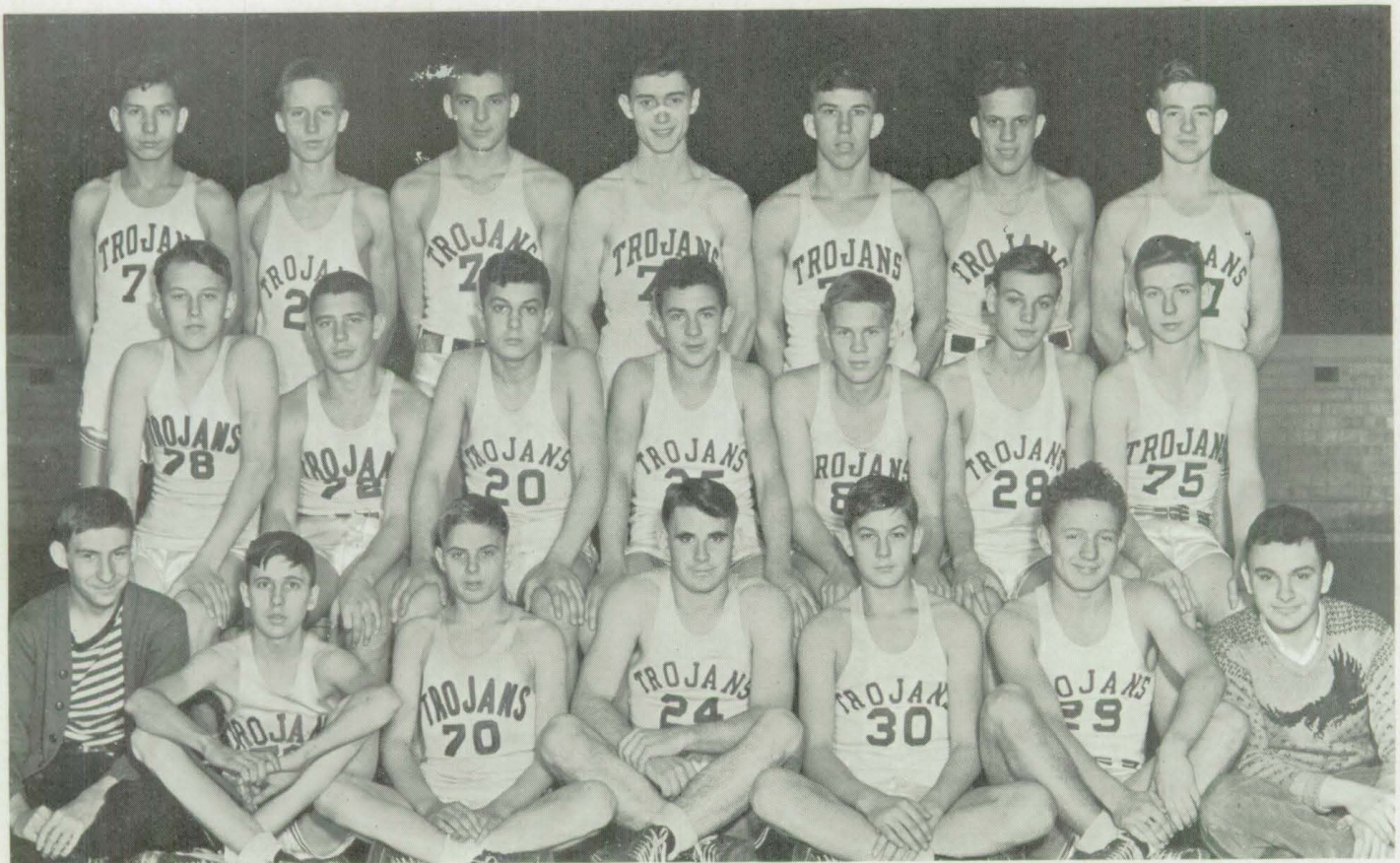


TROJAN COLTS

KNIGHTSTOWN MORTON MEMORIAL

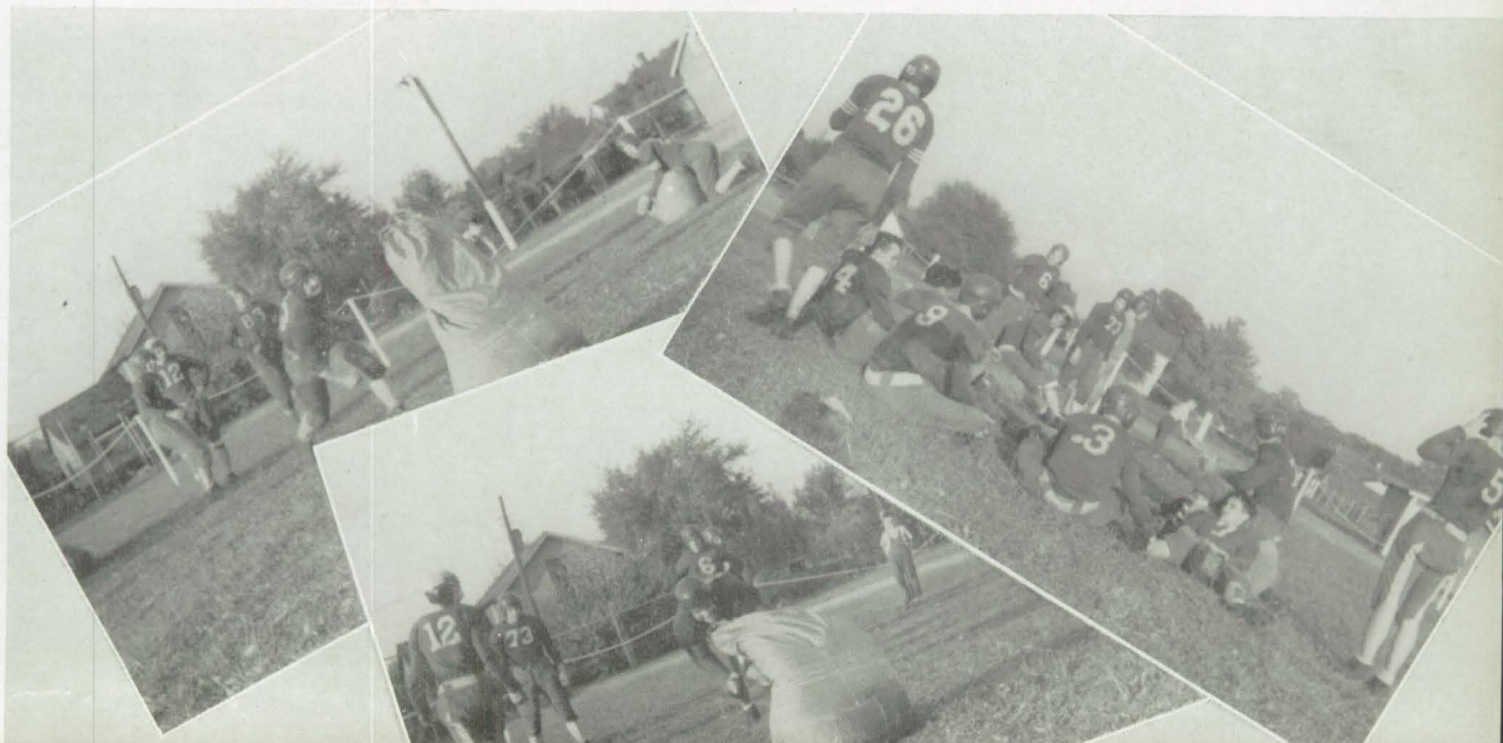

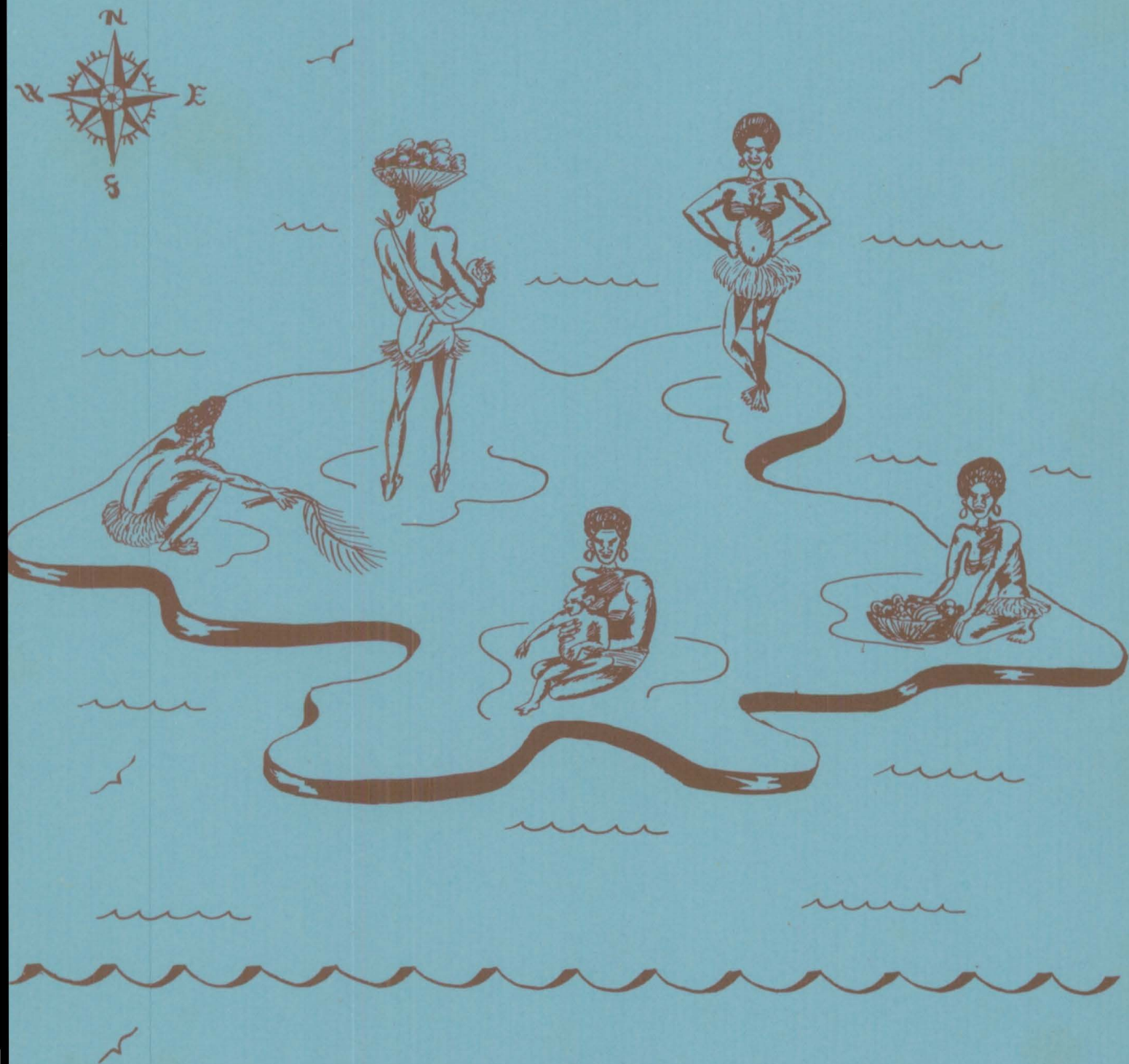

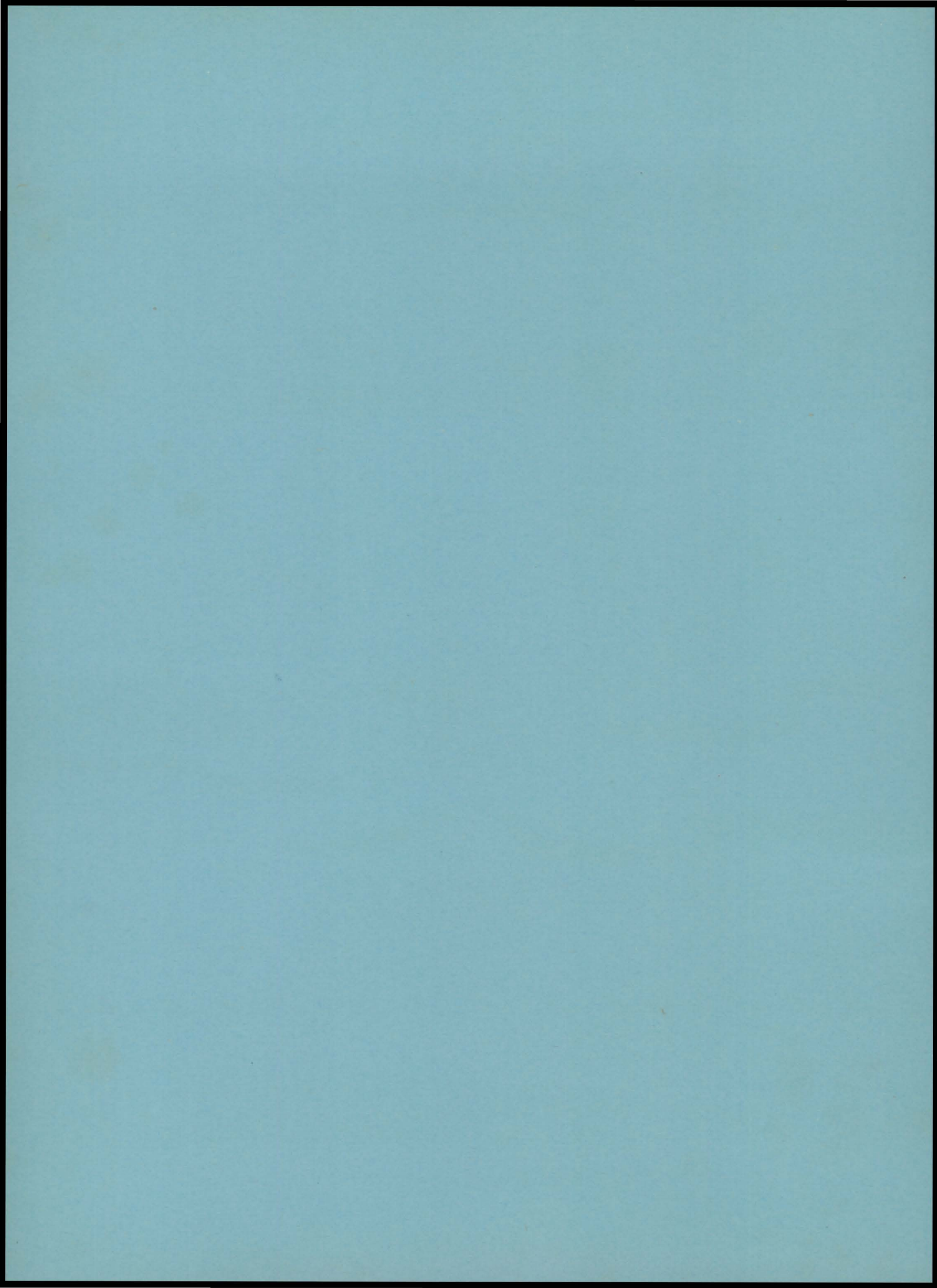
