Part of knowing correct English is the use of it. Miss Ritter gives students of her class an opportunity to put correct English into use.

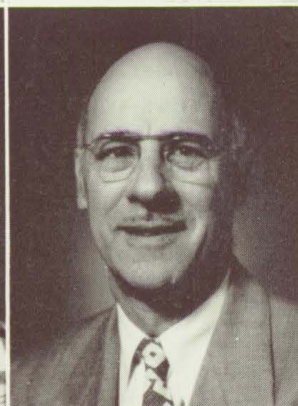

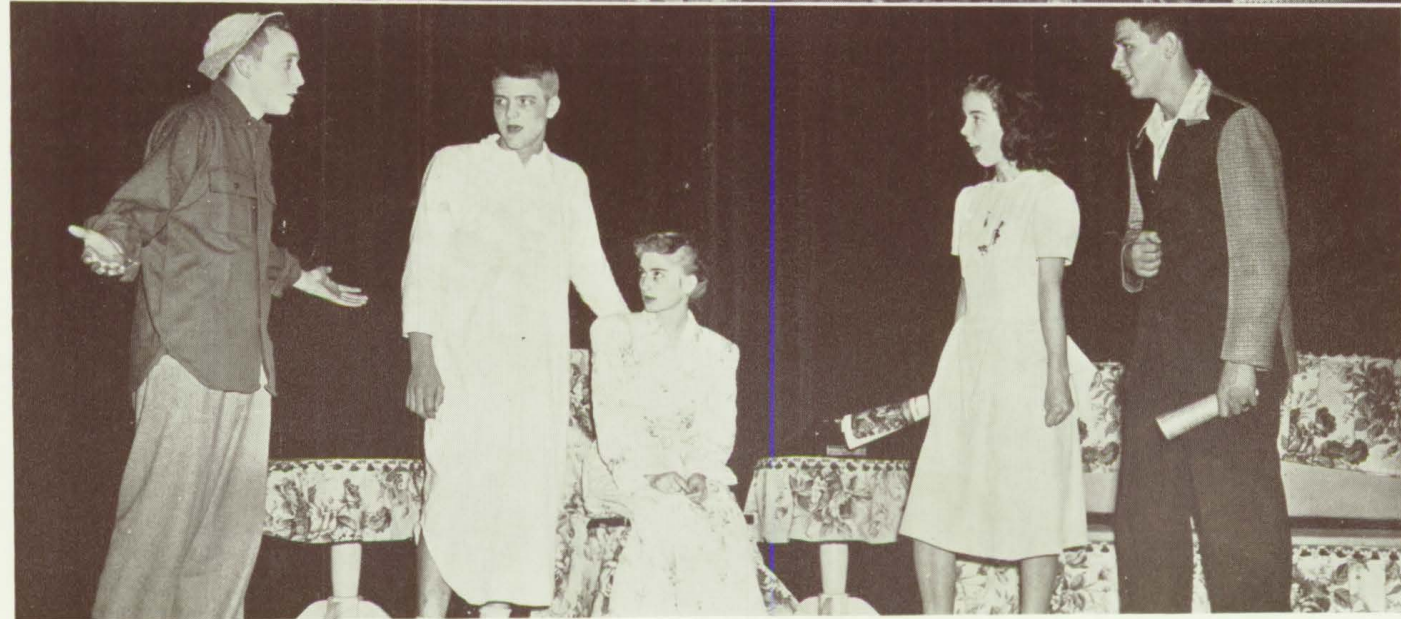

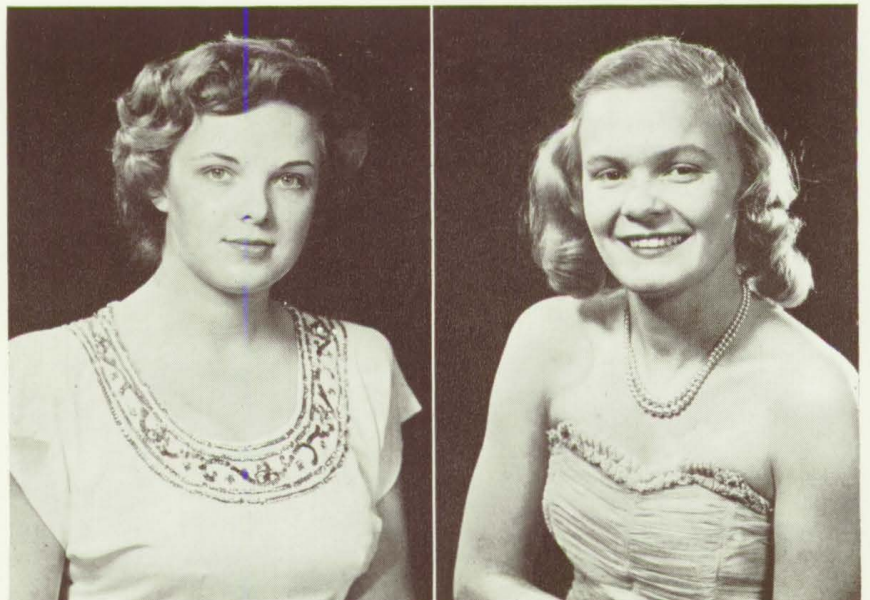
Junior Prom

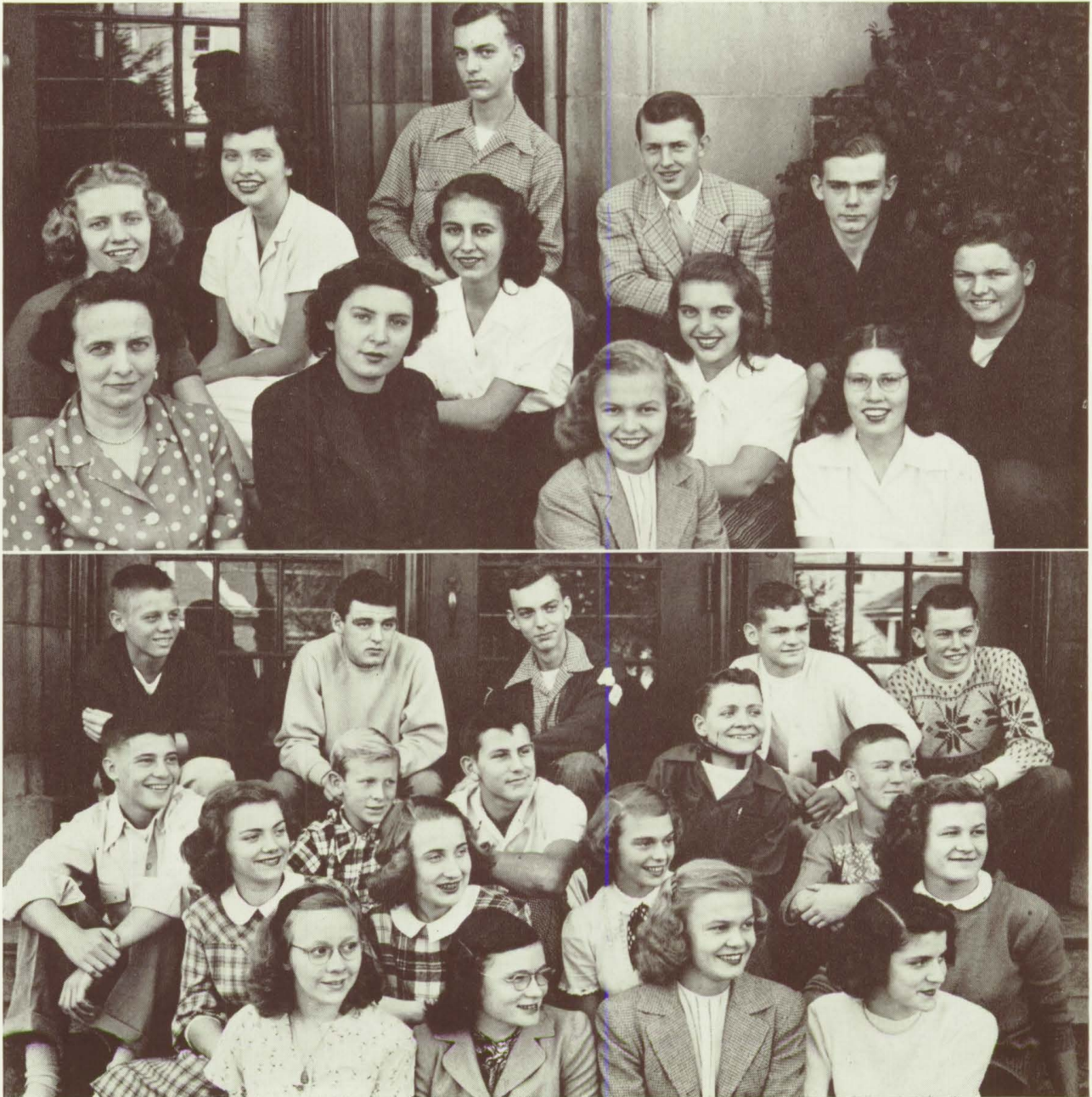

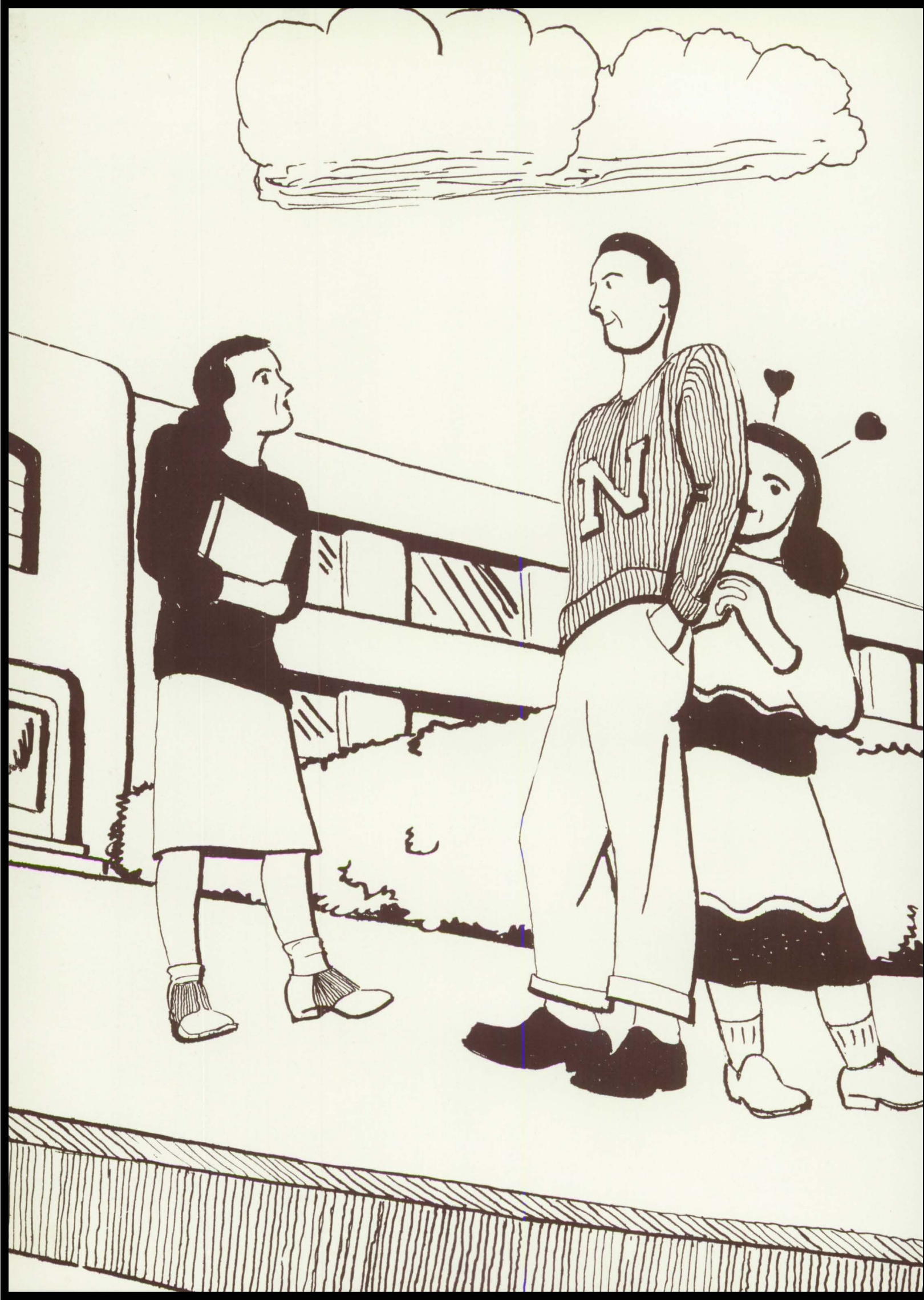

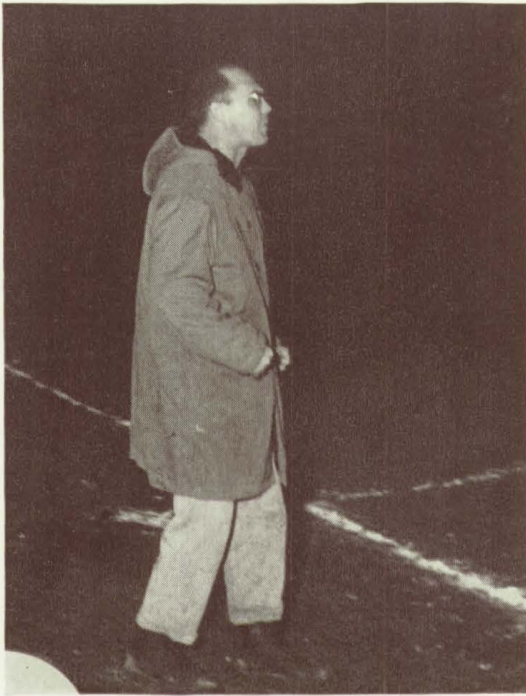


Act VI

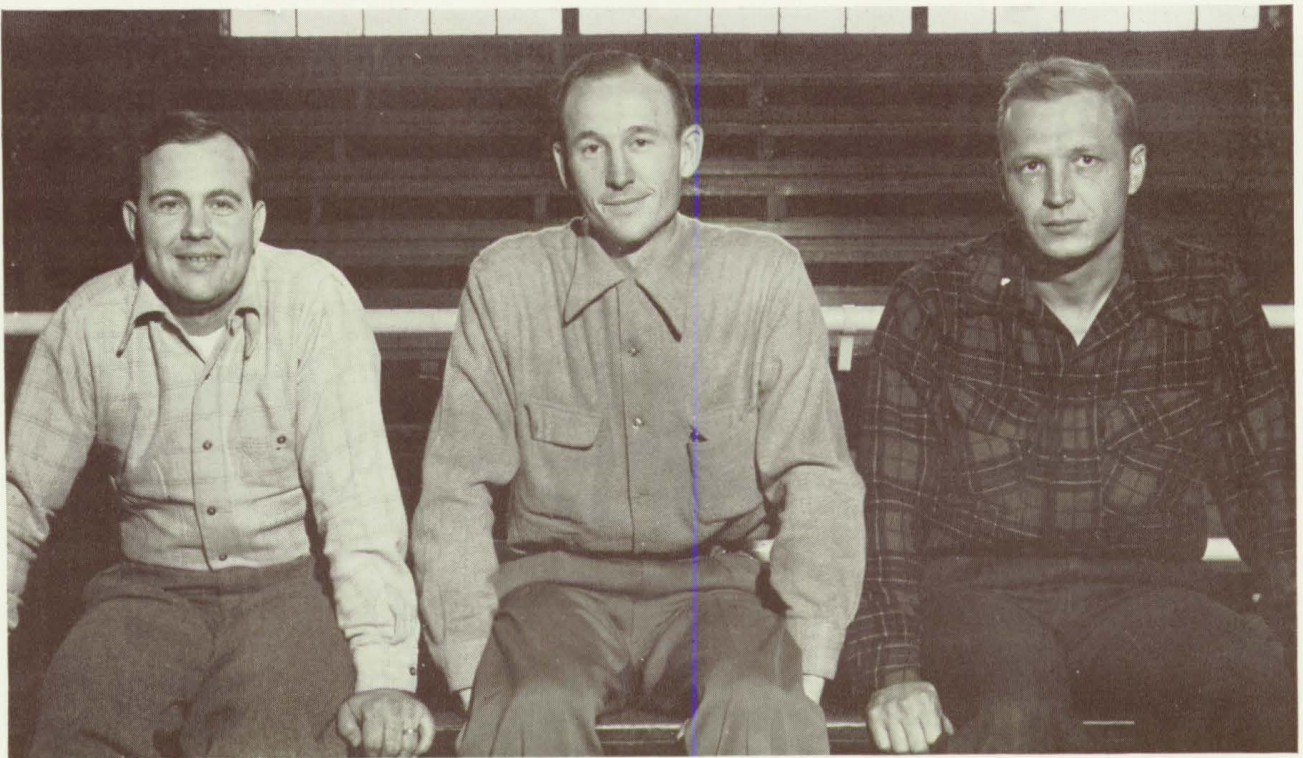

The '47 football season found the men of Troy with a small and inexperienced eleven. We got under way with a long trip to Bloomington, and were the underdogs by four touchdowns. But we came home at the small end of a 13-0 score.

Next we were attacked on our own field by an over-confident Seymour team. At half time we trailed 19-6 and came back with determination to tie up the game and give the people something to talk about.

We were feeling much better now, and had a little more confidence in facing our first NCC game with a powerful Richmond team. We couldn't get started and the Red Devils ran over us 25-0.

The Trojans, after a week's recuperation, ventured to Rushville. We played good ball the first half, only to fall apart the last and come home silently at the tail end of a 27-12 score.

We were now ready to do battle with the Marion eleven and were gunning to beat them and cause one of the greatest upsets in the conference. We played heads-up ball and were ahead 13-12 with 17 seconds to play, when a Giant back found his receiver in the end zone. Final score, 18-13.

After that game we were feeling pretty good. We traveled to Huntington, who hadn't won any of the six they played, and we left them with seven defeats as we broke into the win column. Jerry Ellis scored the only touchdown to make it 6-0.

With a victory behind us, we were now faced with the Anderson Indians. It was a rainy night and it slowed the Indians' passing attack as Jack Keith scored two touchdowns to put the game on ice, 25-6 in favor of the Trojans.

Now the people really had something to talk about. Logansport was the next victim. This was Jim Dailey's best game. He ran wild for three touchdowns, two of them being in the final minutes to bring us from behind an 8 to 6 score to win 18-8.

We were now at our peak and were ready to trim Sacred Heart. A muddy field to slow us down and a few bad breaks, with Sacred Heart men there to take advantage of them, cost us the game. Final score, 12-7.

Muncie Central, rated as one of the best in the state, was our next foe. Time after time the Bearcats broke Wojak, the NCC scoring leader, into the end zone. Ed Trieschman played fine defensive ball, but it was not enough as they dropped us 49-12.

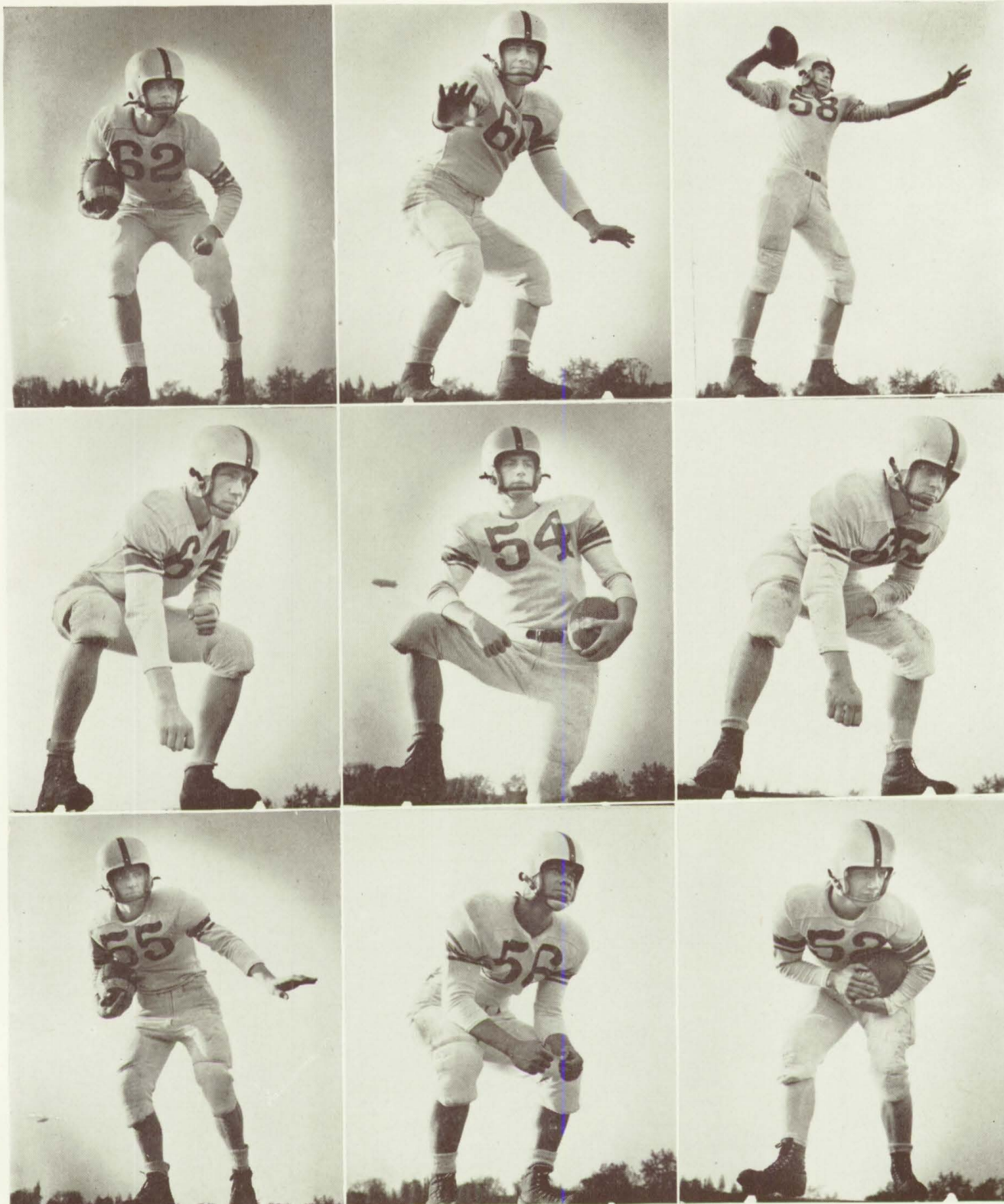

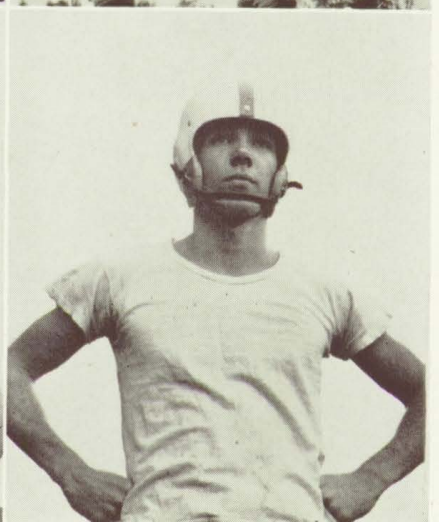
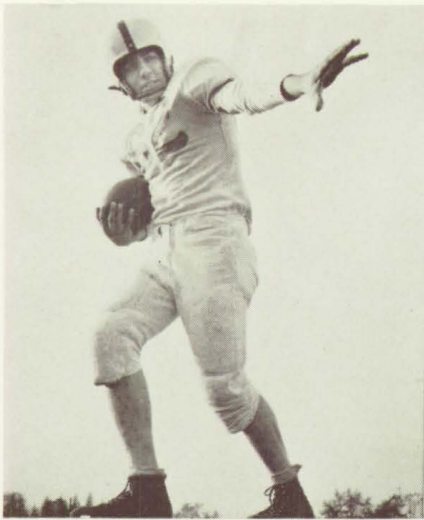

had. With another year to play, he will go places in the conference.

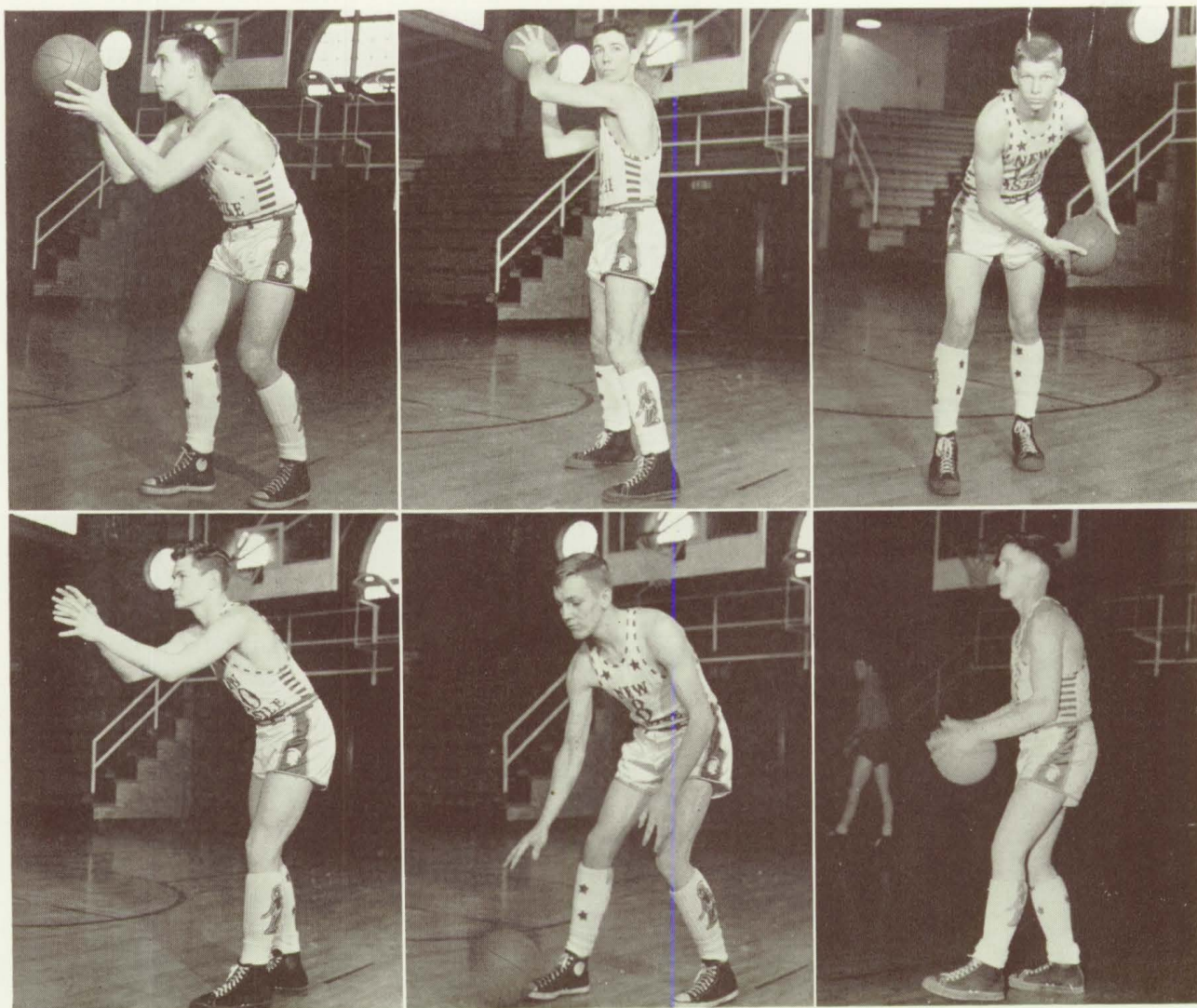

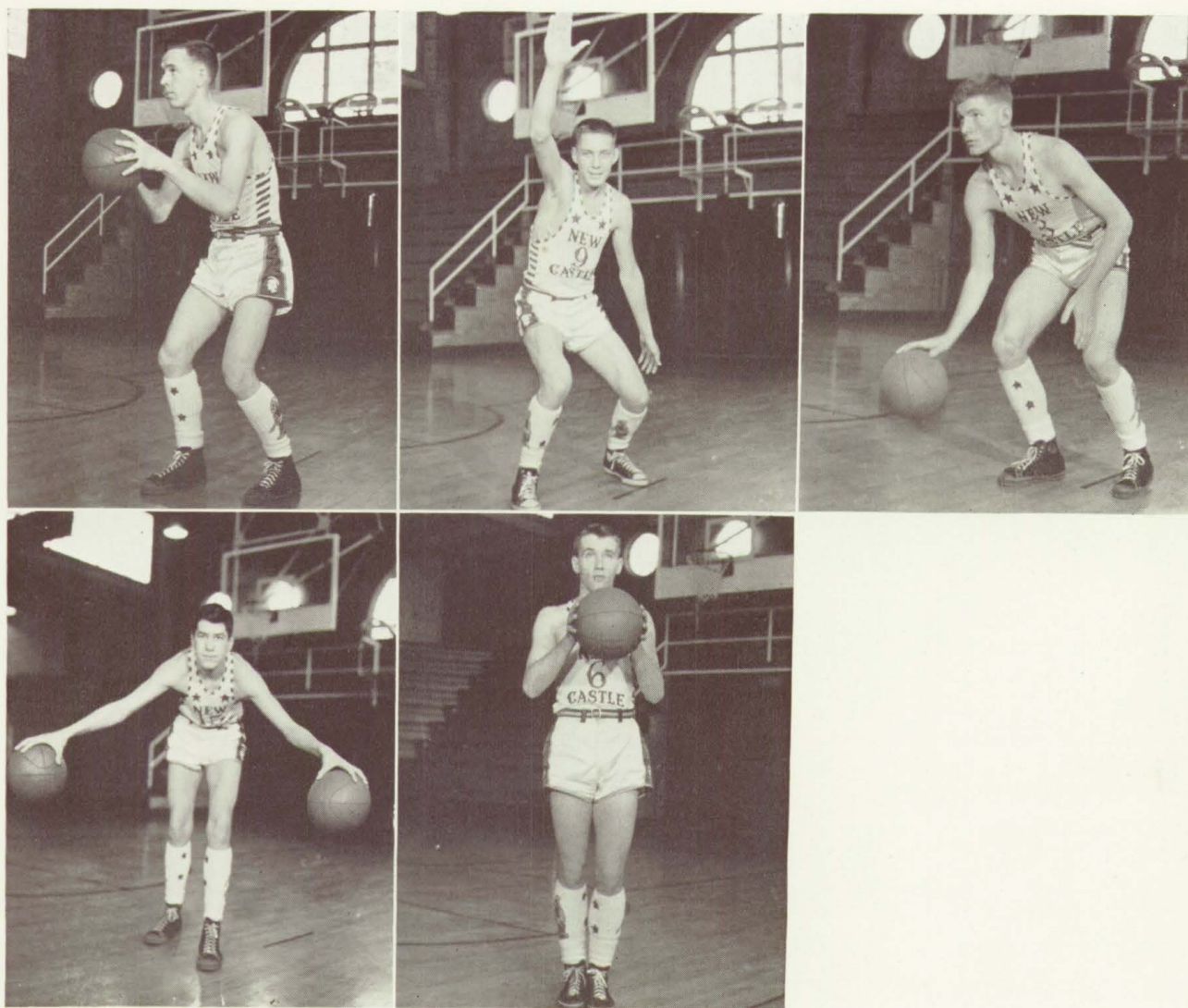

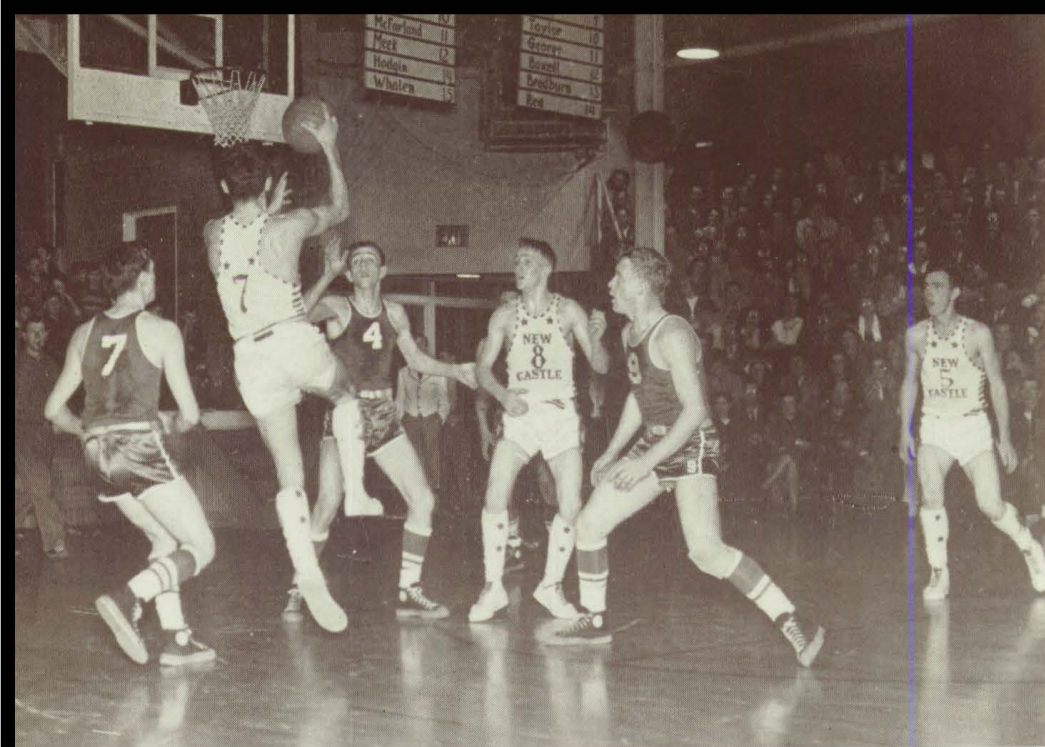

DICK WHALEN—6' —155 lbs.—"Hands," only a sophomore, didn't get to play much but held his position as guard on the team by his ability to control the ball.

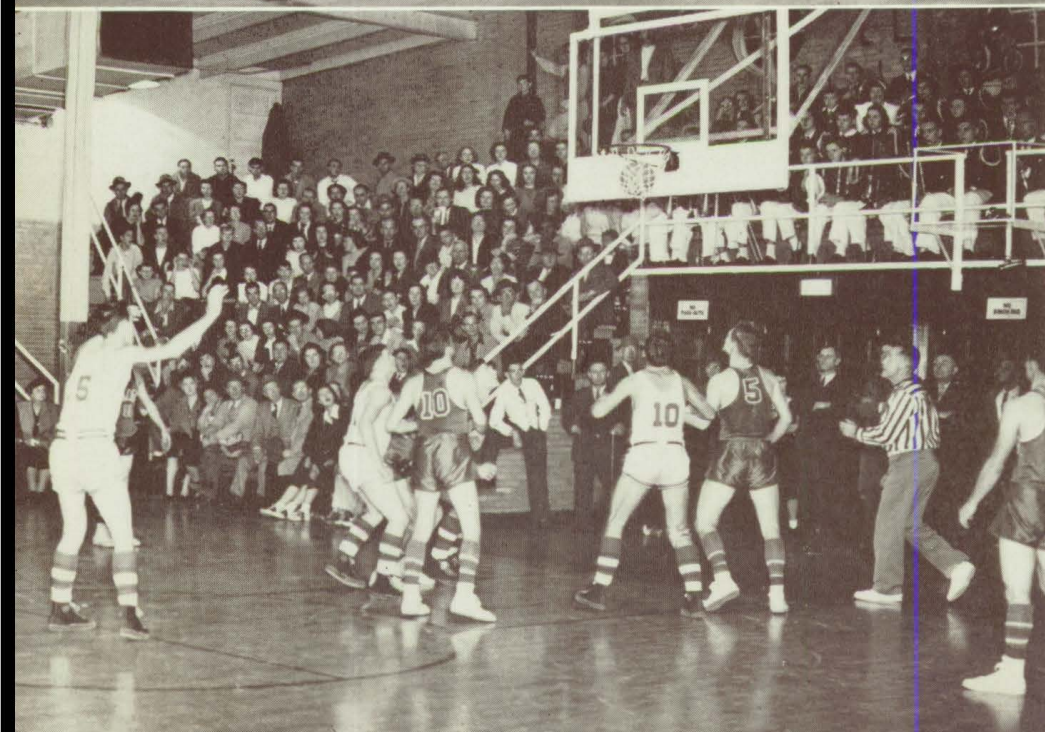

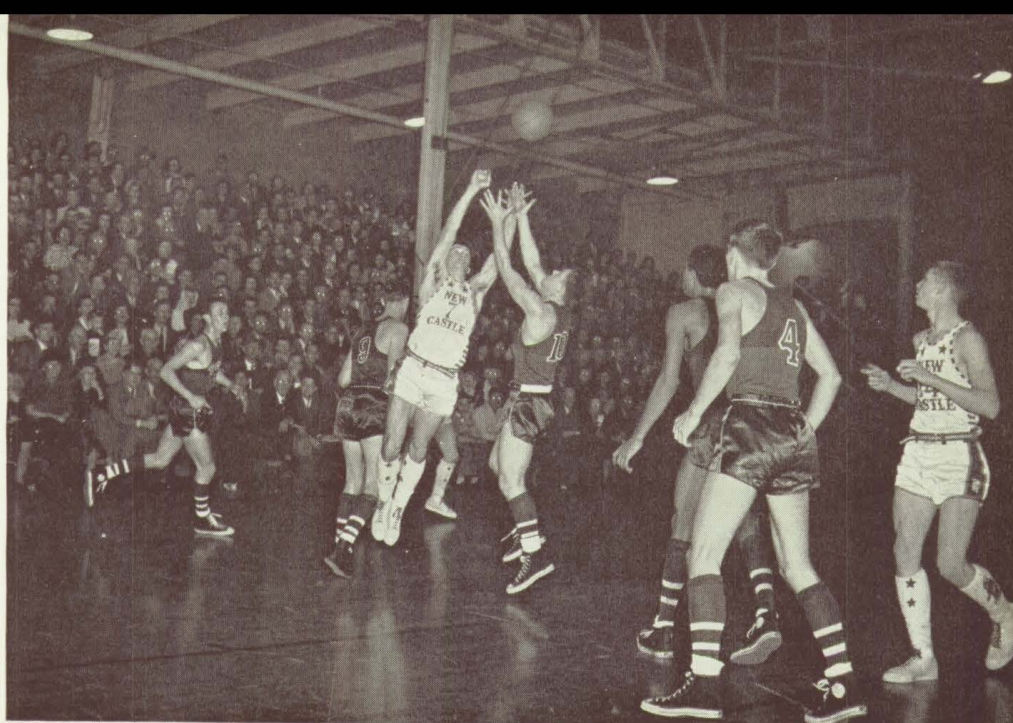

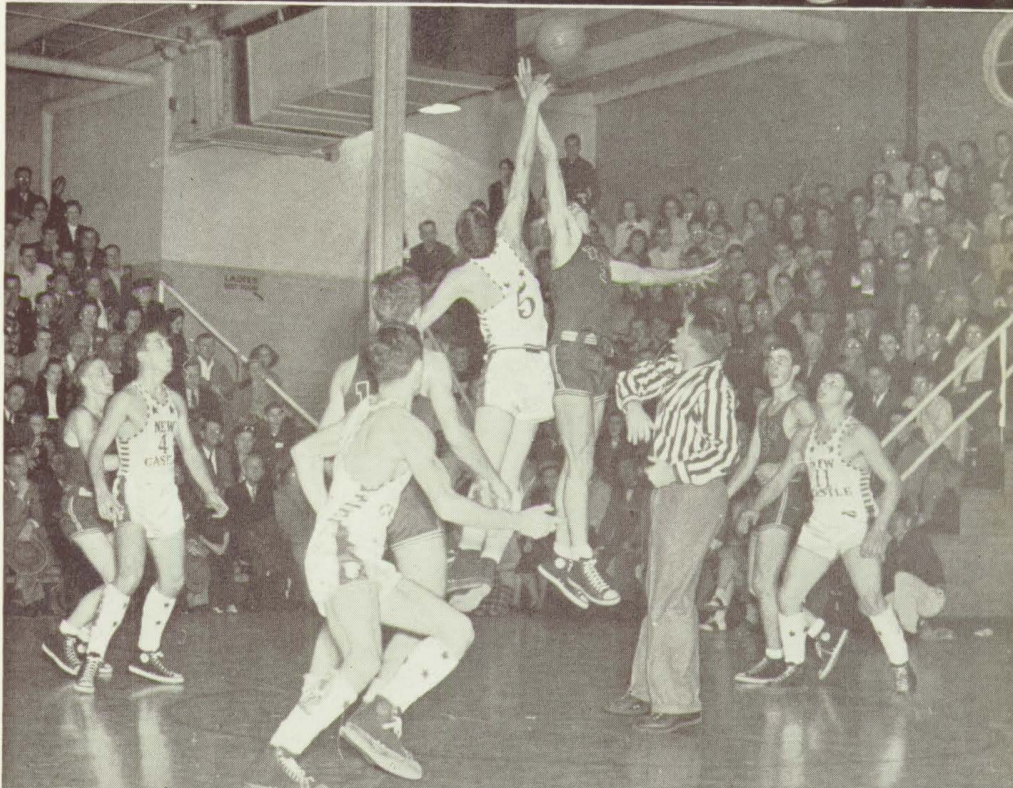

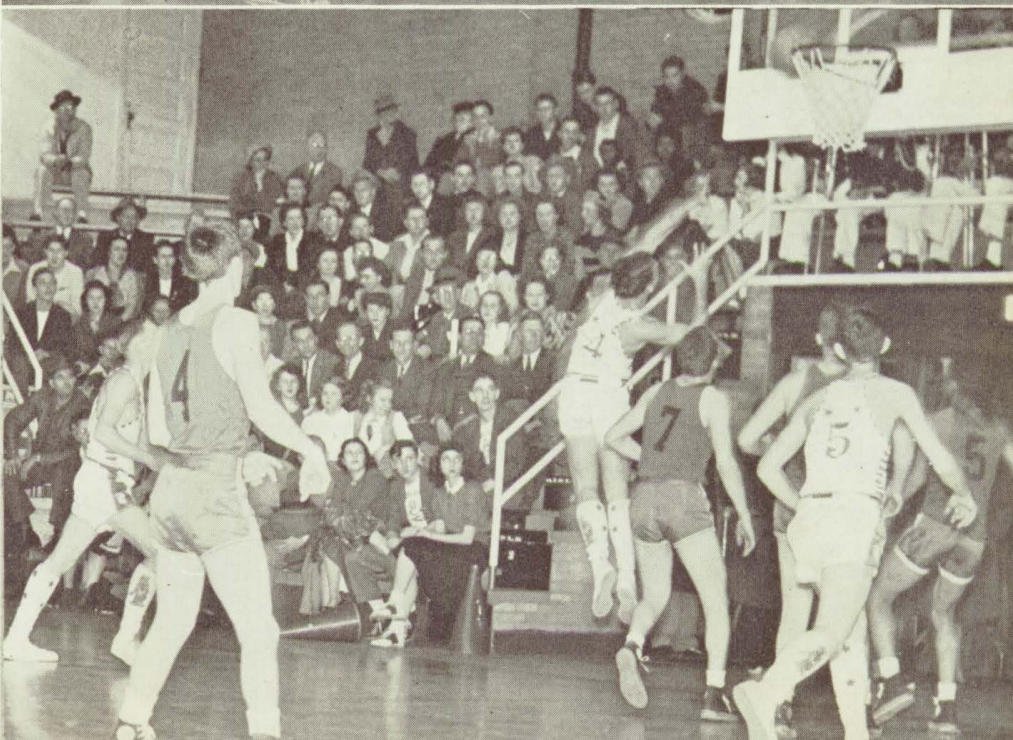

The Trojans' Trail

The man directly responsible for athletics in New Castle is Coach "Chuck" Stuckey. During his regime as head of the athletic department, sports have reached a high level in N. H. S. Mr. Stuckey has instilled in his boys a thorough knowledge of sport and an appreciation of the qualities of fine manhood through his own example. So with a man like that as head mentor you can not blame him or his boys for the record they have compiled over the season. And while we are on the subject let's take a look at the Trojans' Trail.

New Castle's Trojans started the season with an inexperienced five and the people didn't seem to have very high hopes for them. So with the spirit they had they did pretty well. Here is their record of the past season.

They opened their season playing a Greensburg quintet and lost the game. It was a close game most of the way, but the Trojan five didn't have that extra spark to win in the last quarter and came out on the tail end of a 27 to 26 score. Our next guest was a small Connersville five which the Trojans set back for our first victory by a score of 30 to 28. The date set for the Anderson game was November 26. The Indians proved to be too experienced and they handed us our second loss in one week by a score of 38 to 32.

Tech of Indianapolis took to the road and gave us our first real, hard-fought victory. Tech led most of the game until the last few seconds when Ellis hit a one-hander to tie the score at 32 all. Then Ellis stole the ball and passed it to VanBebber, who shot just as the gun went off to hit and make it 34 to 32, our favor. The following night we traveled to Burris for our first game away from home. We stopped them cold and came home with a 34 to 27 victory.

It seems that the last three games left before New Year's tourney were very discouraging. We fell under the heels of the powerful Richmond Red Devils, Muncie Central, and Rushville by the scores, 39 to 27, 55 to 31, and 46 to 44 respectively. Then came the most thrilling thing that has happened to us this season—we won the New Year's Tourney. We sent

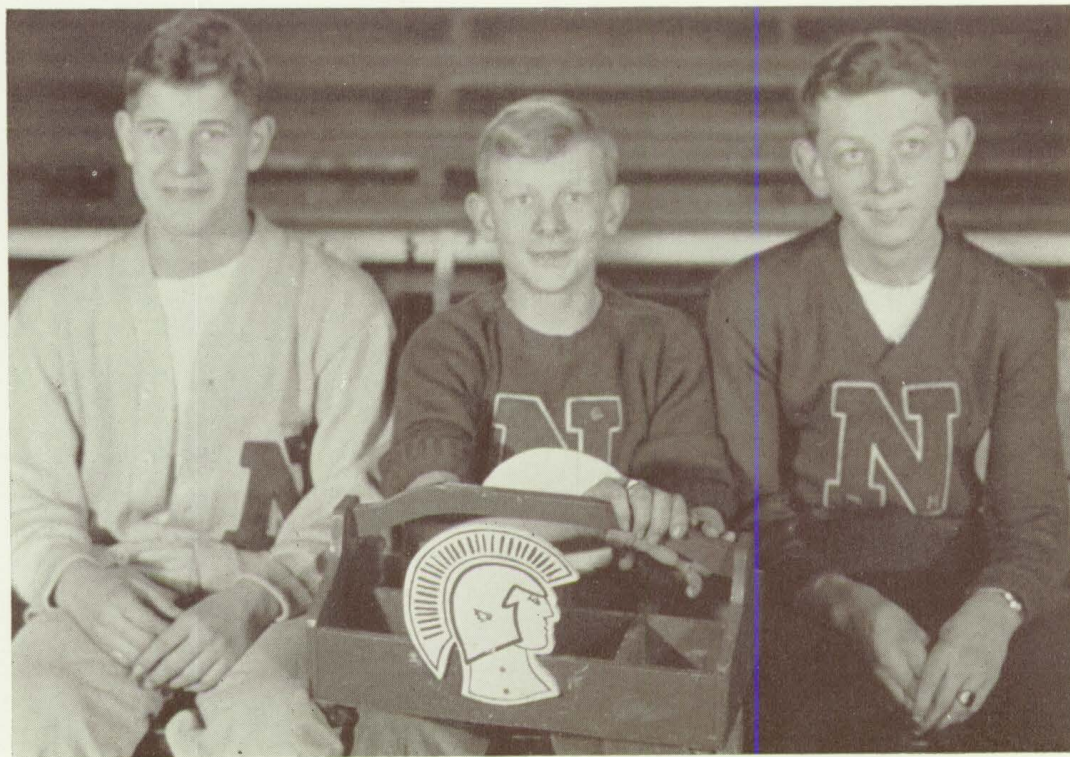
Anderson to the consolation game by a score of 41 to 25 and then won the final game by handing Logansport a sickening 44 to 33 defeat.

Lafayette, N. C. C. conference winner, paid us a visit and left us with a 47 to 32 defeat. We were on the road again and went to Kokomo where they handed us a 41 to 25 defeat. Then the Frankfort Hot Dogs sent us home with a 46 to 21 loss. Back on our own floor we entertained the Red Devils and again they set us back by a score of 43 to 27. Marion was waiting for us in their field house and we could not overcome the lead they had on us. We lost 37 to 27. Then the Logansport Berries came to town and got their revenge by dropping us 38 to 25. We were gunning for Muncie Central's hide this time and we got it, if that's what you want to call it. We barely edged past them, but we did win by a score of 41 to 40. We were feeling about average but we wanted the Indian's scalp. We did get it by running over them 40 to 36. This was the first game in which the sophomore five appeared as the starting line-up.

Then came the last two games of the season and they were away from home. We lost one of them to Lebanon and the other to Columbus by scores of 57 to 45 and 52 to 46 respectively.

At the end of the regular season the Trojans started to get ready for the coming sectional. The Stuckeymen's first opponent was the New Lisbon Tigers, and we drubbed them right into the ground by a score of 59 to 19. Next we faced the Straughn Indians. We had little trouble in disposing of them as we sailed to a 36 to 32 victory.

Then came the final game of the sectional in which we played the Middletown Cossacks. At the end of the game we found ourselves on the top end of a 40 to 38 score, and an overtime victory. Bill VanBebber, stellar forward, who many said saved the game for the Trojans in the last quarter, came along and swisher the nets for 12 points, including the bucket that sent the game into the winning overtime. But it was the steady playing of the whole team that sent us to the Regional.

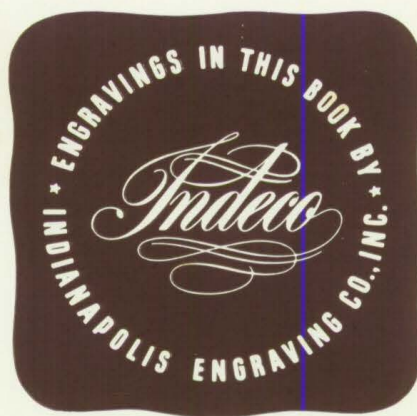
