
Our Faces Tell Our

New Castle-Henry Township High School is the official name of the brick building located on Fourteenth, Walnut, and Fifteenth streets, but to most of us it is called N. H. S.

N. H. S. added a distinctive landmark to its appearance this year. This is the aerial to the school FM radio station, WYSN. With the addition of the aerial, some changes were made. Part of the room was converted into a studio and a control room. The station is located at 89.3 megacycles on the Frequency Modulation dial. "Your Schools In New Castle" broadcasts over a power of 10 watts and has a radius of about two miles. New Castle High School became the fourth high school in Indiana to have a station owned and operated by the students.

There are many other additions; a very large freshman class came to the high school. This was contrasted with a small senior class.

The faculty made various changes, and nine new teachers were added to help teach the varied subjects. The dean of girls changed for the second semester. Miss Evelyn Rentchler took over Mrs. Alice Berhendt's duties as dean. Walter Hassfurder coached the varsity basketball team for the first year, while Kenneth Simmons coached the basketball B-team.

In the sports field, boxing and wrestling were added. Added to the list of organizations were the Bible Club, Art Club, and Rifle Club.

A girls' cheering block was reorganized by the yell leaders. In memory of a fellow classmate, the block adopted the name Macerettes.

Three classes added to the curriculum were distributive education, distributive occupation, and narcotics.

The programs were written and broadcast by the students of the radio classes, except for some transcribed programs, at 89.3 megacycles.

Members of Mr. Michael's shop class make many useful articles as they learn the operation of these machines. Some of these articles include cedar chests, book cases, lamps, coffee tables, and many other useful pieces of furniture to be used in the home. Members of the shop classes display their work behind the large windows in their workshop in the lower hall.

The art class in New Castle Senior High is one of the most interesting classes offered in the school. These art students shown here are molding clay to be used as dishes, ash trays, or ornaments. They also keep the bulletin board in the hall gaily decorated with signs of the season and news of coming dances. Other projects of the art department include finger painting, water color painting, and the making of puppets.

"Breakfast at school" is pictured here in Mrs. Davisson's cooking class. In this beginning cooking class, girls are taught how to prepare simple meals and bake pies, cakes, and muffins. In various other home economics classes, the girls are taught table etiquette, Christmas decorations, grooming, buying of clothes and their color schemes. 
Our Senior Year

The following week, however, the Haymen chalked up their second win of the season and first North Central Conference victory against Logansport, 7-6. The New Castle outfit followed this triumph with a victory over Royerton. Then the Trojans had a two-game win streak broken by the Muncie Central Bearcats. The Rose City crew played one of its best games of the season against the Muncie team although they were beaten. This defeat was cast aside in the Trojans' minds as they blasted the Frankfort Nighthawks in their next outing to finish the season in good spirits and win their second conference victory.



But Just Not Enough Pounds





DEVINE — If "Ginger" only had another season left he would surely be a starter. Harold got very rugged toward the season's end.




















Good Reserve Strength Helps Cagers Throughout Season



Jane Horney, Janie Stinson, and Ruth Higgins, members of the fifth period physical education class, are participating in a game of basketball, one of the games played during the winter months.




The members collect convocation passes at convocations, usher at plays, concerts, and other programs, and compile the honor roll at the end of each six-weeks' grading period.
