




RELAXATION WAS IMPORTANT, TOO...




THE FUTURE

Barbara DeWitt discusses her future career in art with Miss Leanna Young, art instructor, as Mr. Richard Jaeger looks at the advanced art display.




New Castle citizens and all students were stunned on December 18, when they learned of the sudden death of Superintendent Joe R. Craw. Mr. Craw, who came to New Castle from Hagerstown as principal in 1942, became superintendent in 1945. He held both A.B. and M.A. degrees from Butler University.

His work as a school administrator was recognized all over Indiana and New Castle schools became known for their progressiveness. Realizing the inadequacies of the present school buildings, Mr. Craw worked diligently to foster the building program. Wilbur Wright and Sunnyside were built during his administration, another grade school and administration building, and two grade additions will be built this summer, and he was hard at work on plans for a new high school at the time of his death.

OUR ROSENNIAL FOR OUR FRIEND

It is not primarily as an administrator that we students will remember Mr. Craw but as a friendly person who was never too busy to stop and chat. When we think of him we always remember his smile and cheery hello and realize how remarkable it was that he could have known so many NHS students. Despite his many responsibilities, he could always find time to demonstrate his favorite recipe to a cooking class or to join in any classroom activity. The friendly atmosphere he created will long be remembered in NHS. Therefore the 1954 Rosennial staff wishes to dedicate this Rosennial to Mr. Craw, a wise administrator and a good friend.



Mr. Rexford G. Wright, high school principal, became acting superintendent of schools in December following the death of Mr. Craw. A firm believer in high scholastic standards, he worked constantly for a bigger and better school system. Mr. Wright secured his A.B. degree from DePauw University and his M.S. degree from Indiana University. He also has had two years of graduate work.

Practical Arts Director, Mr. Edgar Redman, added the duties of principal to his other responsibilities during the second semester. As Practical Arts Director, he was in charge of the large adult evening school. He received his A.B. degree at Oakland City College and his B.S. degree at Indiana State Teachers College. He also has his M.S. degree which he obtained from Purdue University.



The curriculum is diversified to prepare each student for his future aim whether it be college or immediate employment. Classes are also designed to develop special talents in art, music, dramatics, journalism, and speech. Whether they are for the academic or the vocational student, they are made interesting by field trips, demonstrations, speakers, and movies. All of these experiences help to qualify us as useful citizens for our community.

Guiding us in these activities is our faculty—57 strong. Their helpful attitude encourages us to work harder to profit from their training and experience. In addition to their years of college training, many of these teachers have traveled widely or have worked in other fields gaining information which enriches their teaching. 

These and many more days of work and excitement combined to make our senior year in NHS a happy one.















This year more students than ever have poured into the already crowded high school with 273 of these being juniors, 336 sophomores, and 303 freshmen.


Only the juniors were organized as a group with officers and a sponsor. Their main event, as usual, was their successful promheld in May in honor of the seniors.



The loss to Connersville gave the Trojans a losing record with four wins and six loses.


Coach Hay's boys got off to a rip roar'n start as the Green and White took their first three opponents.









Reeves — Roger, a junior and reserve forward and guard, always played his best. Always fighting to keep possession of the ball, he guarded his opposition closely.


Bunner — Terry, a junior, was third in the scoring division. He was a terrific rebounder and his specialty was to drive his man and come in for a lay-up.







CONVO, TOUR HIGHLIGHT BAND'S YEAR







ALTRUSA, ROTARY SELECT OUTSTANDING SENIORS


Because of their vocational interest in a specific field and also for scholastic achievement and qualities of leadership, eleven seniors were chosen Altrusa Girls.


Elsa Daubenspeck and Jack Andrews were chosen among the top ten students from the House of Representatives.








