We Reveal Special Talents

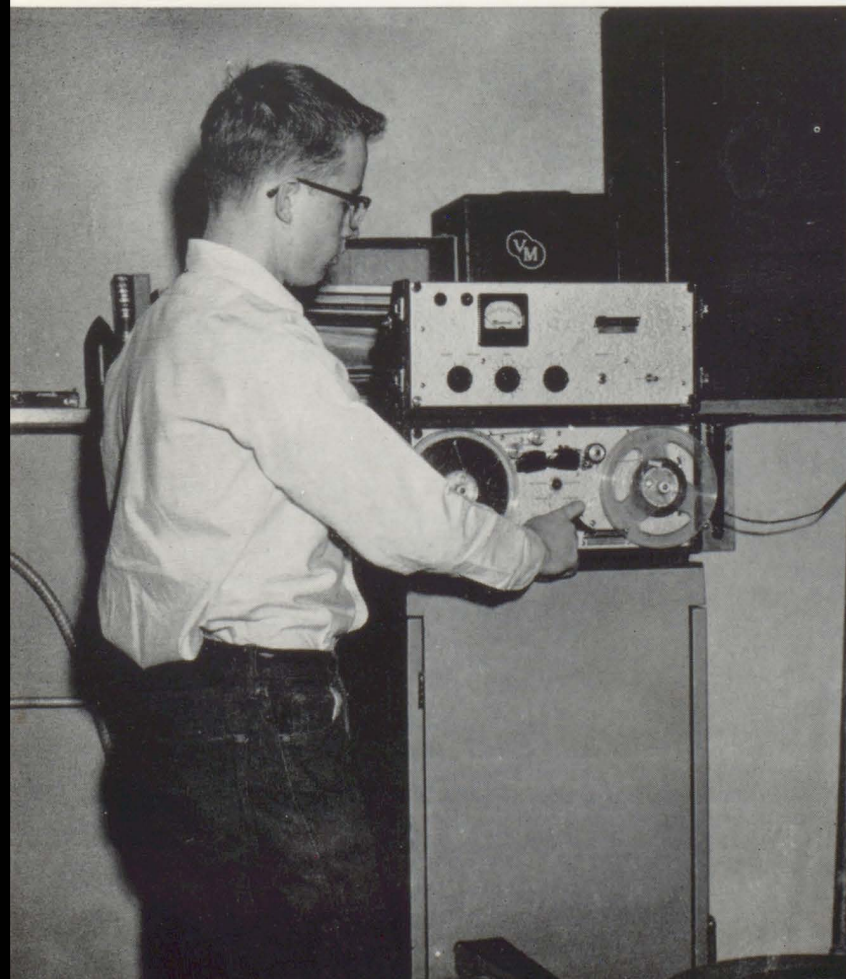

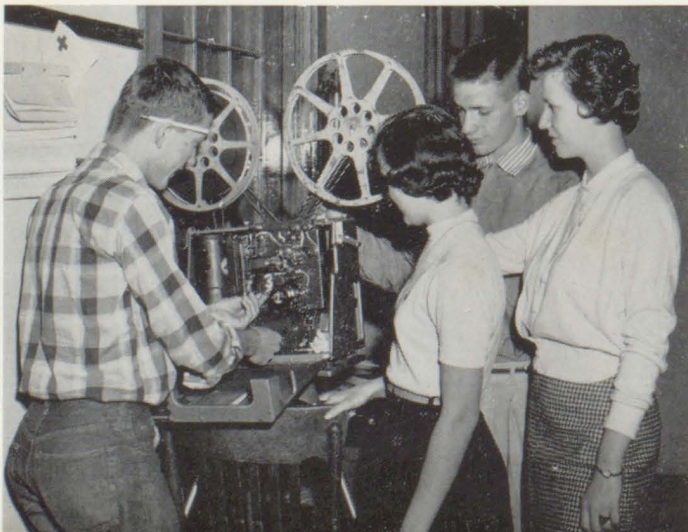

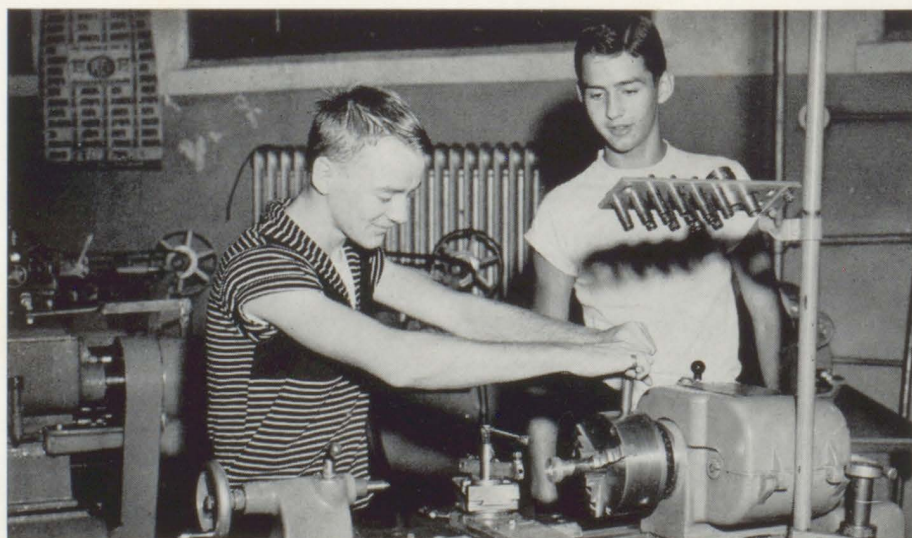

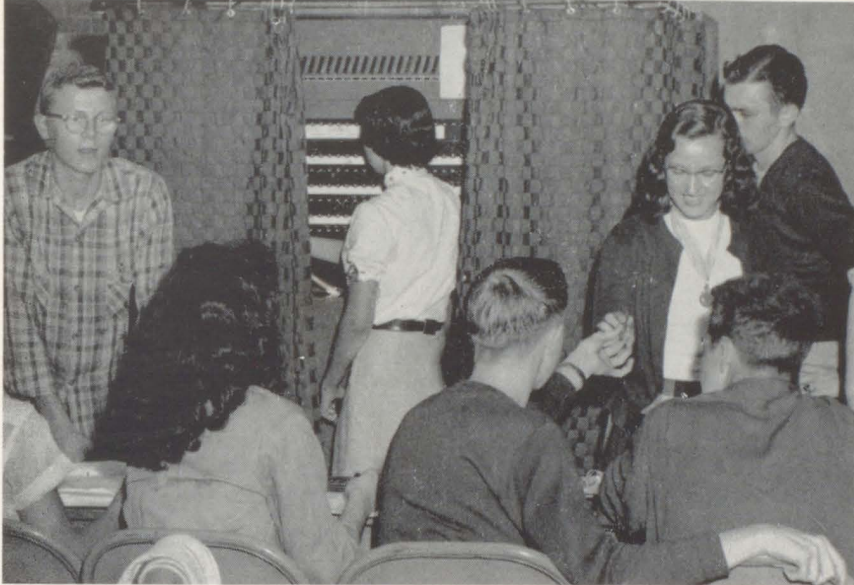

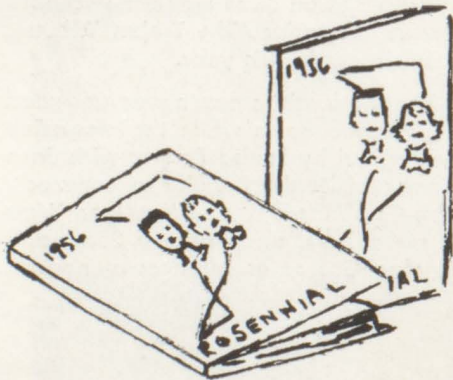

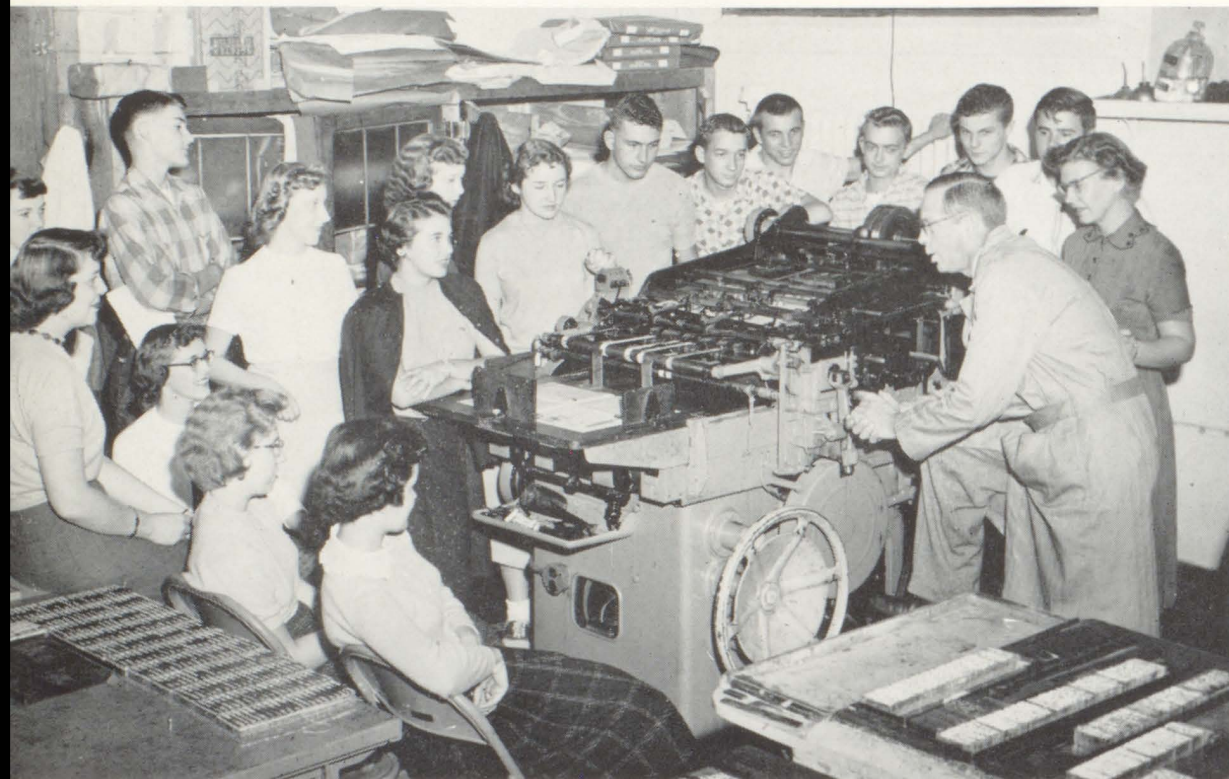

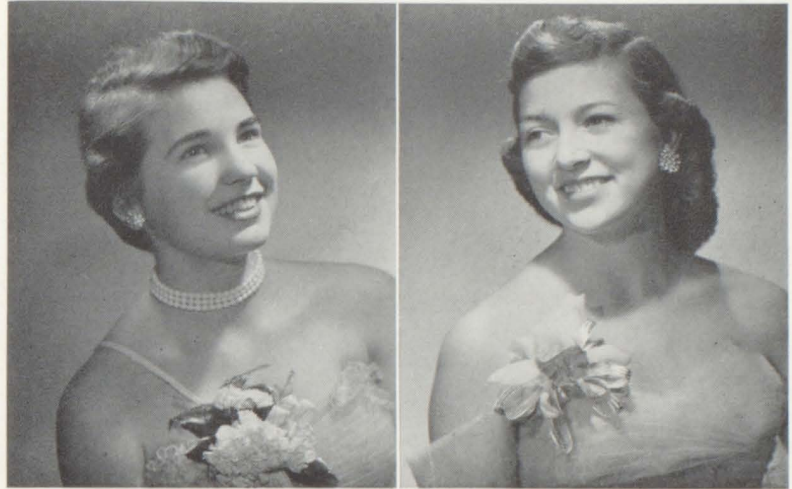

Reigns Over Southern Wonderland

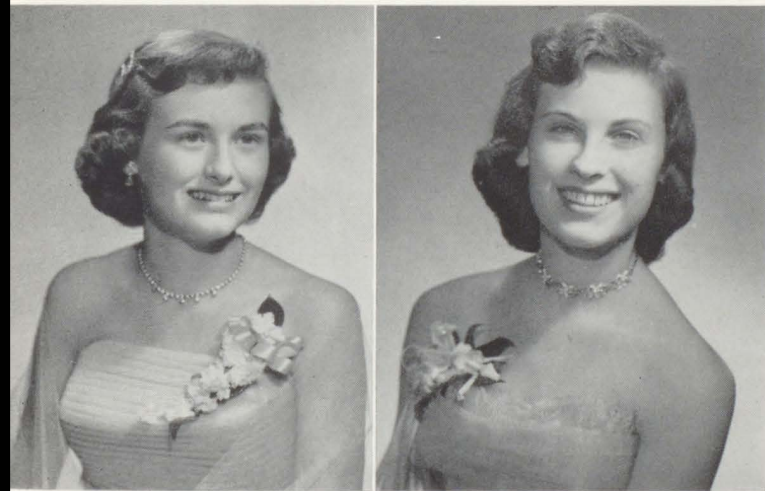

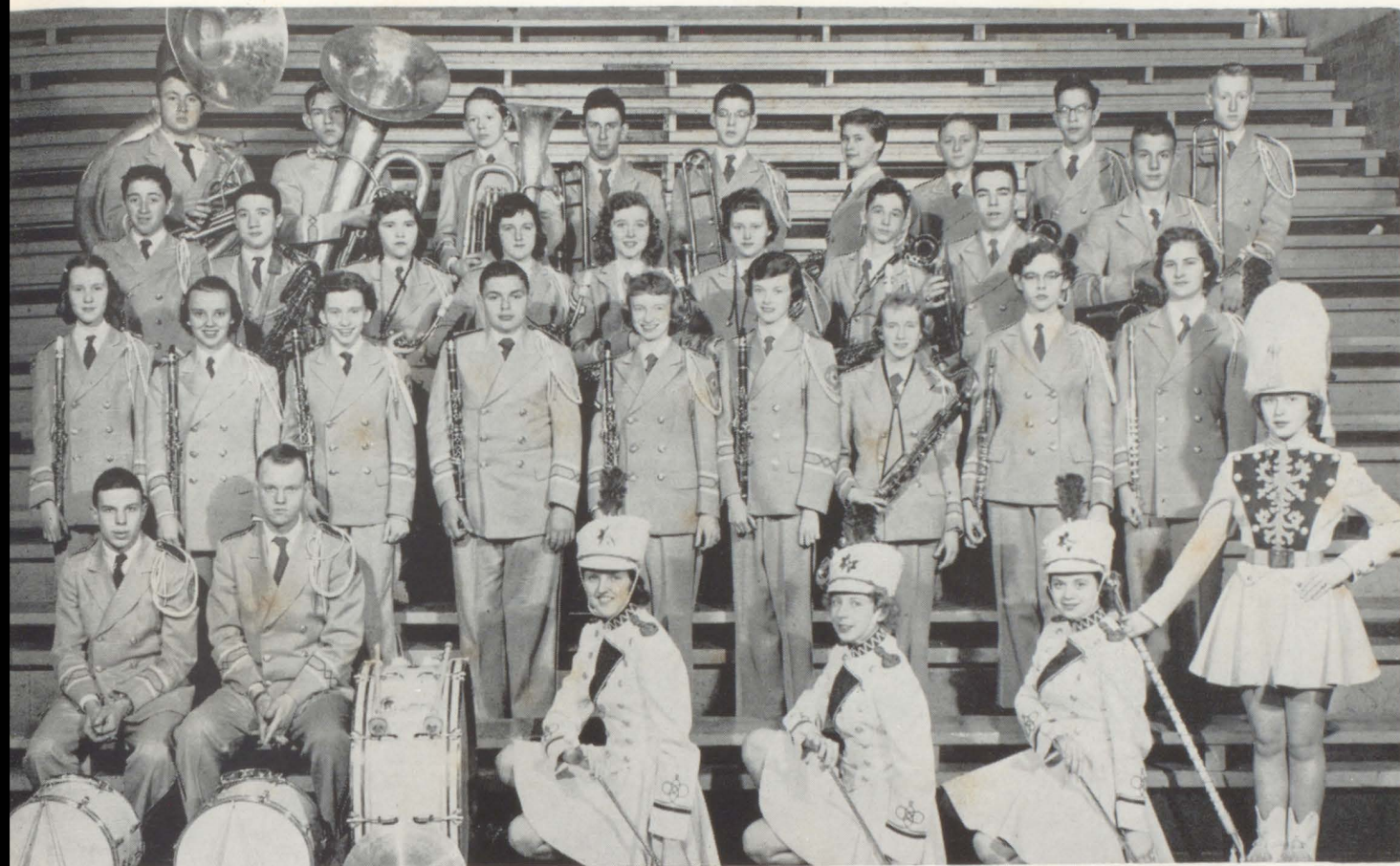

Singing in the Christmas and Easter convocations and at the spring and fall concerts was the main attraction for the Girls Concert Choir with 52 voices.

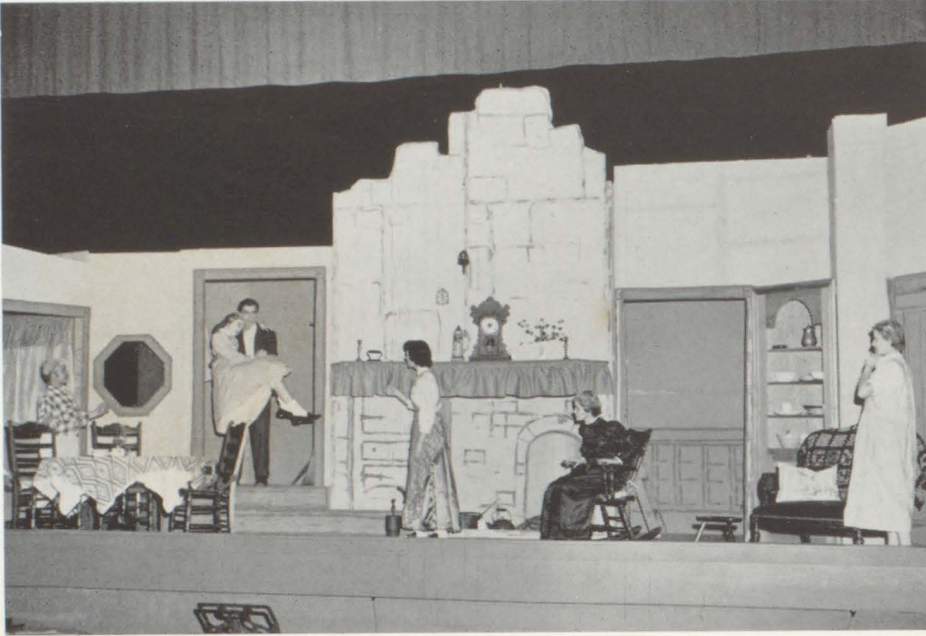

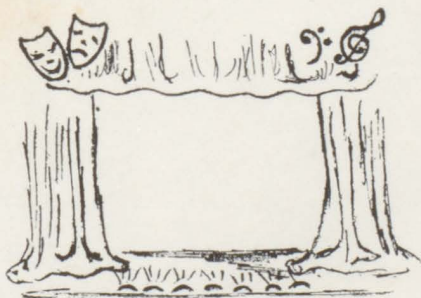

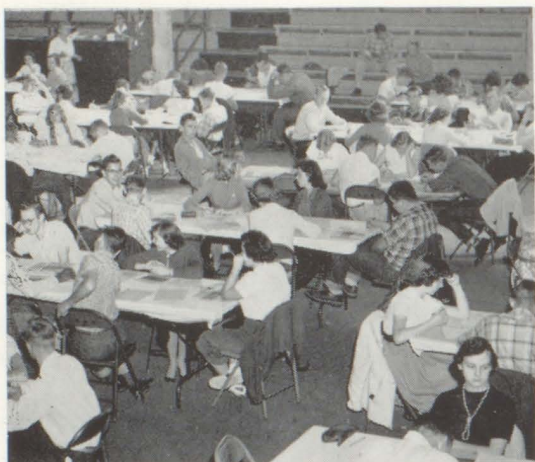

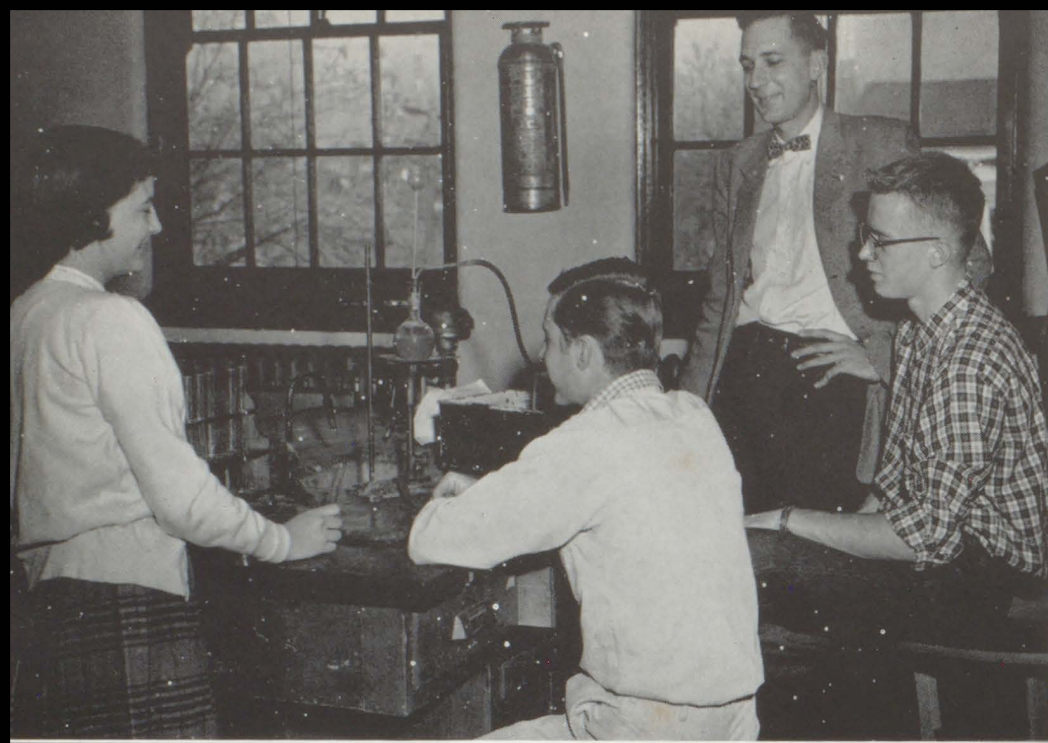


Parties, Activities

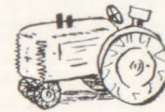

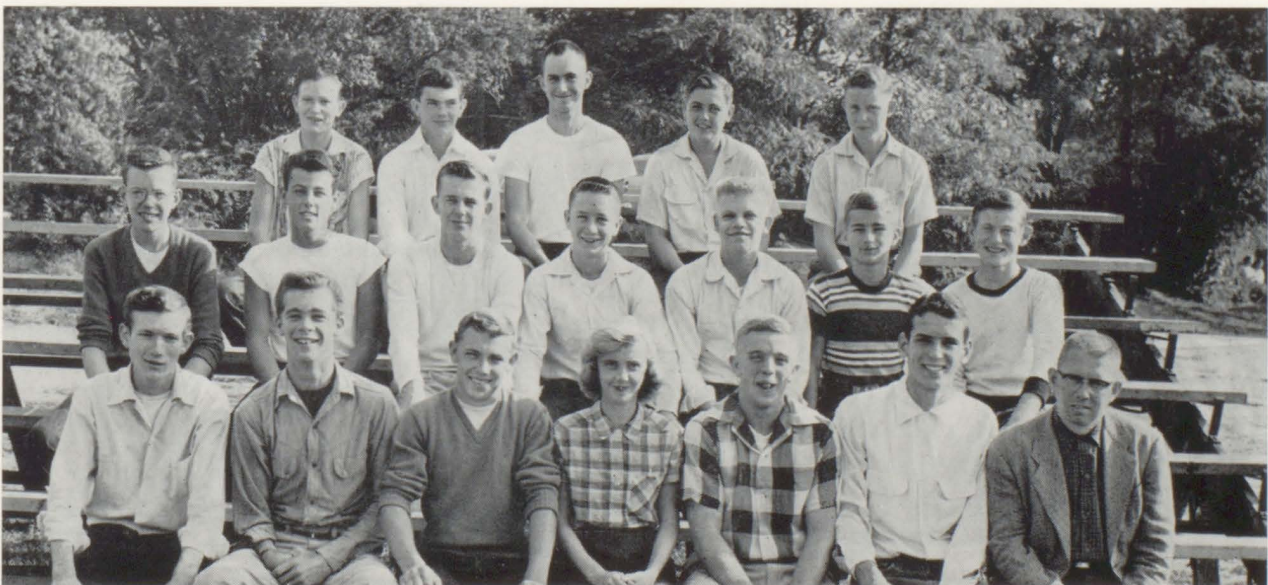

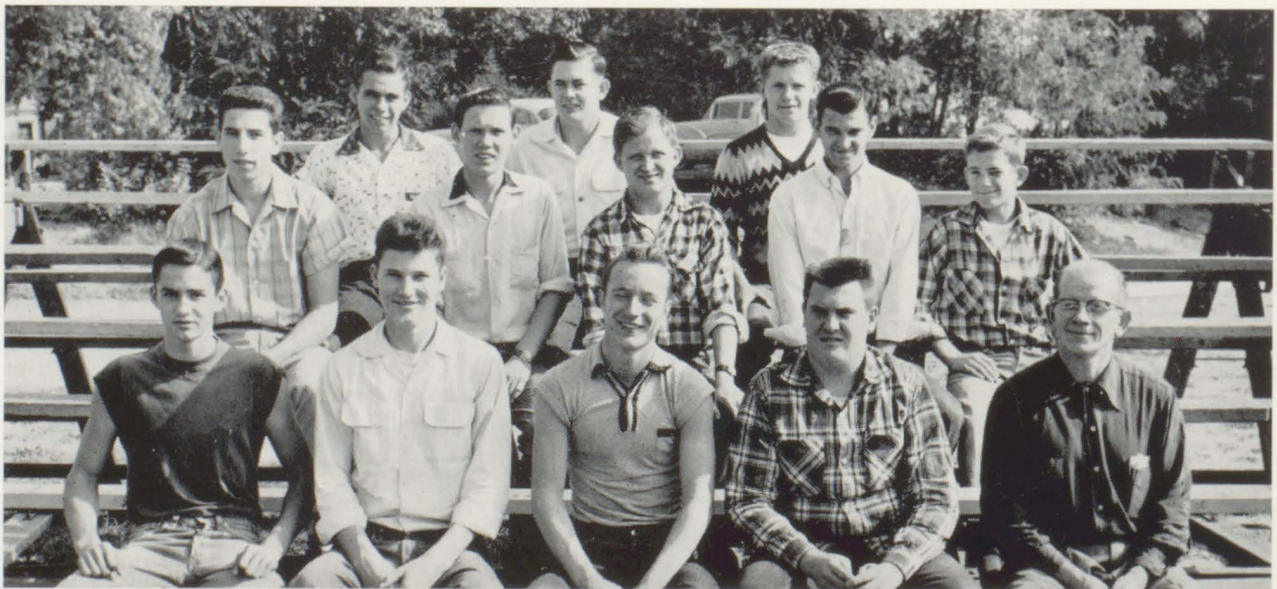

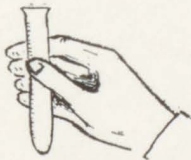

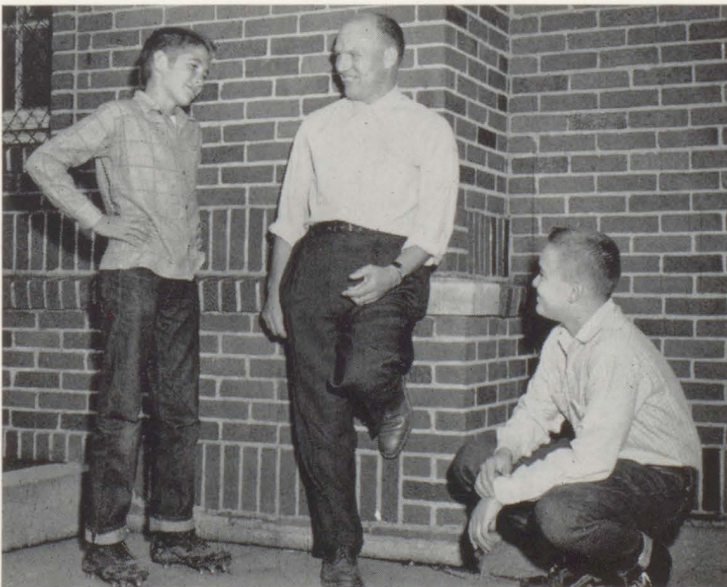

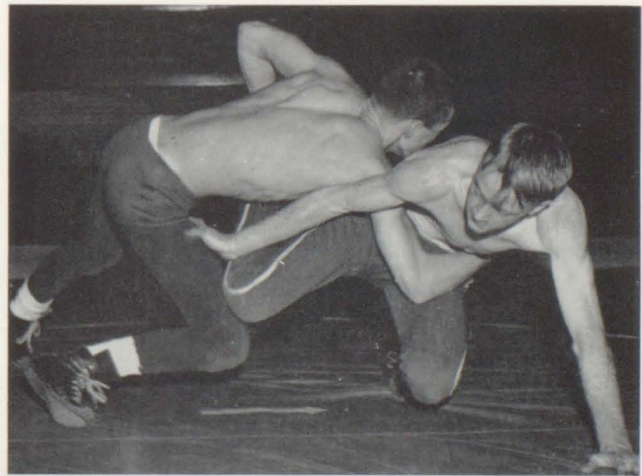
Musclemen Develop Coordination

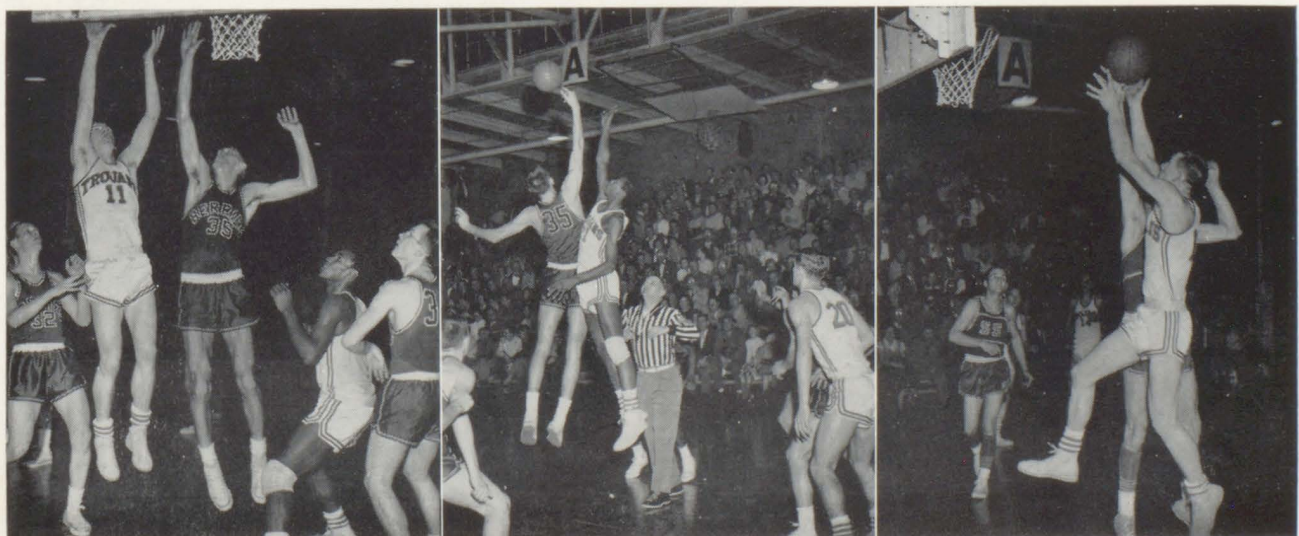

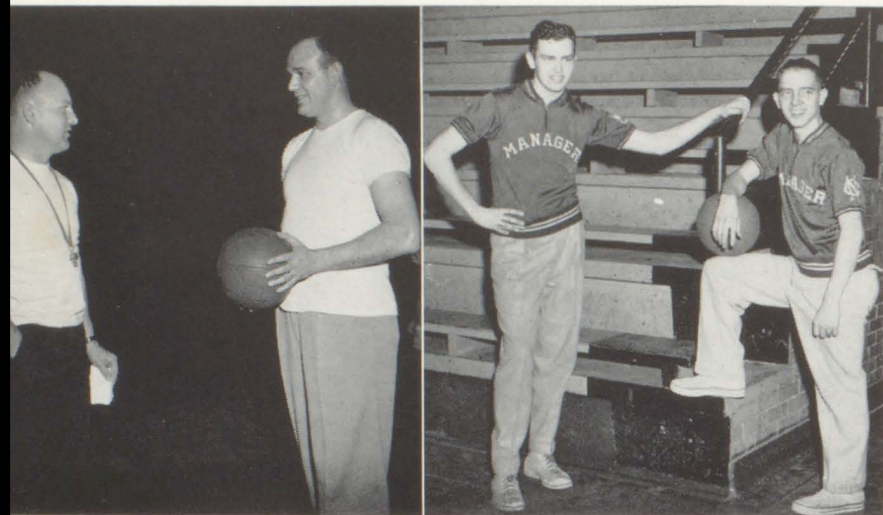

Coaches Stress Team Play, Fundamentals

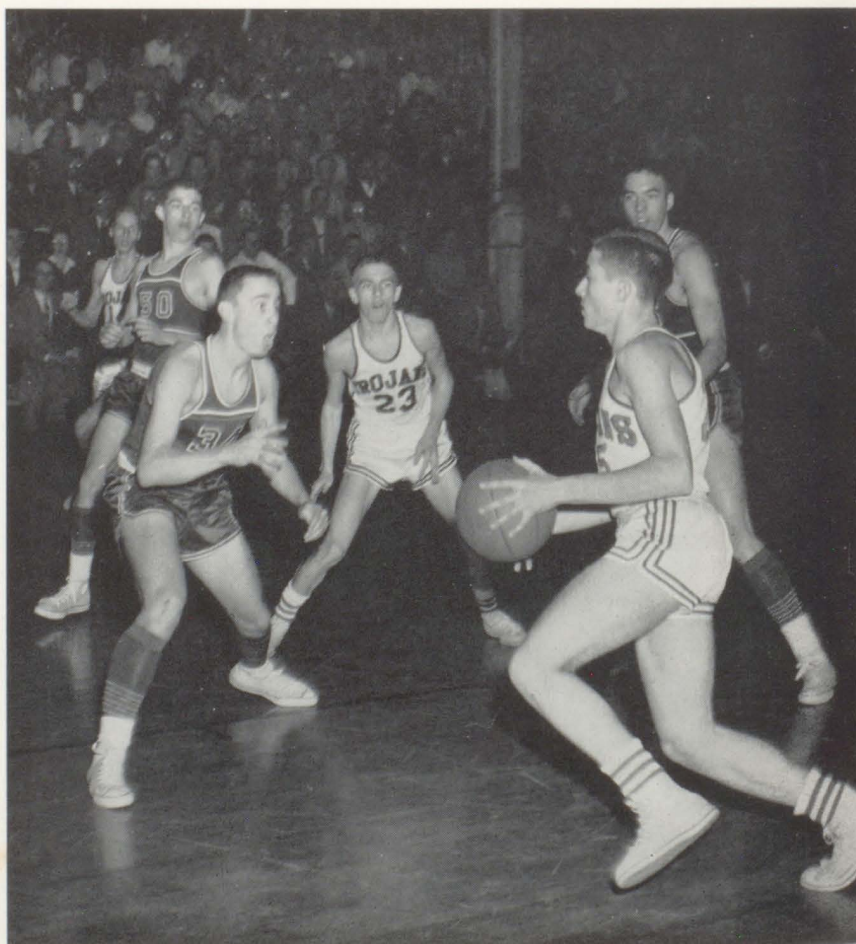

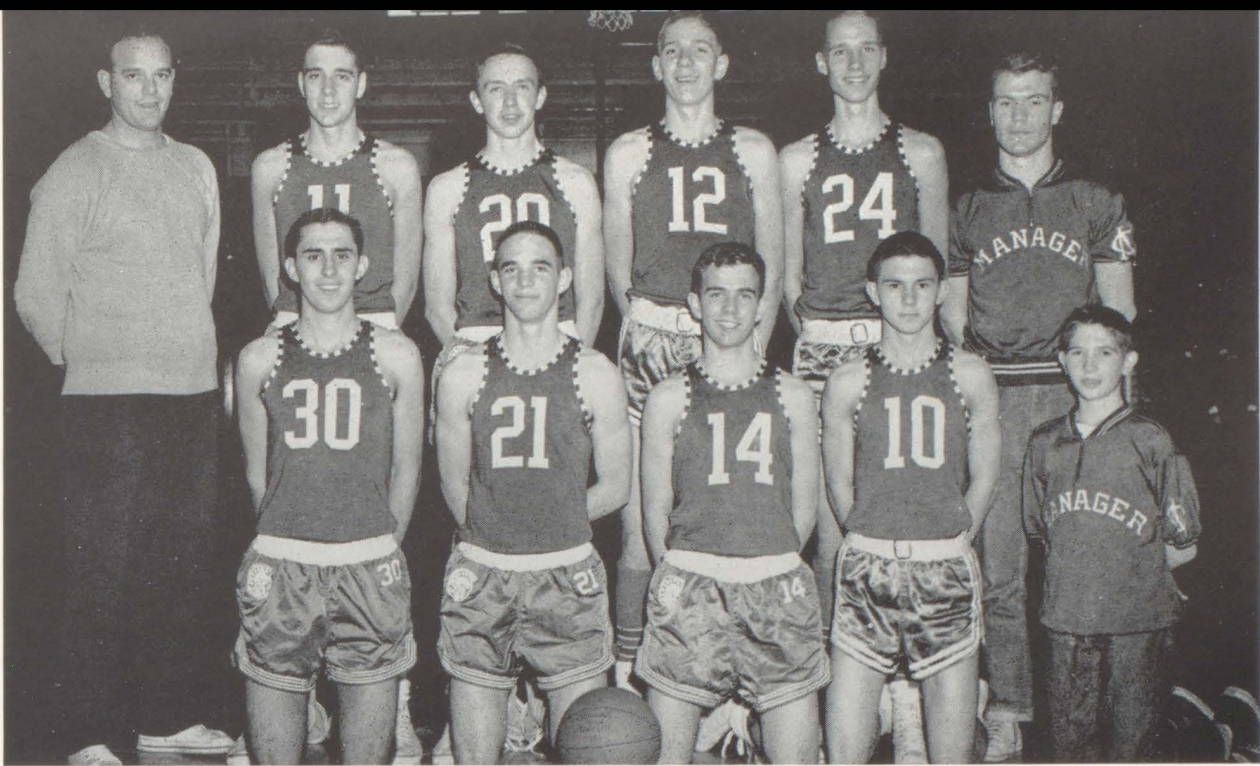

Reserve basketball coach Walter O'Brien guided his team through a successful season this year, winning eleven of nineteen starts.

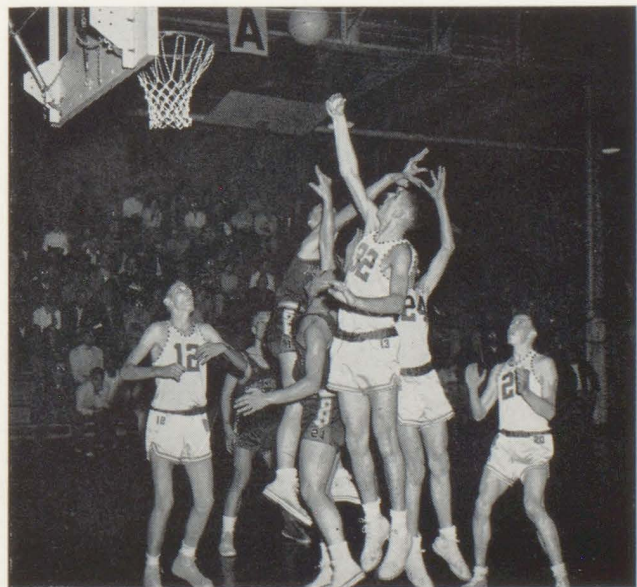

"TROJAN THINLIES WIN AGAIN; SNAP MORE RECORDS" was a common headline in the papers during the 1955 track season, as the Trojans enjoyed a much welcomed winning streak, winning five regular meets and dropping only one, while placing well in the various relays throughout the season.

Several records were broken by the Trojans. Kay Miller consistently crowded and passed the six foot mark in the high jump and twenty-one feet in the broad jump. The senior star was the leading Trojan scorer, as he racked up over 100 points. Jerry Swayzee was the first Trojan pole vaulter to clear eleven feet in a decade. 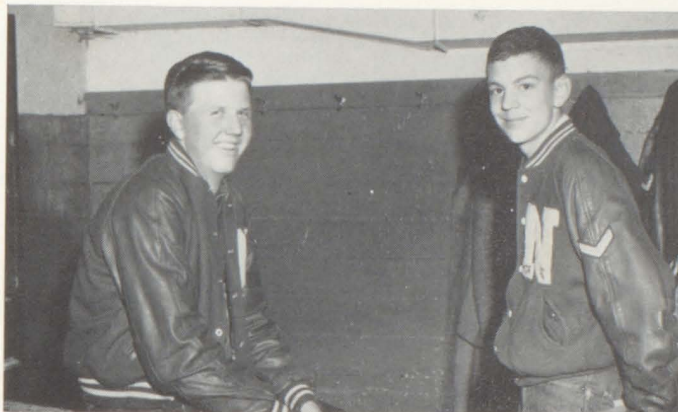
