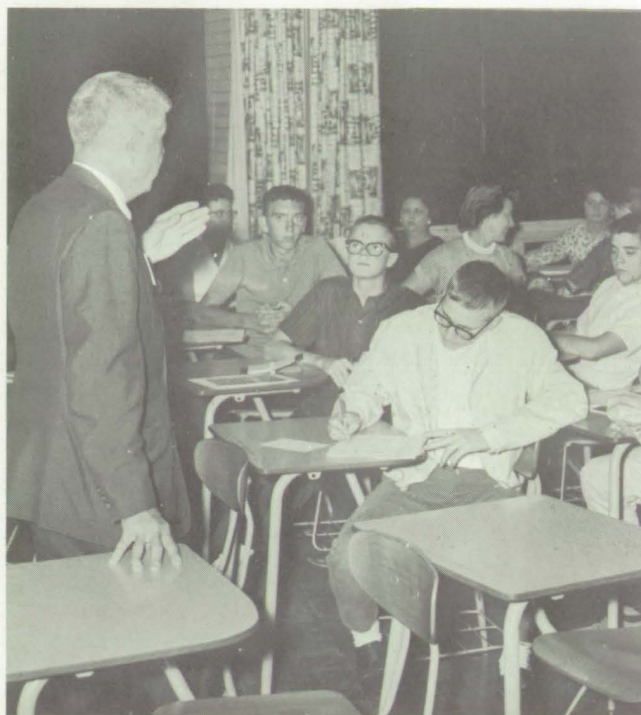

Though our problems caused moments of indecision, on Friday, November 22, 1963, a national crisis overshadowed all personal thoughts. The entire student body was gathered in the Fieldhouse for a sports convocation. As the last speaker finished, Mr. Pugh stepped forward to make an announcement which will remain vivid in our memories for the rest of our lives.

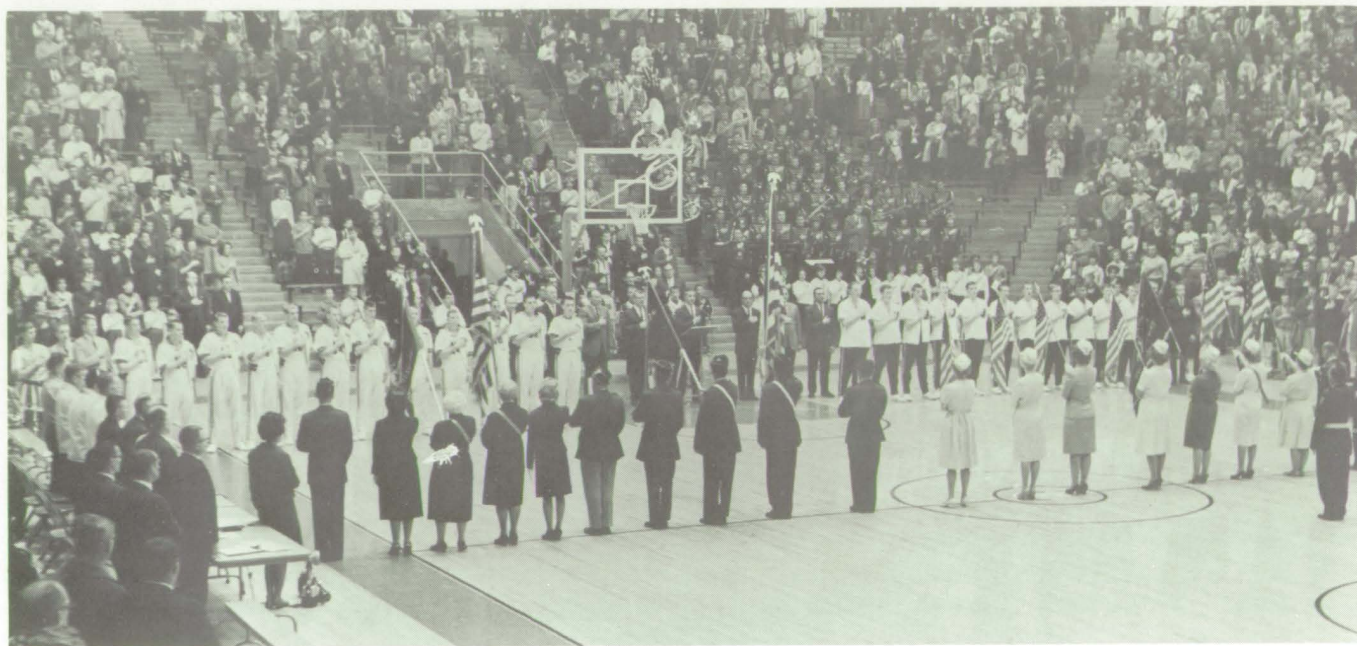
The mass of students moved in unison toward the exits. A tragic silence hung over the gymnasium where usually shouts of enthusiasm emerged. Our beloved President, John Fitzgerald Kennedy, was dead. Our Spirit, though dampened, was ever-present. We watched the television coverage of his burial with heavy hearts and troubled minds, but we never lost our courage and our hope. The President was dead yet we knew we would carry on, with his memory embedded firmly in our hearts and his ideals ever-strengthening our Spirit.

by the American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars before the start of the first basketball game.

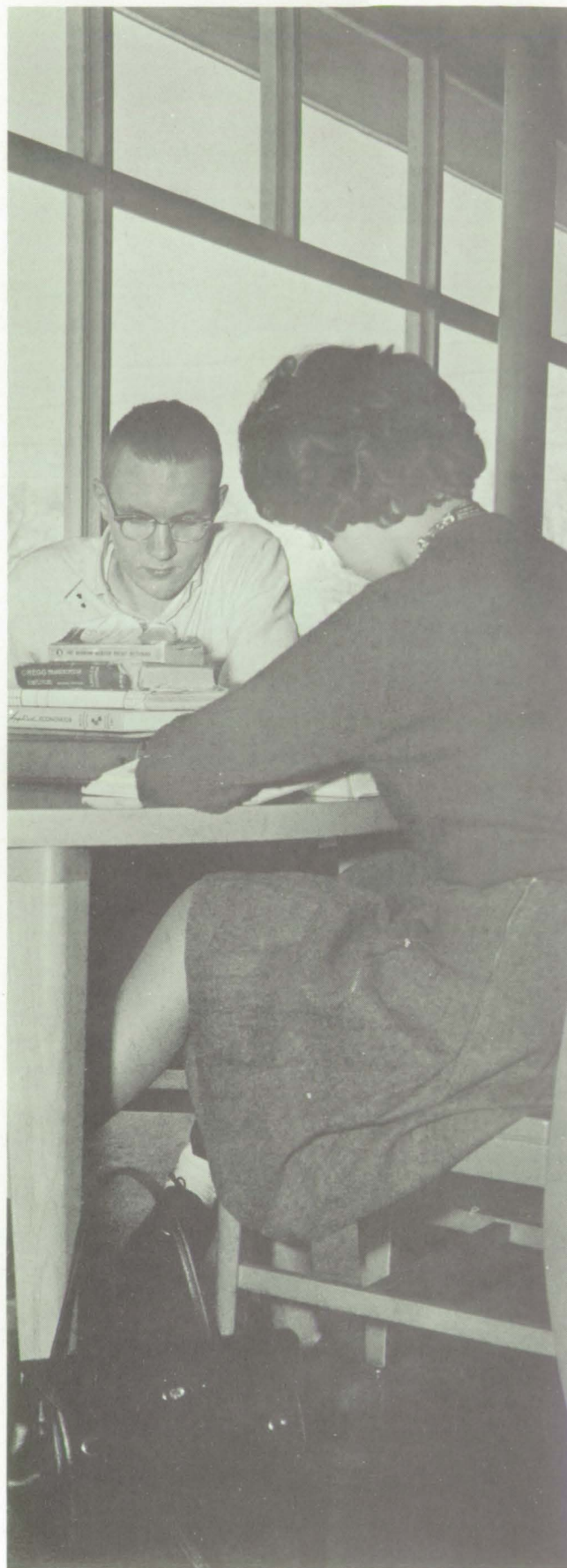




STUDENTS

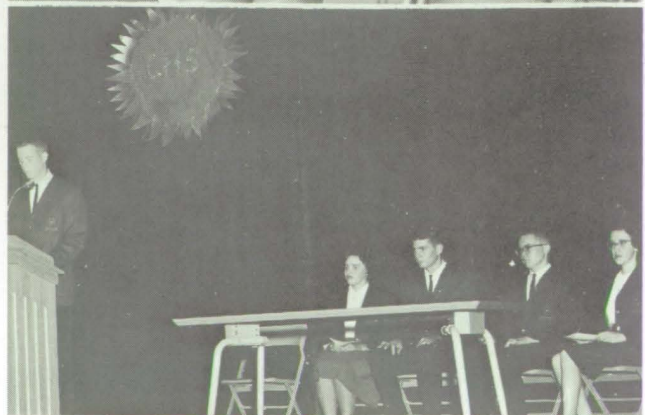
Winning Honors . . . All Liven Senior Year

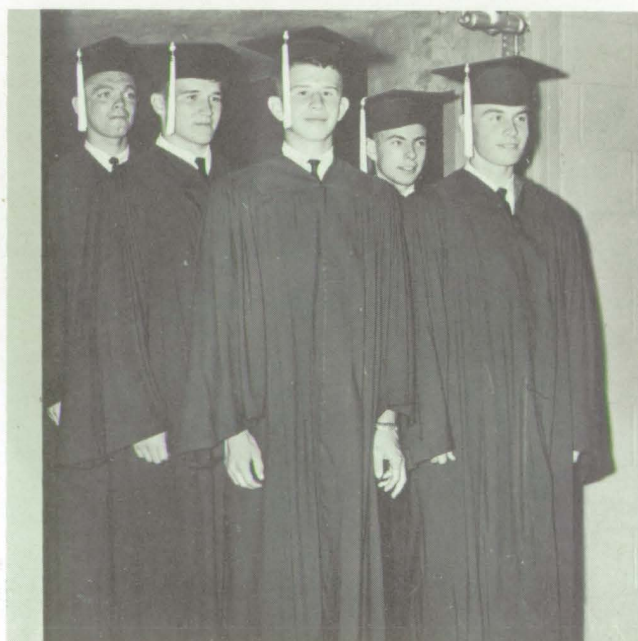

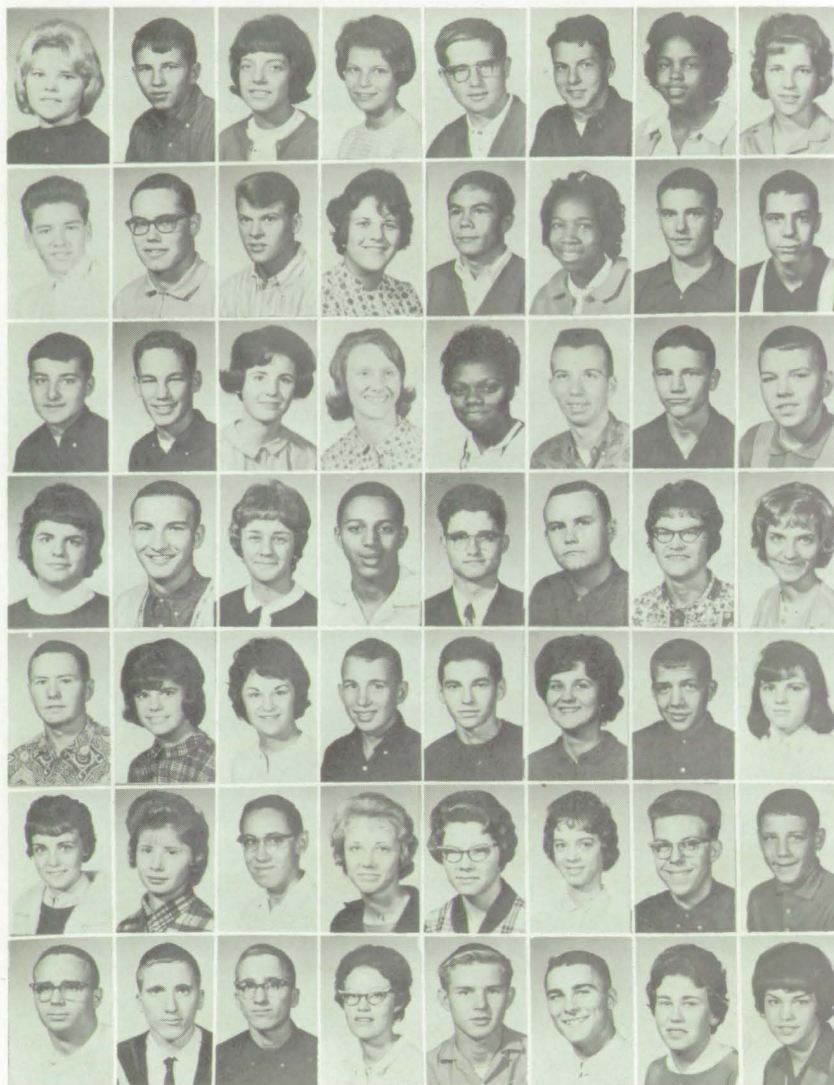

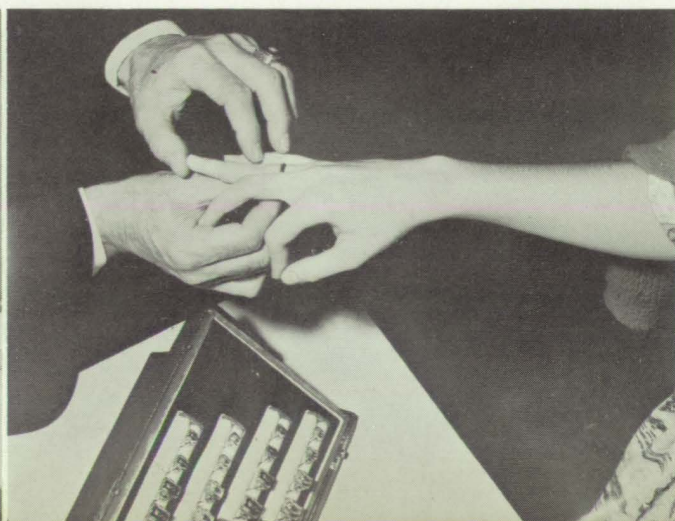

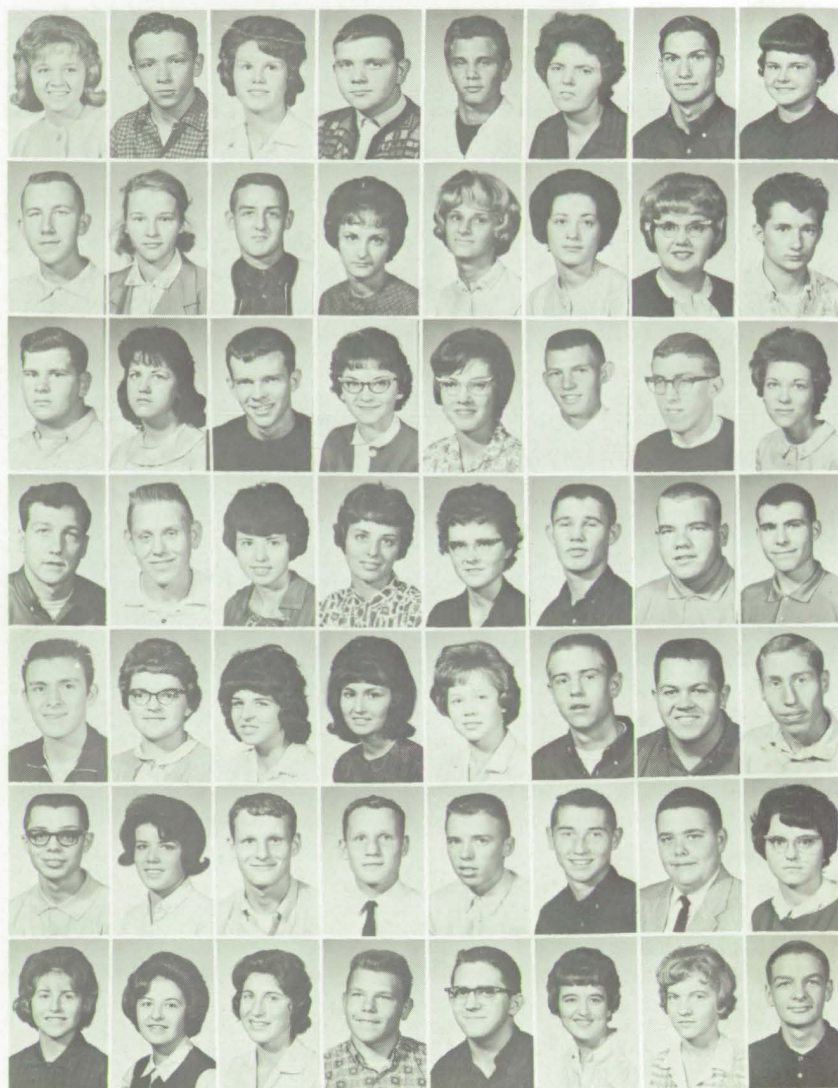

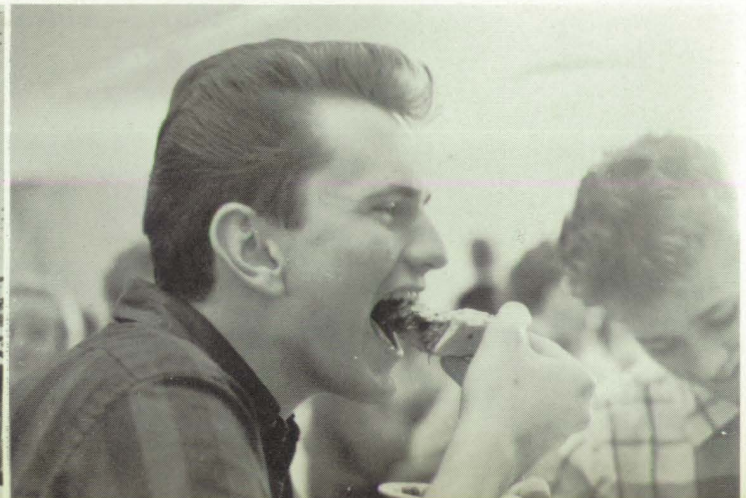

Using the given conditions and the theorem stating that vertical angles are equal, Sharon Logan proves that angle 3 equals angle 4.

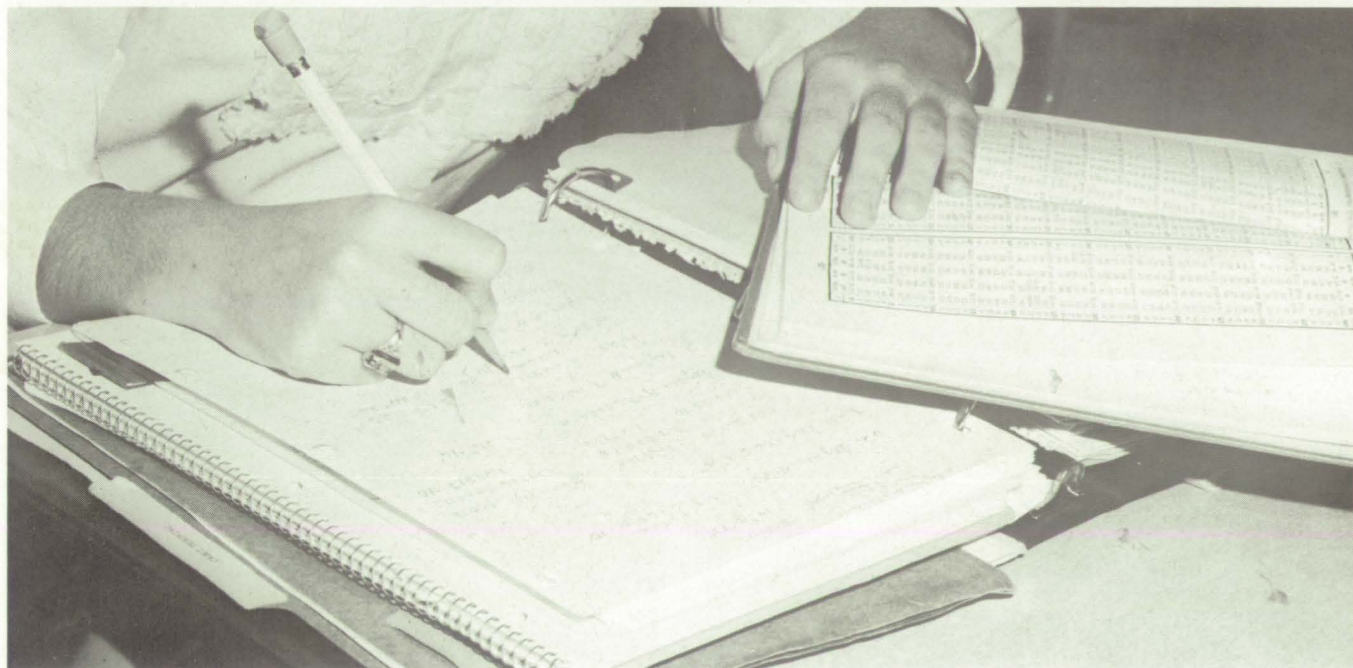
Our math and science programs are important not only to those of us who are planning to attend college but also to those who will enter the labor market upon graduation.

In our math program, three courses are offered. These are plane geometry, advanced algebra with a six week excursion into solid geometry, and finally senior math composed of trigonometry, analytical geometry, and calculus. In plane geometry we learn the methods of proofs and a year later in solid geometry go on to use what we have learned previously to solve three dimensional objects.

Our science program offers us the choice of biology, physical science, chemistry, and physics. Biology is taken by almost all sophomores as one year of laboratory science is required for graduation. A year's study of chemistry familiarizes juniors with the composition of matter in both its free and combined forms. In physics, seniors learn methods by which man has explained the world around him.

In senior math, we often have to interpolate to find the logs of trigonometric functions of angles not in the tables. This is some-

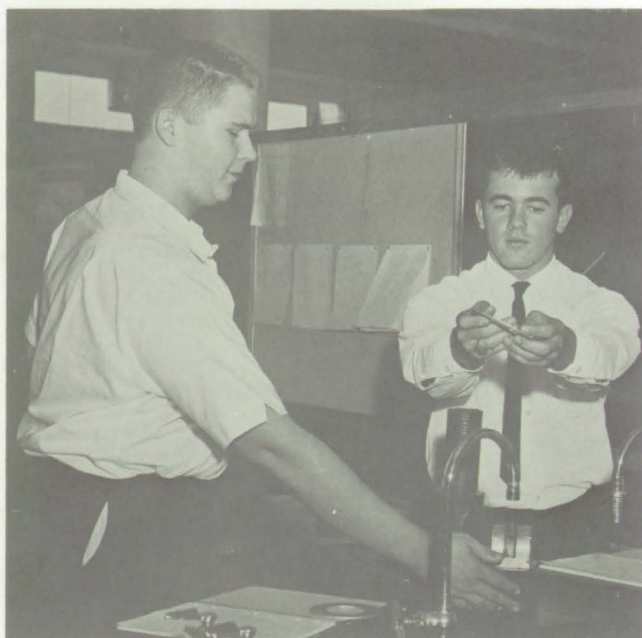
times confusing but is not impossible to do, and we usually perform the complicated operation with accurate results.

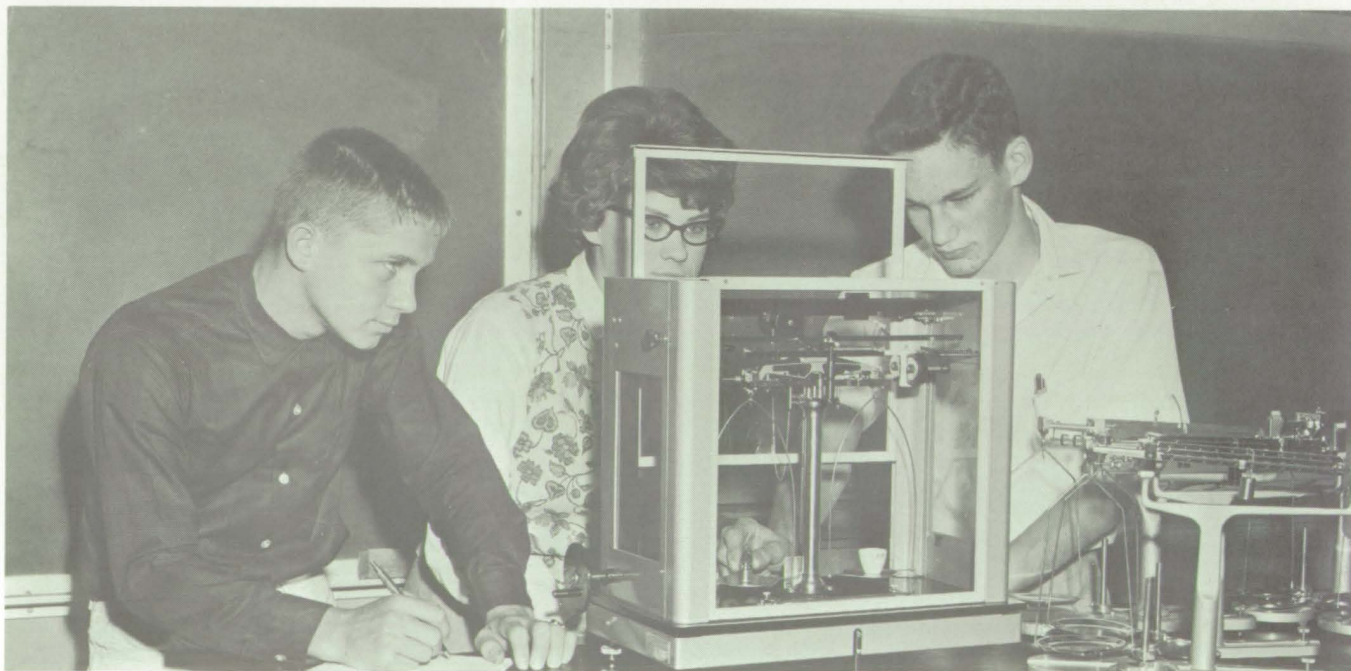

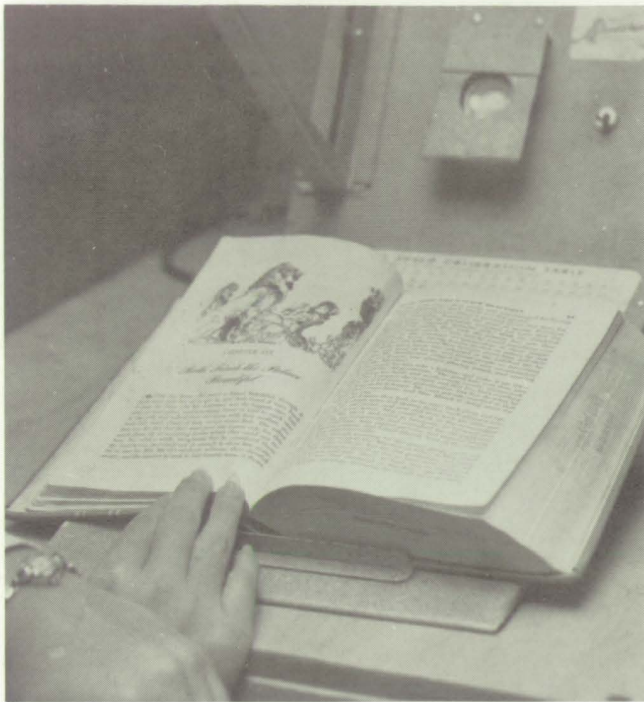


Curtis Carmack and Tony Goodpaster conduct an experiment demonstrating the law that like magnetic poles repel each other.

Study Of English And Languages Enables

Senior English stresses the study of literature, both domestic and foreign. Shown in the school bookstore examining the wide selec-

tion of books are Jeannie Heilman and Susan Nelson. They will find books for class study and also enjoyable home reading.



Our English program contains classes for students who plan to go to college and for those who will end their formal education with graduation. The program for non-college bound students stresses the study of literature, development of our writing techniques, and an appreciation of reading.

Those of us enrolled in college-bound English courses study journalism and speech as sophomores. Later, as juniors we perfect our grammar and written composition and interpret American literature. In our final year, we compile a research paper and broaden our knowledge of world literature.

Spanish, Latin, German, Russian, and French are foreign languages available to the C.H.S. student. In the first year of study, the students build a large active vocabulary by practice in the electronics laboratory and through the presentation of memorized conversations and skits. Assignments concentrate on written work of oral lessons previously learned. Second year study intensifies skills learned during the first year with emphasis on oral work leading to greater fluency.



Our modern language lab is a must for all foreign language classes. The use of tape recordings and earphones enables teachers to work individually with such students as Judy McLain, Rocky McDonald, and Susannah Hoy.

As seniors, we are required to take a semester each of American government and economics. In government, we learn the basic facts of our governmental operations as well as those of other countries. We delve deeper into our responsibilities as American citizens in the solution of our domestic and international problems.

In economics, we learn the fundamental principles of our economic system and apply these facts to everyday situations. Well-versed in these basics, we will strive to use our knowledge after graduation in the promotion and defense of our American economic system of private enterprise.

demanding and also physically rewarding of these are push-ups, deep-knee bends, and various gymnastic feats.

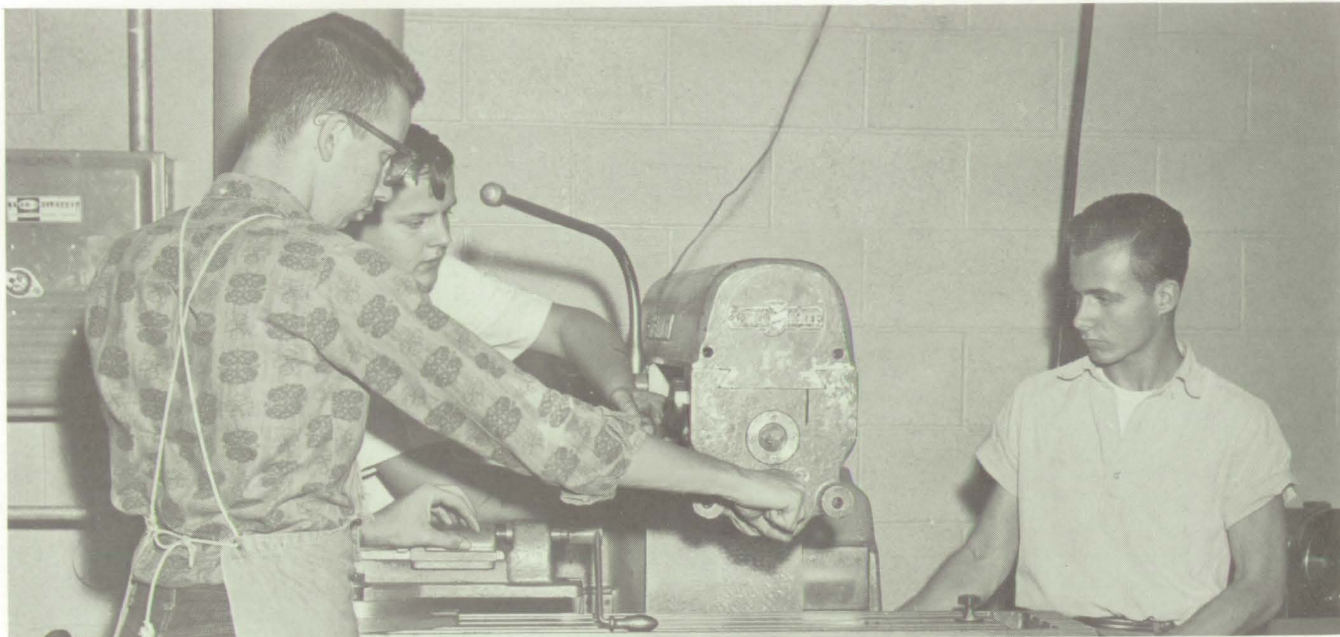
Physical education is a required course among our sophomores and can be taken as an elective course by juniors and seniors. During the winter, boys' and girls' classes are combined for about two weeks as students learn to square dance and to try basic steps in social dancing.

Boys' classes include touch football, volleyball, dodgeball, basketball and gymnastics during the fall and winter months. During this period basketball is the favorite activity. As spring materializes, sophomores find themselves outside participating in softball and later track and field events. During the year they limber up for each class session with numerous calisthenics.

Sophomore girls spend their time in such sports as softball, basketball, volleyball, kickball, speedball, soccer, and deck tennis. Between the many team games, they also compete in such individual activities as shuffleboard, table tennis, badminton, tumbling, and archery.

Boys' and girls' physical education classes are combined for two weeks to provide students with instruction in square dancing.



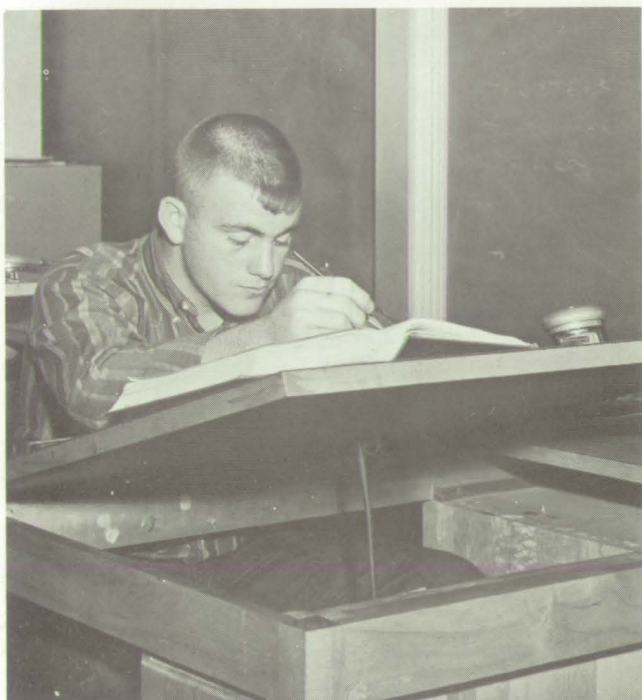

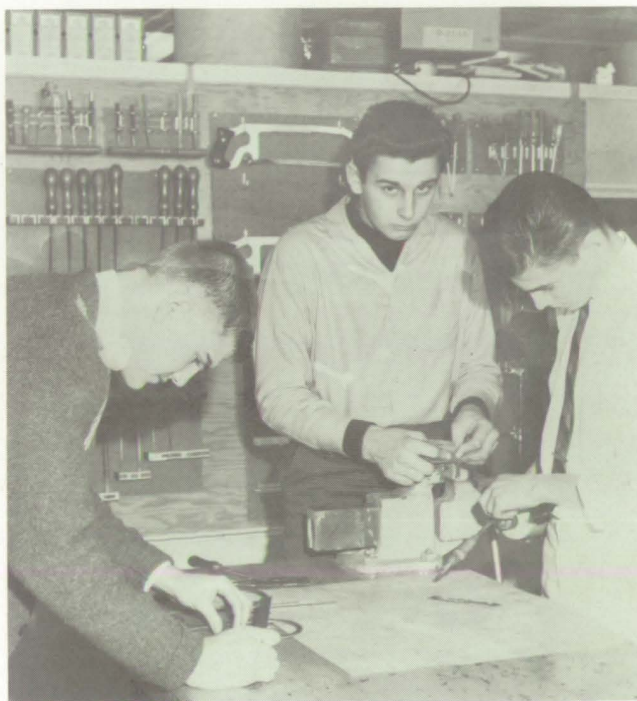

Students For Competitive World of Work

Our Practical arts classes are excellent but inadequate for an enrollment of 1,250 with only about 40 percent going on to college. Instruction is available in crafts, printing, machine shop, metals, and electricity. Homemaking courses are the most popular among girls with 332 students, and drafting is the boys' favorite with 170 students.

To provide training for the non-college bound students and to encourage students to remain in school, a total of \$500,000 has been collected from cumulative building funds for the construction of a new vocational wing. Our practical arts staff, assisted by various adults from business and industry, have devoted much time to the designing of a program to best meet the needs of our future students. Architects' drawings are complete, bids will soon be let, and construction on the unit to house home-making, art and crafts will begin this summer.

Attached to this new wing will be the shop unit containing classes in printing, machine shop, metals, power and transportation, building trades, electronics, and drafting.

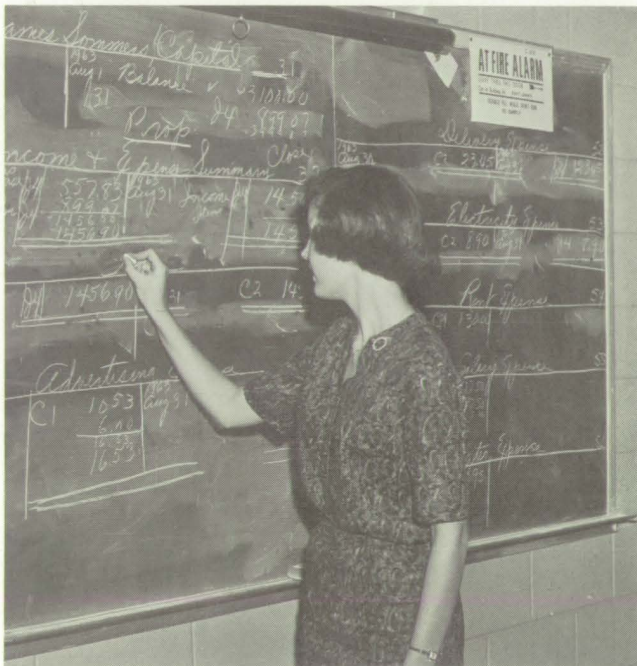

Business courses are many as students prepare for a variety of careers such as store managers, bookkeepers, secretaries, and clerks. Many of us also enroll in typing or other business classes to acquire skill for our own use. Some of the business courses offered are basic business for sophomores and seniors, typing, shorthand, office clerical practice, and business correspondence. Retail selling, a course for juniors and seniors, provides classroom instruction and on-the-job training in local retail stores. Bookkeeping also provides job training.

Home economics includes courses in home nursing, child care, clothing, housing, and family living. In home nursing and child care we learn what to do in those emergency situations we sometimes encounter at home. Clothing class teaches us how to choose materials, plan the design of clothes, and produce wearable articles without waste of materials. Housing gives us the opportunity to experiment with possible designs for our future homes and also teaches us how to live within our means.

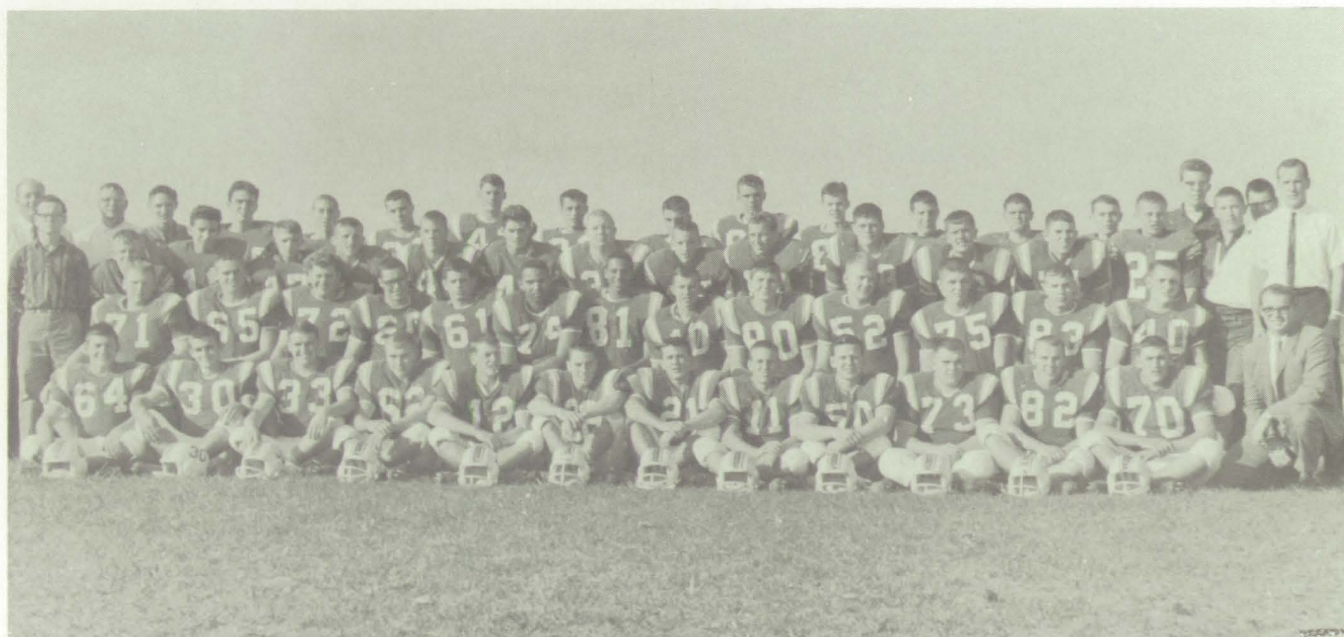


SPORTS

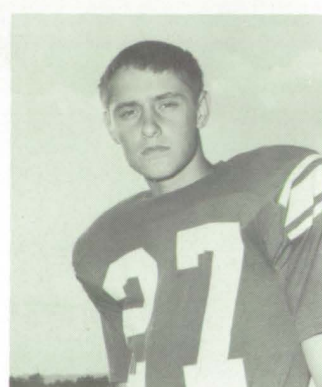
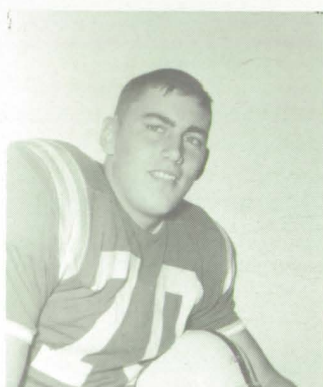
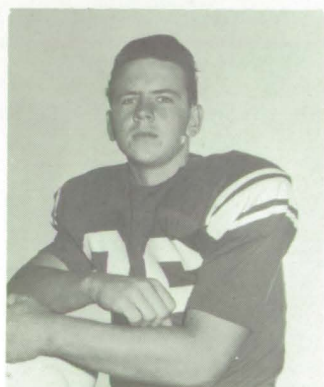
Four Win, Six Loss Gridiron Record

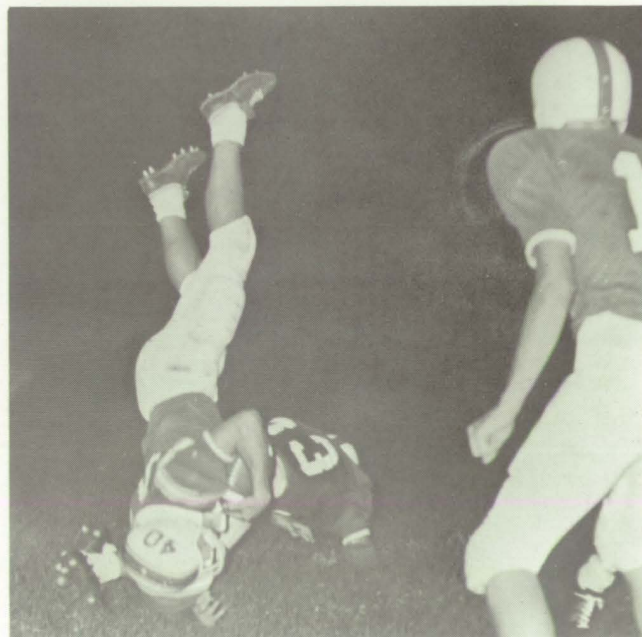

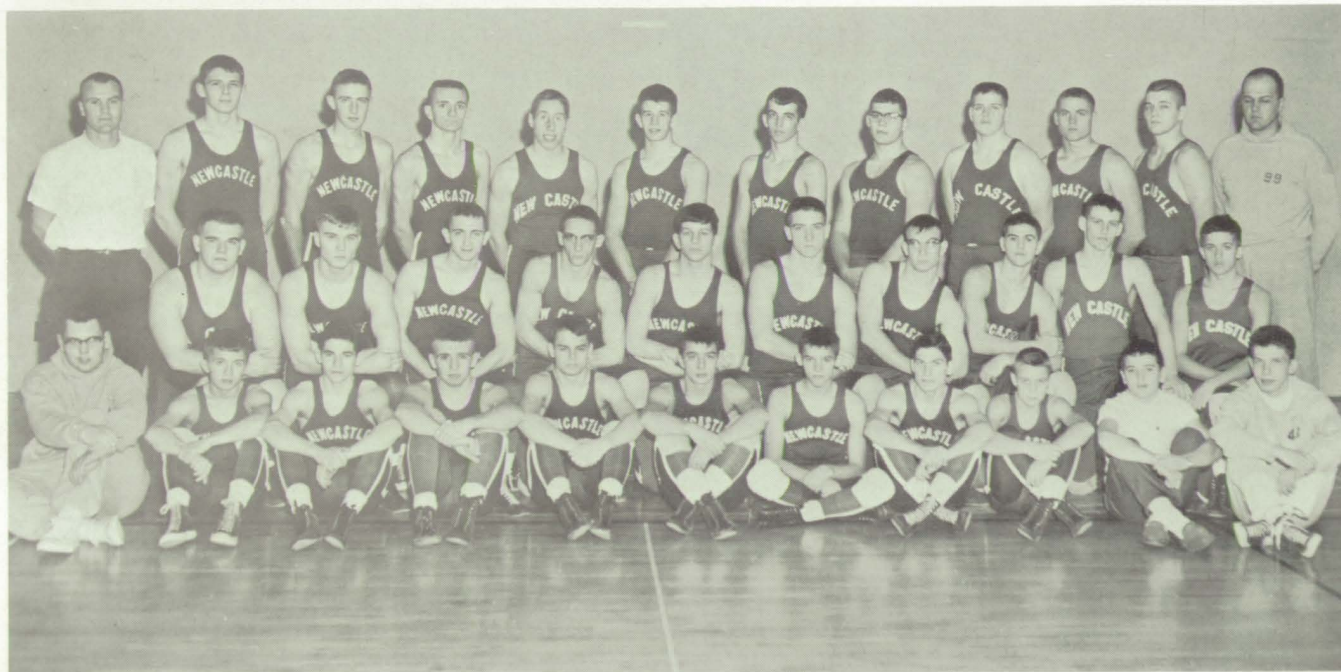

The hopes of next year's team depend on the returning lettermen Doug Ford and David Wake and on the reserve team which won three of its seven dual meets last fall.



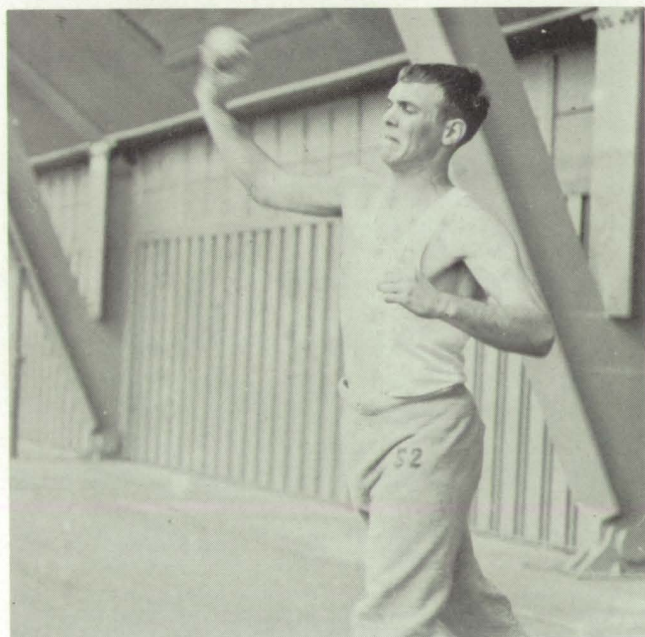

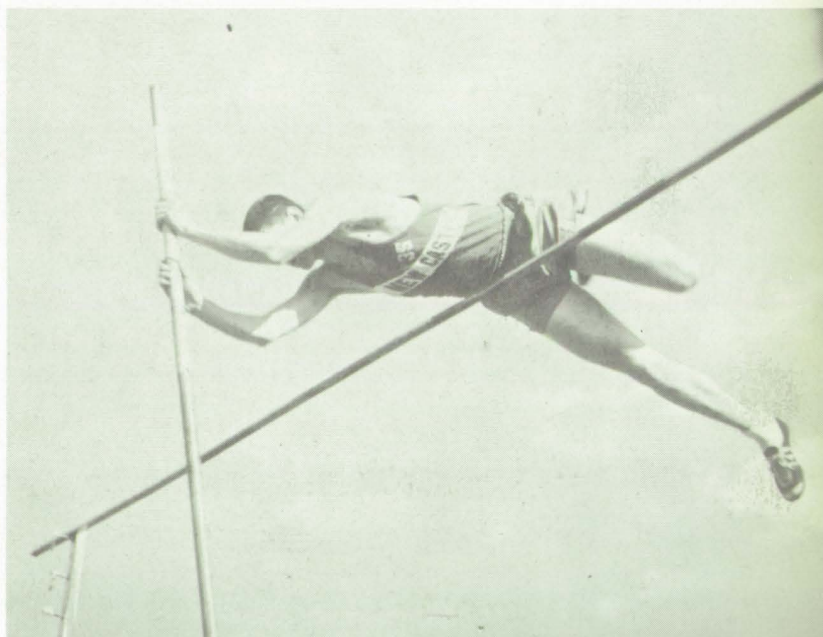

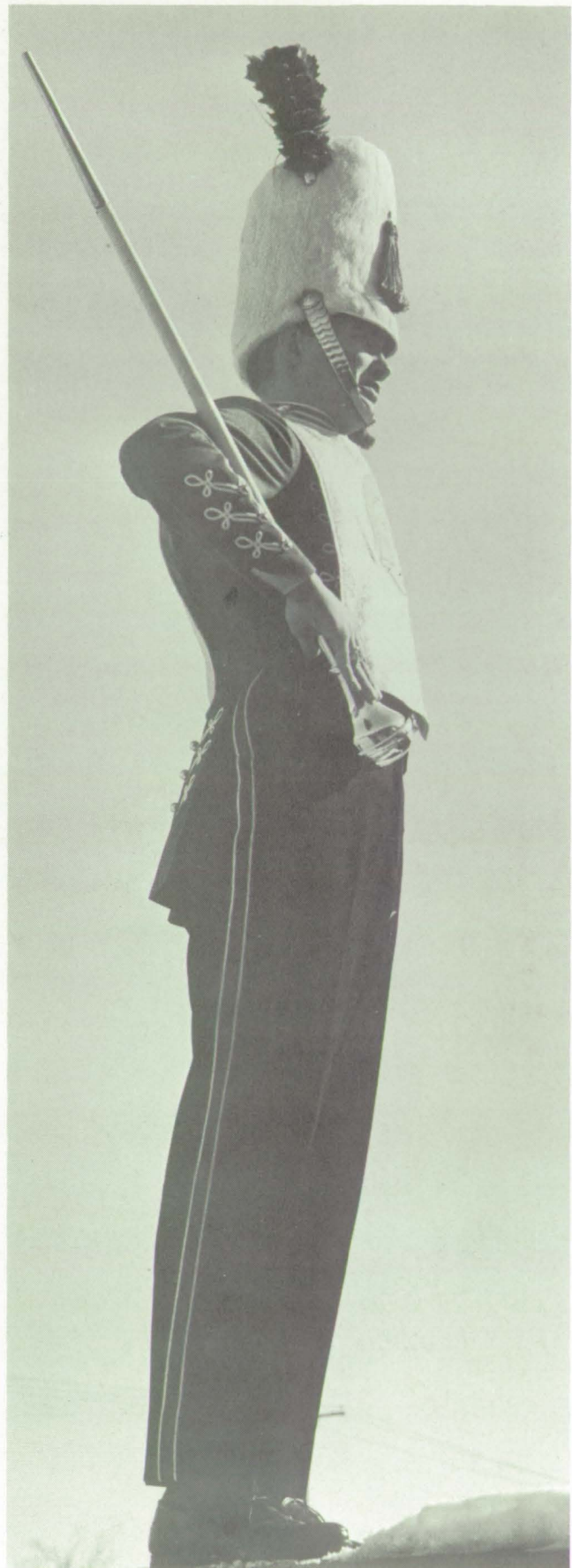




ACTIVITIES

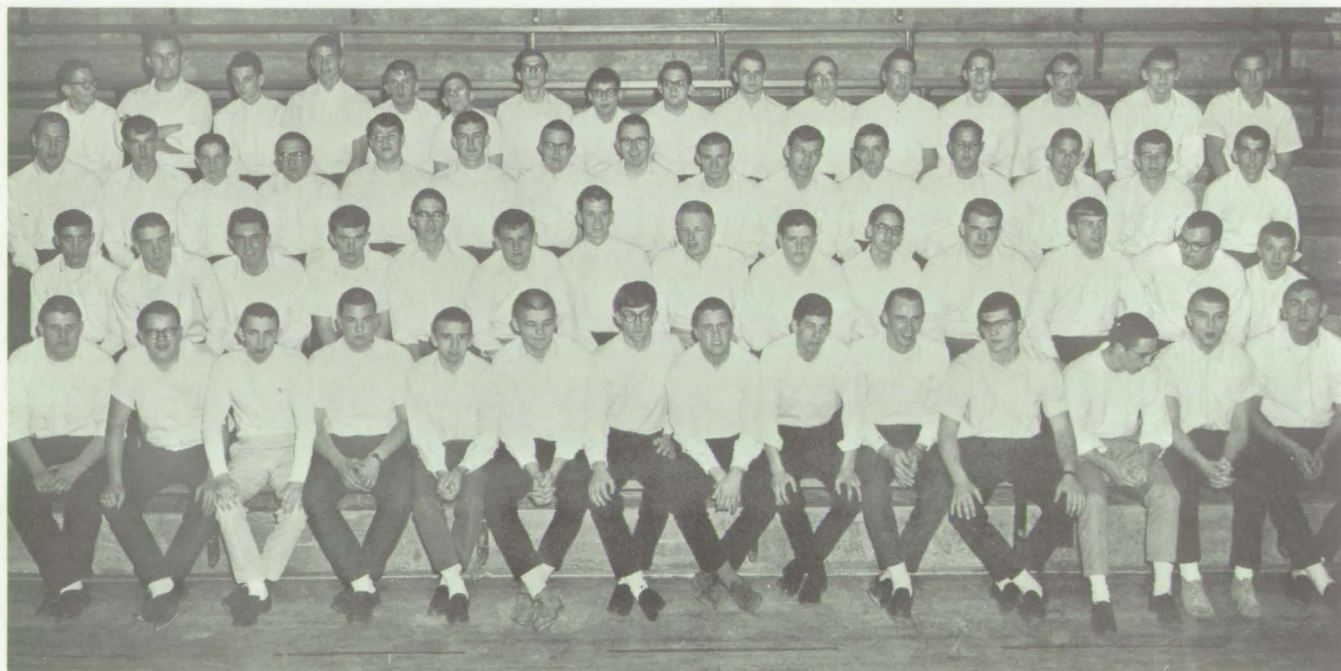

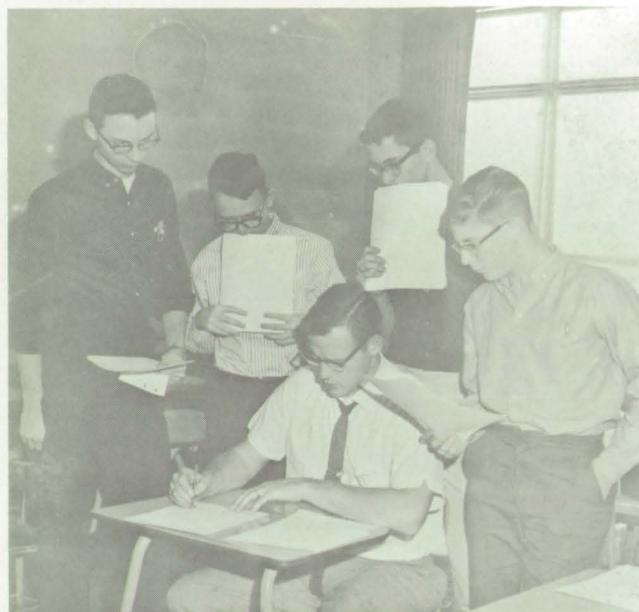

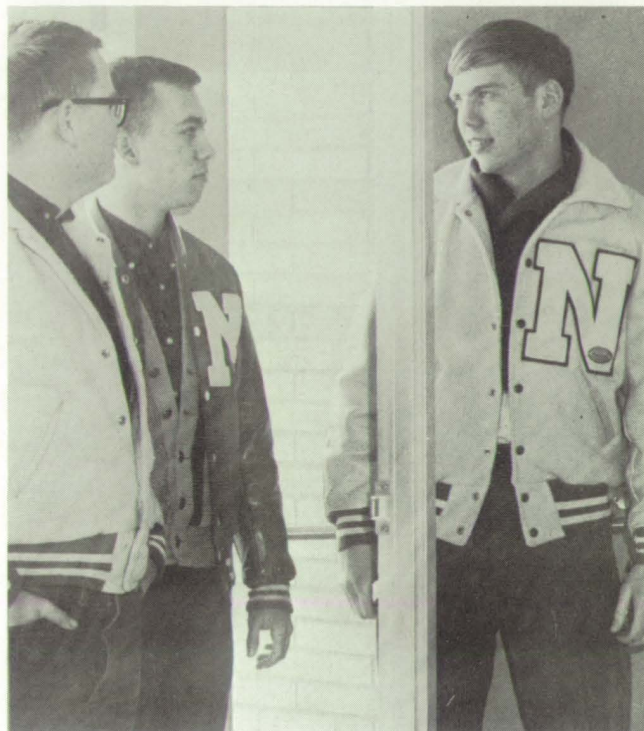

tary; and Kris Wilson, treasurer. They led the Student Council meetings each first and third Wednesday of the month.

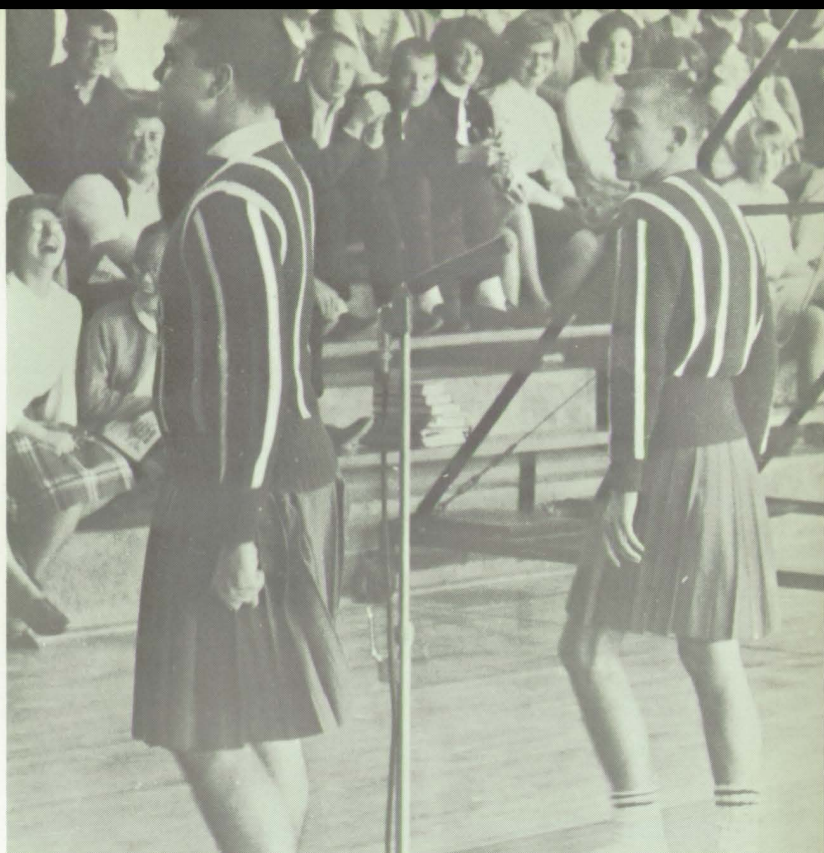

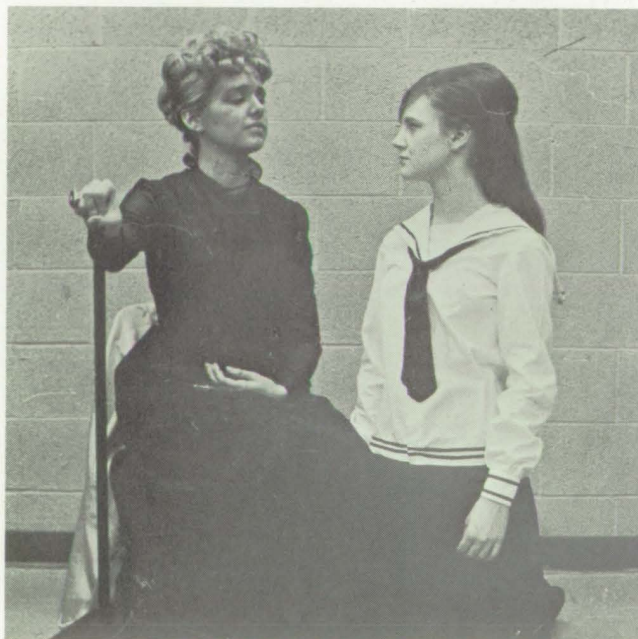

During the year, the praise-winning Dance Band donated its time to raise funds for a new First Aid ambulance and for the March of Dimes telethon.

Cooperating with the vocal groups and student actors, several bandsmen played in the pit orchestra for the spring production of "Music Man."

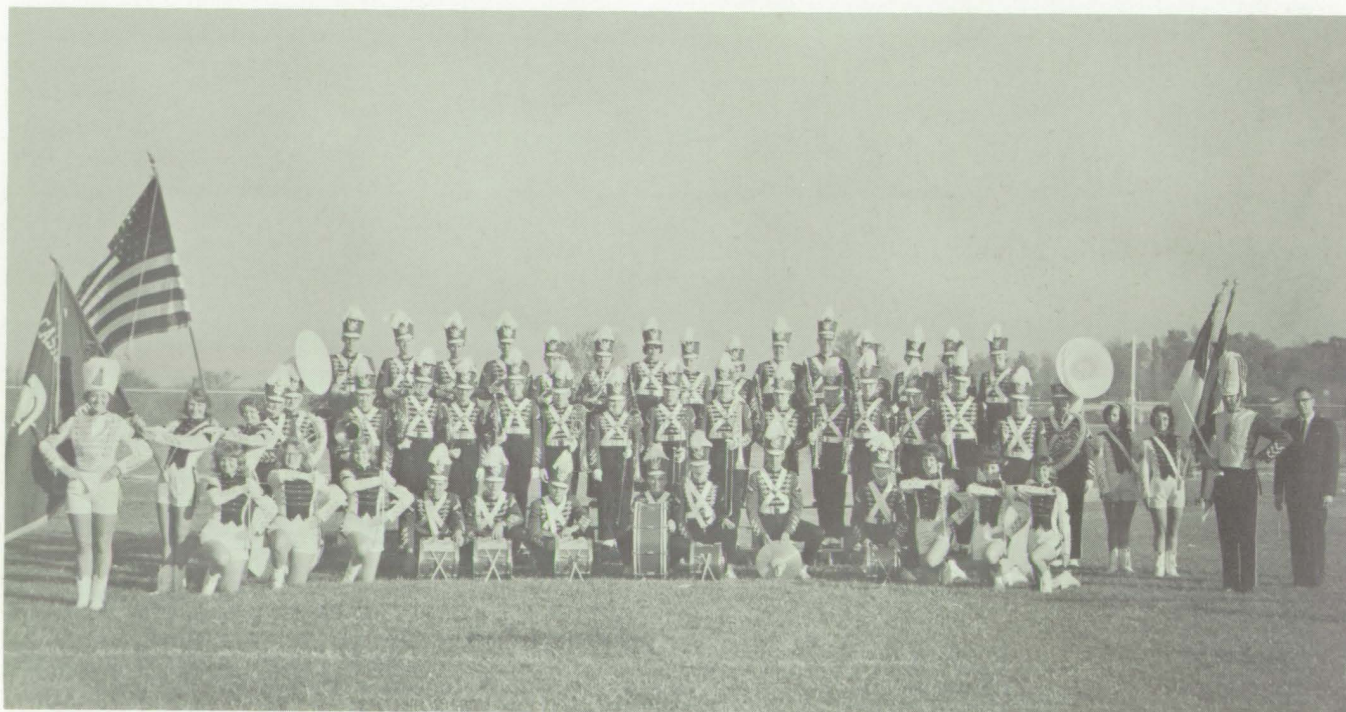
