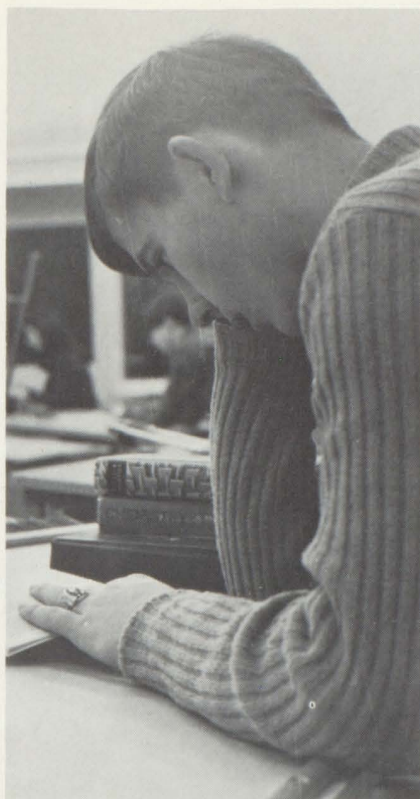
## Reflection Adds Meaning To Movement

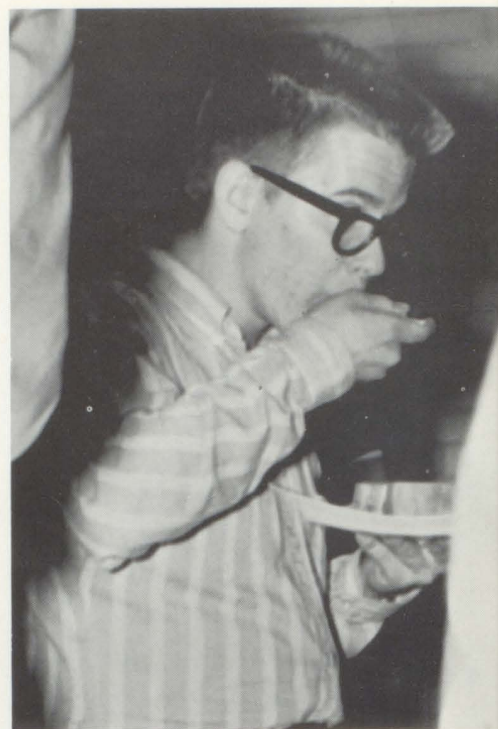

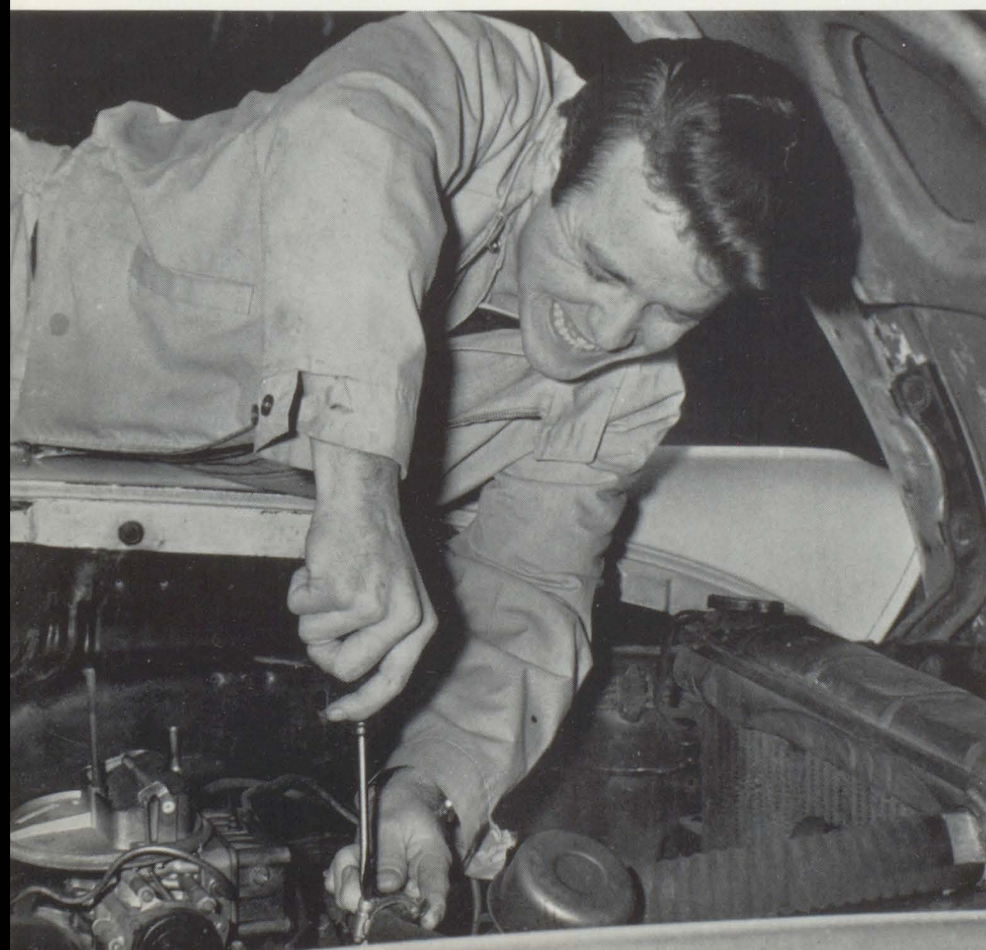

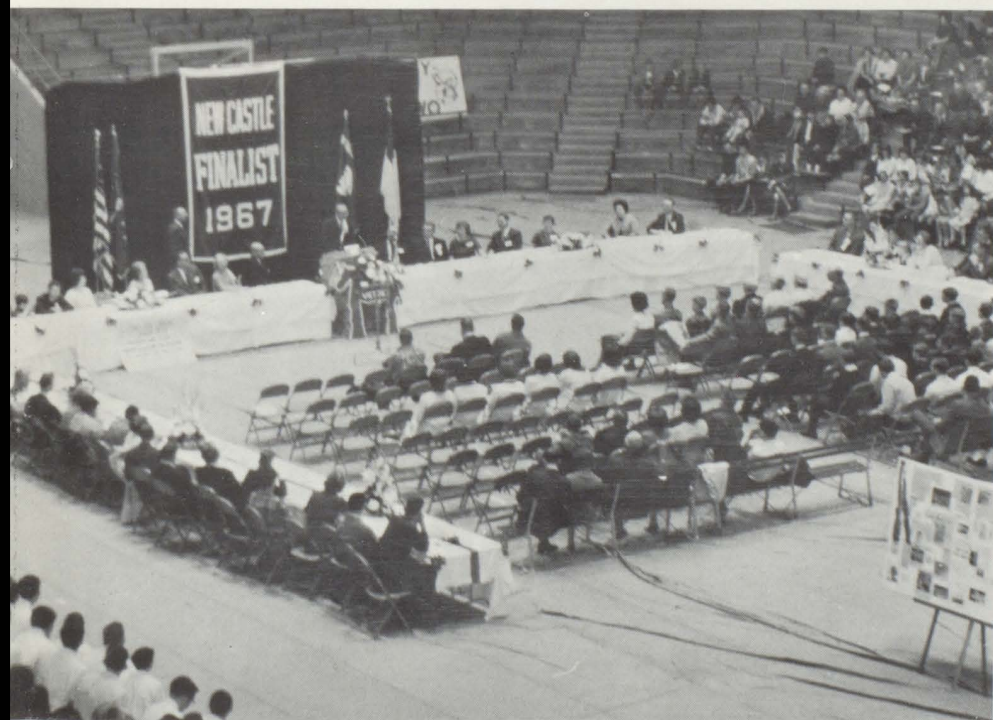

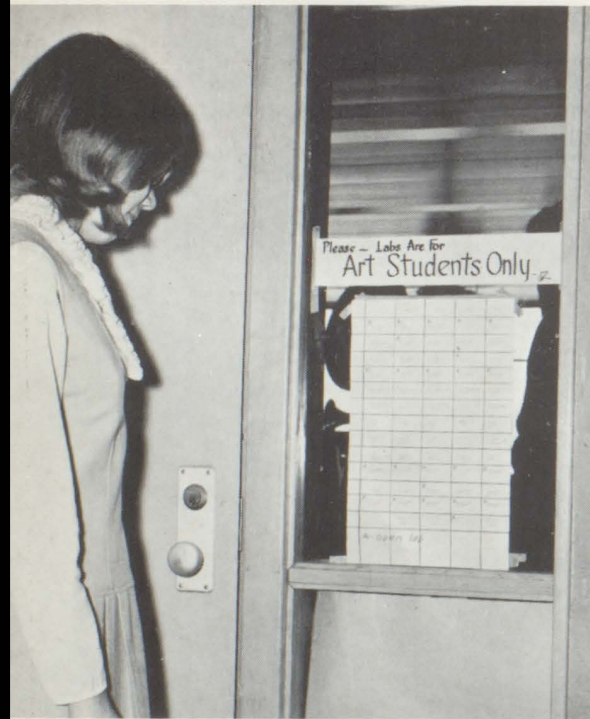

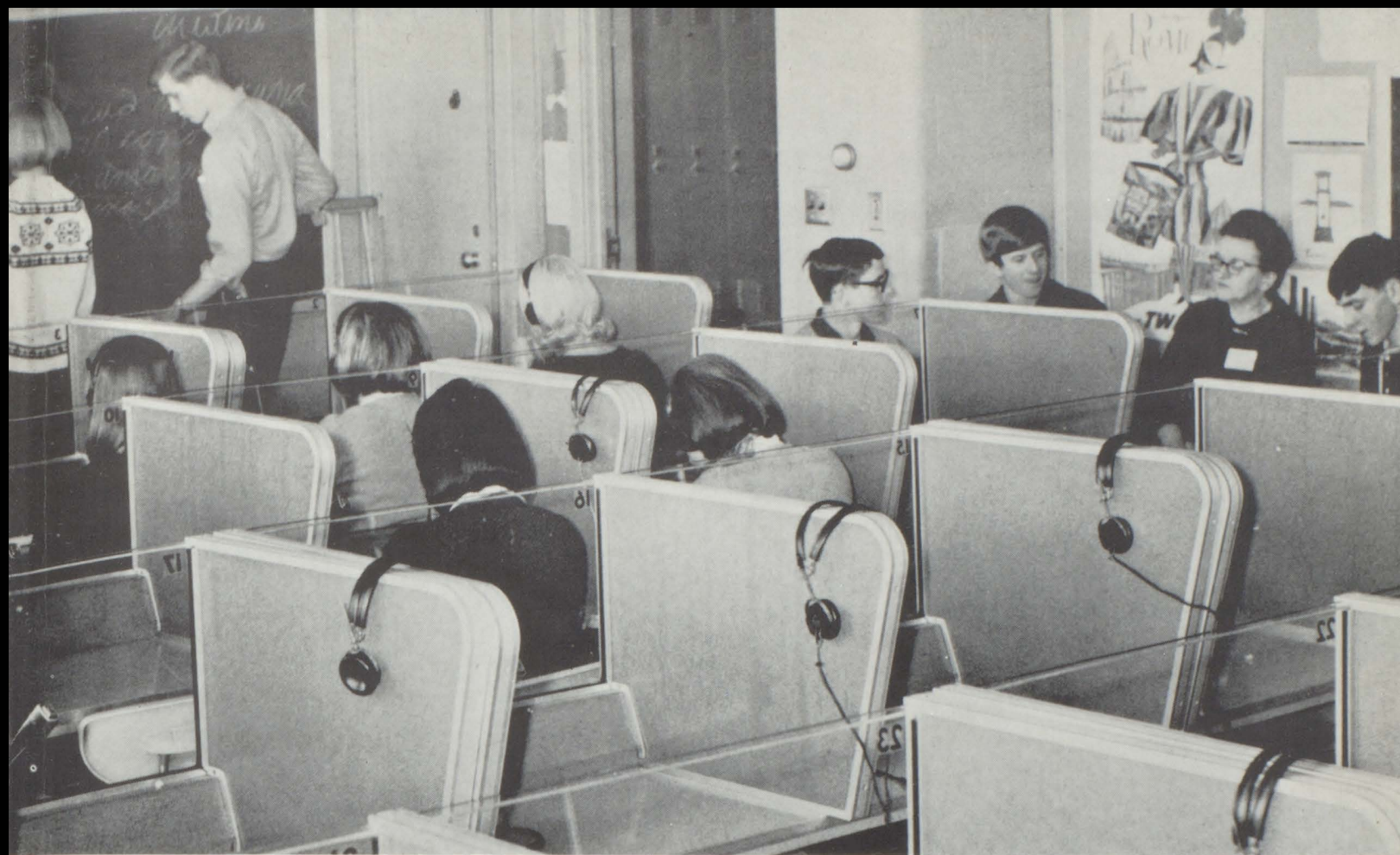

## Periods, Bells, Old Routine Are Replaced By Flexibility

The newest and most exciting approach to education, flexible scheduling and independent study, was introduced this year. Periods were replaced by 30-minute modules and scheduling was done by computer on an individual basis. Walls were removed to make large lecture rooms, and classes were scheduled for small group discussions and 90-minute labs. By spending a minimum amount of time in class with up to two and one-half hours of study time a day, an individual could decide for himself in what areas he needed to concentrate, recognize the need for teacher-

help, and find time to use library and laboratory facilities.

This situation, similar to that at college, gave the college-bound students insight into what to expect. Even those who planned no further education were exposed to the challenge of meeting academic responsibility.

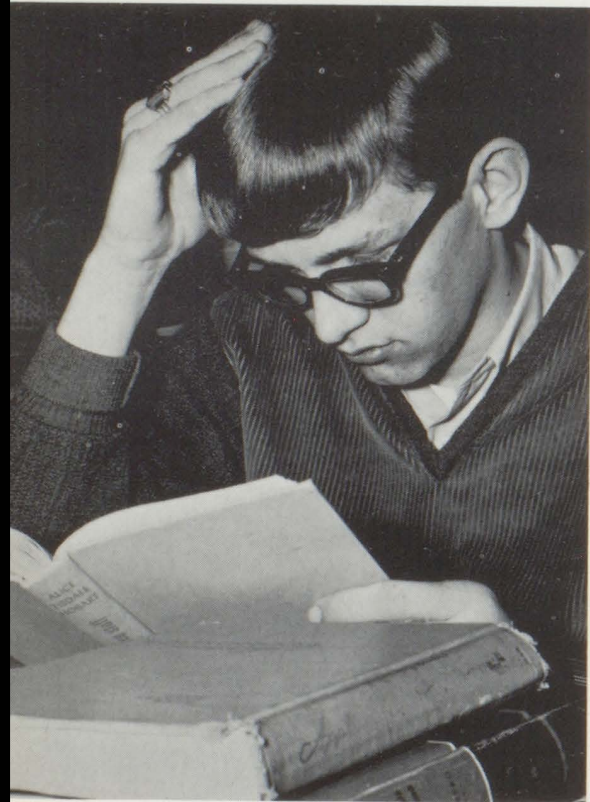
Of course there were problems in adapting to the complete change. Lack of study areas, forgotten schedules, and general confusion prevailed at first. But most difficulties were soon overcome, and it became hard to remember the old hour-a-day, five-day-a-week pattern.

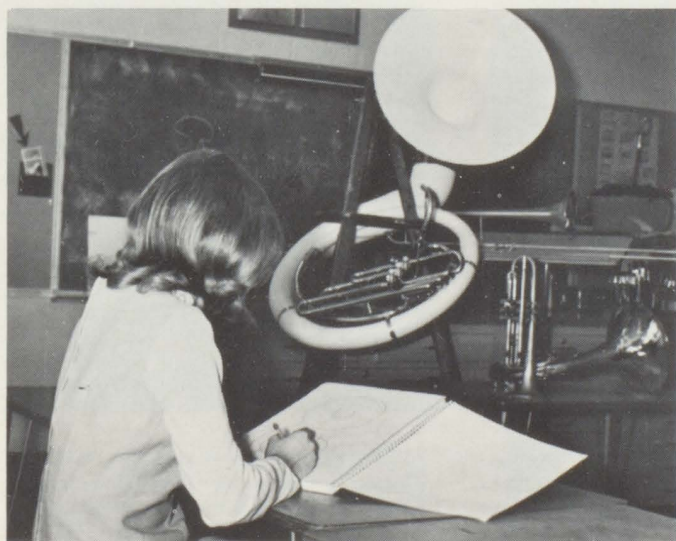
# Academics

The New Castle Community School Corporation was on the move this year with a progressive School Board and school administrators. An elementary building program got under way, many new materials were purchased, and curriculum changes were made at various buildings.

Leading the school corporation as superintendent was Dr. Donald G. Turchan who was appointed after the death of Mr. Rexford G. Wright last July. Dr. Turchan identified his main goal as maintaining and increasing high quality instruction, the heart of the school.

Seeing the relationship between student and teacher in the classroom as the most crucial part of the learning process, Mr. Pugh, our principal, and Mr. Lehr, our vice-principal, agreed it was the task of the administration to provide each teacher with the materials, equipment,

and motivation for attaining an optimum level of performance.

Mr. Pugh believed flexible scheduling provided distinct advantages to the student because it opened doors to an unlimited variety of opportunities, one of which was a more realistic approach to study time.

Mr. Lehr, as vice-principal, guided students in attendance problems, worked with extra-curricular activities, and helped students in the management of their independent study.

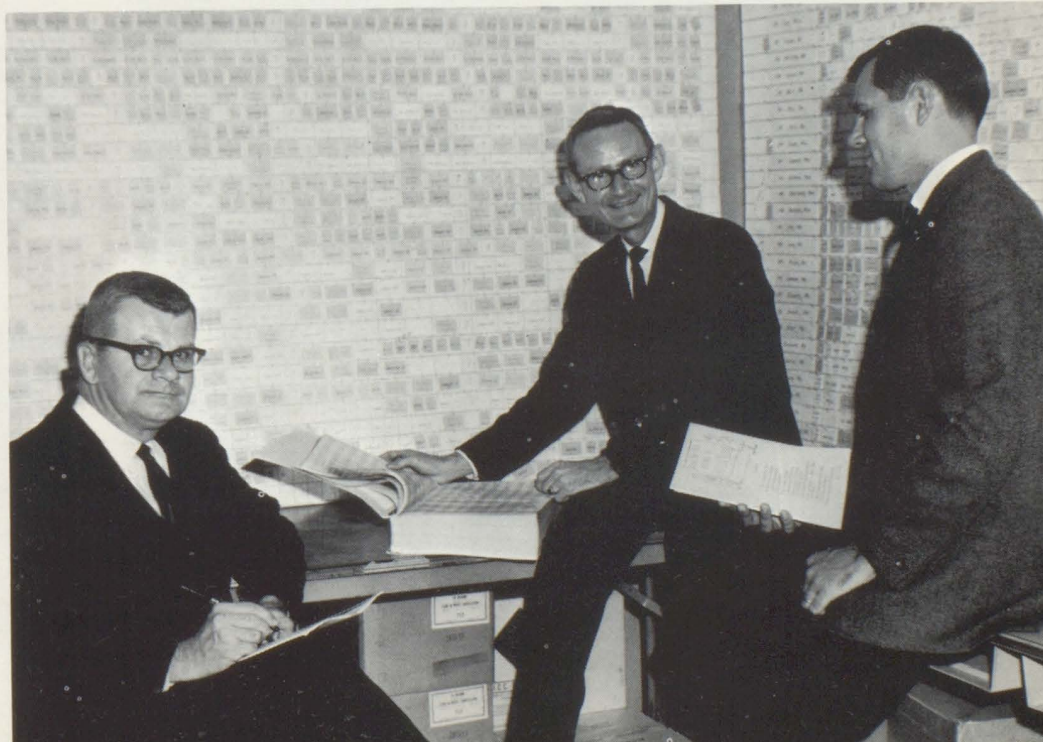
Also working with them on the program was Mr. Donald E. Overly, an intern in the project sponsored by the National Association of Secondary School Principals. He was one of 90 men assigned to senior and junior high schools across the U.S. He consulted with department chairmen on the effective use of study and class time and other aspects of flexible scheduling.

HUNDREDS of tiny tabs for classes and teachers had to be adjusted many times as the master schedule was established last

summer. It still is referred to often by Mr. Pugh, Mr. Lehr, and Mr. Overly, even now that school is under way.

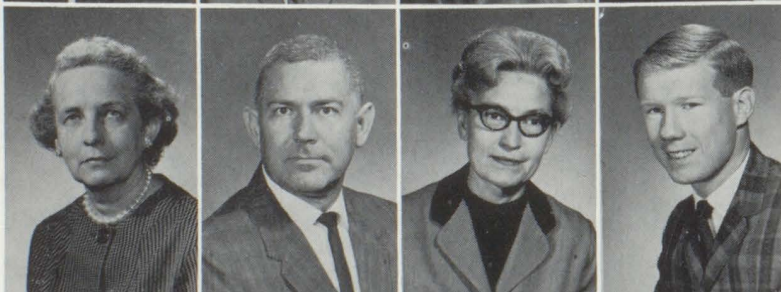

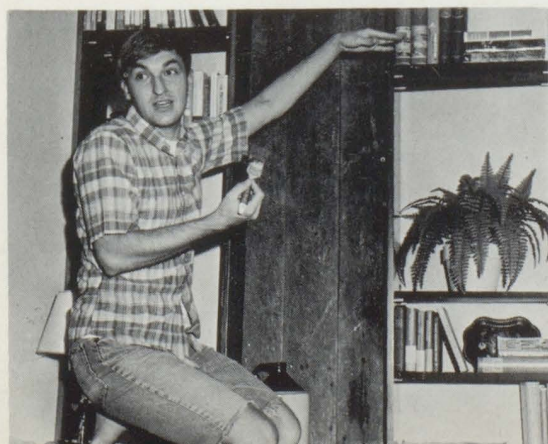

# Counseling Is Beneficial To Students

In their attempt to become better students, CHSers were faced with problems needing outside advice. Our five counselors, led by Miss Rentschler, were available to help find a solution, as well as to establish a better understanding between the students and the teachers.

As the new school year developed, the counselors encountered problems that had never before existed. Students who weren't using their free modules effectively had to be placed under directed study. Warning and failing notices were replaced by grade evaluation cards for all students twice each semester.

To assist seniors in completing college applications, the counselors made CHS available for the S.A.T. tests in both November and December. All students were invited to the Career Day programs held monthly under the supervision of Mr. Lawson and Mr. Hay.

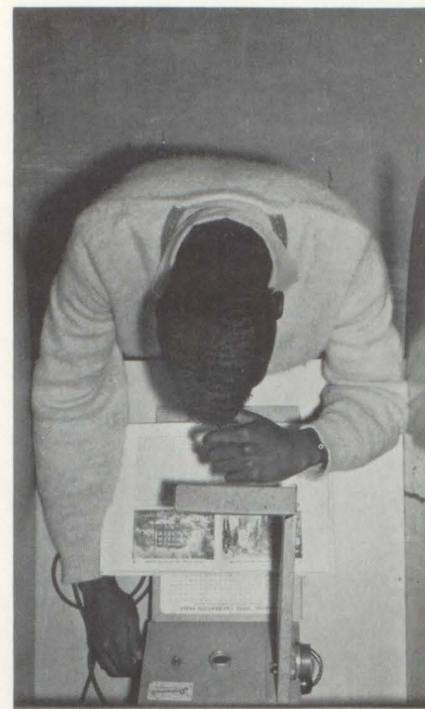

In the English curriculum at CHS, both regular and college preparatory classes were designed to enable the student to express himself clearly in speaking and writing. As an aid in the appreciation of literature, teachers planned their studies around the classics and works of modern authors from all nations.

Flexible scheduling permitted the use of many teaching techniques this year. Added to the English department this spring was a large lecture room with a seating capacity for 72 students. Here, many large group activities were held, as classes frequently met for lectures, films, or records. Smaller group sessions allowed time for questions.



# Fundamentals Are Key To Language

Foreign relations were an important factor in our life; and to understand others we studied their customs, ways of life, and languages. At Chrysler, an extensive study of four foreign languages was offered including four years of Latin and Spanish, three years of French, and two years of Russian. In the modern language classes, emphasis was placed on learning to speak the language fluently. Hours were spent imitating new words along with memorizing new alphabets and vocabularies.

A study of derivations and dialogue led to an understanding of cultures and customs which allowed the students a more complete knowledge of the language. After many state tests, sophomore Sandy Hunter was chosen to spend two months in Mexico.

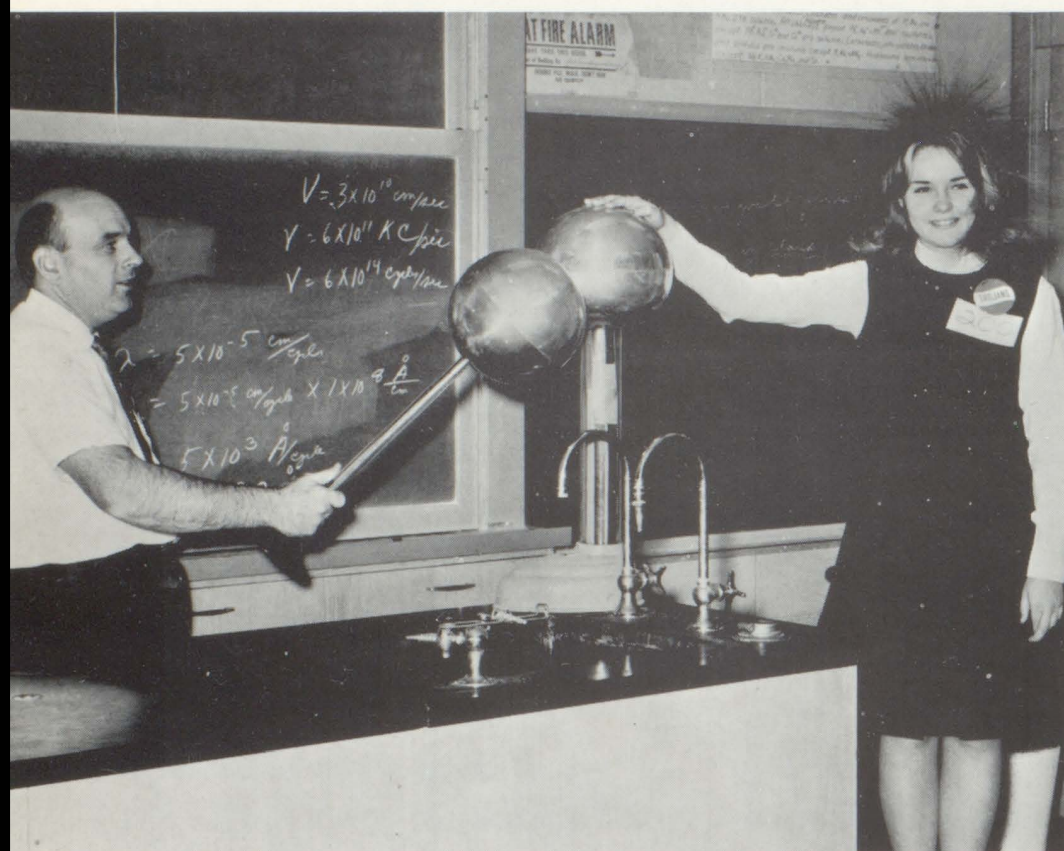

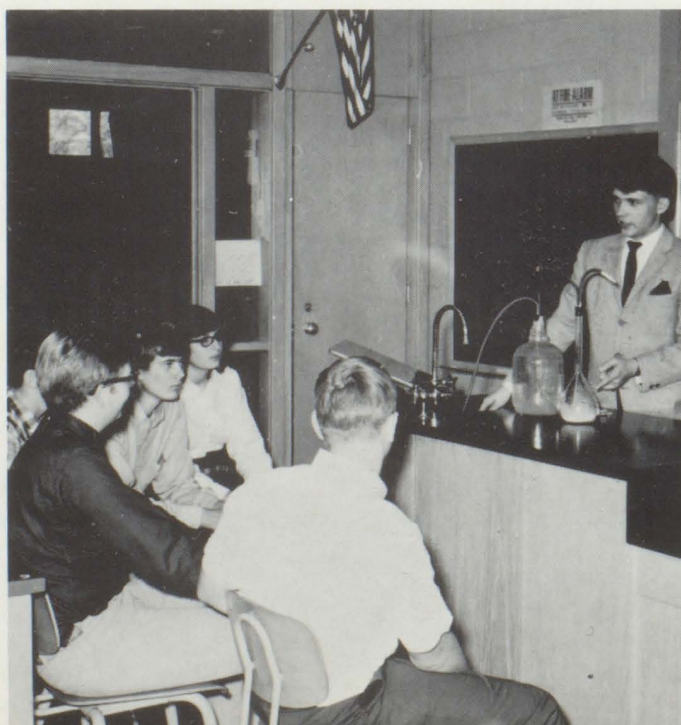

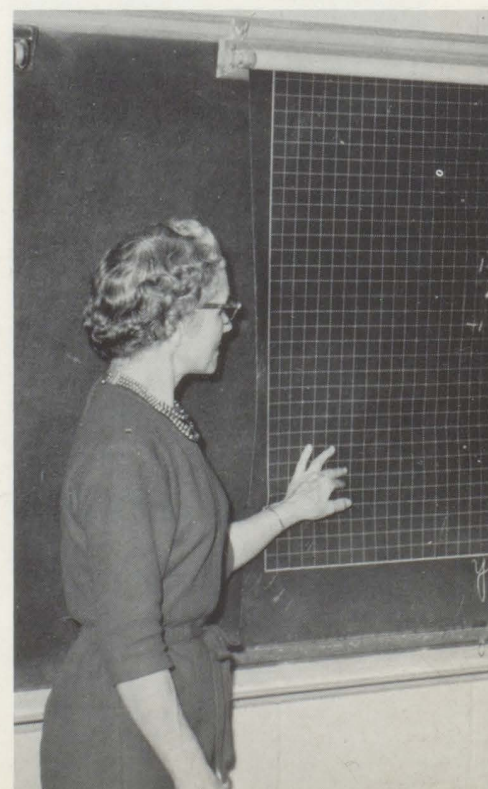


Above: MAKING a correct drawing is important, points out student teacher Mr. Wampner to Kim Klipsch.

Below: STUDENT TEACHER Mr. Shearer explains how smoking effects the lungs to a small group of biology students.

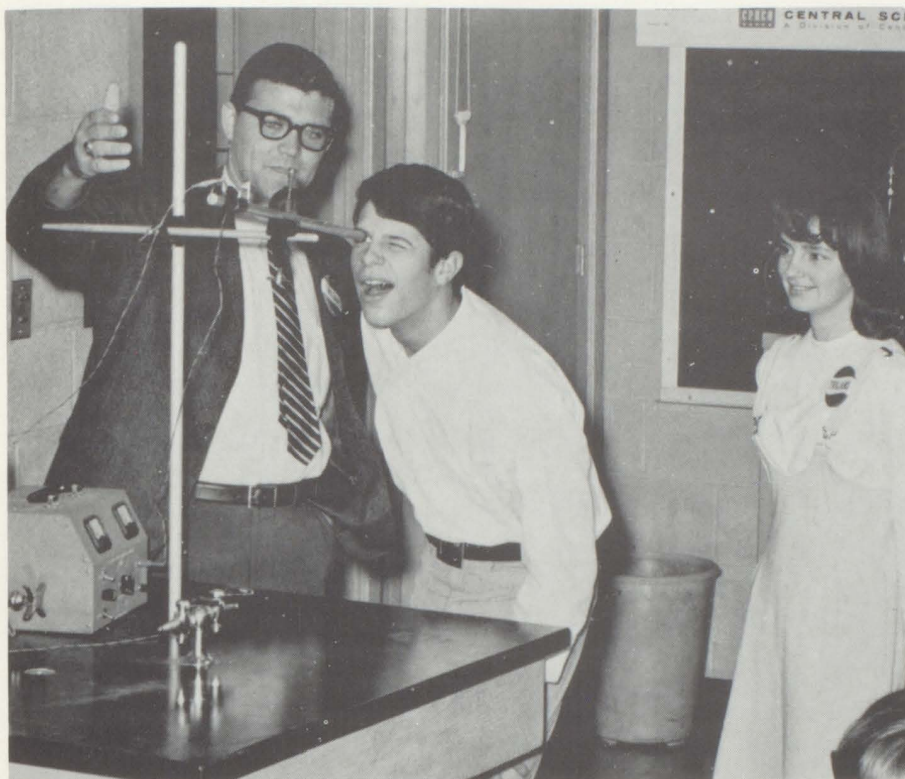


Below: CONFIDENCE is shown by Fred Mann as he accurately constructs a graph for Miss Orr, senior math instructor.





# To Math And Science Departments

In biology classes where closed-circuit television, taped labs and lectures, and team teaching were already in use, flexible scheduling blended very well this year. Added were open labs and small group sessions.

In physics, Mr. Keys issued semester plans to students, encouraging them to work beyond the required material. Ninety minute labs and small groups were also added.

Chemistry teacher Mr. Hall altered schedules to omit repetition of lectures and allow more time for small group meetings, extra labs, and unassigned science projects.

Geometry and algebra teachers combined classes three days a week to omit repeating lectures.

Along with reviewing the fundamentals of algebra, senior math students gained a basic knowledge of trigonometry, analytic geometry, and were introduced to advanced algebra.

The Social Studies curriculum was organized to create a better understanding of the history, politics, and government of the United States. Classroom debates and discussions provided a link between history and modern political issues including American involvement in Vietnam.

Students who followed the development of the nation were better able to comprehend the functions of city and school government. School-wide elections for class officers and Ball State Assembly helped students realize the value of their right to vote.

Two teachers in the required senior courses of government and economics used flexible scheduling in a program of "team teaching." Source themes, term papers and oral reports increased students' understanding of such areas as the F.B.I. or the State Department. Speakers from industry and government gave a first-hand view of Social Studies.

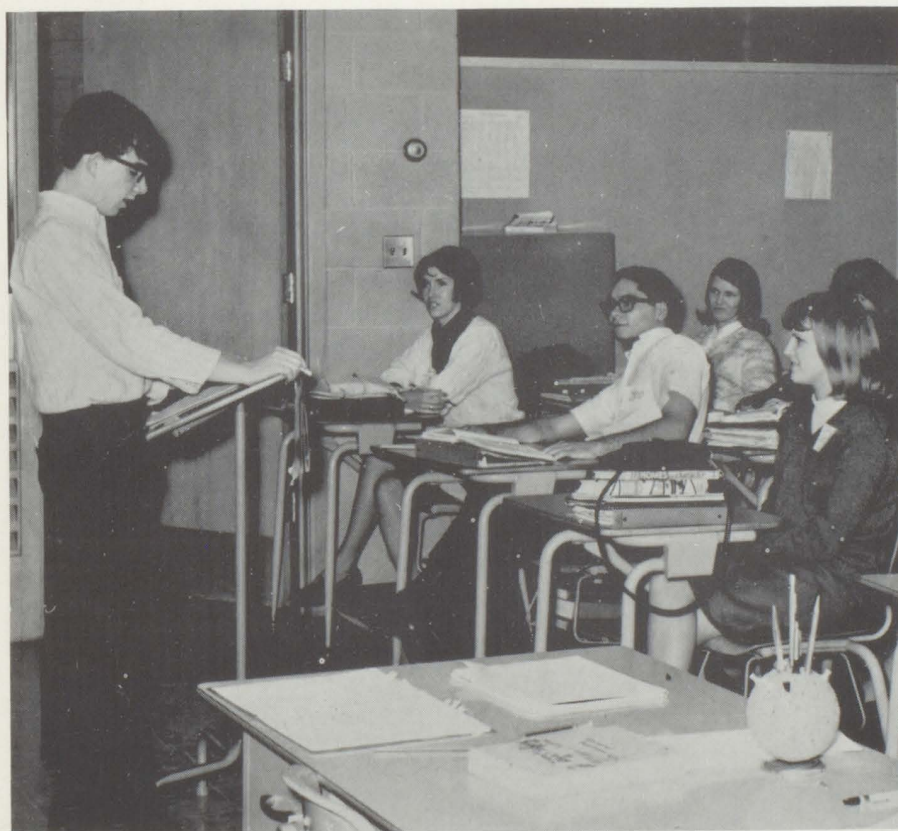

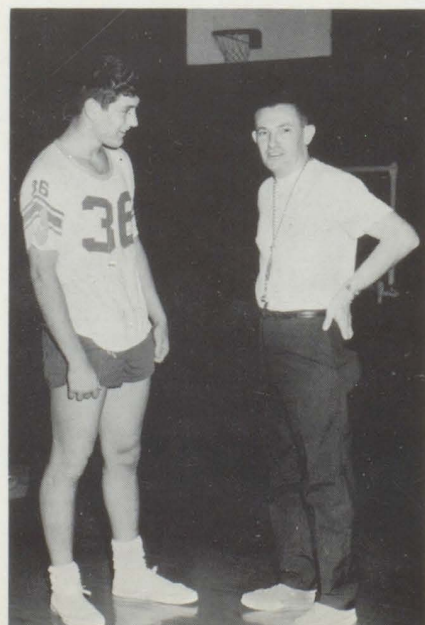
Sophomores at CHS faced a challenge to improve physical coordination. Physical education was the only class unaffected by flexible scheduling. It continued to meet fifty-five minutes a day, and five days a week.

The girls' activities began with speed-a-way and volleyball. Basketball, tumbling, and recreational sports were the winter program. In the spring when the weather was nice, the girls went outside for softball and archery.

Playing football, speed-ball, and volleyball engrossed the boys during the fall. Winter sports were basketball, wrestling, and gymnastics. Spring took the boys out to participate in track and field events and softball.

For both boys and girls, the course began with a series of physical fitness tests. At the end of the year, the tests were repeated to reveal improvement, and their scores were compared with those made by high school students throughout the nation.

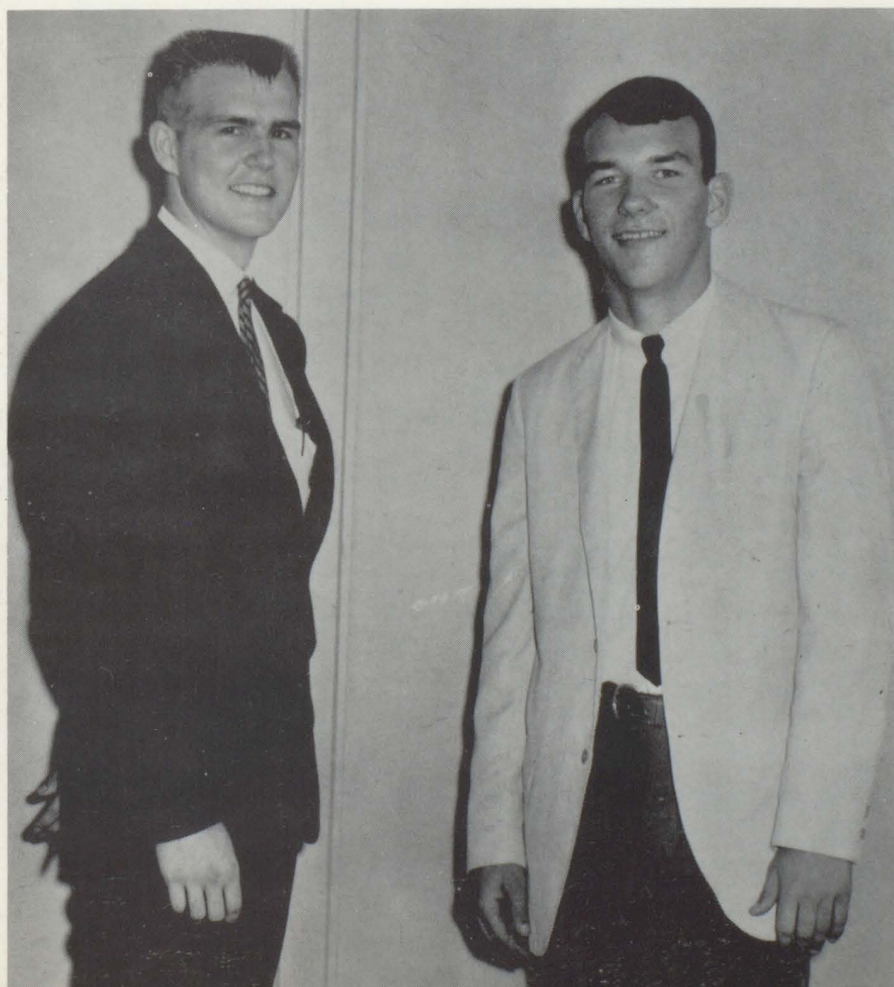

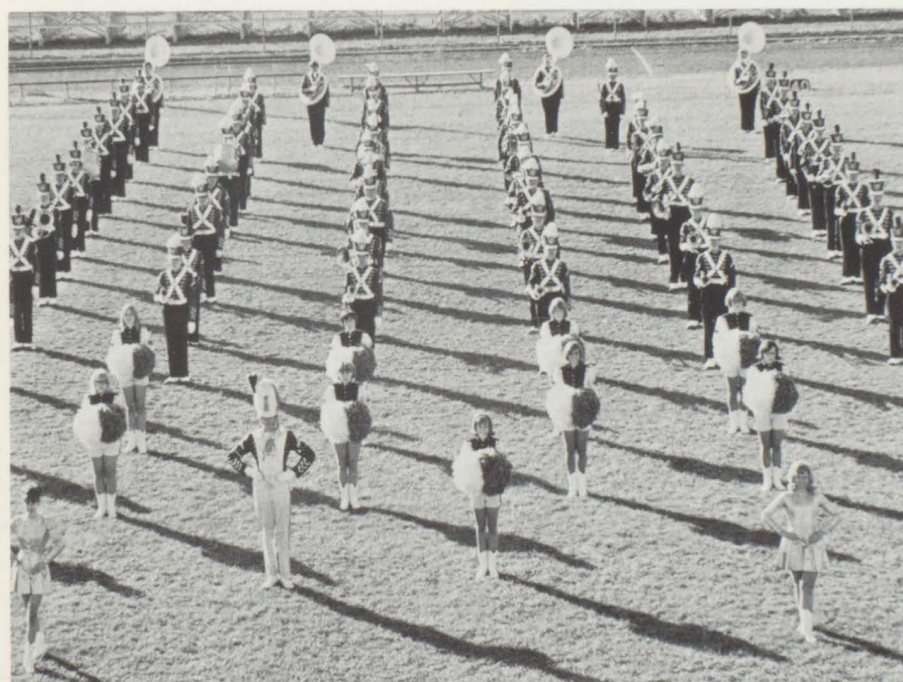

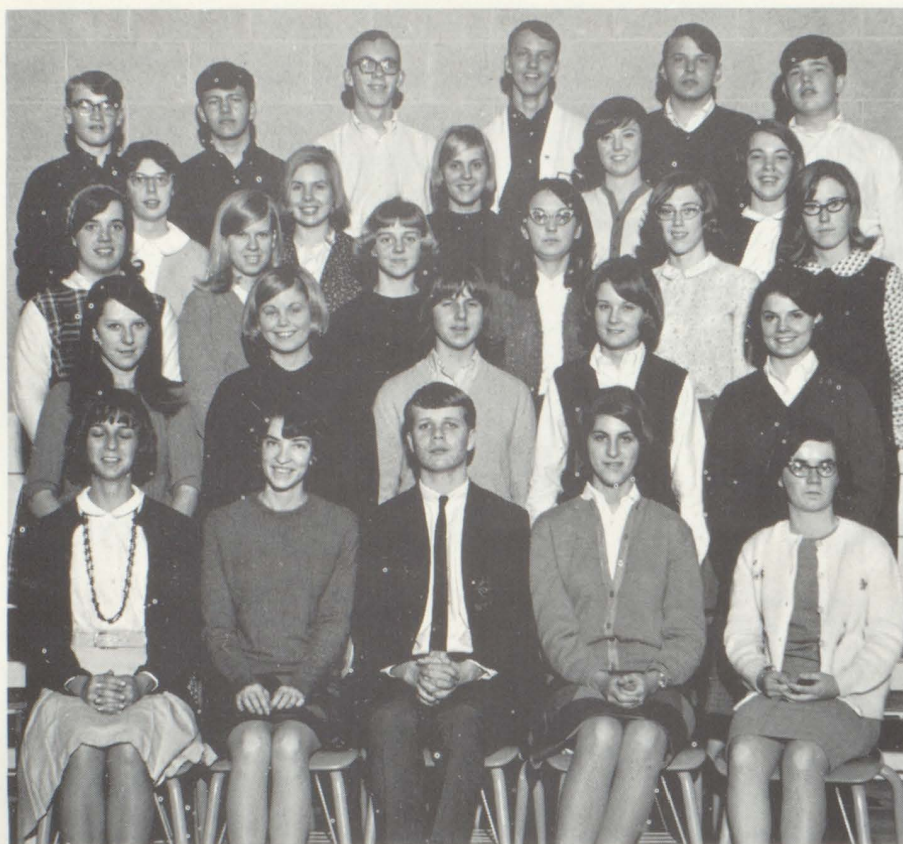

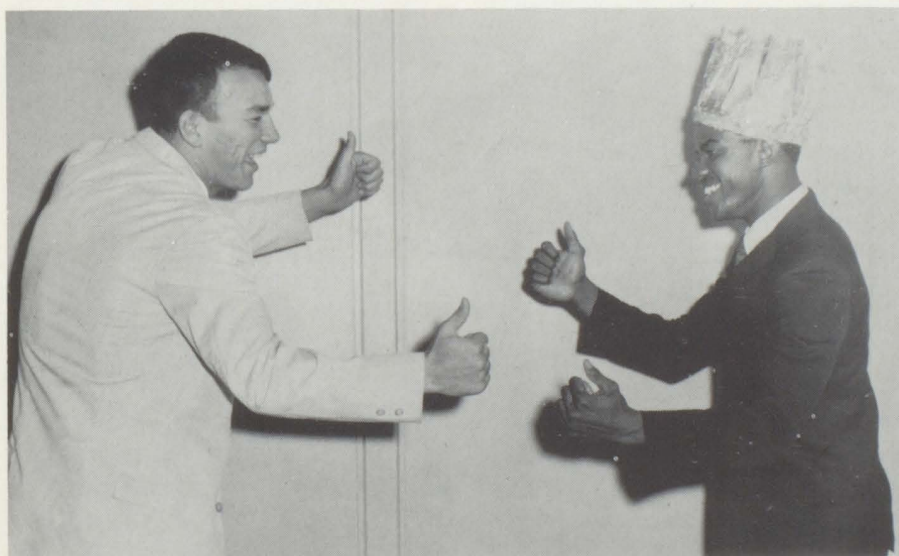

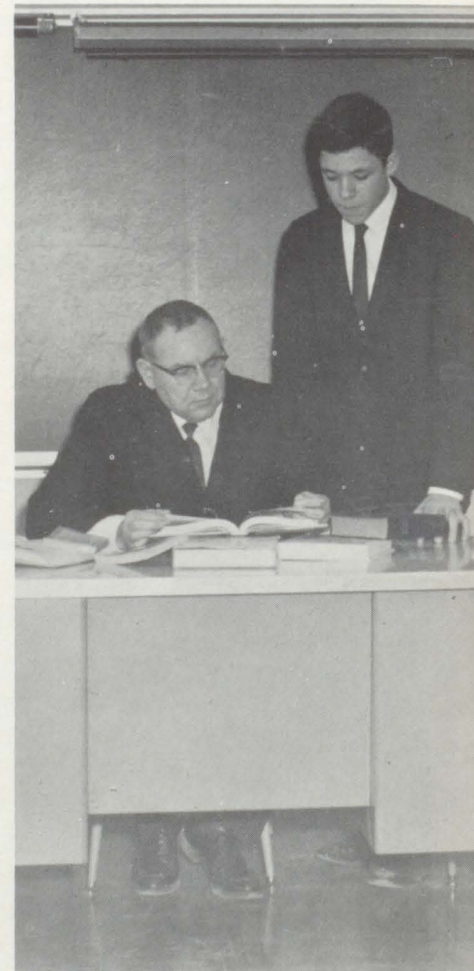

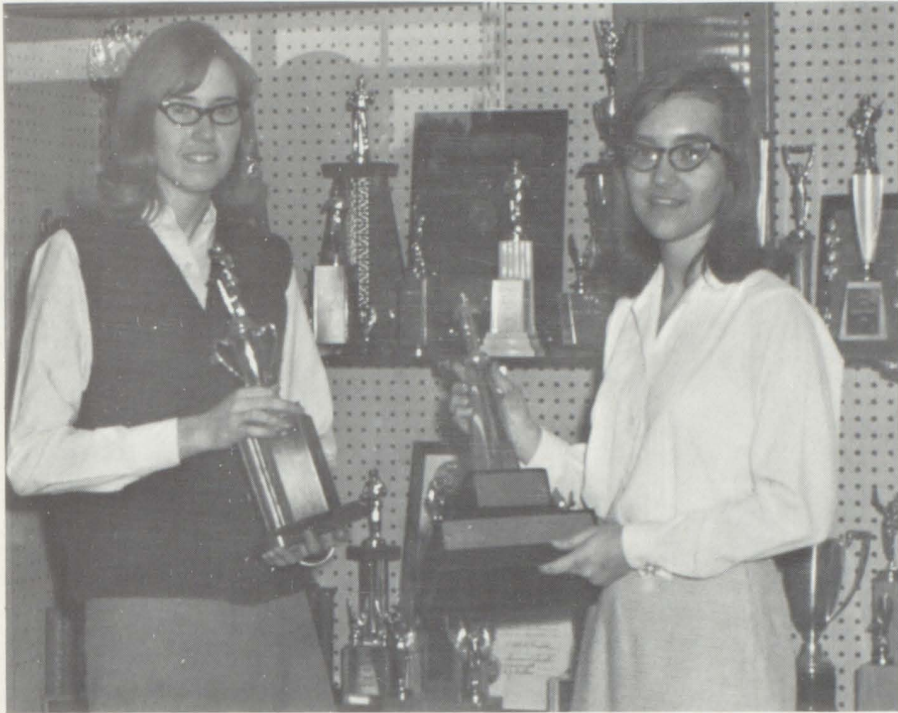

## Literary Magazine Depicts Mood



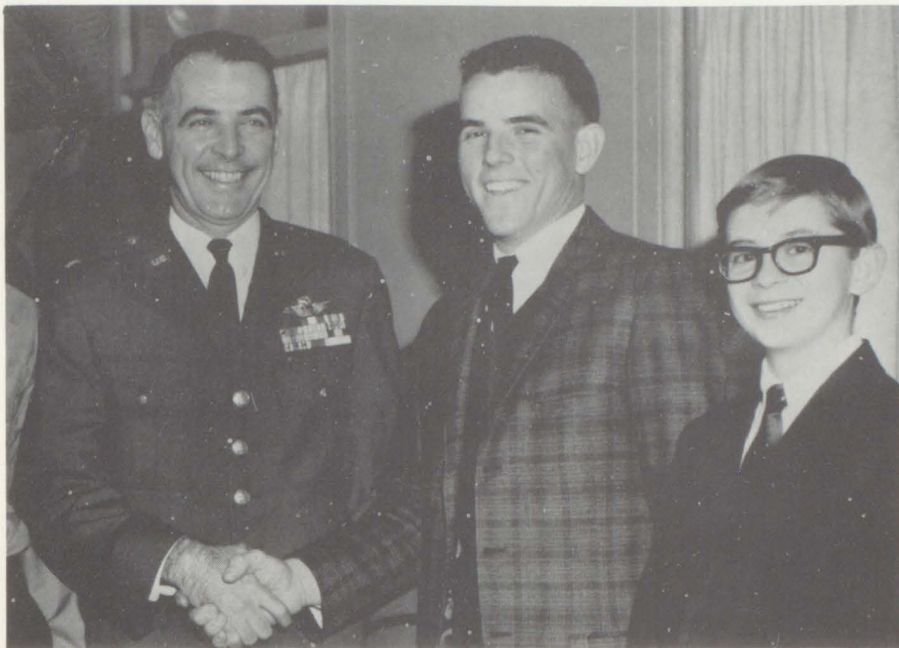

A congressman, and an astronaut, a lame shepherd and a world traveler, all appeared in this year's series of convocations.

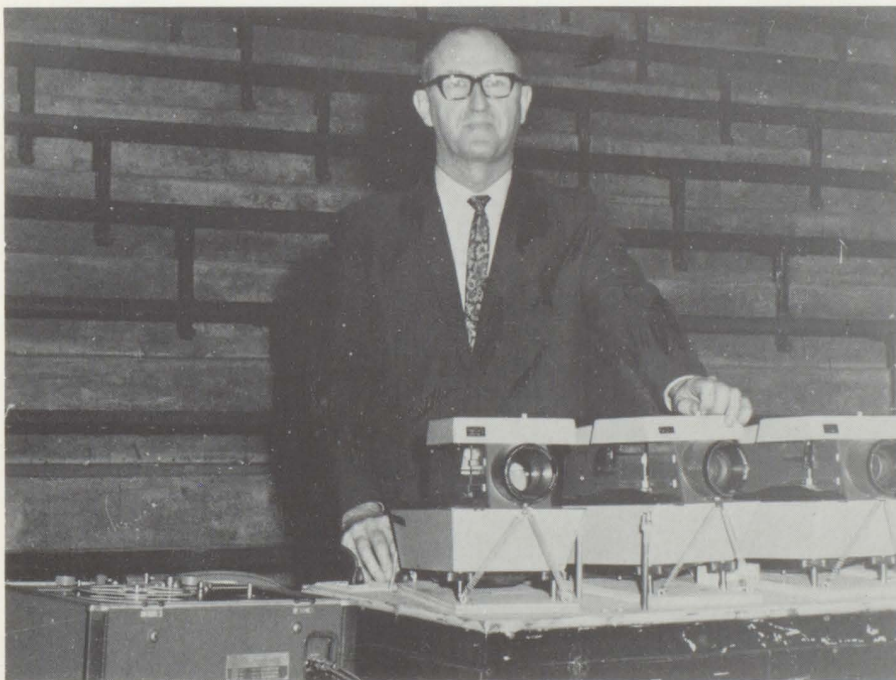
In the Lincoln Day program, Tenth District representative Richard Roudebush explained to an attentive audience the various functions of government.

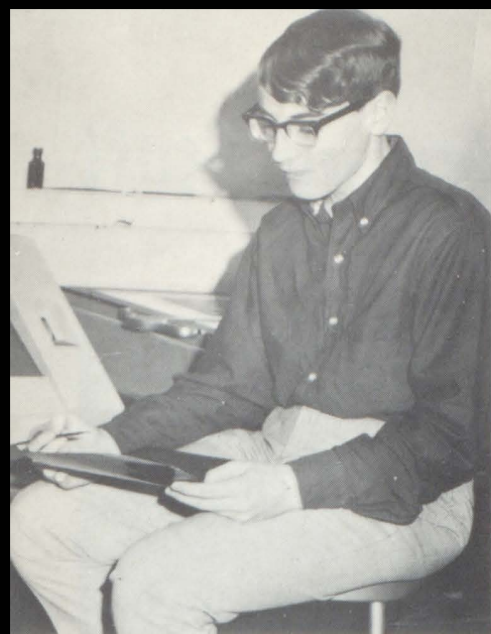

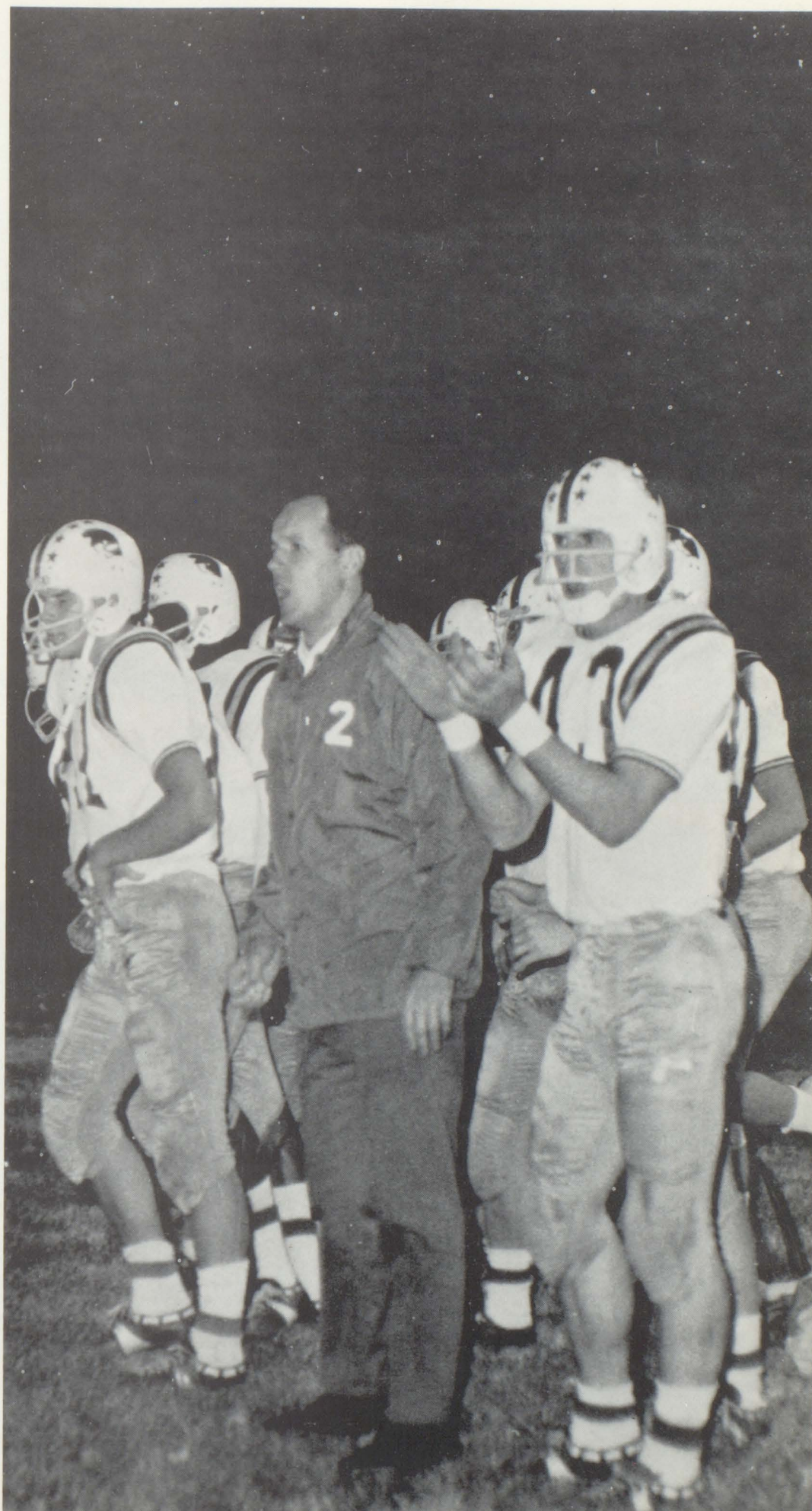

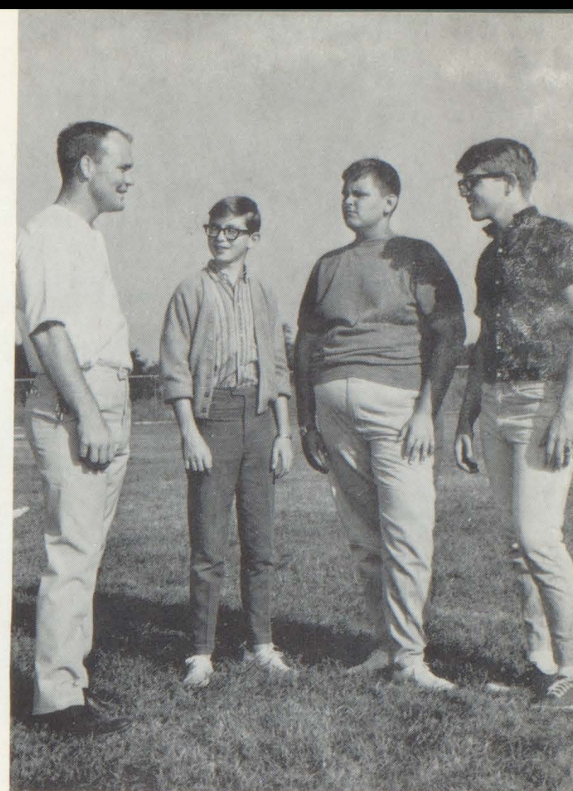

## Harriers End Season with 4-3 Record

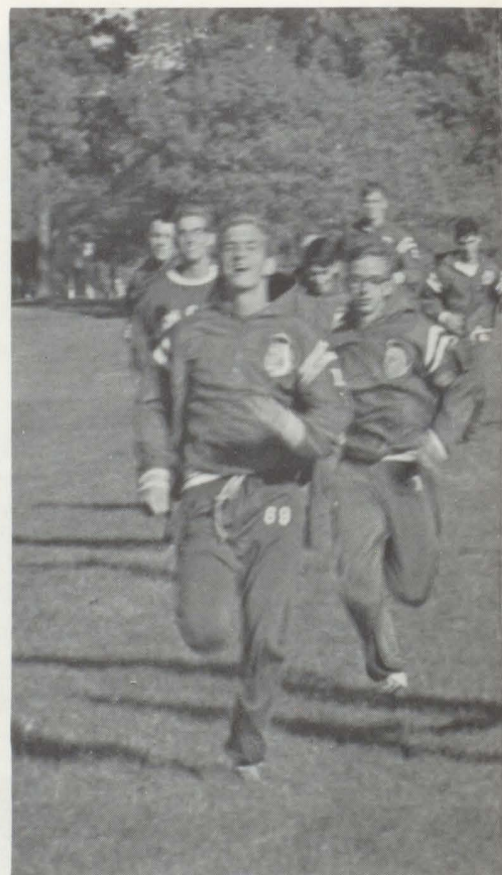

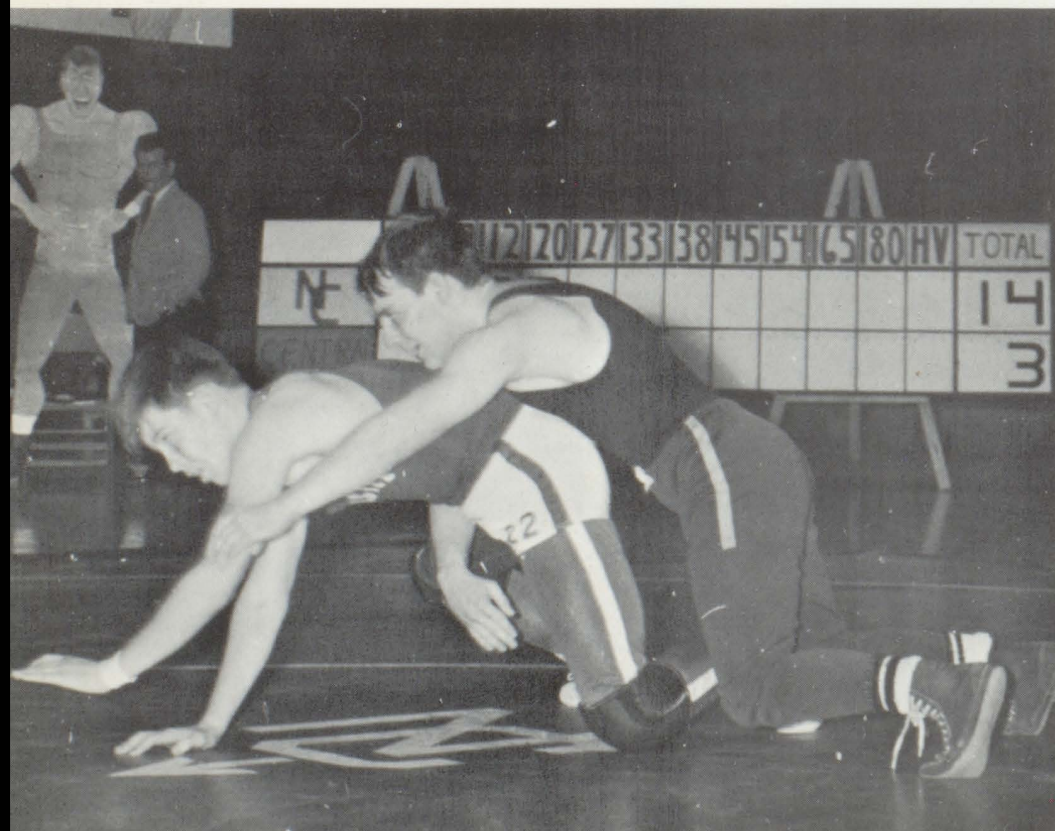

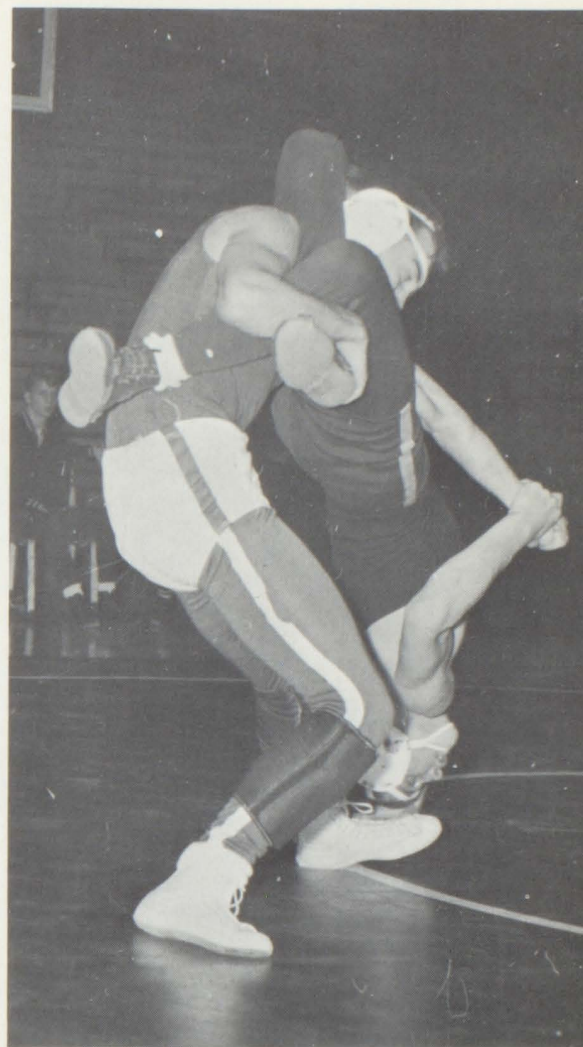

Above: THE REFEREE WATCHES as North Central Conference champ Mick Sears prepares to flip his rival.

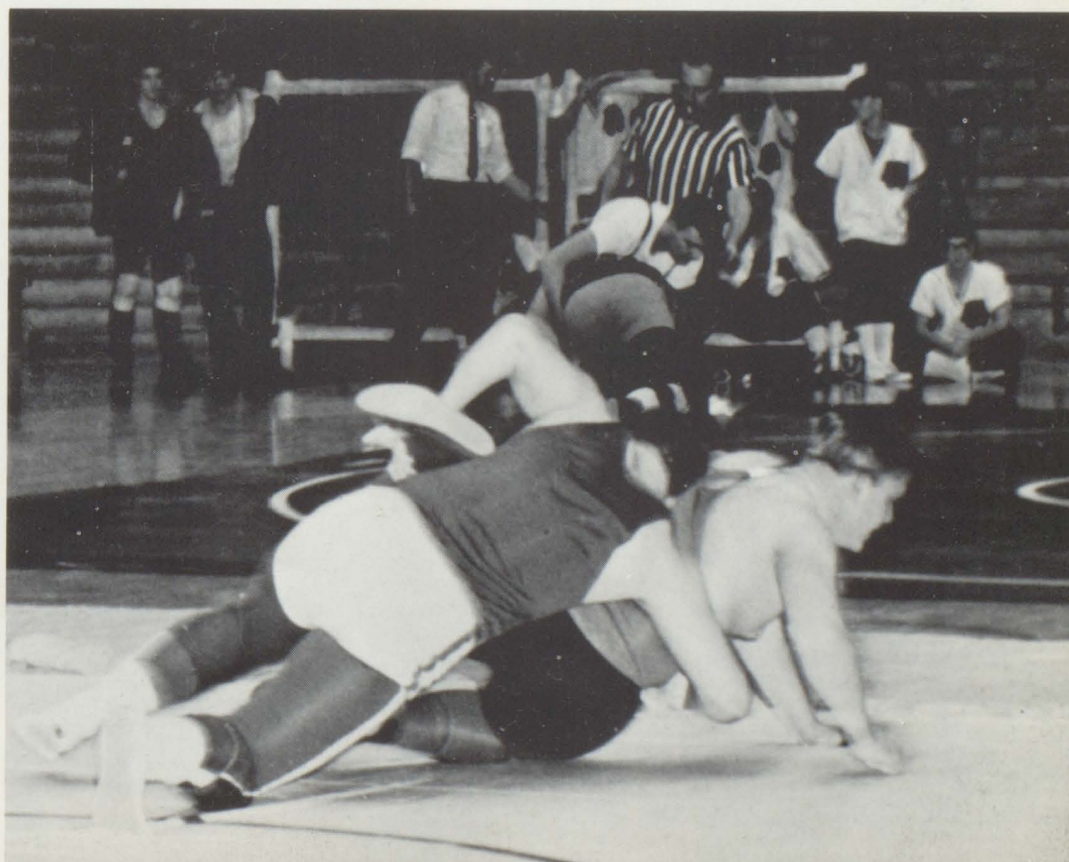
Right: DEMONSTRATING how to achieve points through a reversal, Mick has his opponent tied in knots.

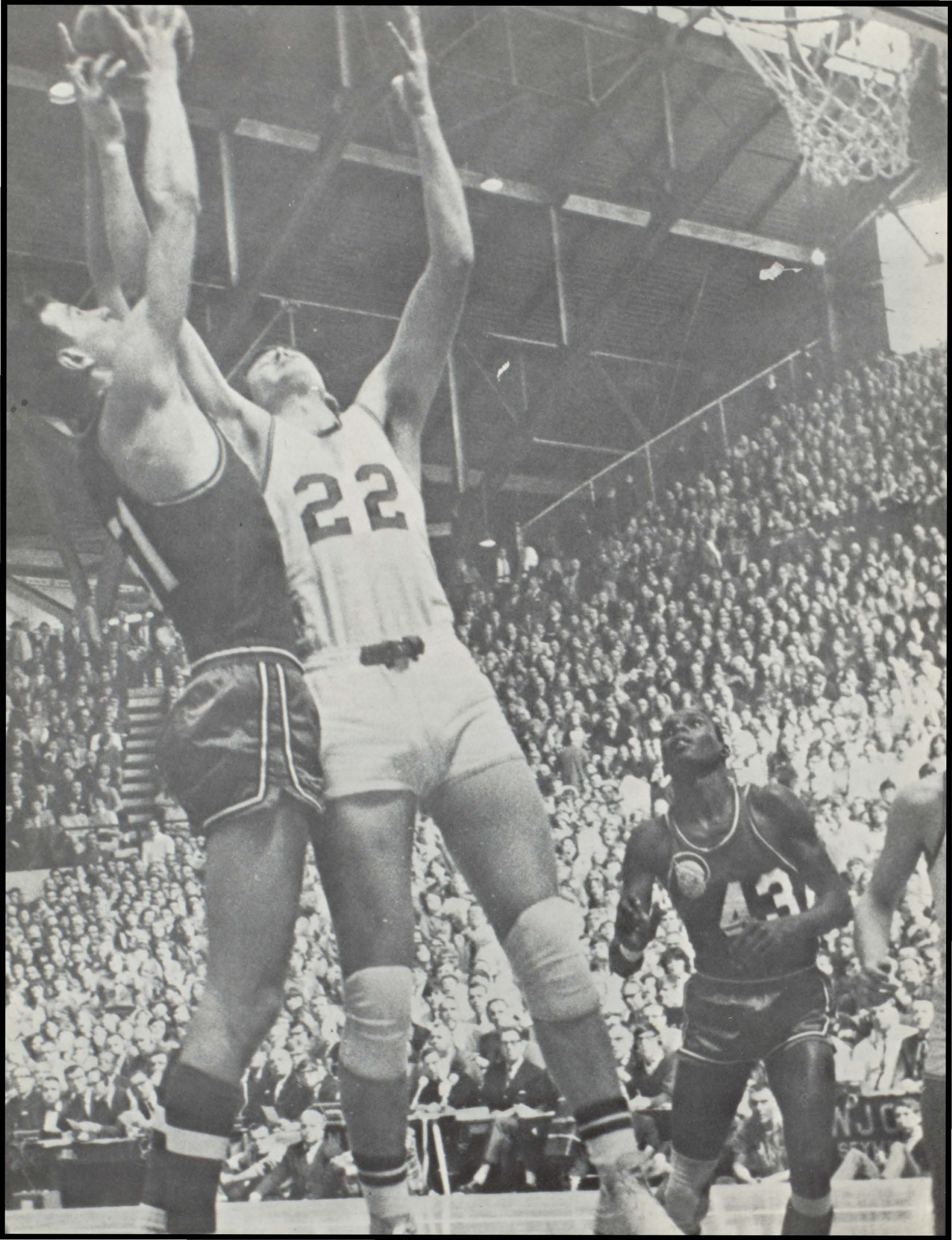
Below: ON TOP OF the situation is Harold Huffman, heavyweight, who attempts to pin his Warren Central opponent.

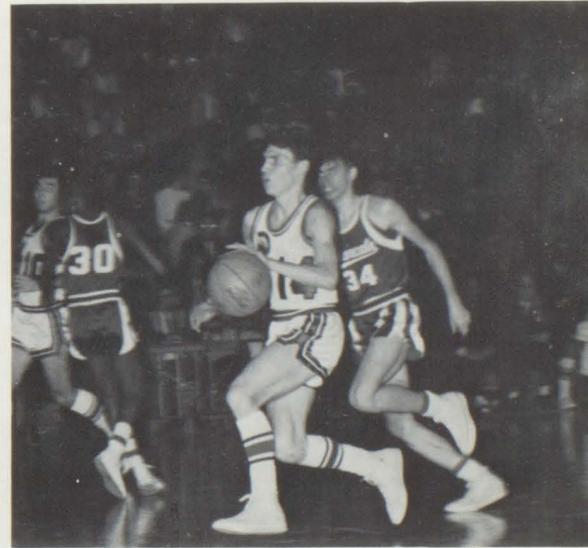

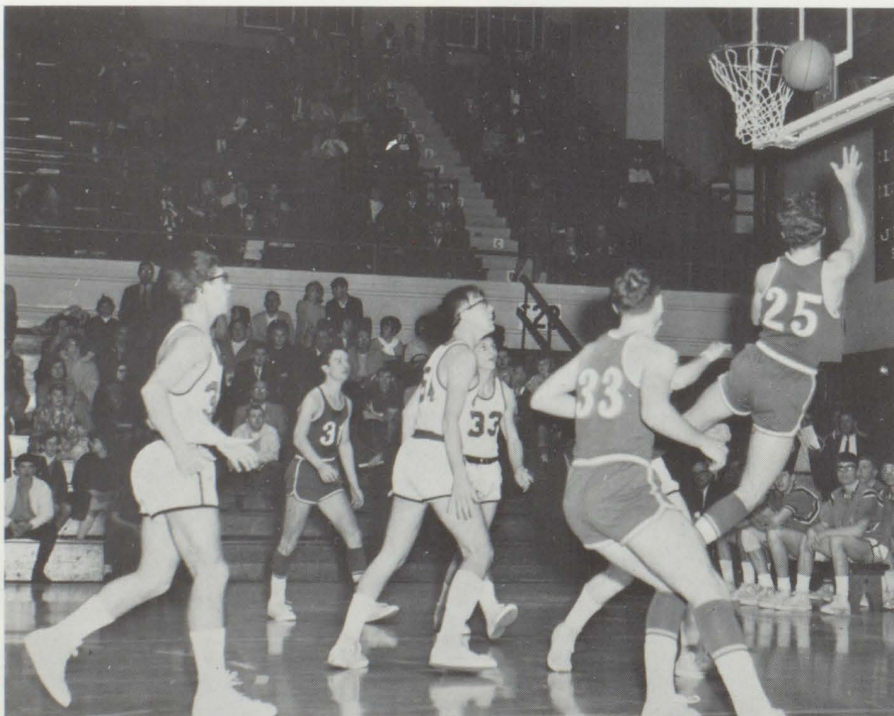
# Reserves Compile 14-6 Season

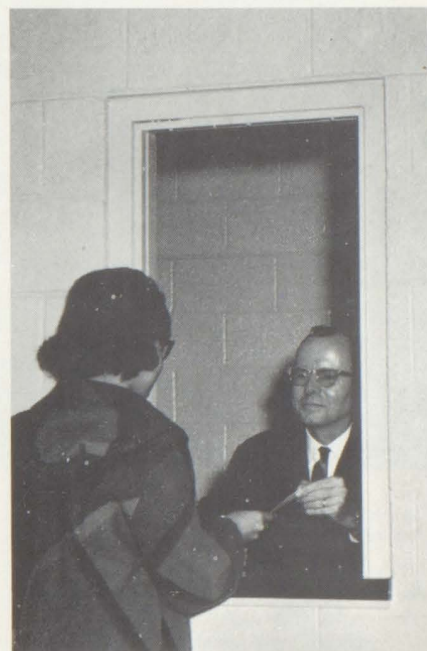

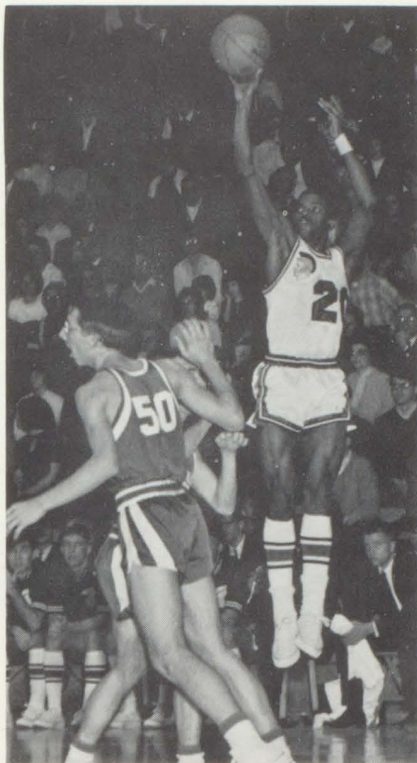

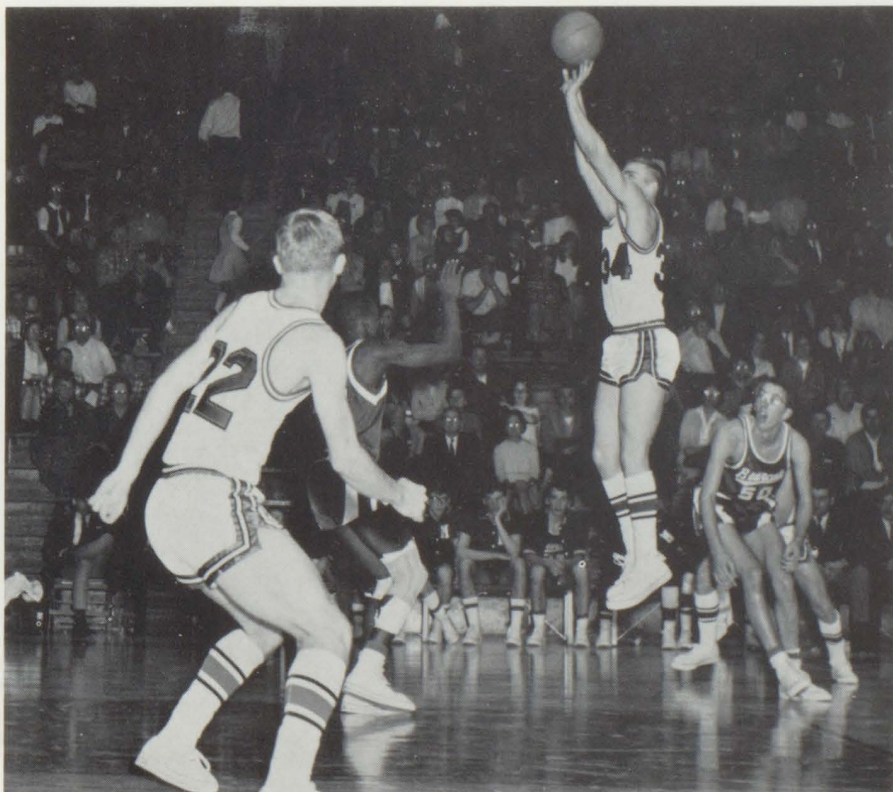


REBOUNDING FORWARD Steve Williams moves up for a quick two points against worried North Central players.

TEAMMATES Mickey Thomason and Jim Lamberson assist each other in recovering the ball for the Trojans.

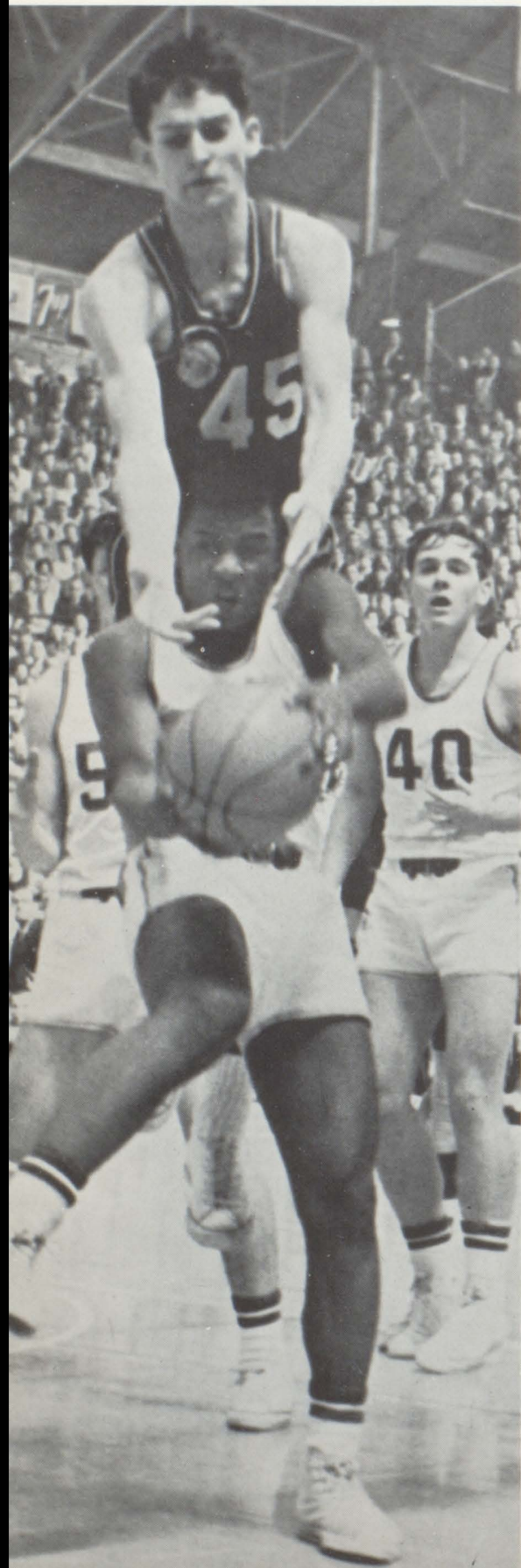


BALANCED JUNIOR Doug Ferguson is determined to keep the ball for the Trojans after bringing down rebounds.



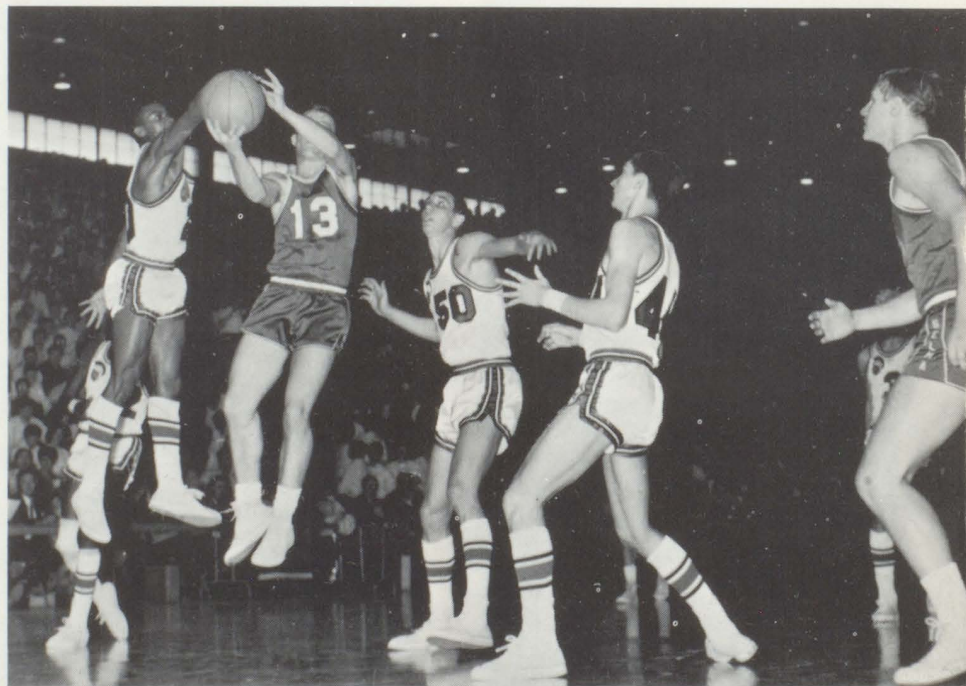

Recording the best season in CHS tennis history, the '66 netmen collected 11 wins and 8 losses.

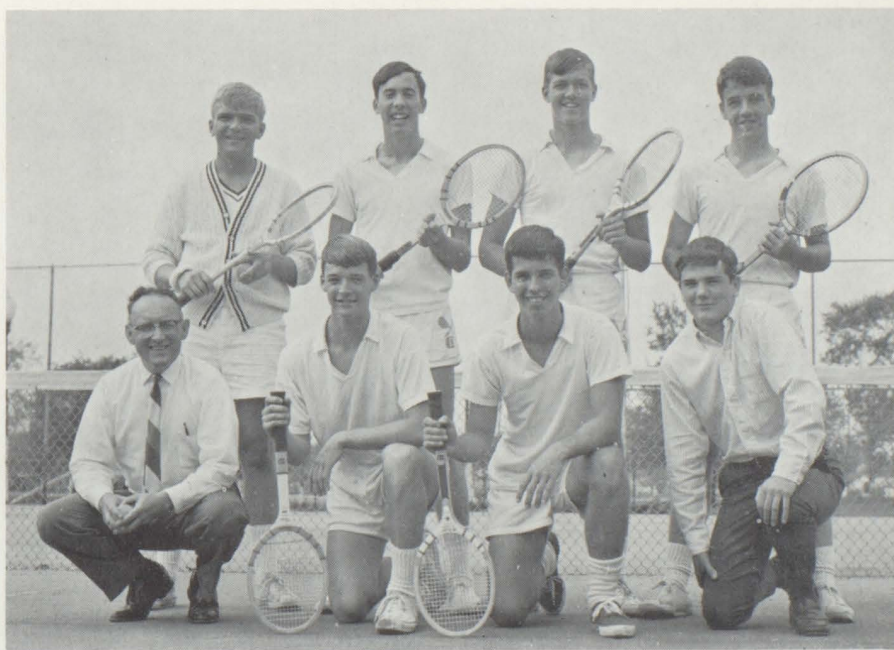

Although Jarvis, who made the all-conference team, graduated last year along with six other seniors, Coach Brooks had an equal number of lettermen back this year and expected a good season.

Jarvis led the team in batting with a .366 average. Senior Jerry Goodwin was awarded the MVP trophy. The best New Castle moundsman was Jim Lamberson with a 2-0 record. However, a well-balanced team provided for some exciting moments.

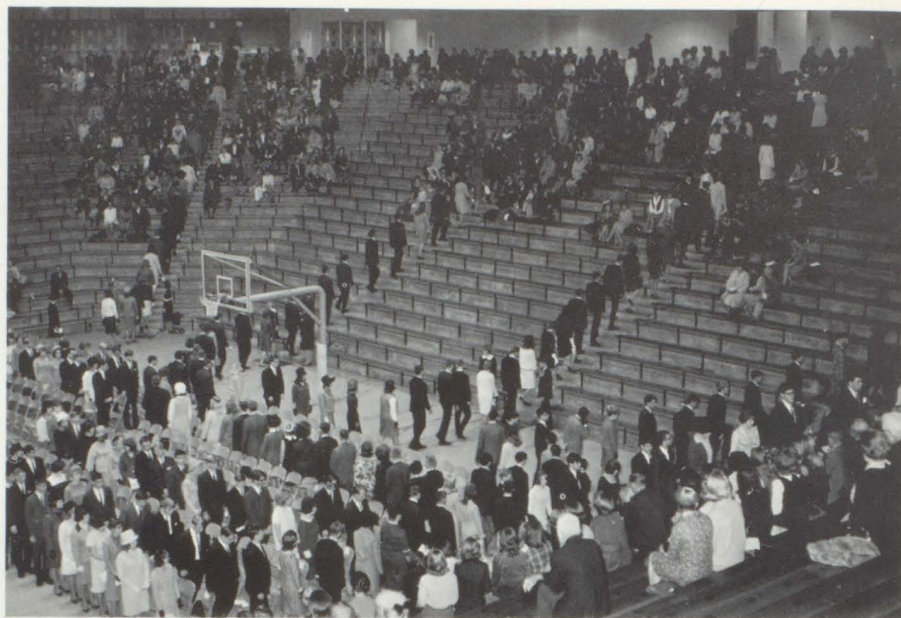

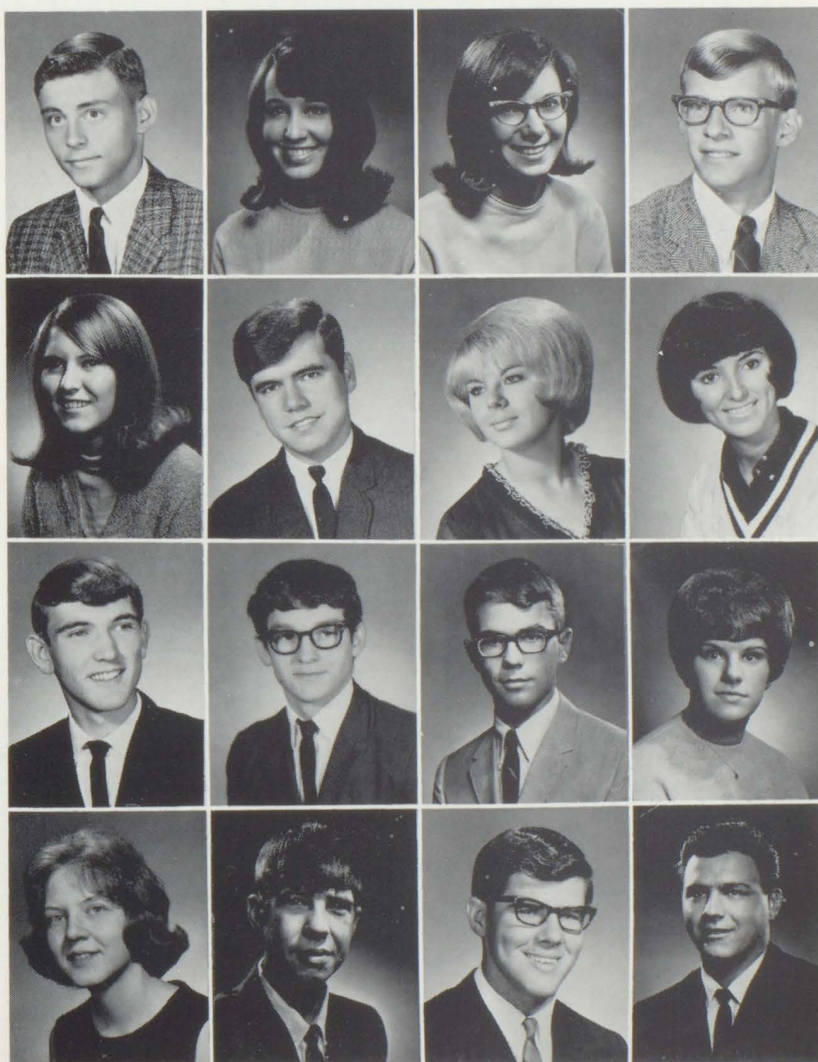

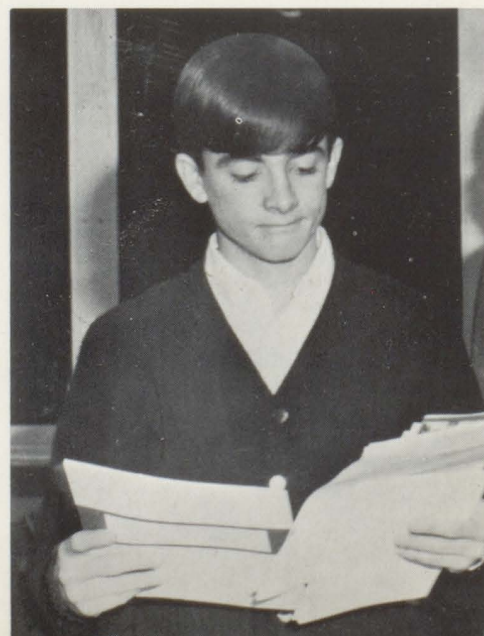

# Confusion For Sophs



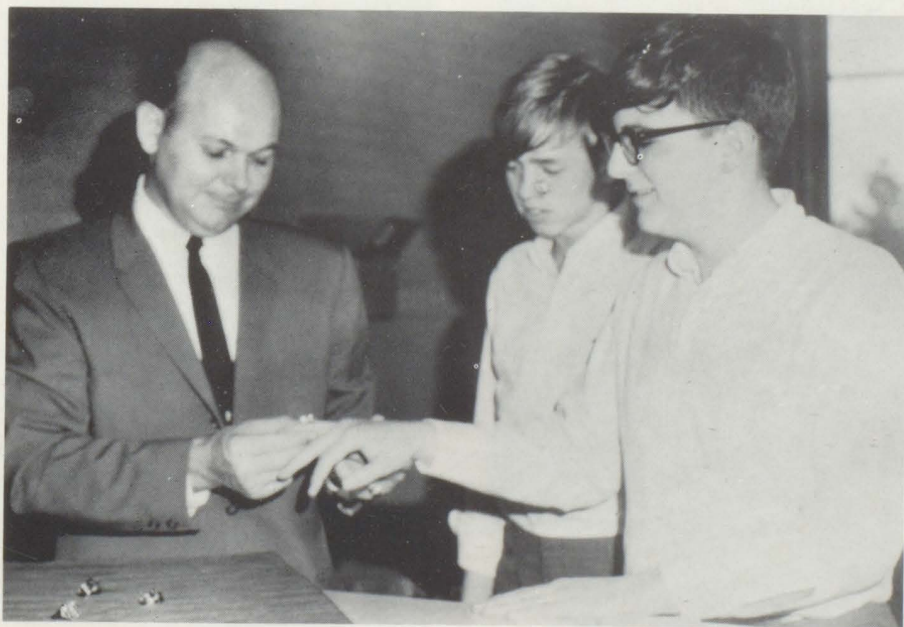
