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





Achievement Day



"I knew that eventually hard work and long hours would pay off in the end," Miller said.




"The students really did give more from the heart than from the pocket," English teacher Steve Dicken said.

Students also answered the call for help with a gift lift, a canned food drive and a blood drive.



State Heavyweight Champion James Dickerson

"There are a million things going through my mind," Dickerson said of his victory.


Dickerson was the first state champion wrestler for NCCHS since Bill Lewis won the heavyweight title in 1963.


Jeremy Platts and Josh Hardwick were defeated in the first round.

Two swimmers go to state



Senior Nathan Simmons held two afterschool jobs. When he was not at school he said he was working at Wendy's or at Bundy Tech.


"I can easily spend 50 hours in Bundy during a performance week, but usually only five hours in a normal week," he said. Simmons was an administrator for Bundy Auditorium.

Students were treated to a special convocation in the fall when geneticist Sam Rhine visited NCCHS. He addressed the issue of teen pregnancy.


Rhine stressed that pregnancy affects not one but three lives — the mother's, the father's and the baby's.

Rhine also said that teenagers often don't know that they are pregnant until they are well into the pregnancy.


"Vine out of ten couples will not know when the mother is pregnant," he said.


The separation of church and state is always a hot topic in education. Religion is a personal value that everyone cannot agree on.

Where is the line drawn?


Public schools are not allowed by law to incorporate religion into their daily routine. Religious material may be used in public schools, however, if the focus is on something other than the religious content.

"A lot happens to our book after we send in our work," sophomore Jeremy Brown said. "I had no idea that it was so complicated."




The trip was not all work, though. The group visited several Kansas City attractions such as the Hallmark Visitors Center, Crown Center Shopping Mall and the Plaza.

The game was memorable for seniors because, according to Tabor, "It was our last game in a Trojan uniform. I wouldn't trade the memories for anything."



Seniors honored on Recognitions Night


Over \$73,000 in scholarships and awards were distributed among members of the Class of 1995 at the annual Recognitions Night program.

Monetary awards were given for scholastic achievement, athletic excellence, positive attitude, extracurricular involvement, adn community service.



Night club offered students one last chance to be together before going their separate ways.






"April put her friends before guys and would break dates to be with her friends if they needed her," senior Ericka Bell said.





Throughout her career, Ellen gained notoriety in the North Central Conference — finishing as NCC medalist three times and making the all-conference team four years in a row.





In the fall, she received a green blazer at the Achievement Day Convocation for maintaining an 11.0 or higher grade point average during her high school career.


Ellen planned to attend Northwestern University — to continue her studies and possibly her passion for golf.



Technology continued to be emphasized in many areas. Noncollege-bound English classes were revamped to reflect the state Tech Prep requirements.




Biology and chemistry teacher Nan Polk instructs a student on the proper techniques for using a microscope. (Ericka Bell photo)

For many NCCHS students these colors held a special meaning.


They hold the key to their imaginations and self-expression. Creatively transforming ideas into visual reality was a hard but enriching job that art students tackled head-on.

The time had come, and many students realized the importance of learning living skills. The Family and Consumer Sciences Department was prepared to teach these important skills.



STUDENTS STRIVE TO MEET


DEADLINES

fect composition. Many students felt it was difficult finding time for writing speeches and reading books during their busy high school schedules.


"It takes a lot of time and effort to be good in English," senior Jon Sulteen said.

With these goals in mind, students spent hours upon hours reading, writing, and practicing speeches in hopes of perfection.





Business keeps up with current TRENDS


The world was changing right before our very eyes, and nowhere was that more obvious than in the Business Department.

Nancy Oakes' business management students organized a crew to redecorate their classroom to give it a more "business-like", or professional, appearance.







"Building projects in electricity gives us hand-on experience on how to solder electronic parts, and it trains us for future trades," sophomore Ken Kendall said.




THE School is alive with the sound of MUSIC



"During class, I ask questions," sophomore Vicki Dobbs added.



This year a not-sonew "gang" made itself known—the SCIENCE GANG!


The science gang used their noggins and showed that smart is "cool".


There was only one place where freedom and communism were combined: the social studies department.

This group definitely took learning to a different level. Where normal classes left off, social studies began. Surpassing the normal bounds was something they did unlike anyone else.







"It's very sleek and attractive," associate editor Carrie Robertson said. "Students seem to be more interested in reading it rather than throwing it in the trash."











Polston received a personal honor as she was invited to the Top 40 workout in both volleyball and basketball.


Senior Jeff Millikan added, "The NCC is by far the best conference in the state. It is a good feeling to know the 1995 team is at the top."





Throughout the season the Trojans showed their depth, never losing a match 0-5.


Senior captains Curt Huntley and Ross Shauver received the Most Valuable Player Awards.



Calvin "Buzz" Duff said.


The Trojans led two opponents, Muncie Central and Anderson, before losing in the second half. Anderson came from behind to score the winning touchdown with less than one minute left in the game.





One high point of the


season came when the ladies defeated Connersville in the dual meet season.



RESTLERS ROCK STATE Trojans wrestlers set record for consecutive dual meet victories with a 42-0 record.

This year's team earned itself the title of the best Trojan wrestling team ever, and will be known as one of the best athletic Trojan teams ever.

The wrestlers won their fifth straight North Central Conference championship. In addition, they had a record-breaking 42 victories in a row without a loss. This also broke last year's school and state record of 41-0.

Five wrestlers qualified for the state tournament this year, earning a tie for second place in the state and the highest finish ever for a Trojan wrestling team.

Heavyweight wrestler James "Bubba" Dickerson earned the first Trojan individual title in almost thirty years when he pinned all of his opponents to win the state title.



LADY TROJANS DOMINATE OPPONENTS

Trojans win a share of the NCC for the first time since 1979.

The Lady Trojans had a season that ended with the second most wins in school history. They ended with a record of 19-4.

The girls were only beaten three times in the regular season. They breezed by all their opponents, which included a 98-32 destruction of Muncie South.

The girls also added a North Central Conference to their list of accomplishments for the season. They finished the conference season with six wins and only one blemish to Lafayette Jeff, with whom they shared the conference crown.

This was the first North Central Conference title for the team since 1979.

The girls also won their sixth straight sectional title. They dominated the tournament with an average winning margin of 44 points.

"This team would have to be considered one of the top two or three teams in Trojan basketball history," Coach Curt Bell said.

There were many individual highlights of the season. Senior Sheila
Polston became the fifth all-time leading scorer with 876

points, and the second alltime rebounder with 624. She was also voted to the top forty team.

Sophomore Erica Cory broke the school record for three-pointers by hitting 75 in a season.

Sophomore Kiya Griffin shot 63% from the field, breaking the record.







"We win every game because we support the New Castle Trojans," Coach Linda Allen said. Senior Jenny Dyer received the Most Improved and Best Spot Awards.


The Best Climber was Cindy Reece.

"New Castle shows lots of support to the activities associated with the high school," senior basketball player Jeff Millikan said. "We especially appreciate places like Rax, who supported our team."



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

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

Herff Jones Yearbook Company, 726 E. Gracia, Marceline, Missouri, 64658, printed Volume 78 of the New Castle Chrysler High School *Rosennial*. Our local Herff Jones representative was Chris Frick; our customer service manager in Missouri was Nancy Williams.

The yearbook class, which met during the seventh period each day, produced the book. Students used PageMaker 5.0 to produce the book; they used Write (Windows) for word processing. Artwork came from the Herff Jones *Portfolio* and from various *Clickart* sources. The bulk of the desktop publishing work was completed on two IBM 433 DX/D computers. Two IBM 386 computers were used for word processing. The pages were printed out on a Hewlett-Packard LaserJet III printer.

The main headlines are set in Staccato 555 BT. Body copy is set in Times New Roman. Captions are Times New Roman 9 point.

Rosennial students worked with Doug McWilliams (Mission Kansas plant) to design the lithograph cover during a staff visit to that plant. Endsheets were designed by **Rosennial** staff members.

The book is printed on 80 pound Bordeaux paper that is smyth sewn.

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
