What do a neat-freak, a slob, a shy princess, a goofy prince, a group of poker players, and knights all have in common? They were all characters in the two plays produced by the drama department this year.

The fall play was The Odd Couple, by Neil Simon. The story began as a normal weekend as Oscar Madison, a divorced and sloppy man played by senior Ryan Groce, made an effort to feed his friends Murray, played by Zach Tabor, 9, Speed, played by Bradley Wilkinson, 11, Vinnie, played by Ethan Klotz, 11, and Roy, played by Josh Wilkinson, 12. The men would soon be joined by Felix Unger, played by Kyle Roach, 11. Felix is a very uptight neat freak who tried to commit suicide because his wife left him. Chaos ensued when the poker players learned of Felix's plot to kill himself. Throughout the play, Felix and Oscar are met with many clashes in their personalities. But of course, as in most stories, the play came to happy ending as Felix and Oscar realized that even though they clashed with one another on numerous occasions, they would still have to remain good friends.
"Acting is all about getting to know the character. You have to know every mannerism and such that the character would do and bring it out," Roach said. Coproducer Evan McGrew agreed that it isn't easy to get up on stage and act. "It's easy to memorize lines, the challenge is getting into the part," said McGrew. "You need the ability to observe behaviors, and mimic what they are doing."

After the success of the fall play, auditions for the spring musical, Once upon a Mattress, came around. The story was much simpler and most of the fall plays cast received roles in the musical. The story centered on Prince Dauntless, played by Tabor, who had to marry a true princess, as dictated by his mother, Queen Aggravaine, who was played by sophomore Shylia Ward. The princess of the story, Princess Winnifred of Ikolmkill, was played by senior Abby Rahn. If Dauntless did not get married, then Sir Harry and Lady Larken, played by Roach and senior Karen Dickerson, could not get married and would have to leave the kingdom because Larken was pregnant with Harry's child. Despite his mother's many attempts to keep him from getting married, Dauntless and Winnifred lived happily ever after.
"The plays were a learning experience for the students. Procrastination," Groce said, "isnt always the best way to get
things done. It's when you work your hardest that things come out well." Goofing off is one of the things the casts did very well. "The cast dinner was very fun for everyone," said Bradley Wilkinson. The cast dinner is the fall play 'ritual,' where cast members go out to dinner together as the characters they are in the play.

Altogether, the 3 nights for both plays went extremely well. Nick Simmons, director of both plays, agreed. He was also very pleased with the turnout of both productions. "I'm very glad to see all the talent we have in the classes coming in and in the groups we have now. I believe that next year's productions will be as good as these, if not better."
