




This year was also the first year for an all color yearbook. The academic teams did very well including an outstanding first place in state finals.


















Junior Zach Marcum said, "The best thing about field day was being able to get out of class for four hours." He did not participate in any activities but he had alot of fun.











Fall dance!







First place was awarded to Brittney Toth, senior, singing a Reba McIntyre original. "I was shocked when I won, there were so many good competitors," Toth said.






"The rehearsals were long and somewhat difficult, but I'm glad I pushed myself to work through it," said Tabor.




"I went into this with a so-and-so attitude and came out with a bond like family," said Roach.





"I think the Horizon Center was a perfect place for my senior prom, it was a lot better than having it in the middle school gym," said senior Chase Stigall.


The 2008 prom was held in a new location at the Horizon Center in Muncie. Entertainment was provided by Heartbreaker, a dj from Indianapolis.

"I was really shocked when I won King, there were a lot of guys out there who deserved as much as I did," said senior Josh Burns. Overall, this year's prom was a huge success.





























"Bundy Tech was a lot of fun," said sophomore Chad Nguyen. It's also something to do."

"The most embarrassing, yet funny, thing that happened on Bundy Tech was when I accidentally put a spotlight on the audience," said sophomore Brandon Brooks.



"We all try to think of popular or well-known music, actors, actresses, etc. to make the rally as fun as possible," said Dave Clark.




In the speech team's spare time, they also joked around. "Speech is really fun, but you have to work hard, and do your work", said Whitmer.





"I really like bowling and all the girls had a lot of fun just hanging out and talking," Kim Rooney, freshman, said.


Ron, coach of the boys JV and Varsity said, "The boys had an amazing season this year."

Nan Polk also said that she had the most fun on Saturday, April 26, when the Environmental Club, with the help of Biology students, planted over 50 trees in Westwood Park.


Sophomore Lisa Stockton said, "I joined Environmental Club because I wanted to help the Earth. I want to help stop global warming, and let people have a good life in the future."



















Sophomore, Kenny Stephens said, "The best part about Mr. Allen's class is learning how to construct different types of projects."


Another sophomore, Ryan Harsha said, "If we are doing book work its pretty hard stuff, but when we get to start the hands on work thats when the fun begins."






This year in the math department the students learned a lot of things that will help them in the future. The math teachers made sure these lessons were taught in a variety of ways.

Teacher Janet Maxwell said, " I enjoy working with the more advanced mathematical problems."



"The program helps the peers learn how to get their point across and not sound rude or threatening," he added.


"You learn all kinds of skills in Peer," Harvey said.

"I know that I am going to benefit from the Peer program. Its going to help me be a better parent and help communicate with people after high school," said David Cantrell, junior.



















A few of the girls on the team said that they really liked the away matches.


