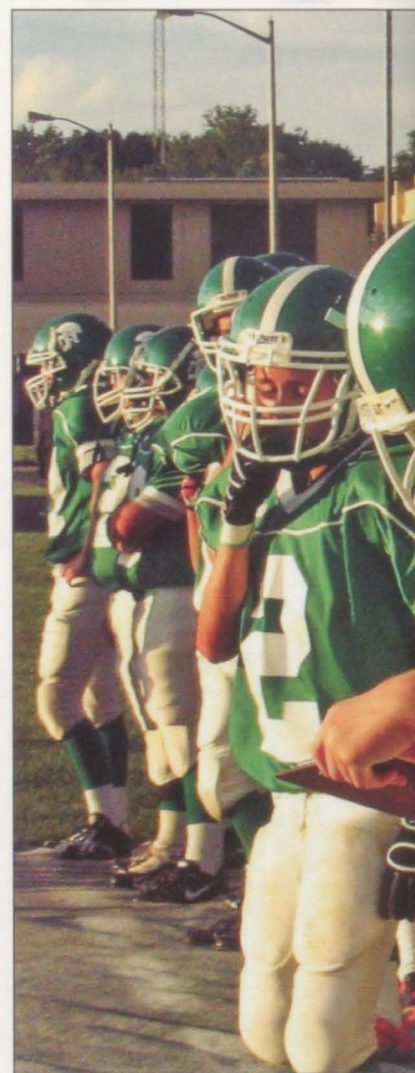
"The best part of the game for me was scoring the first touchdown of the season," said sophomore Jordan Day.

"The best part of the game for sure was playing in the rain, and hearing the student section cheering us on," said sophomore Adam Kranda.

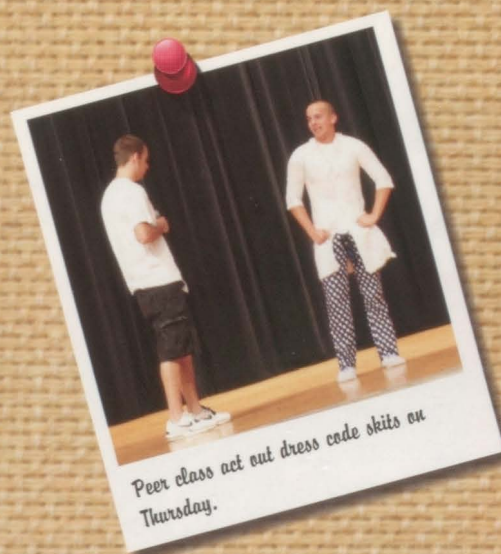

The boys soccer team played a rough game against Jay County during the second week of school. Junior Andrew Adams said, "We did our best, I guess certain aspects didn't work in our favor."

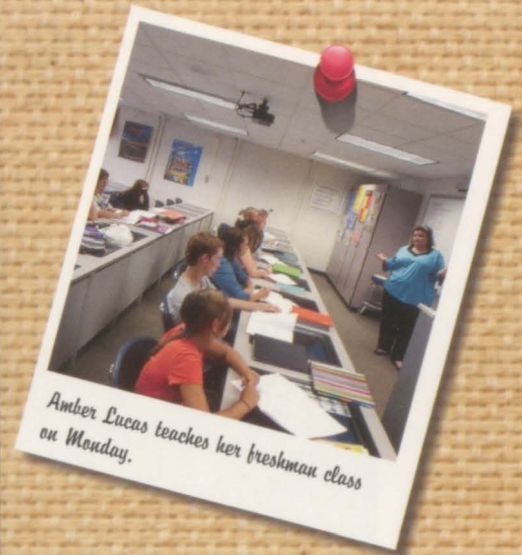
Junior Drew Neuman said, "Even though we lost it was a good game. It showed us that playing team defense and moving the ball more can help a lot."

Senior Jacob Myers said the team lost, 3-1, and they need to work on their ball contact.

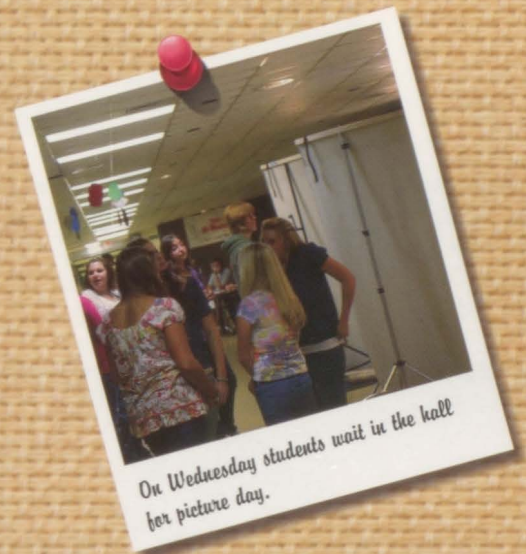
The 2009 captains were Adams and Myers. They said the team goals for the season were to improve every game and to win at least the first game at regional.

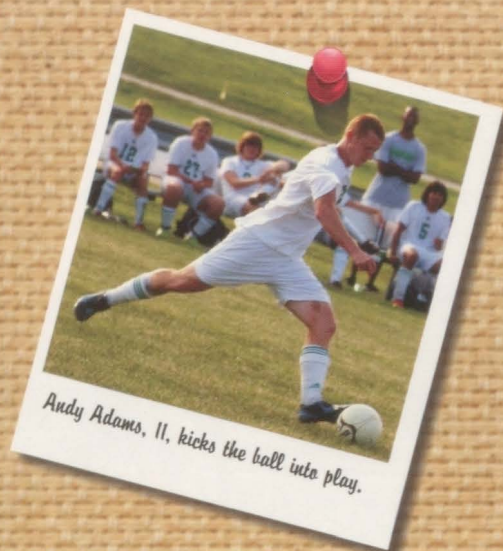
10 Senior Parking Spots

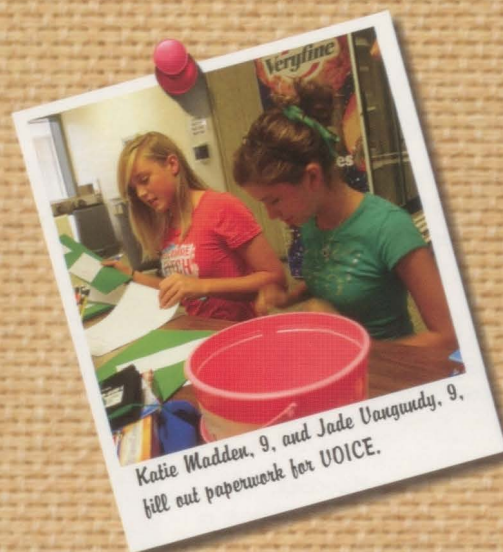

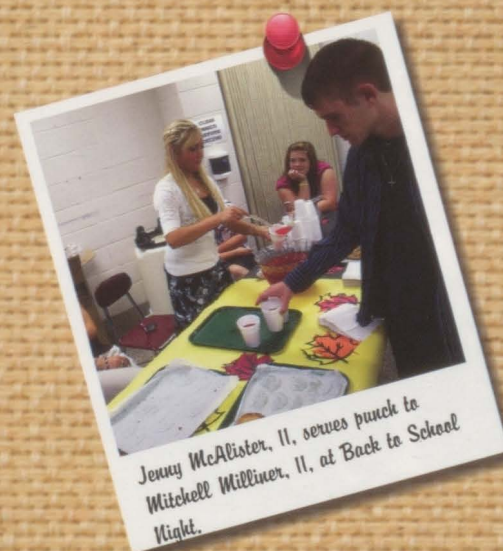

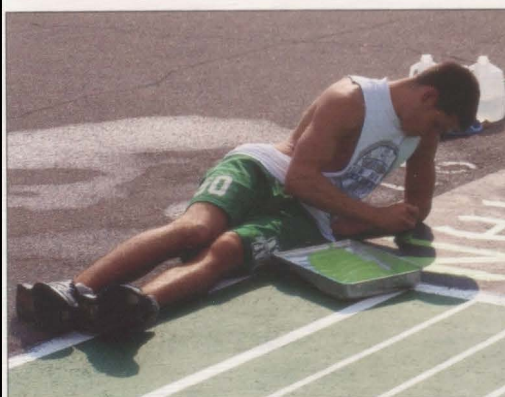

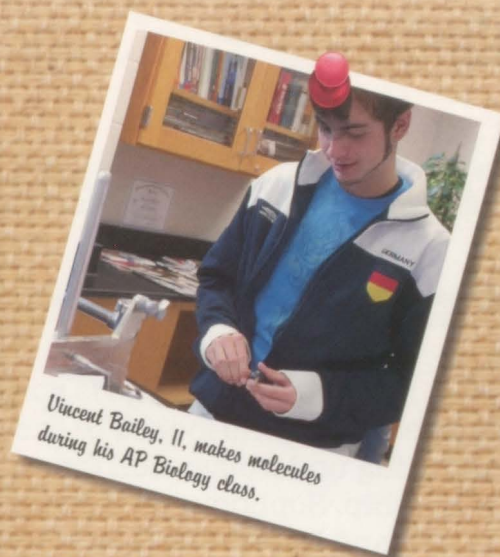
Kickin' against Kokomo

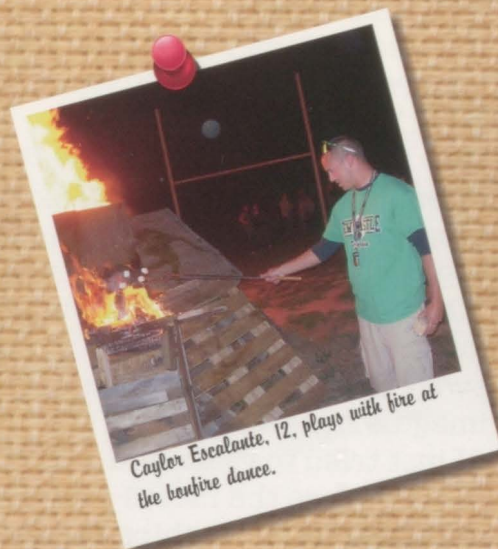

"I was really proud of the girls this season. They worked really hard and did very well throughout the year," Coach Phil Brunoehler said.



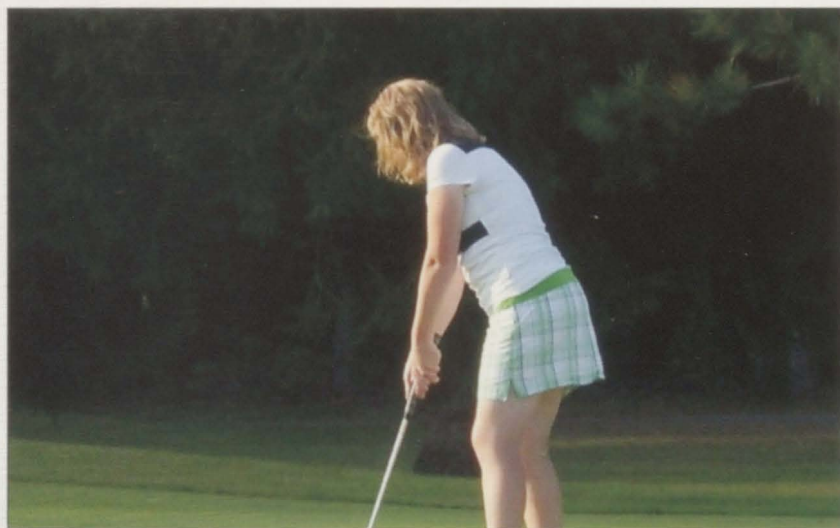

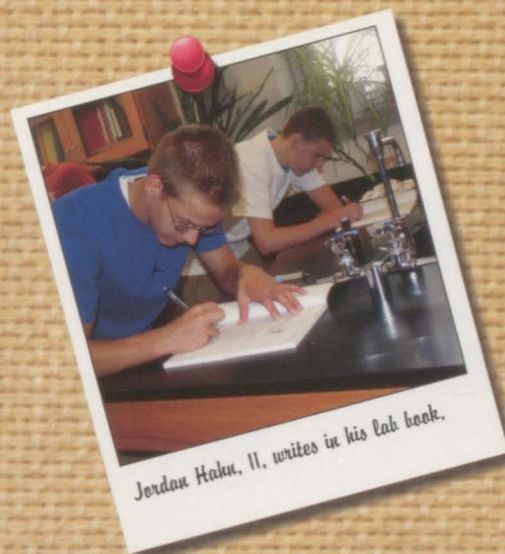

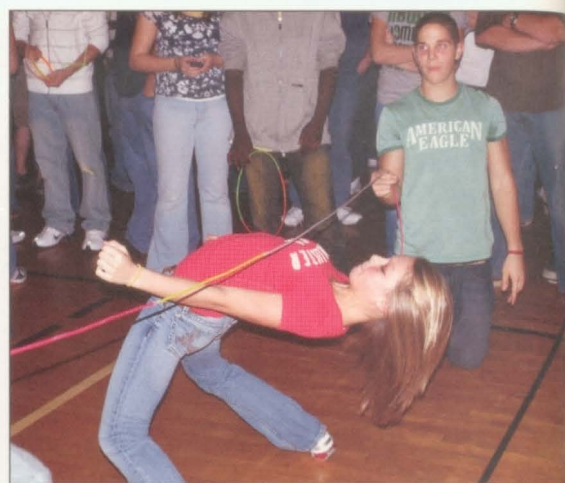

"It was very exciting knowing that I have a lot of friends that would vote for me, so word to my homies," said senior Sam Lewis.

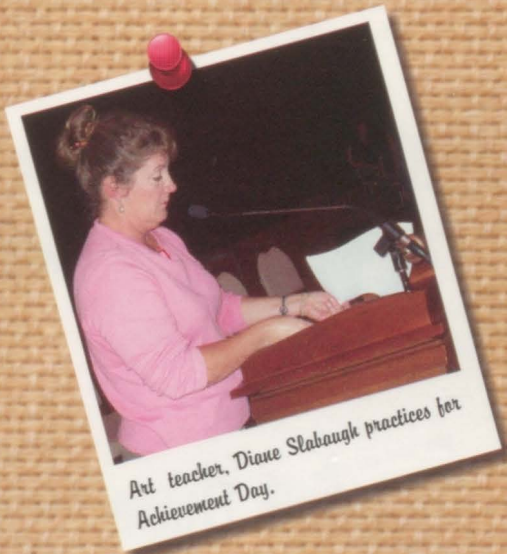

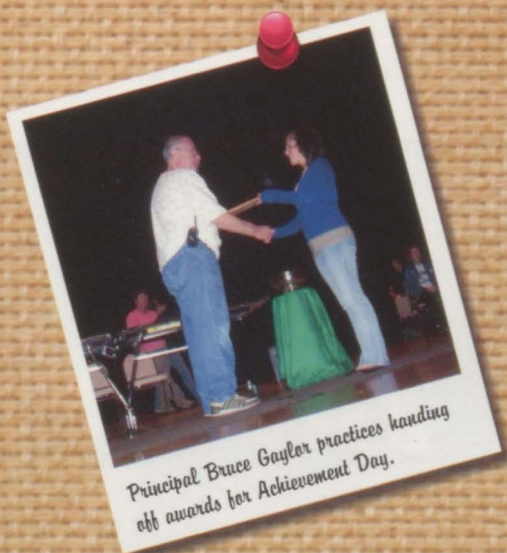

Exceeding Expectations

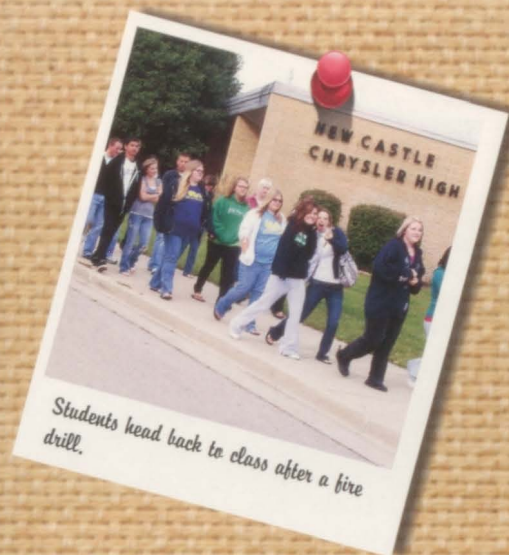

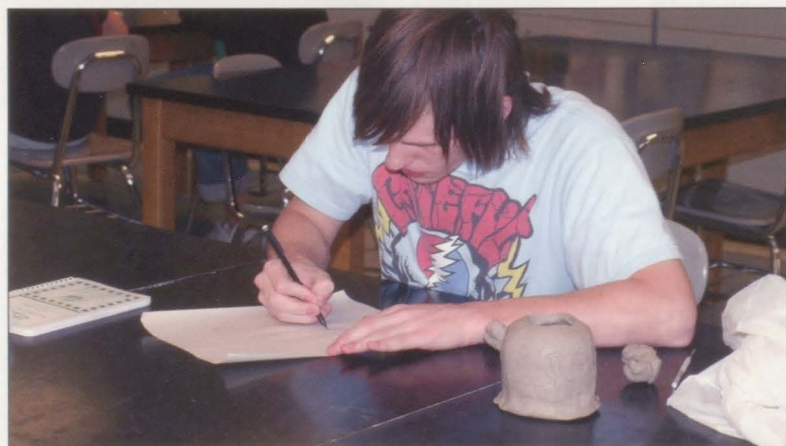
Some students thought of art as away to relax. Art can ease the mind and your feelings can also be expressed through art.

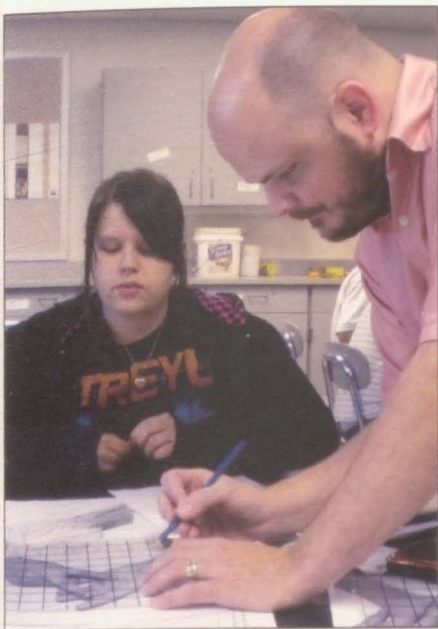

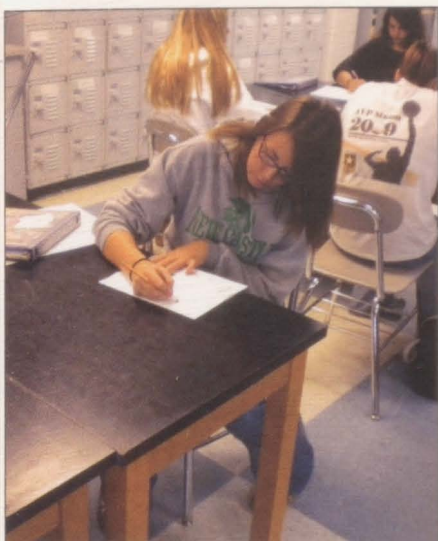

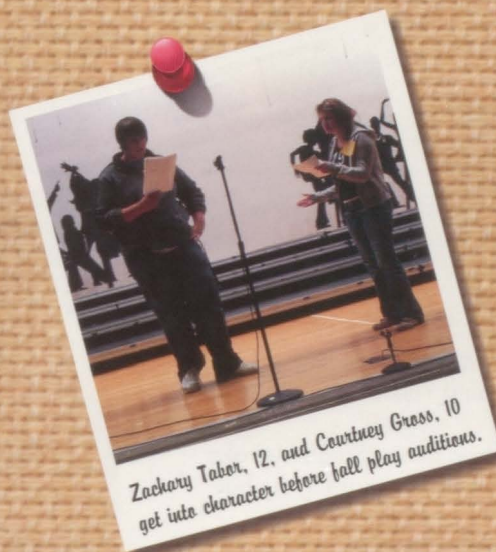

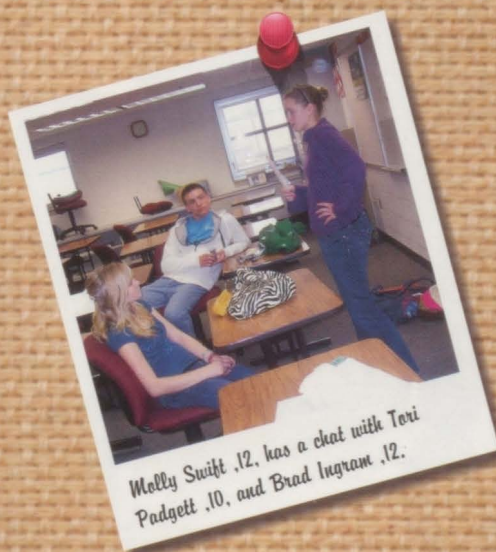

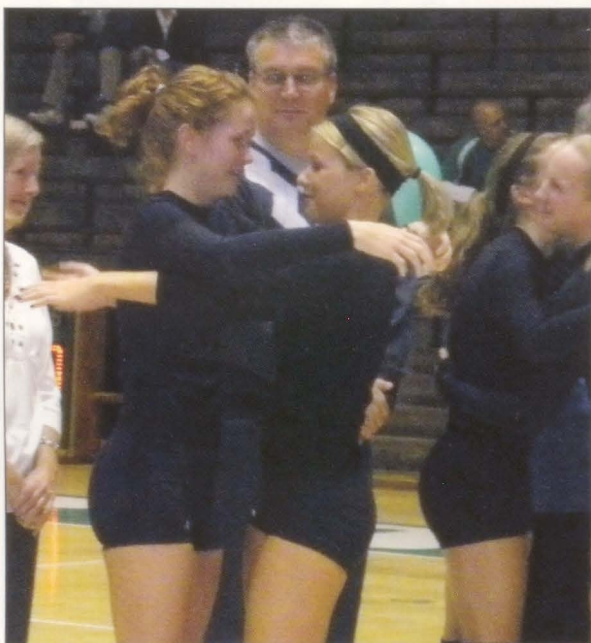

The team said they have every intention of bringing home another state championship in the near future.



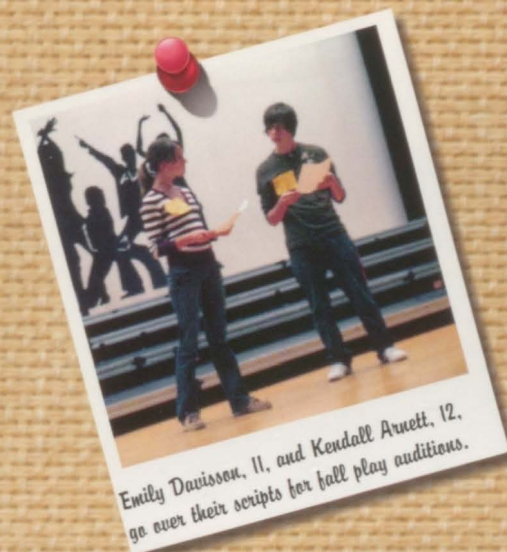

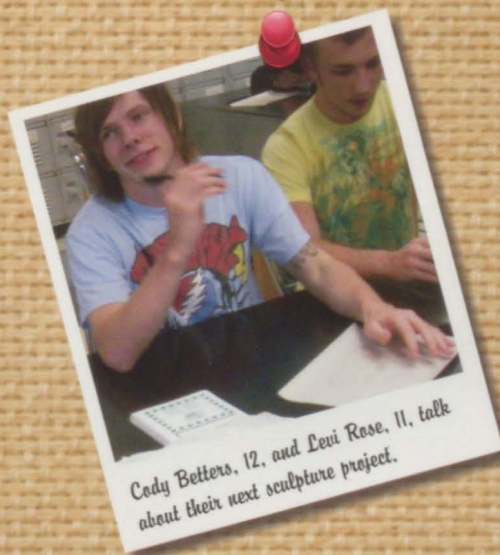

"I'm not doing it alone, I have people I'm doing it with and my coach cheers me on," said Bryce Froderman, sophomore.

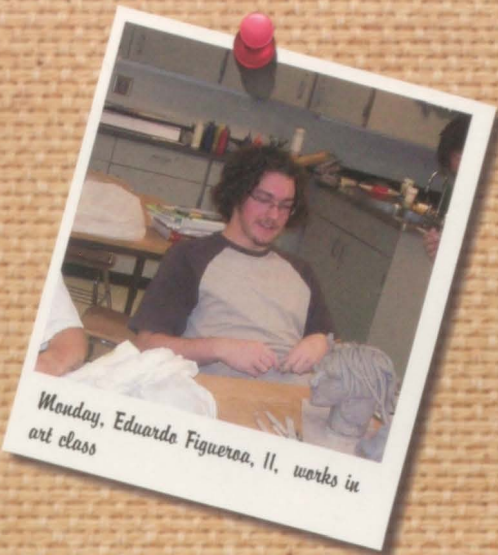

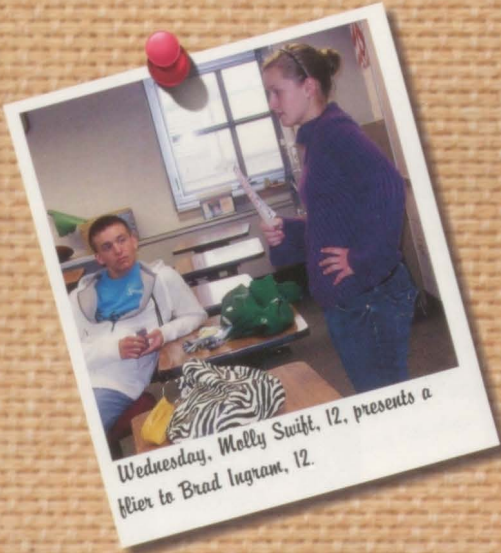

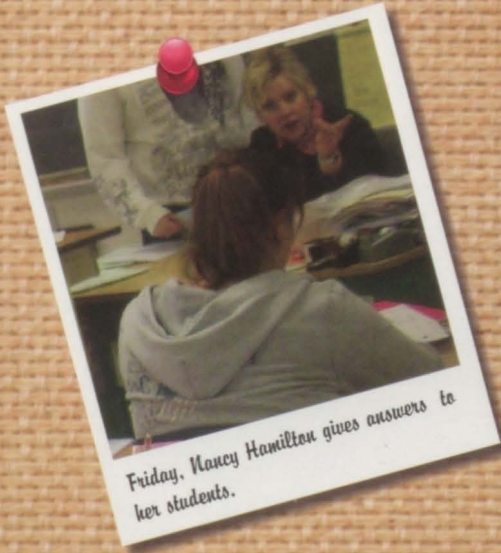

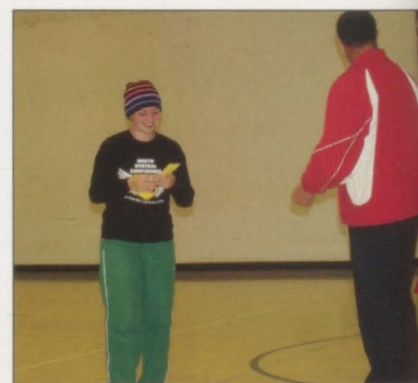

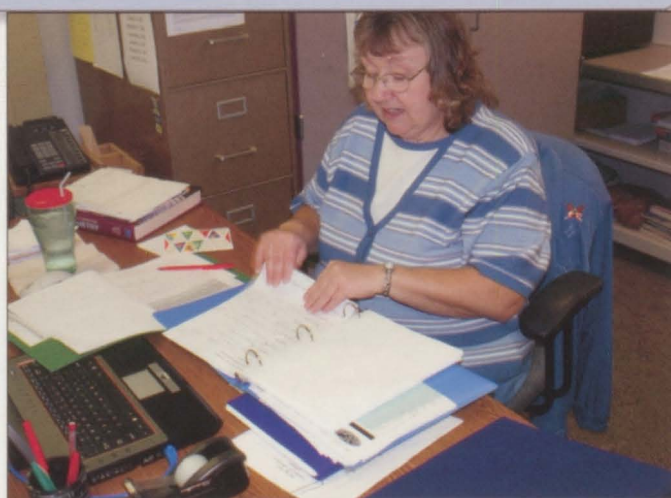
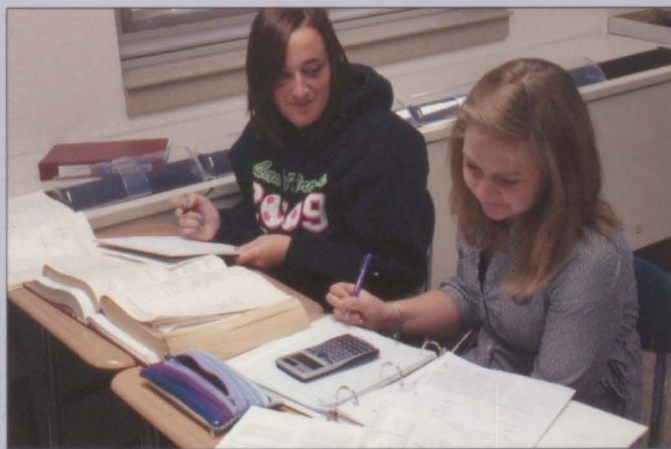
More than numbers

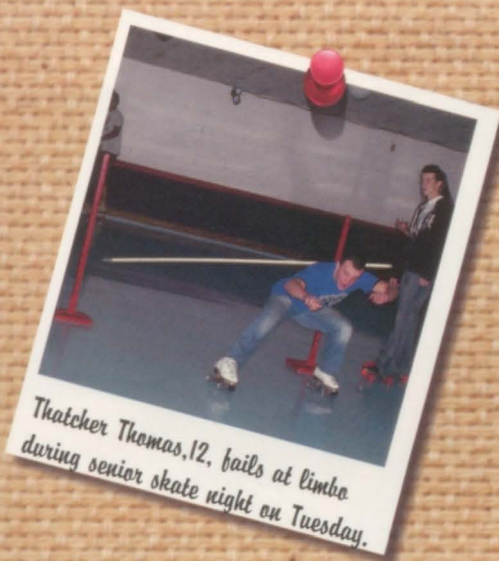

While the test was not something new for the upper classmen, it was something new to the freshman. The idea was popular among them as well.

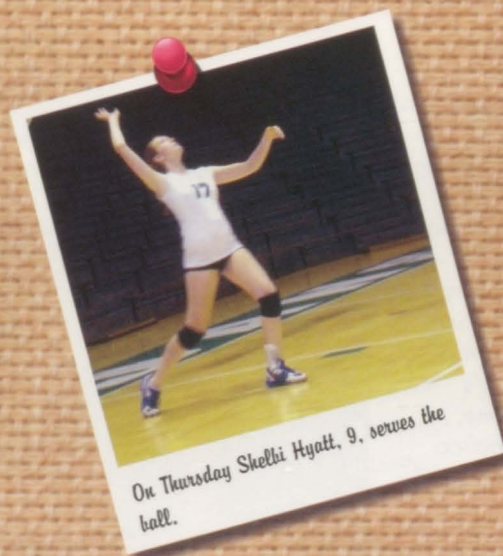

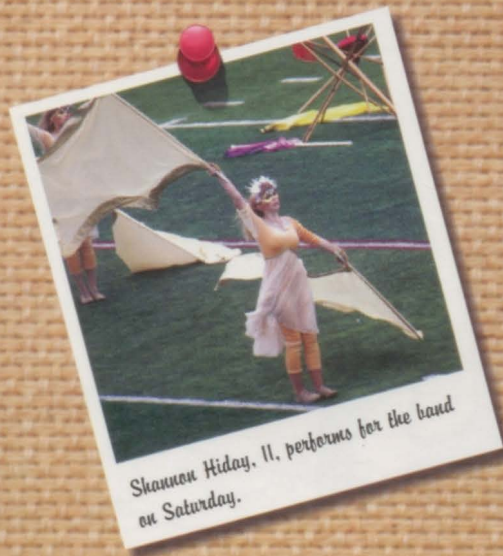

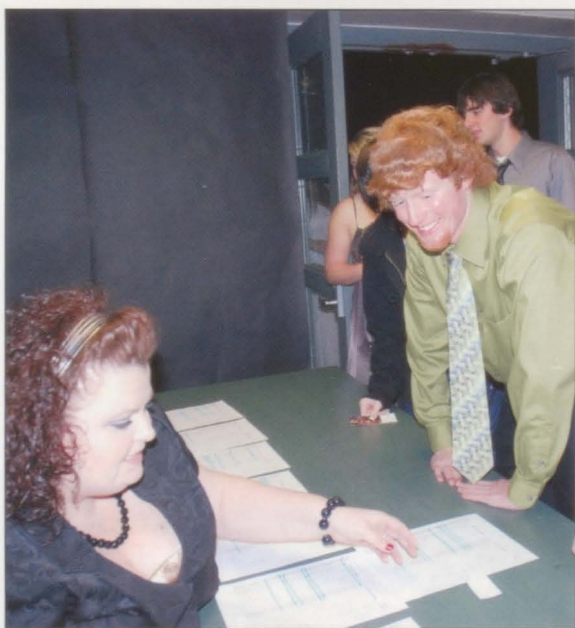
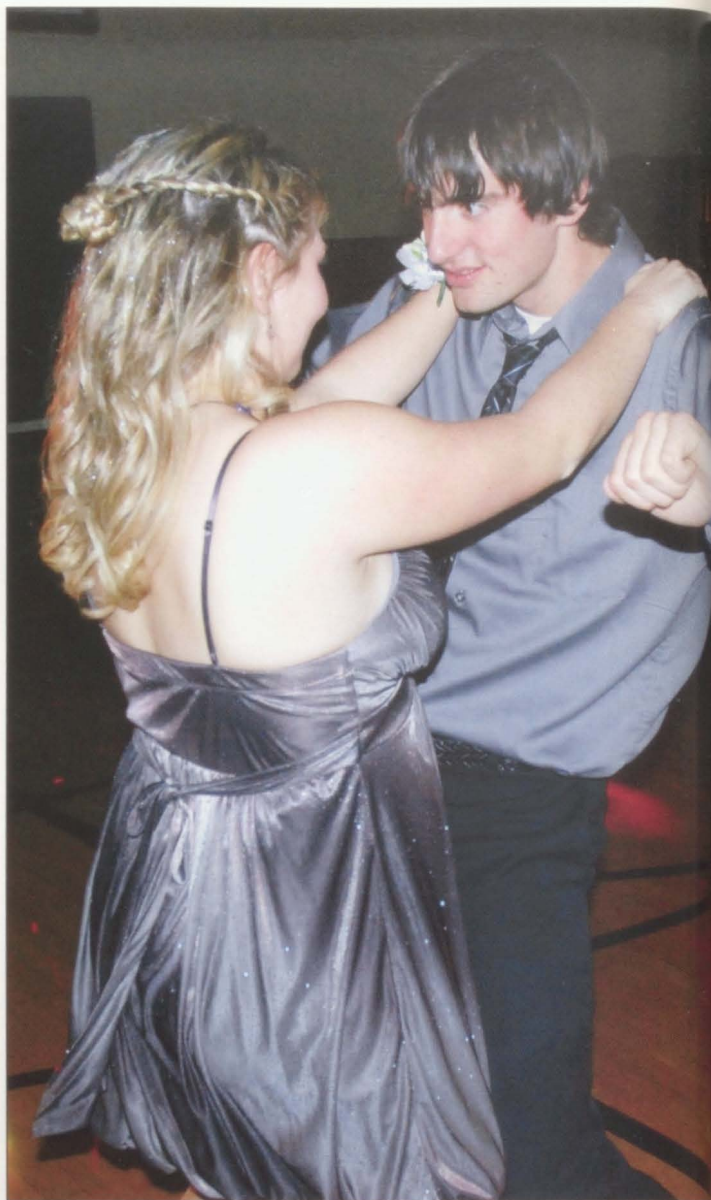

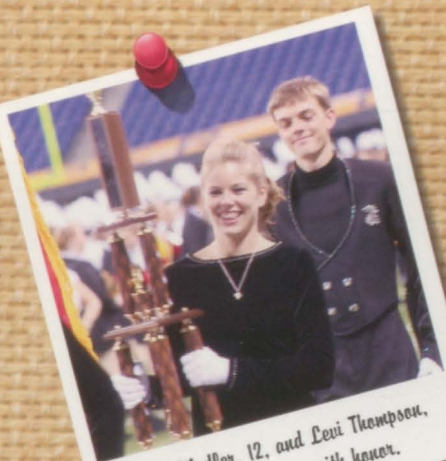

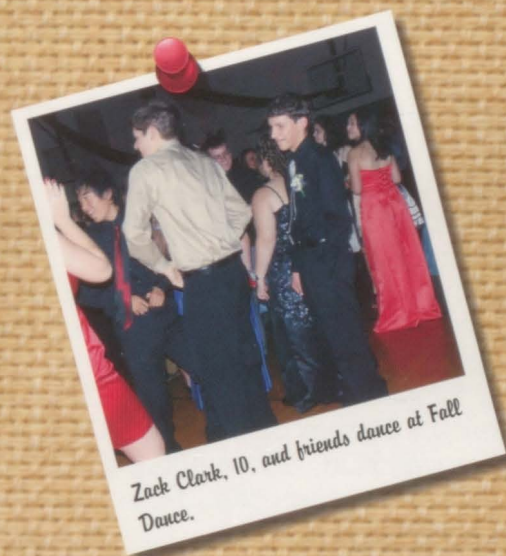

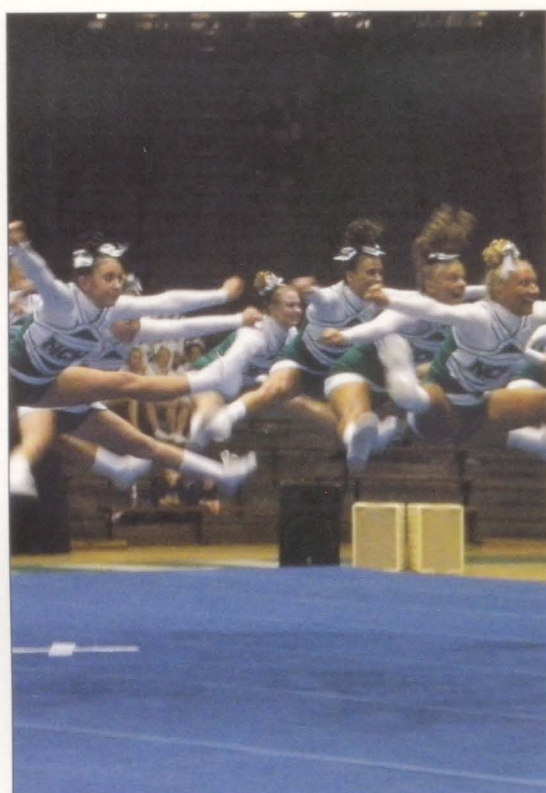

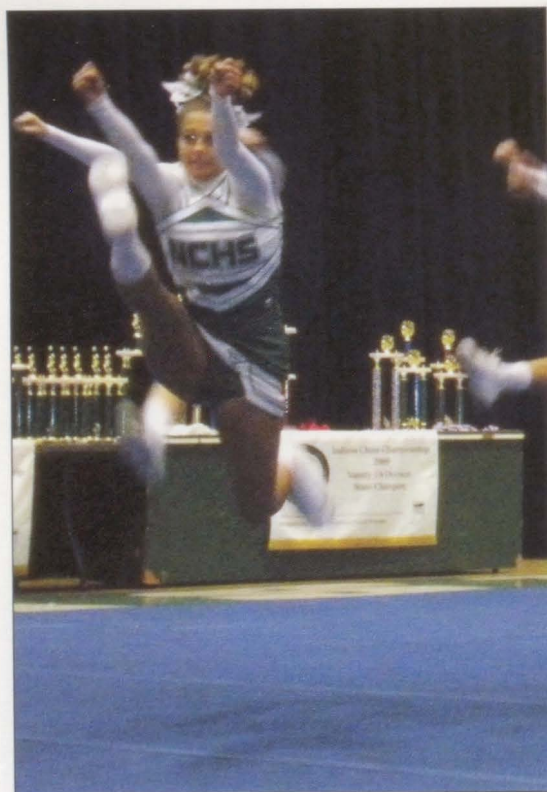

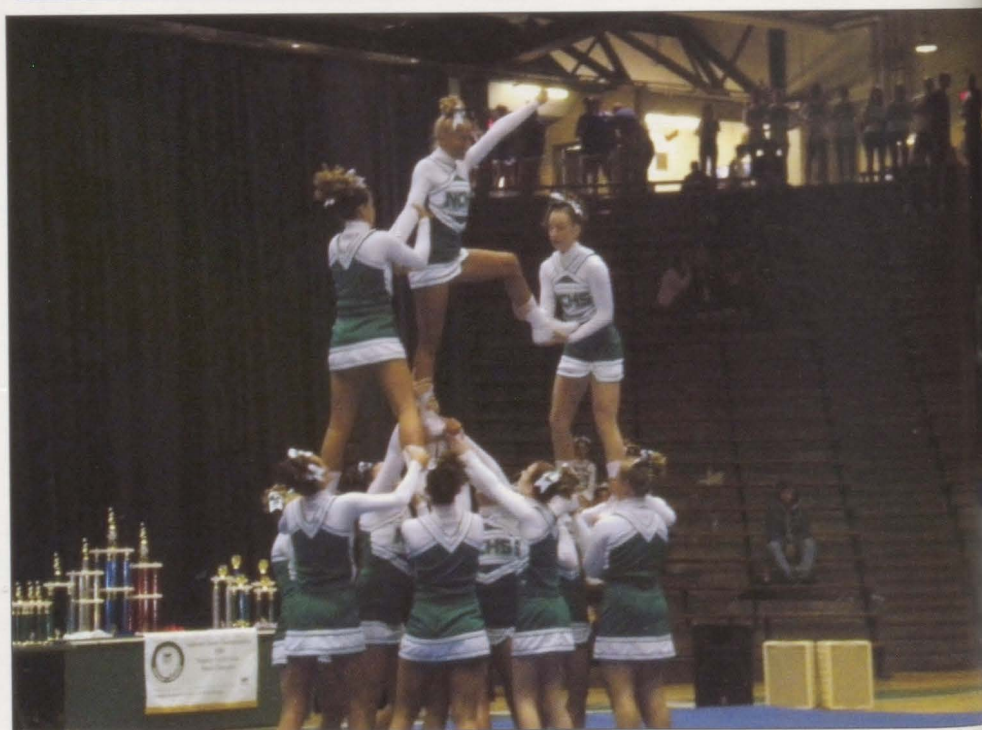

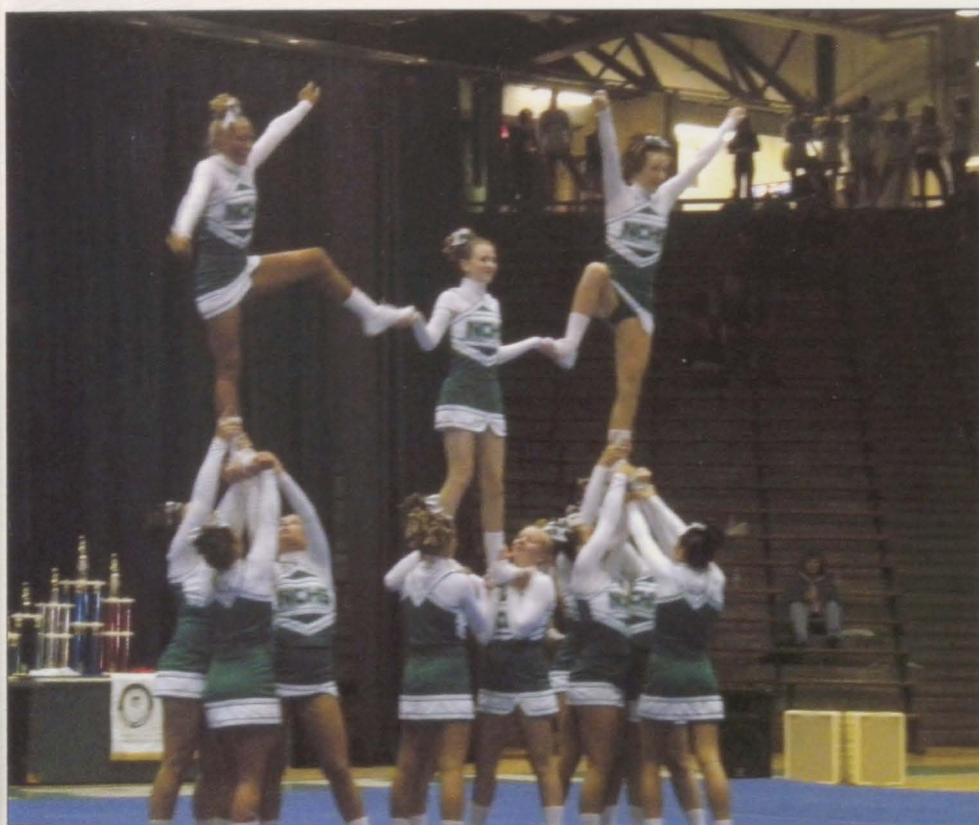

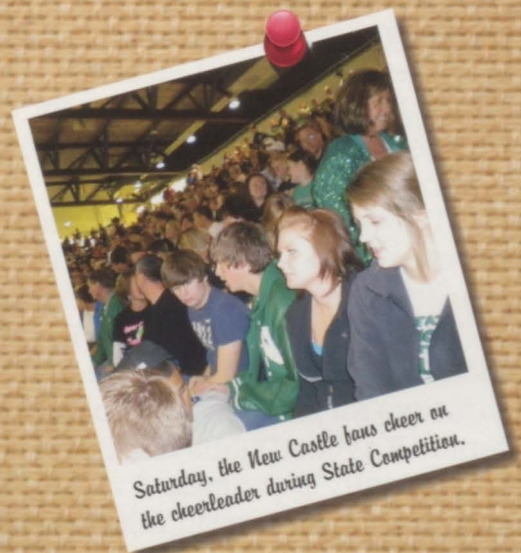

Learning Possibilities

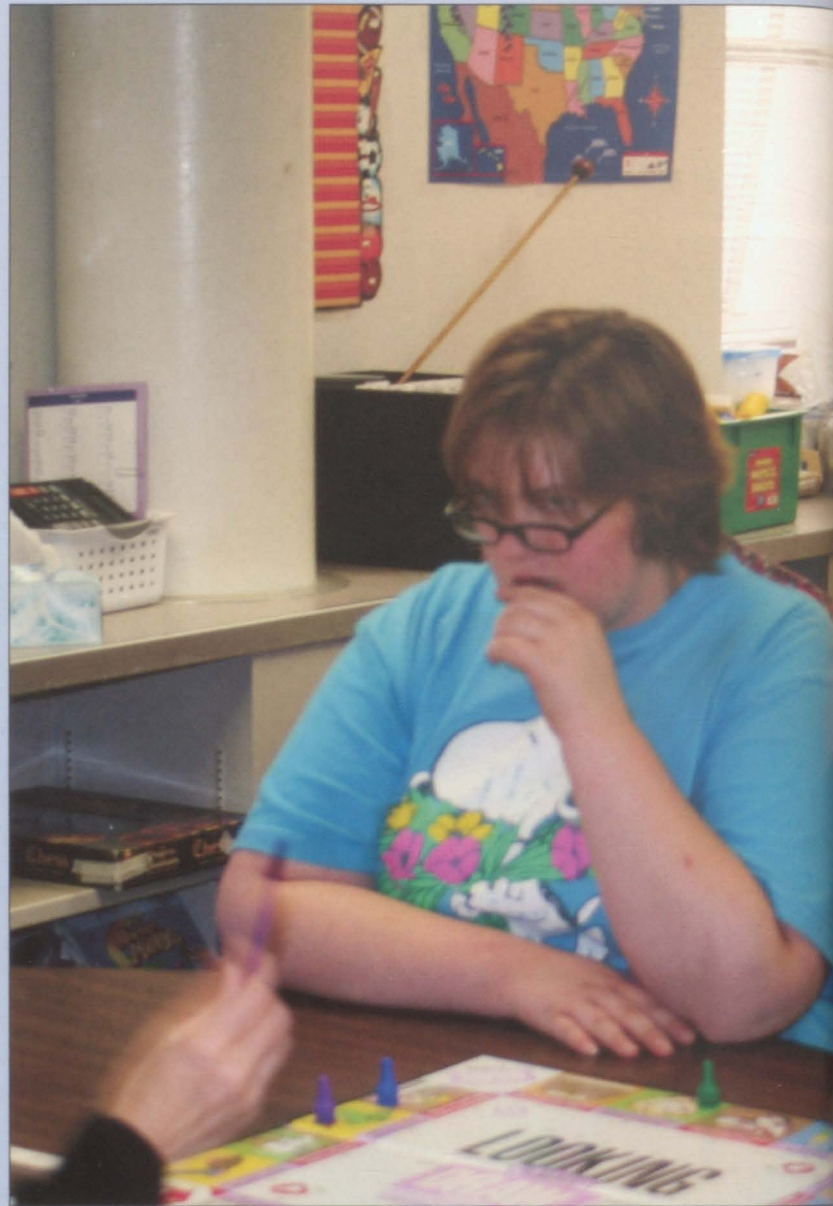

"The team has a lot of talent this year," said Speech Coach Susan Hittson, "With practice they could be amazing."

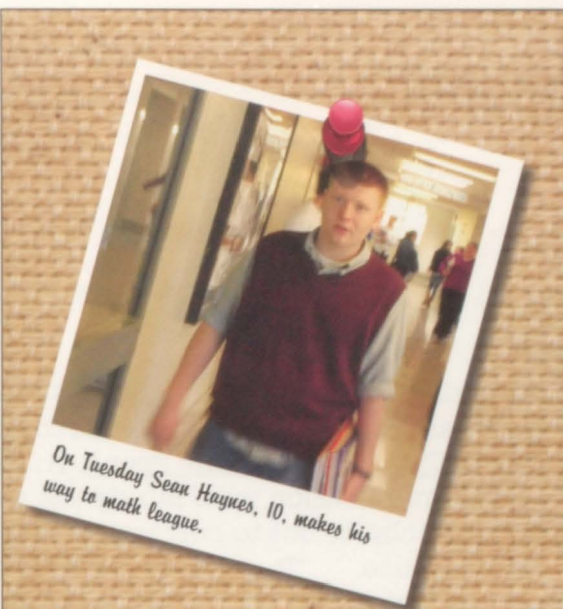

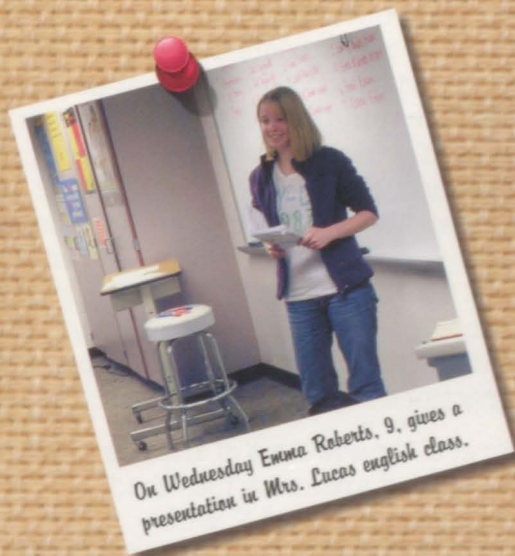

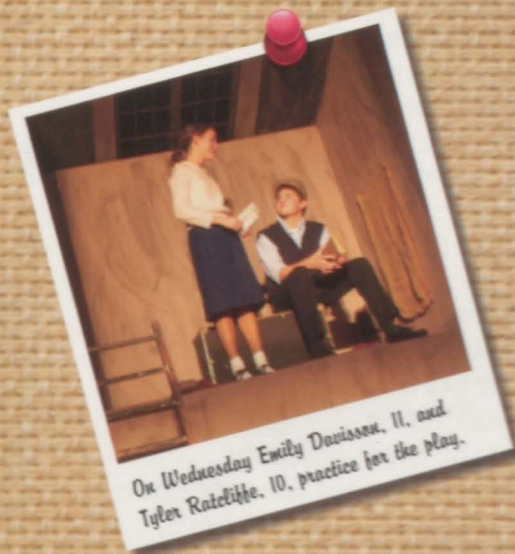

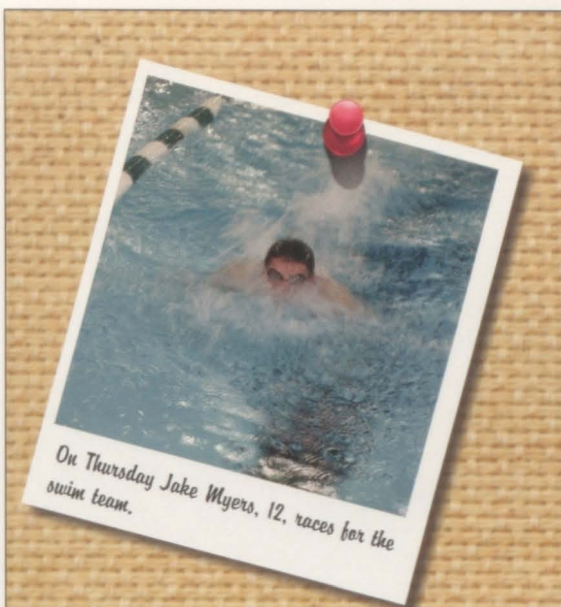

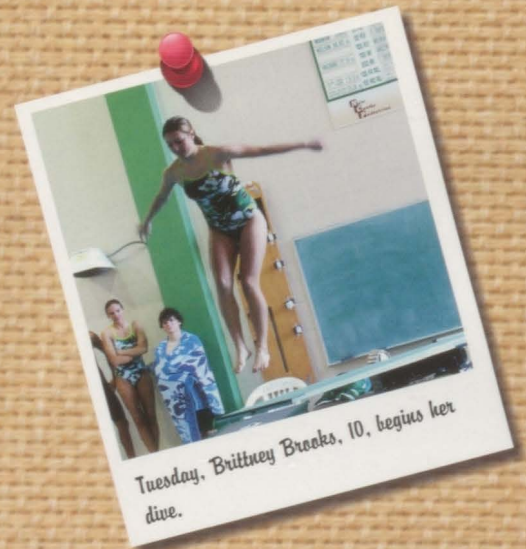
Another important class that was taught was Geography and History of the World.

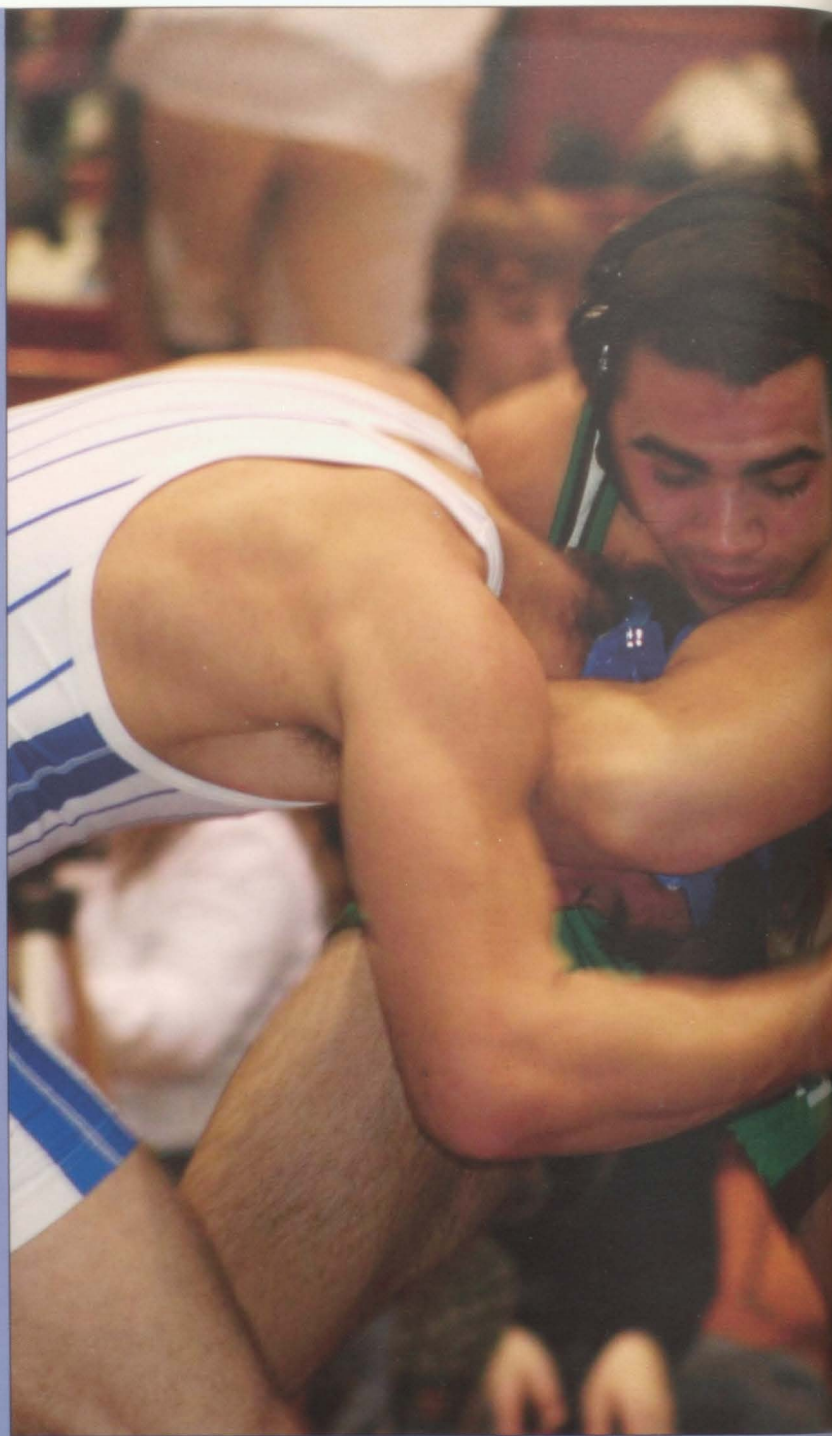
The New Castle wrestling team hosted an invite on Saturday. The Trojans competed against several teams and had several personal bests.

Von Wasson, senior, finished the evening with five pin and zero losses. "I was really proud of the team," said Wasson.

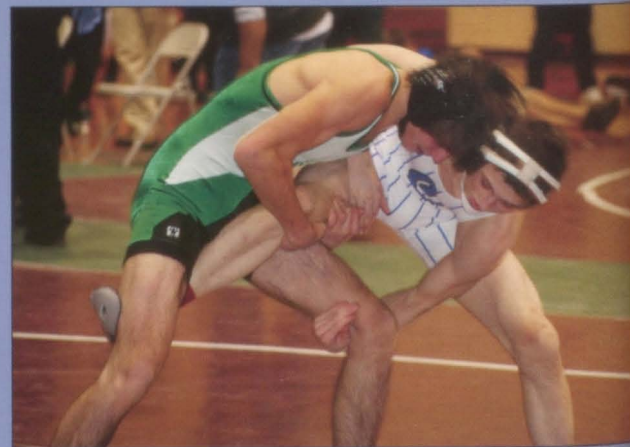

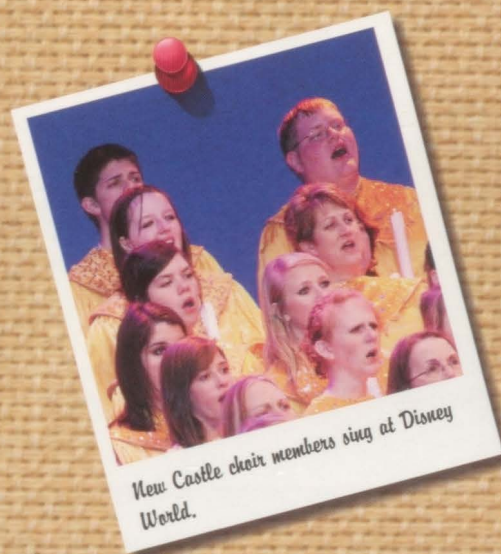

Jordan Richardson, 10, said, "They were a really good team but we made some mistakes. We feel that if we work on following the game plan we should win those games."

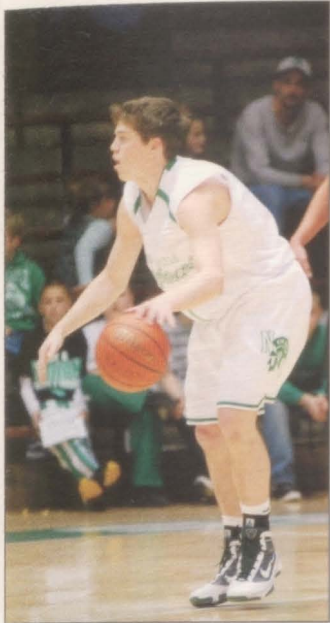
The boys record was 9-1 after the Mt. Vernon game. The only conference victory they had was against Muncie Central, all of the other wins were within their division.

Halder also said, "It's nice to be a part of something where all the guys care about each other. It makes practice more enjoyable."

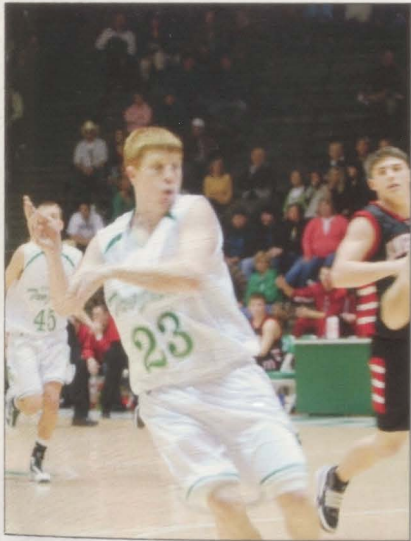

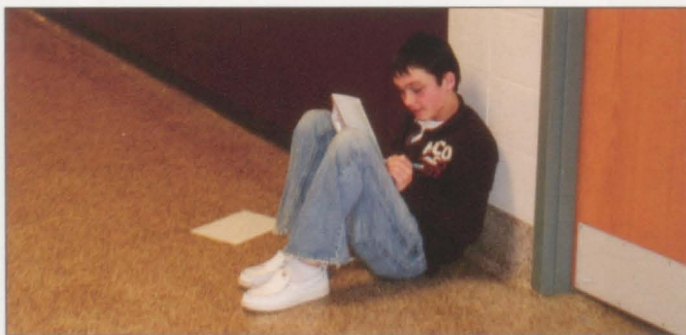
A School of FISH

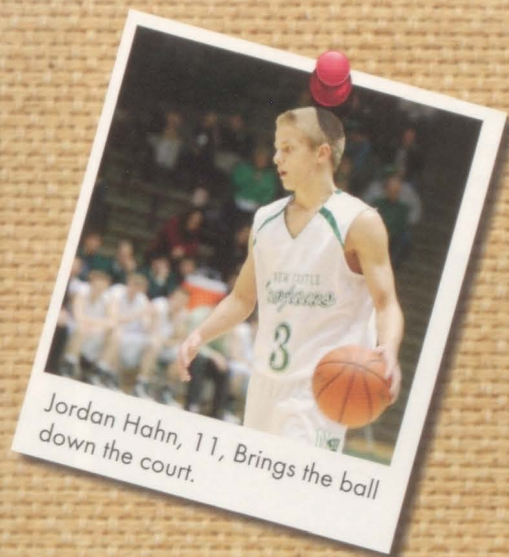

Brown.

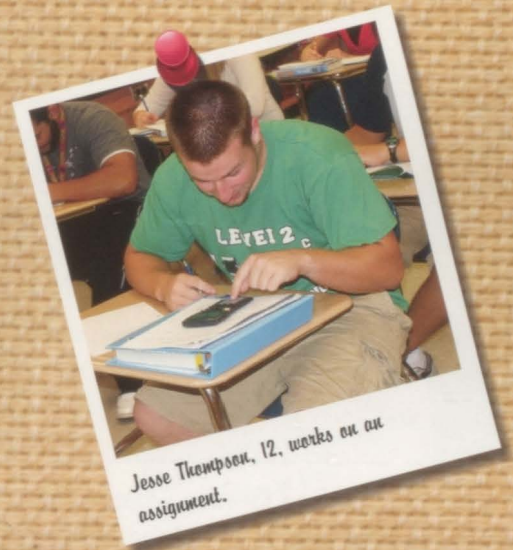

Student government president Aaron Bolyard, senior, said, "The talent show was an overall success for the school and the community."

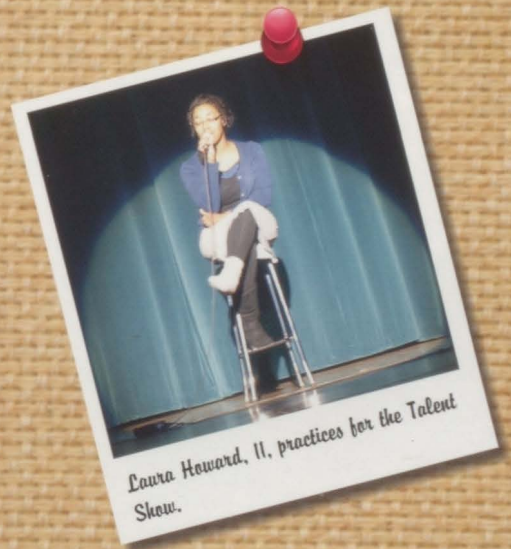
The 09-10 talent show was a great event. All the proceeds from the show were donated to Riley's Children Hospital.

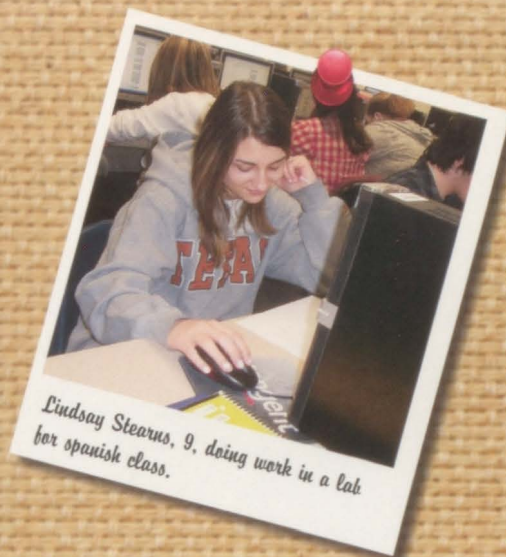

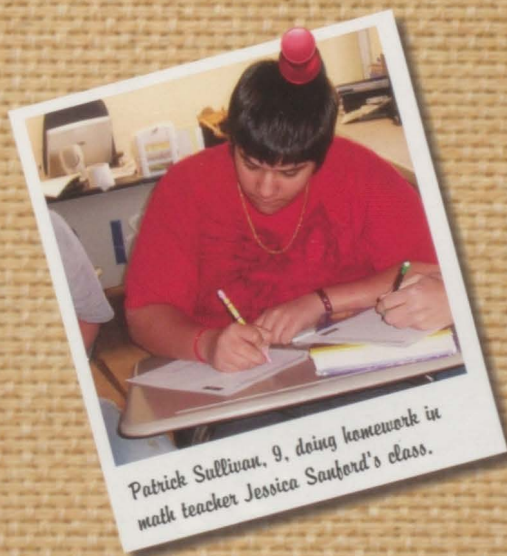

Students Showing Spirit

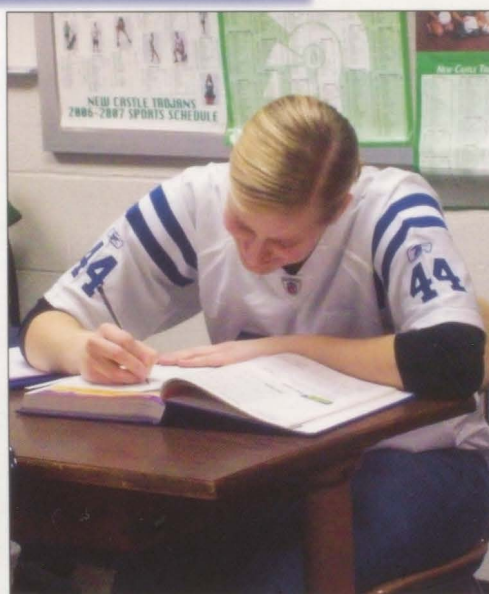
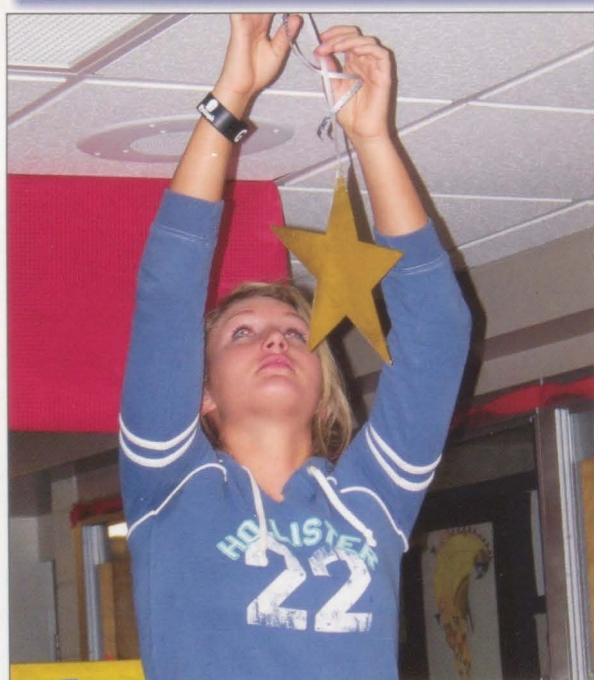
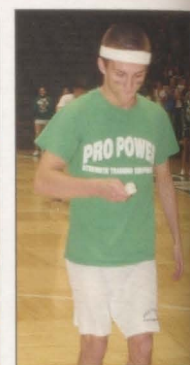

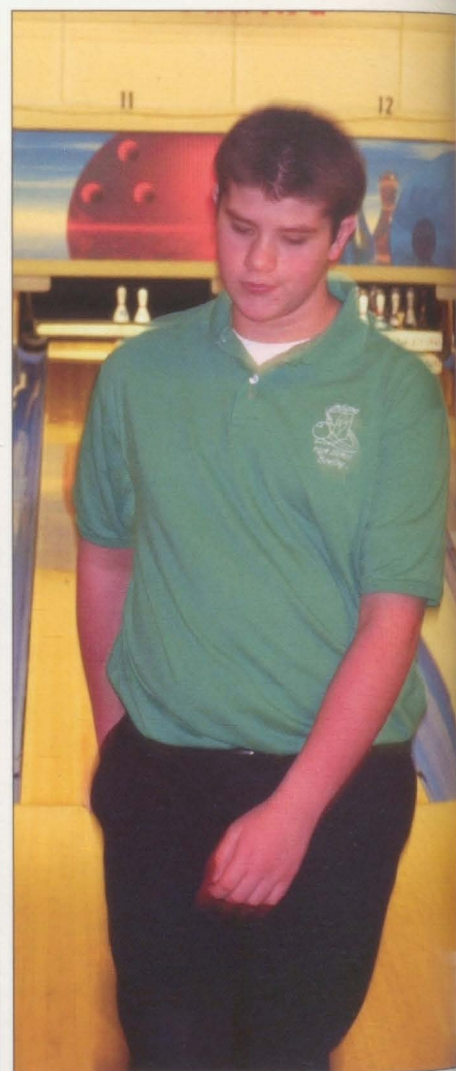

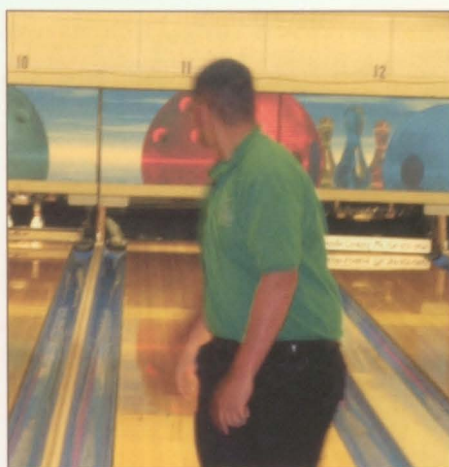
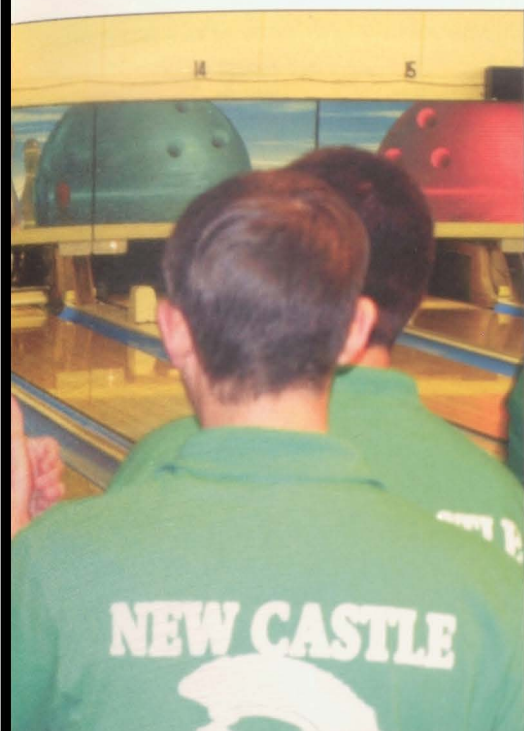
"Competing at state was nerve racking. There were cameras everywhere, so it was distracting," said Haltom.

"Senior day we all got roses, candies, and a bowling pin with our name on it," said Burris.



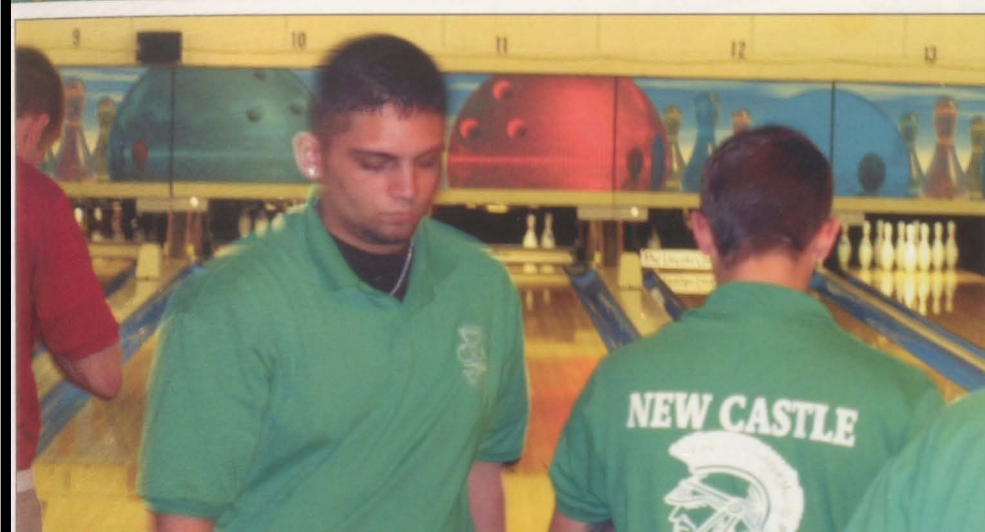

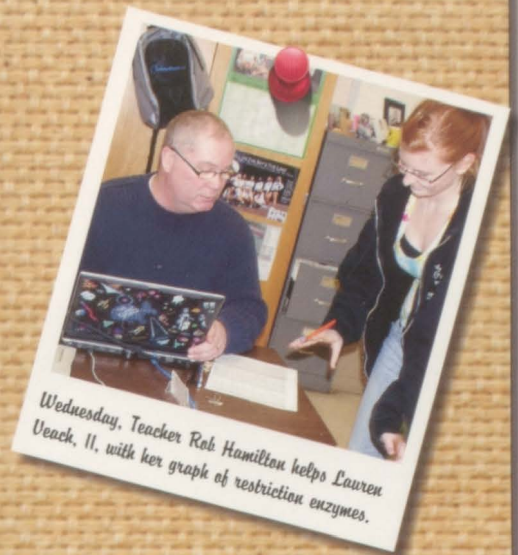
Best Buddies

The journalism classes were important to help preserve all the great memories that were made by the students and staff.

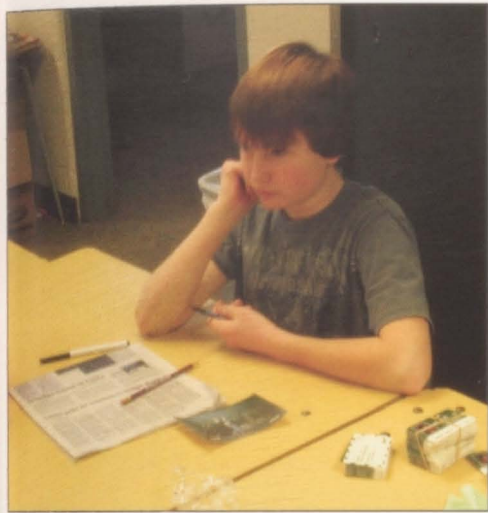
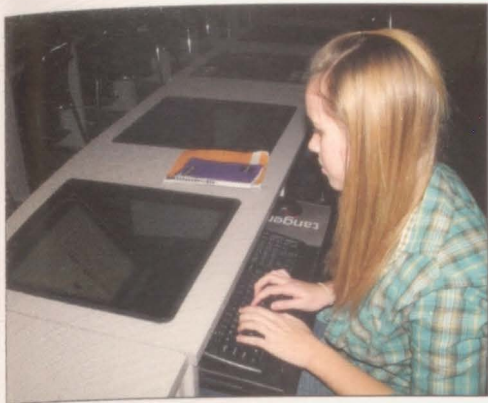

"This is my 20th year teaching English and I really like New Castle Chrysler High School", Clark announced.



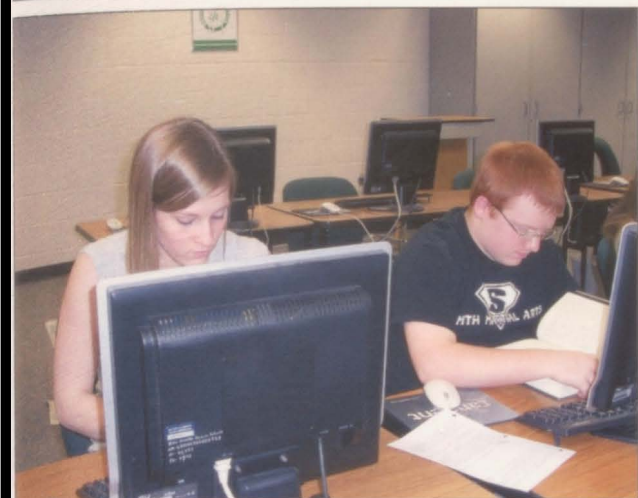

Excelling Academically

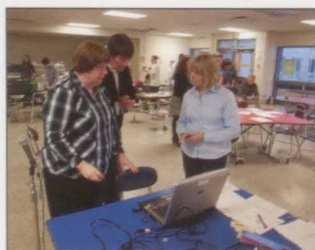
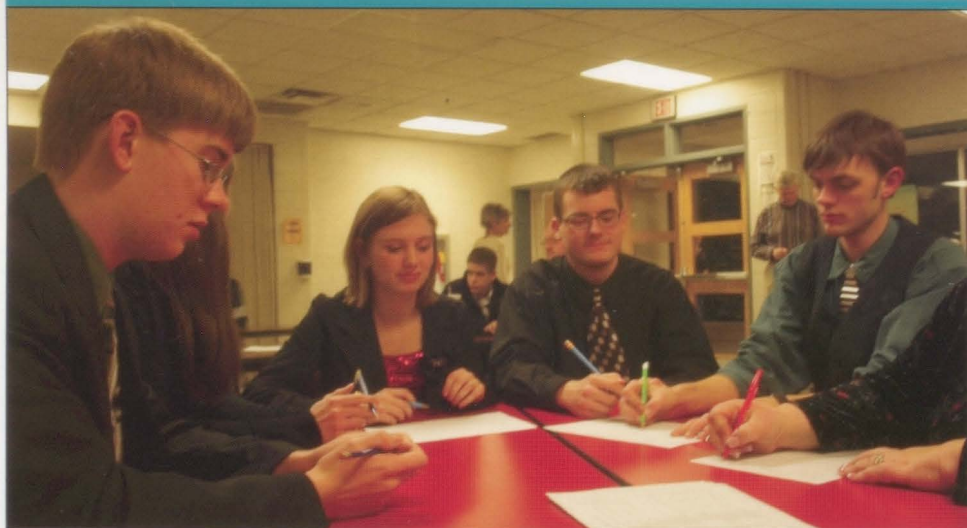

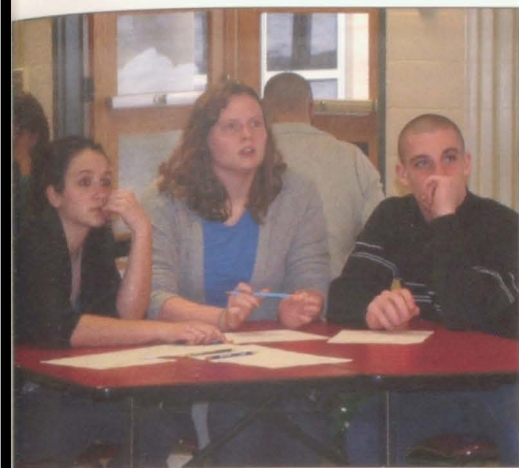

The students in Trojan Report Live provided valuable information throughout the year. TRL was heavily relied on for daily updates and news.

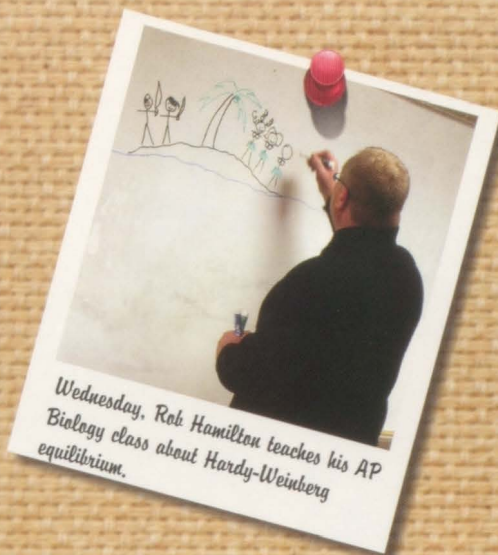

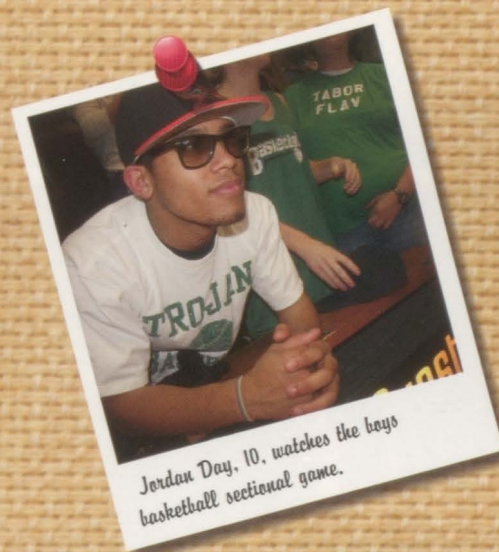

"Because of the snow days the entire cast had to make up a lot of practices. Still, we all pulled together and did a fantastic job," said sophomore Tyler Ratcliff.

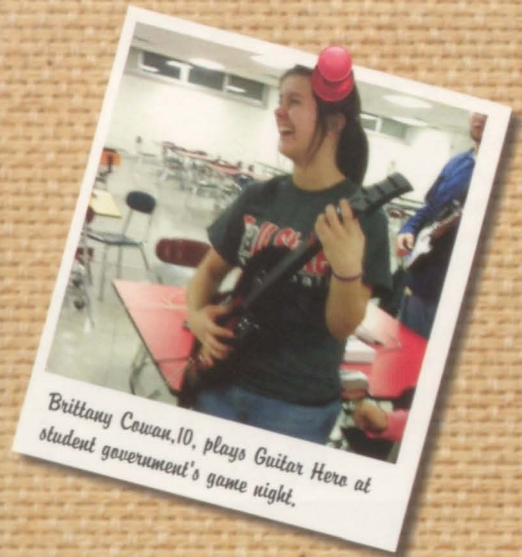
All in all the musical was pulled off with expert skill. It provided the community with some entertainment and showed them all what the music department is all about.

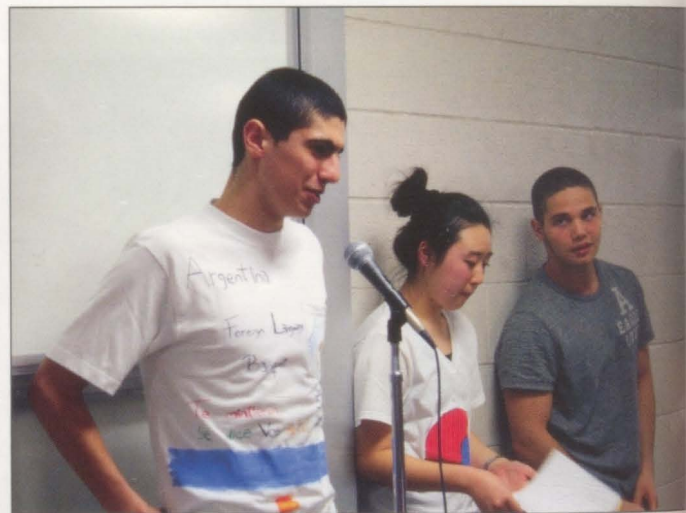

NHS students participated in many other activities throughout the year, including volunteering and the induction ceremony, but the NHS trip was a highlight for many of the members.



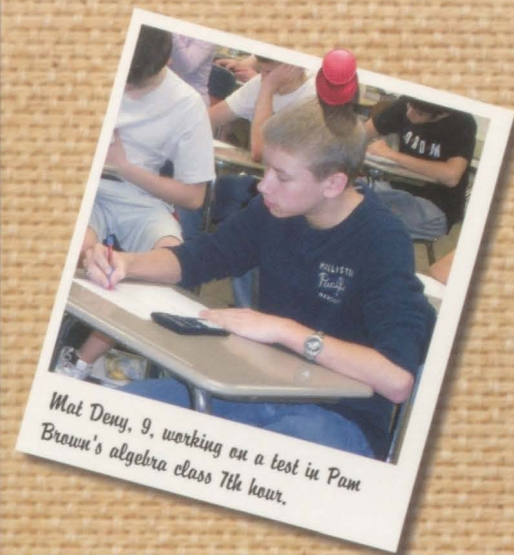

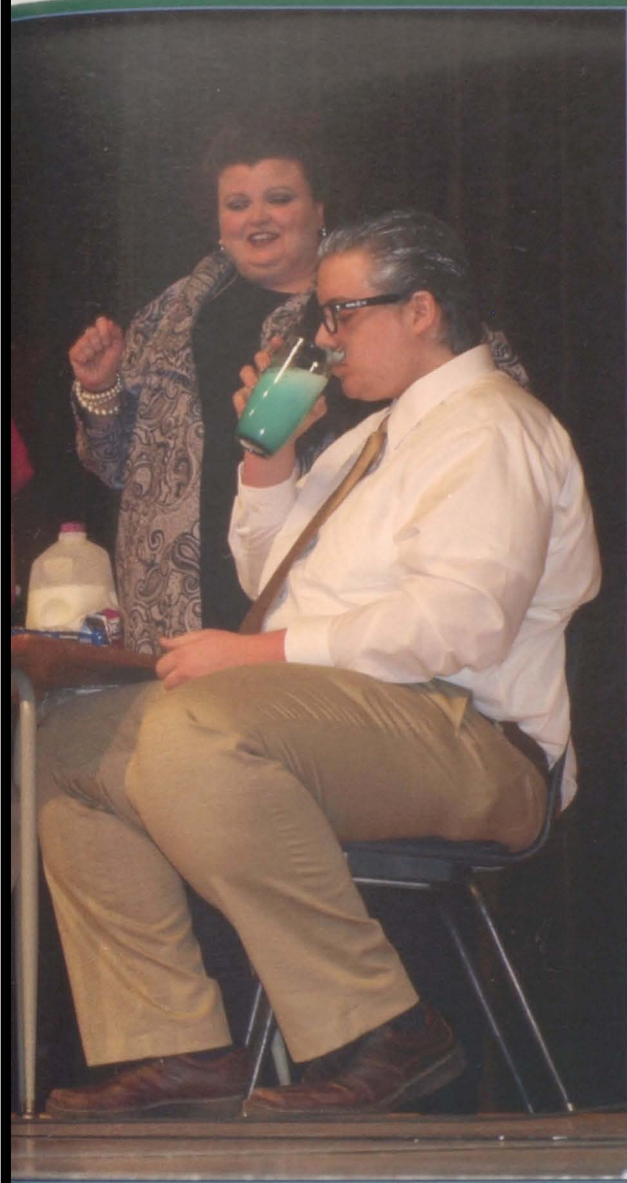

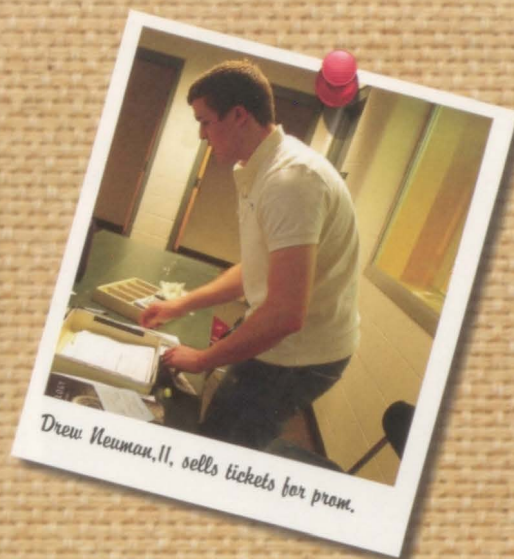

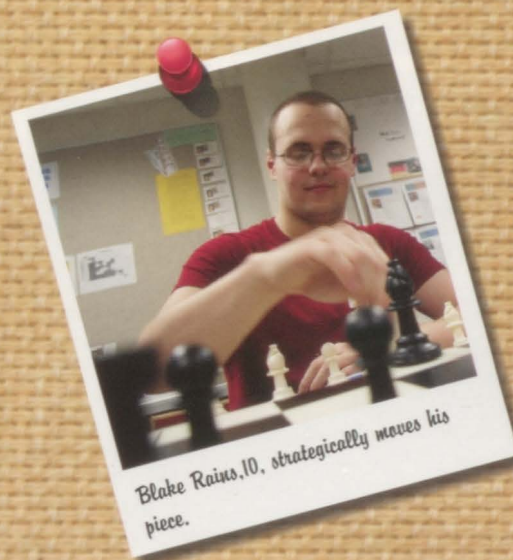

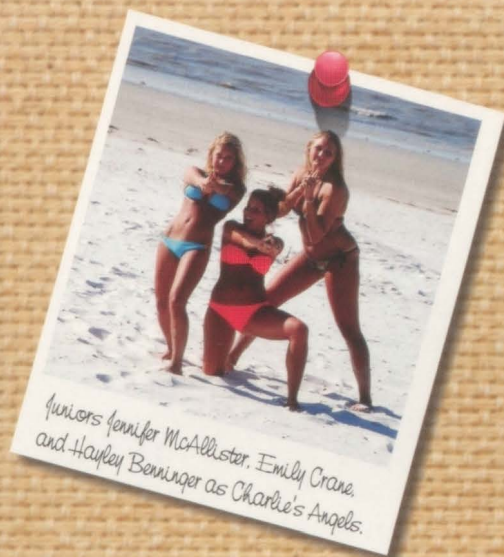

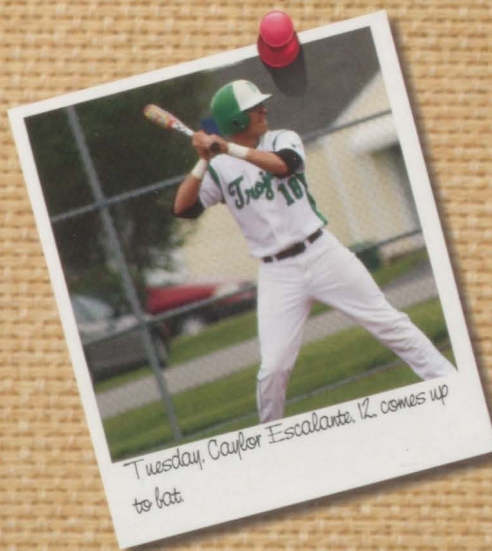

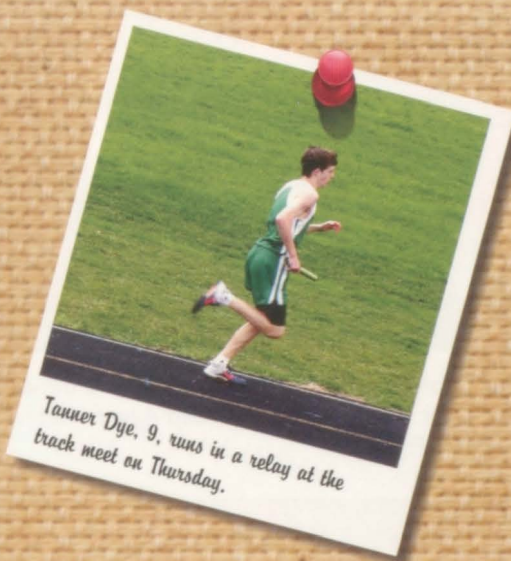
Enduring the Elements

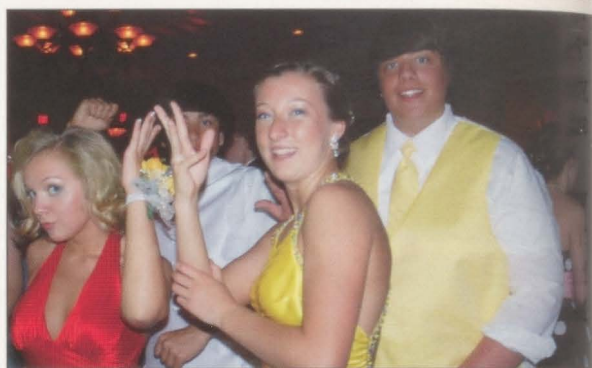

"Prom is a fun time to spend with your classmates," Sarah Neuman said.

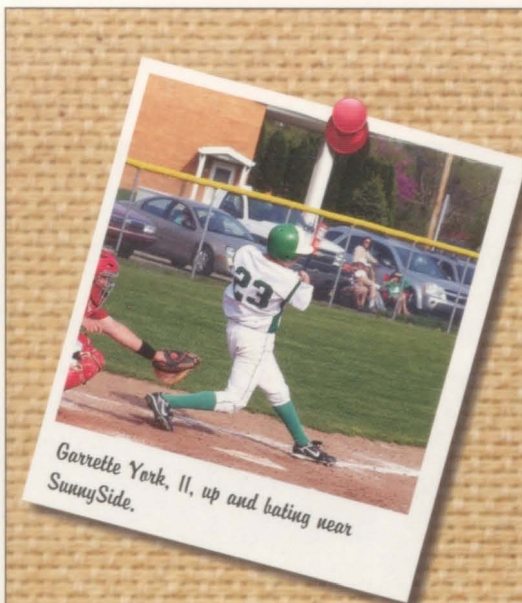

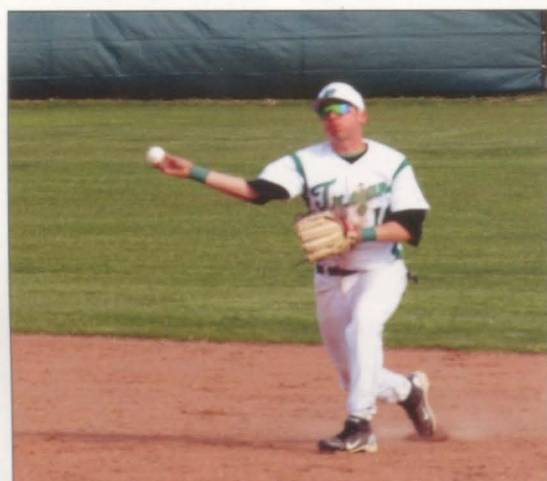

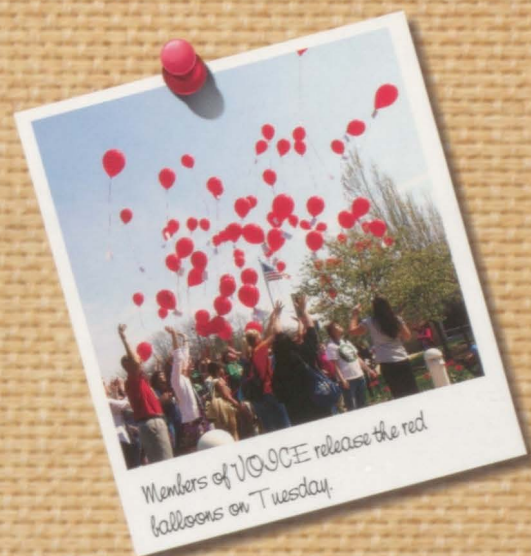

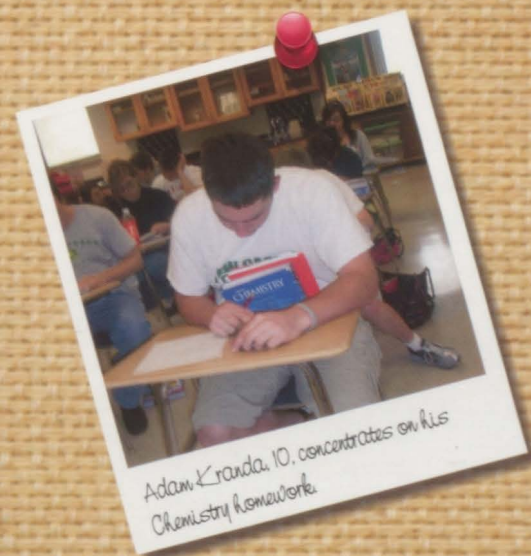

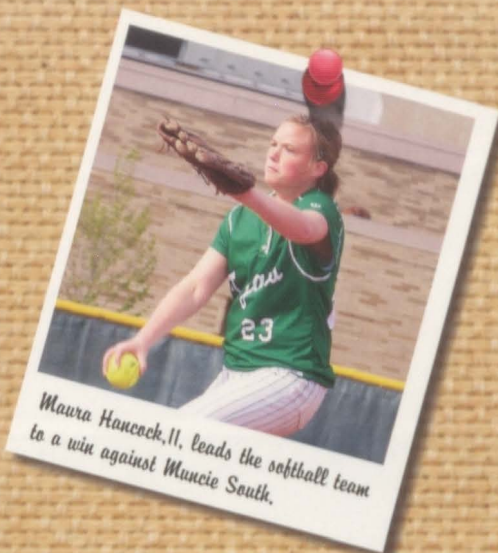

Cochran said, "Ciarra Davis gave the teams courage because of what she's been through. She was poor in health and was still always there for the team."

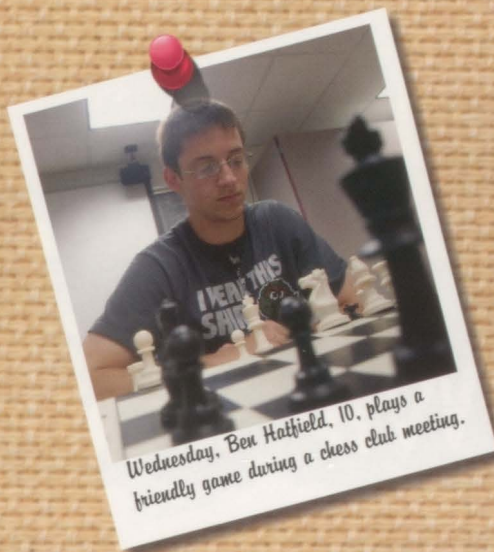
In the second game, Hancock took over pitching for Cochran and earned a win for the team. Shelby Davis, 11, played a strong defense in center field catching anything that went her way.

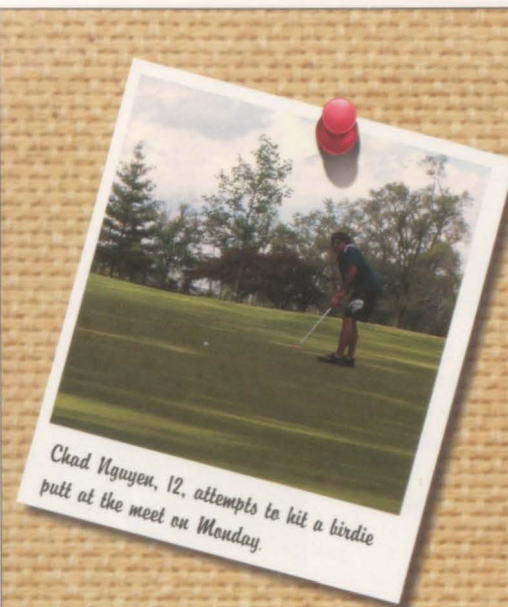

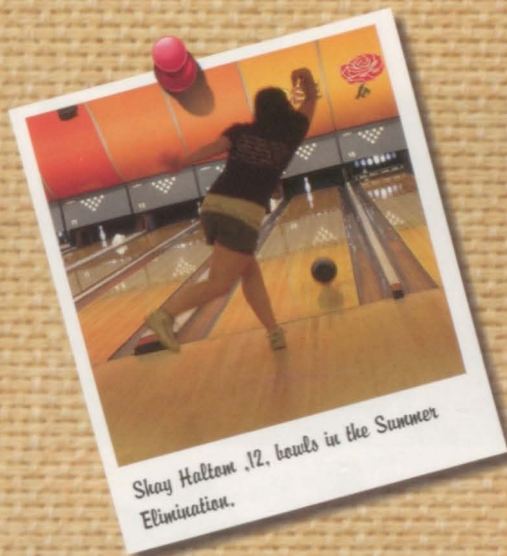

Most of the students on the boys golf team now want to play golf in the future. Brandon Brooks, 12, said, "I train to do better because I would like to play golf in college."



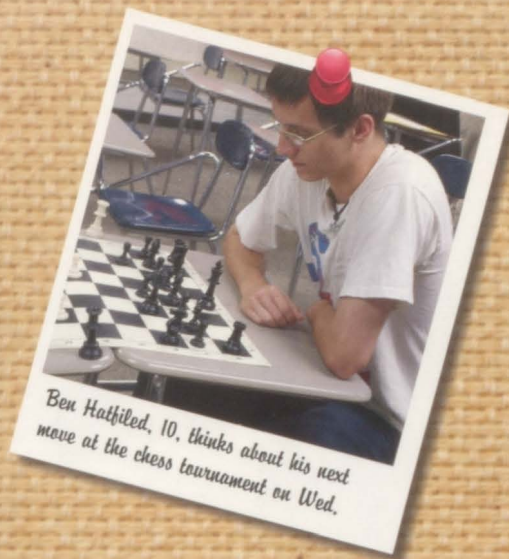

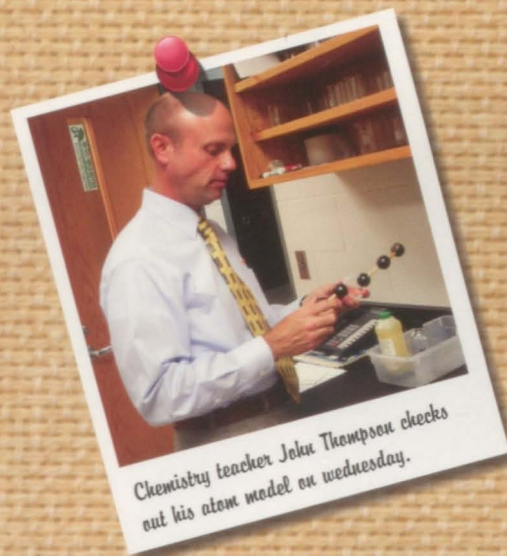

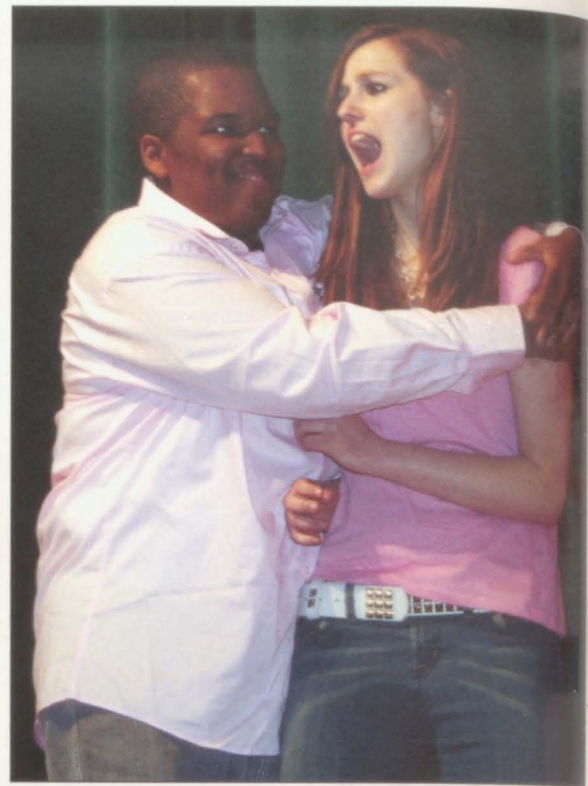

This year during choir, in order for Spring Sing to happen, a lot of practice had to be done, but like most things, everything can have some improvement.

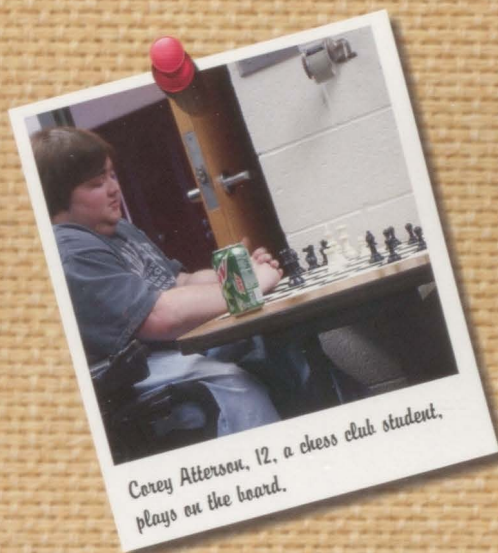

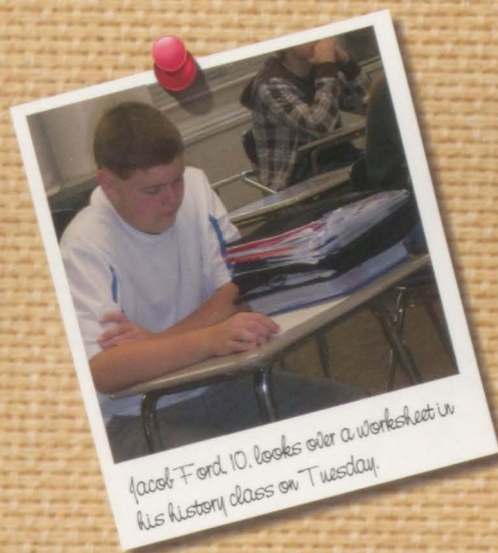

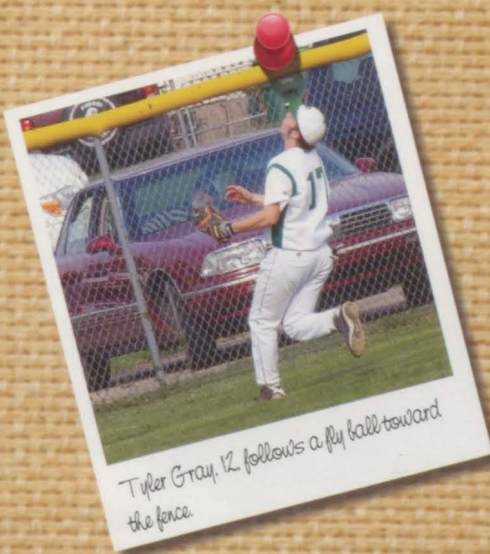

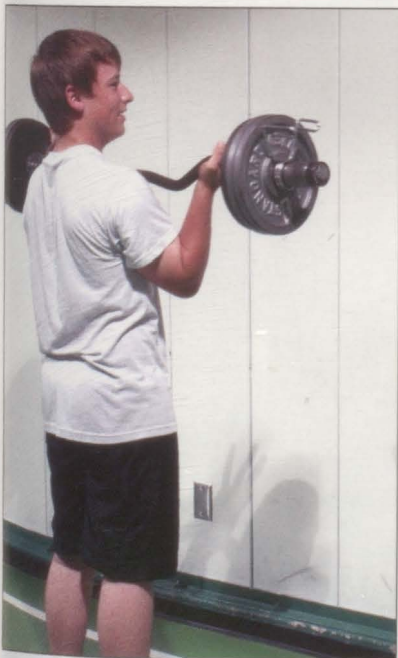

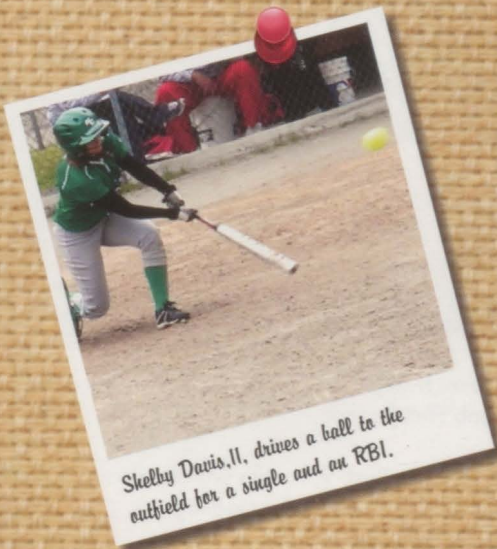

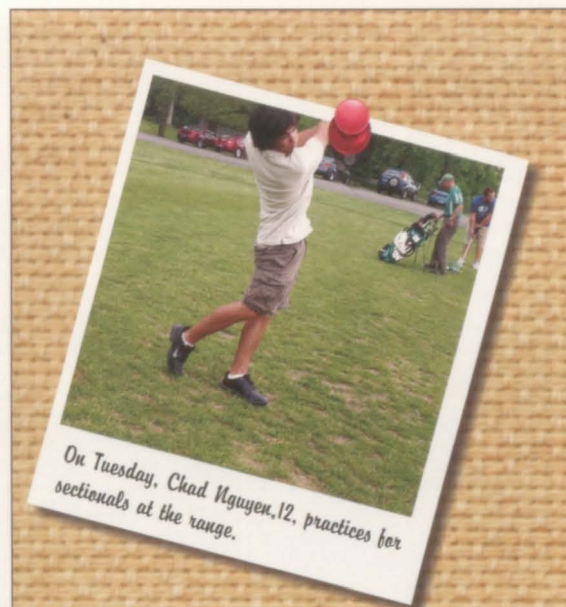

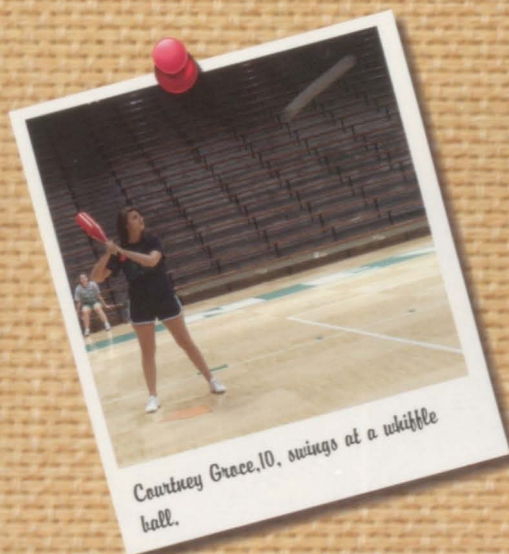
