
Samantha Haggard, 11, said, "The security in our school has gotten better, and so has the technology with the cameras outside for the ladies in the office to see who is buzzing in."

The changes during the school year allowed students to act, play, live and think a bit differently.







Celebrating excellence

The number of green jacket winners honored at Achievement Day more than doubled the amount last year, to 17. These seniors as well as 39 other juniors and seniors were honored at the Achievement Day ceremony on Friday, Sept. 28 in Bundy Auditorium.

The program included the handing out of green jackets, crests and certificates, a special guest speaker, band and choir performance, and the spirit bowl ceremony.

There were three different awards given out. The students GPA determines the award received.

Fourteen students were given a certificate for maintaining a GPA of 3.6667 and above, the next highest award was the crest and a certificate. That award was given to 10 students who maintained a GPA of 3.6656 – 3.9999.

The highest honor, the green jackets, were given to seniors who maintained a GPA of 4.0 or higher.

Principal Chris Walker said, "Any time we get the chance to put someone who is trying really hard on a ppedestalwe take advantage it. Getting all A's requires a lot of sacrifice."

One of the green jacket winners, Katie Rust, said her desire to get into a good college to study pre-med and just to outshine her brother was her motivation.

Tanner Dye was also a green jacket winner this year. Dye said he was nervous and excited at the same time but everything was easier with his parents' encouragement. Wanting to inspire his younger siblings to do well, Dye gave up many nights of hanging out with friends to study and do homework. With this mind-set he hopes to get into a good college and become successful in life.

Dye said, "Prepare and don't let one or two tough classes ruin the chances."











"I was shocked!" said Alex Bullens, 12. "It really surprised mel I thought it was funny and a good thing to reminisce about in the future!"



The 2013 NCHS talent show was a really fun and exciting night for a lot of students at our school, even those of us who just watched, still had a good time.



A Night To Remember




Alex Bullens, 12, and Katie Rust, 12, were crowned prom king and queen this year.

Rust, 12, said, "It was surprising, I didn't think I was going to get queen again because I had got it my Junior year but it was fun dancing with Alex."





The senior events are a very traditional thing here at NCHS, most seniors look forward to them since the first day of senior year.


The events were an amazing way to end the year and spend time with fellow classmates before moving on to college or work.



Samuel Gray, 12, said, "I was excited when I got my diploma because I can now go off to college and become a lineman for an electric company as I've been wanting to do for awhile."






Student Against Destructive 2









The girls tried to frustrate opponents and come out of the locker room with lots of energy, serving aggressively and breaking down the other teams.



When New Castle won against their rival teams, as they did several times this year, Criswell said they felt accomplished.



Football season features new coach, learning opportunities





"Although wrestling is an individual sport, it takes a whole team to be successful," Dylan Buck, 9, said.





Working in art class is something a lot of students enjoy, Parks said, "Art is one of my favorite classes, I like to express myself through my artwork."








