 )orkAlong with other departments in the high school, the special education department has made some major changes. Former Parkview teacher Mrs. Walden was very excited about moving here. Many NCCHS students decided to take a path different from the usual courses. They enrolled in a vocational program. Vocational courses are available to all students who sign up prior to the year of their involvement. There are many different options to choose from, including building trades, CAD, child care, COE/ME, health occupations, industrial co-op training, machine trade, and technical welding just to name a few. The purpose of vocational school is to enable students to prepare themselves for the work force.
One of the popular courses offered in the vocational program is child care. It allows students aspiring to be teachers or child care workers to get hands on experience with children.
