Although we look forward to the completion of the new school, the things we'll remember most will be here—in N.H.S.



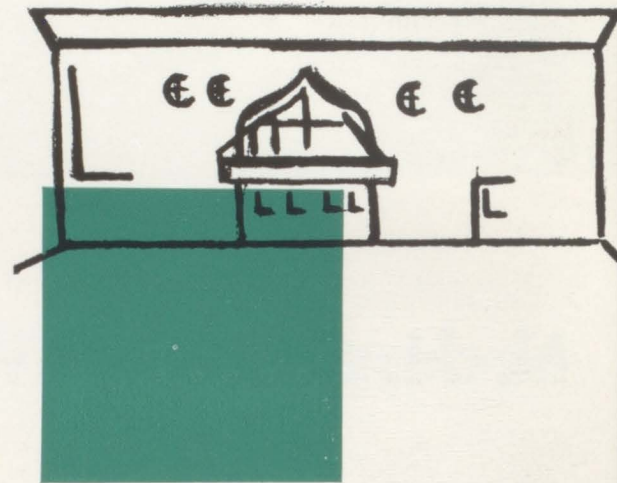

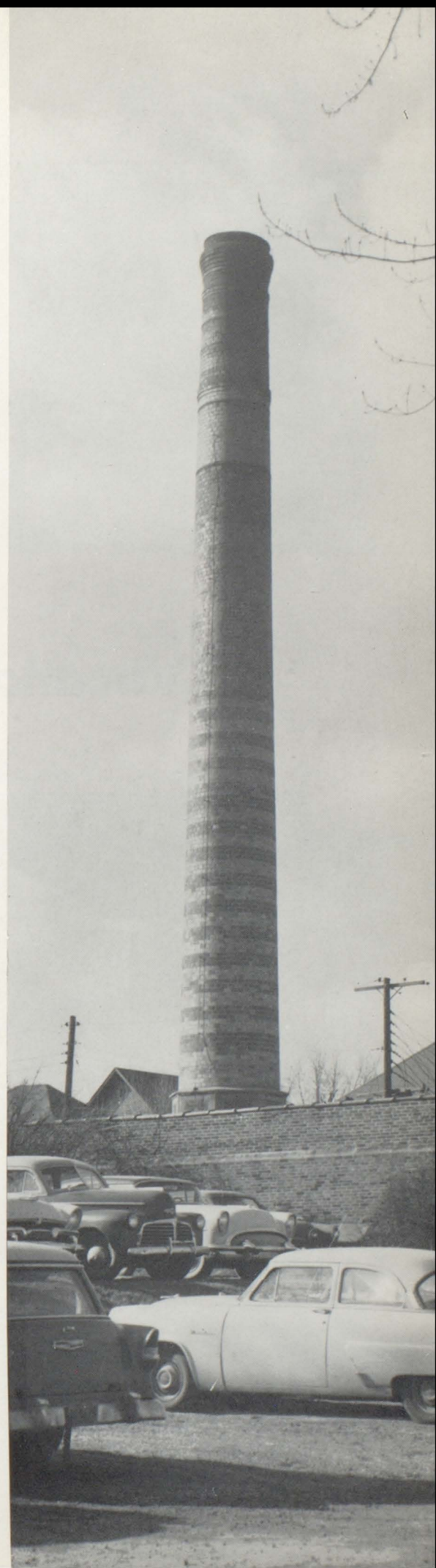
All Around Us

A landmark for N.H.S. students was the smoke stack behind the school. It towered over the building and the Power Plant which held our electrical shop and heated our classrooms.

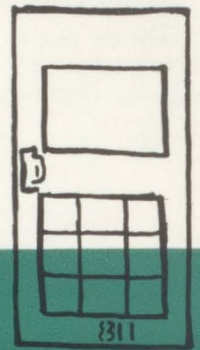
The Church Street Gym, home of the Trojans, saw its last high school basketball games this year. Although small, the Crackerbox always resounded with enthusiastic cheers.

Horns honked loudly at noon and after school as friends passed one another in their cars. Where to park the ever-increasing number was a problem, since space was limited.



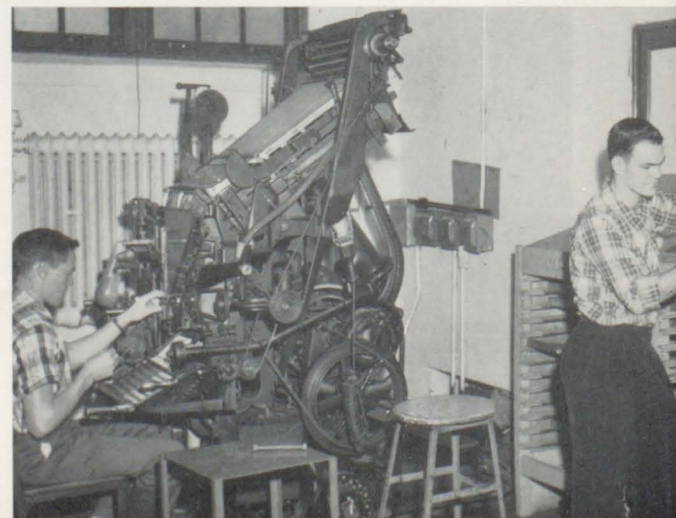


Feet scurrying from bookkeeping to English or from algebra to personal living took us from the basement to the third floor, down the main hall, and to our lockers during the school day . . .

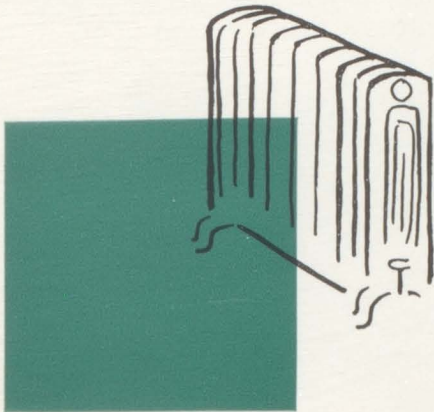


Its Vocational Classes

Synchronizing our watches with the six clocks in the building was difficult, and they often didn't coincide with the bells. Myron Riley, custodian, frequently had to adjust them.

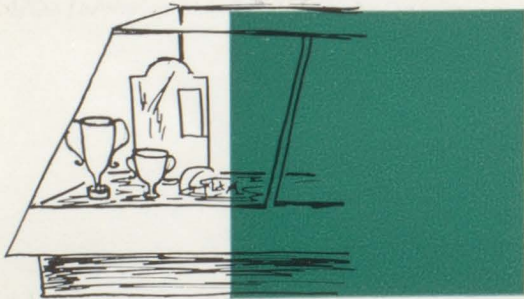
Each week the showcase had a "new look," and its attractive decorations, varying from copper enameled jewelry and speech awards to Retail Selling projects were eye-catching.

Providing a postal service for teachers, keeping class schedules of every student, mimeographing tests, and transacting the business affairs of clubs and organizations were services of the main office.

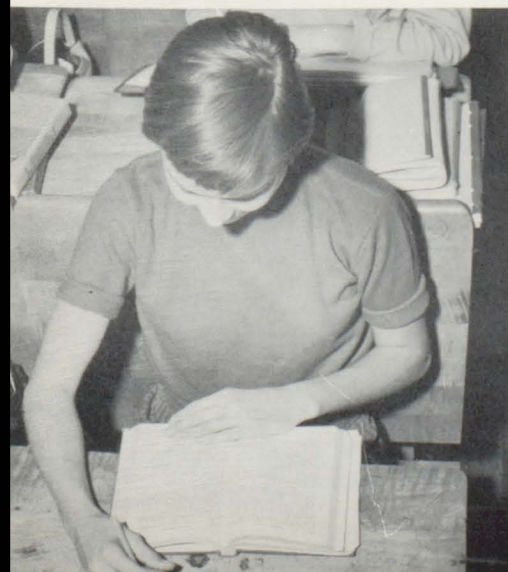


Influence Our Desire To Achieve

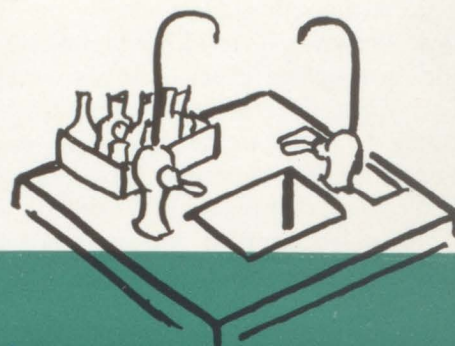

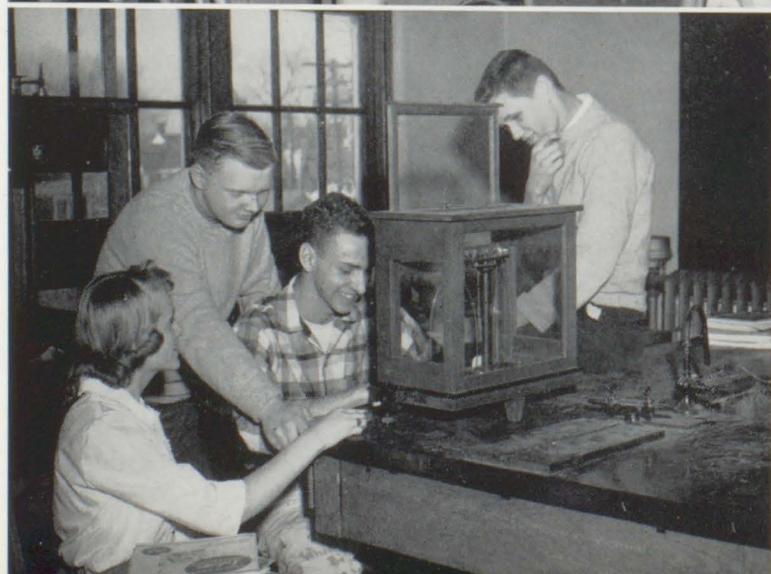

Making mobiles, using microscopes and analytical balances and playing musical instruments interest students of biology, chemistry, art and music.



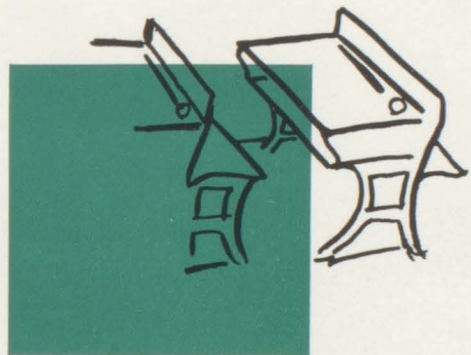


Gaining practical experience as a junior secretary, Mary Sullivan works with Mr. Powell on his retail selling program by answering the telephone and checking over work permits.



Cathy Meece, band secretary, figures band points while Director Bernard Pressler asks Dave Pfenninger for some blank forms from the file.

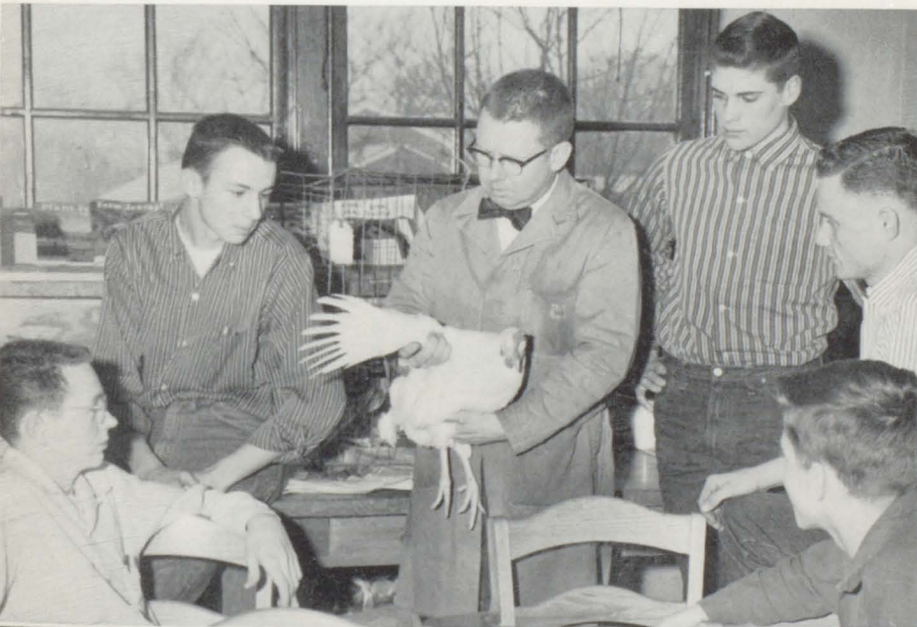
We Learn By Doing

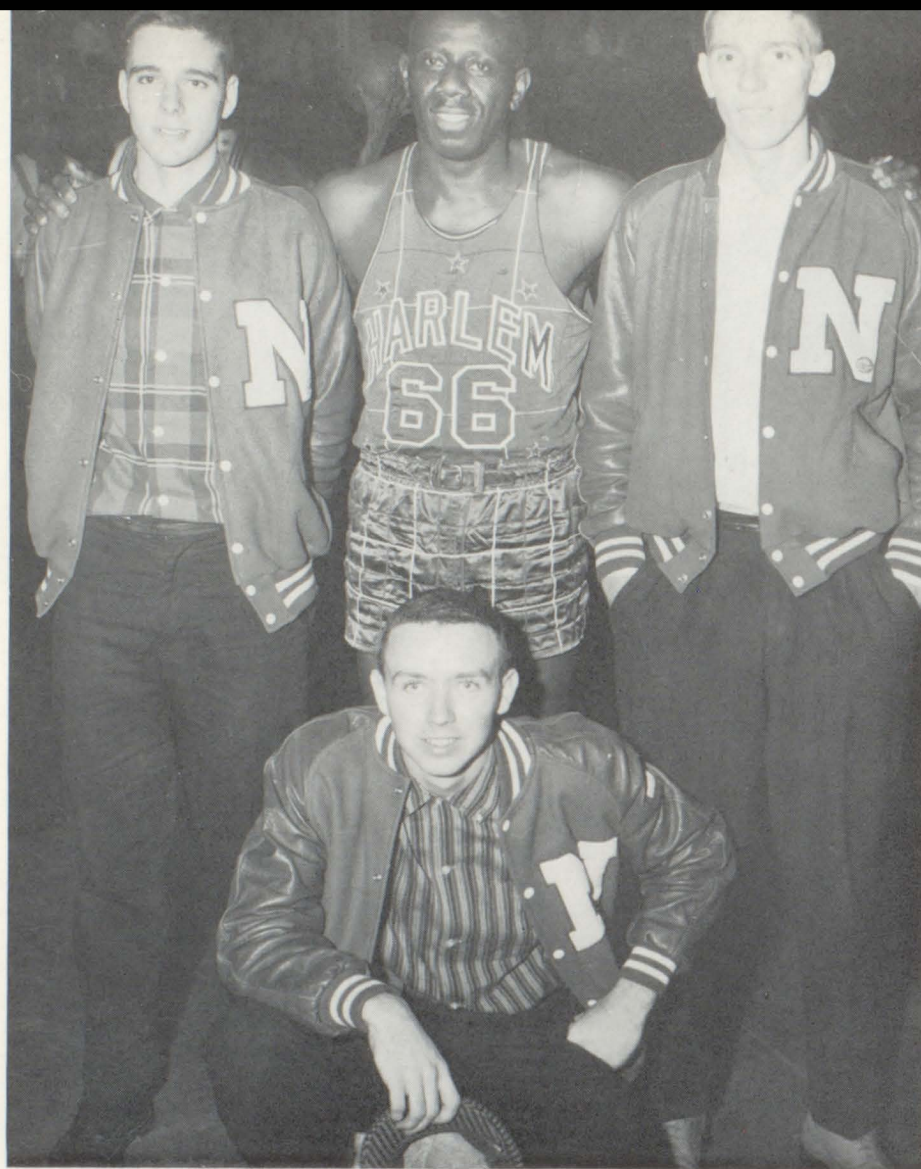

Receiving name cards and invitations, getting measured for caps and gowns, and exchanging chum pictures kept reminding us during the year that we were seniors.

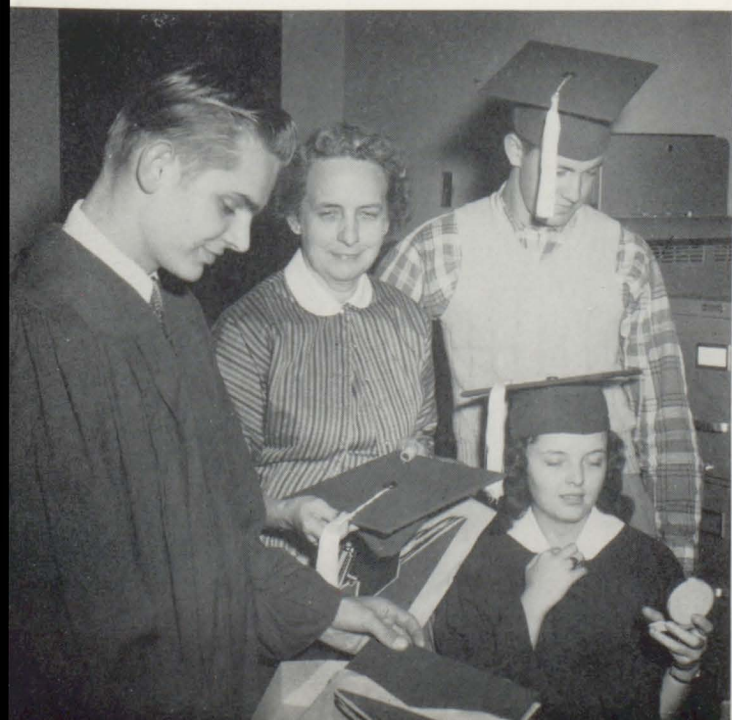
Soon it was time for us to listen to David Bess, our president, at Class Day. Baccalaureate, Commencement, and Night Club Party were the perfect end to our high school days.

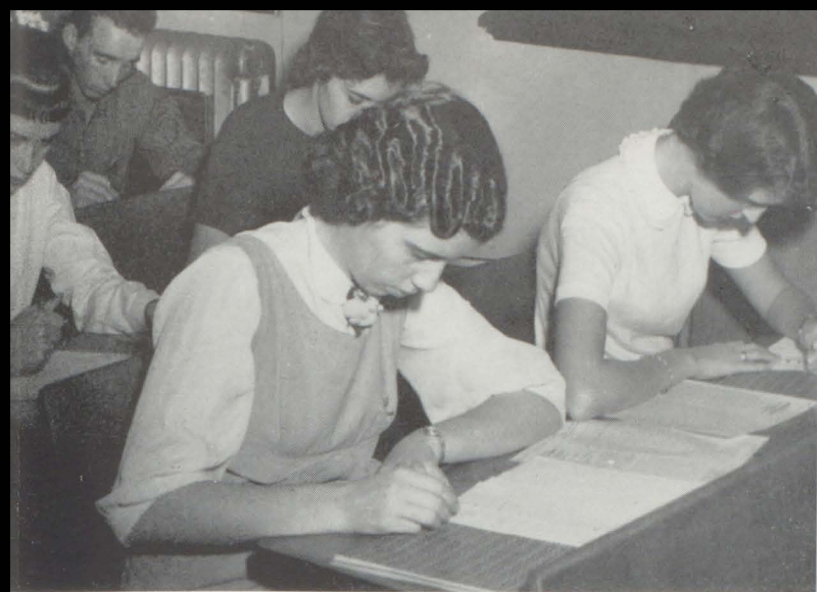

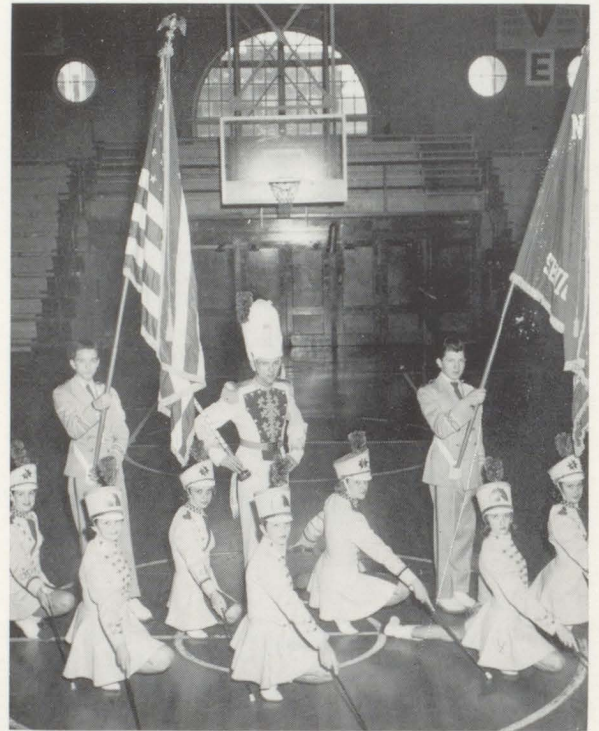
Musicians Display

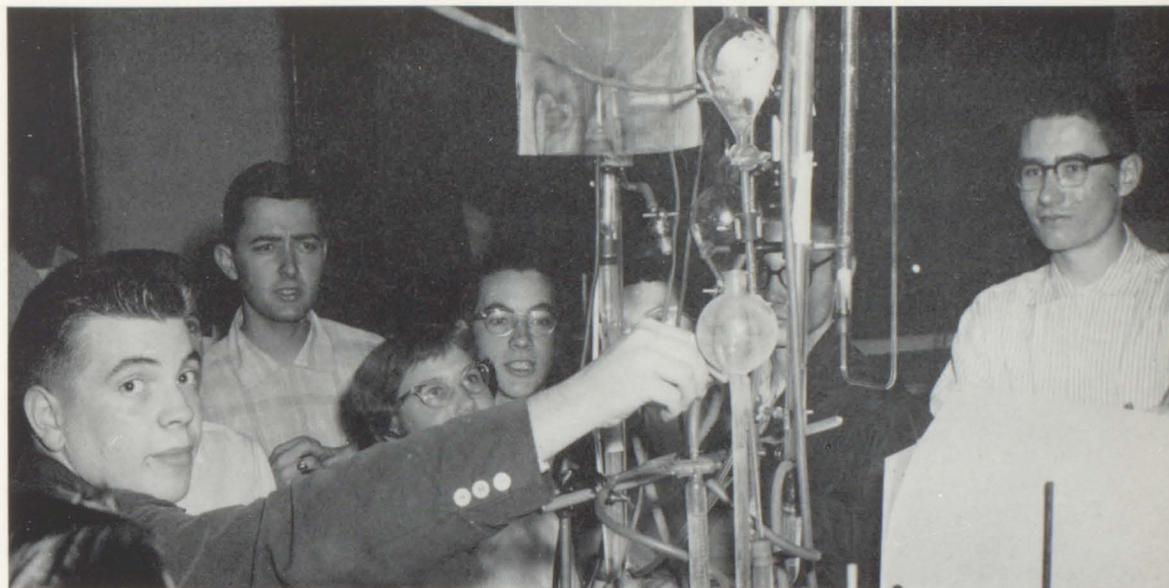

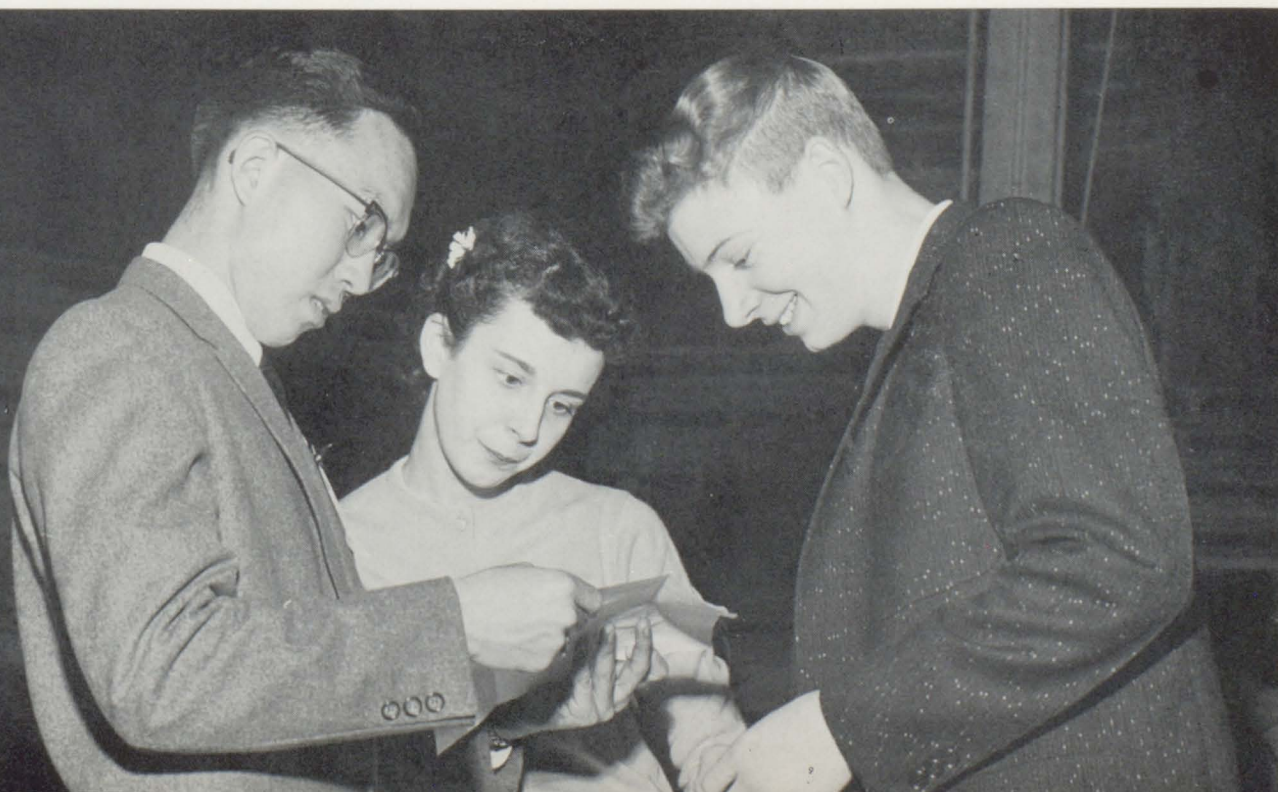

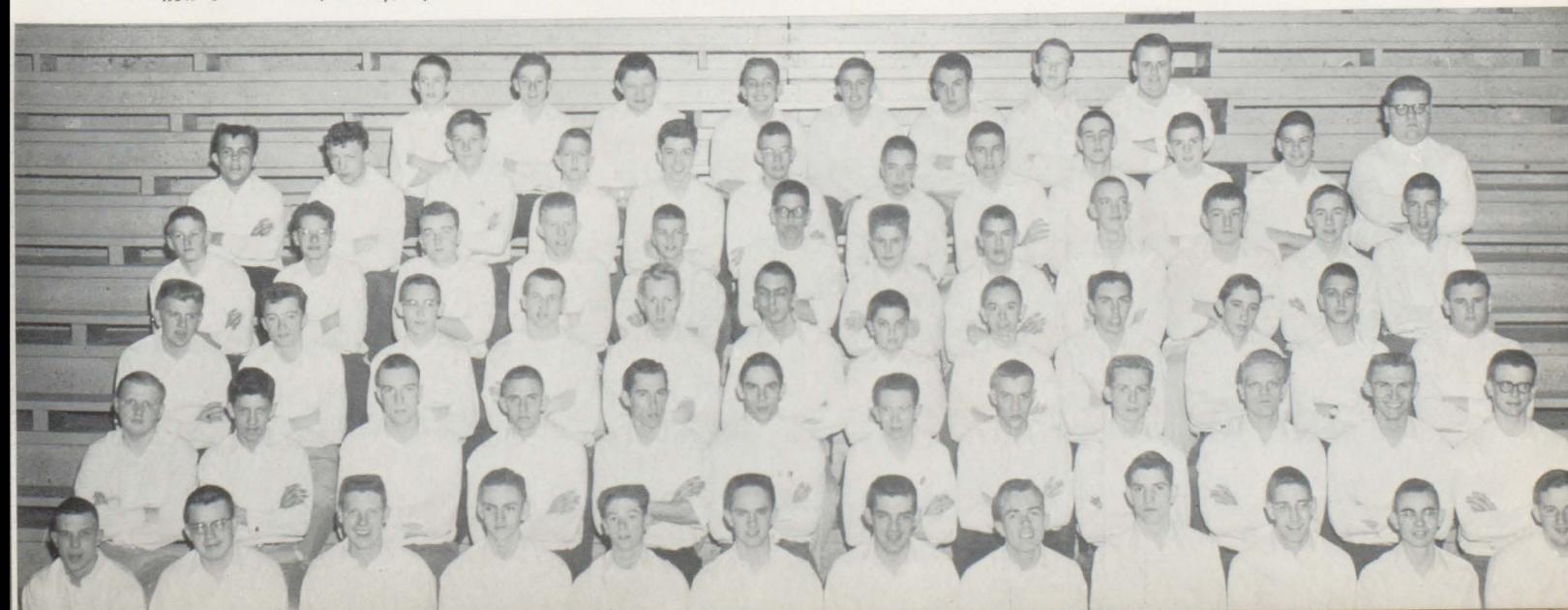

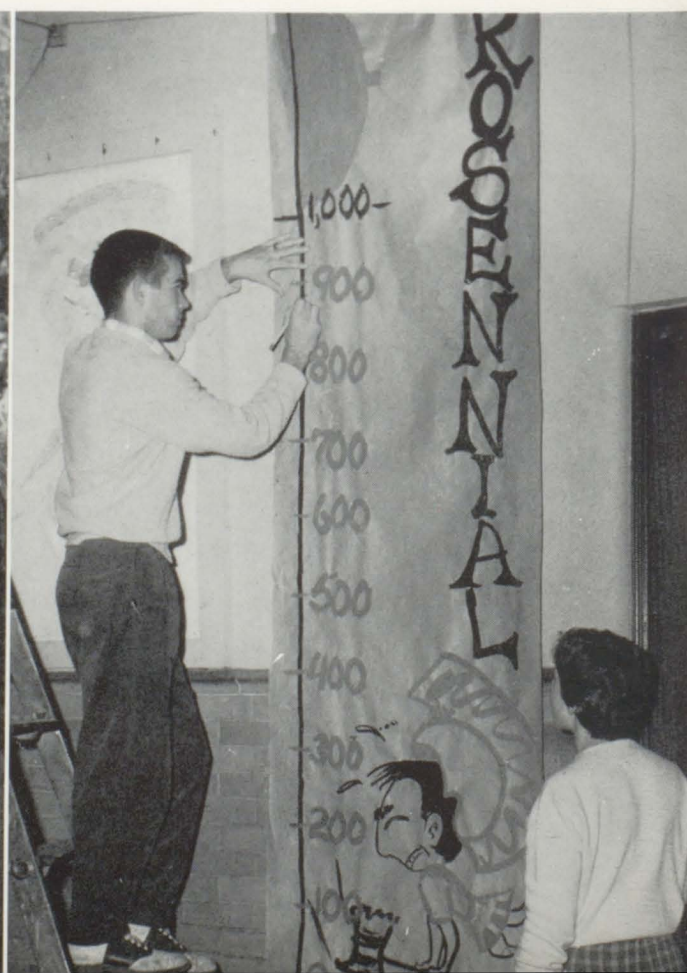

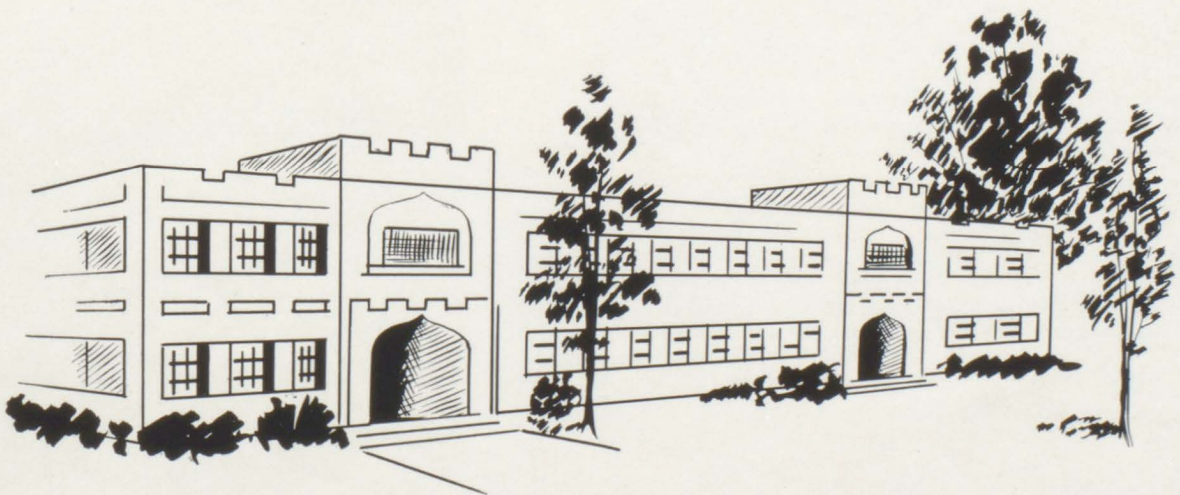

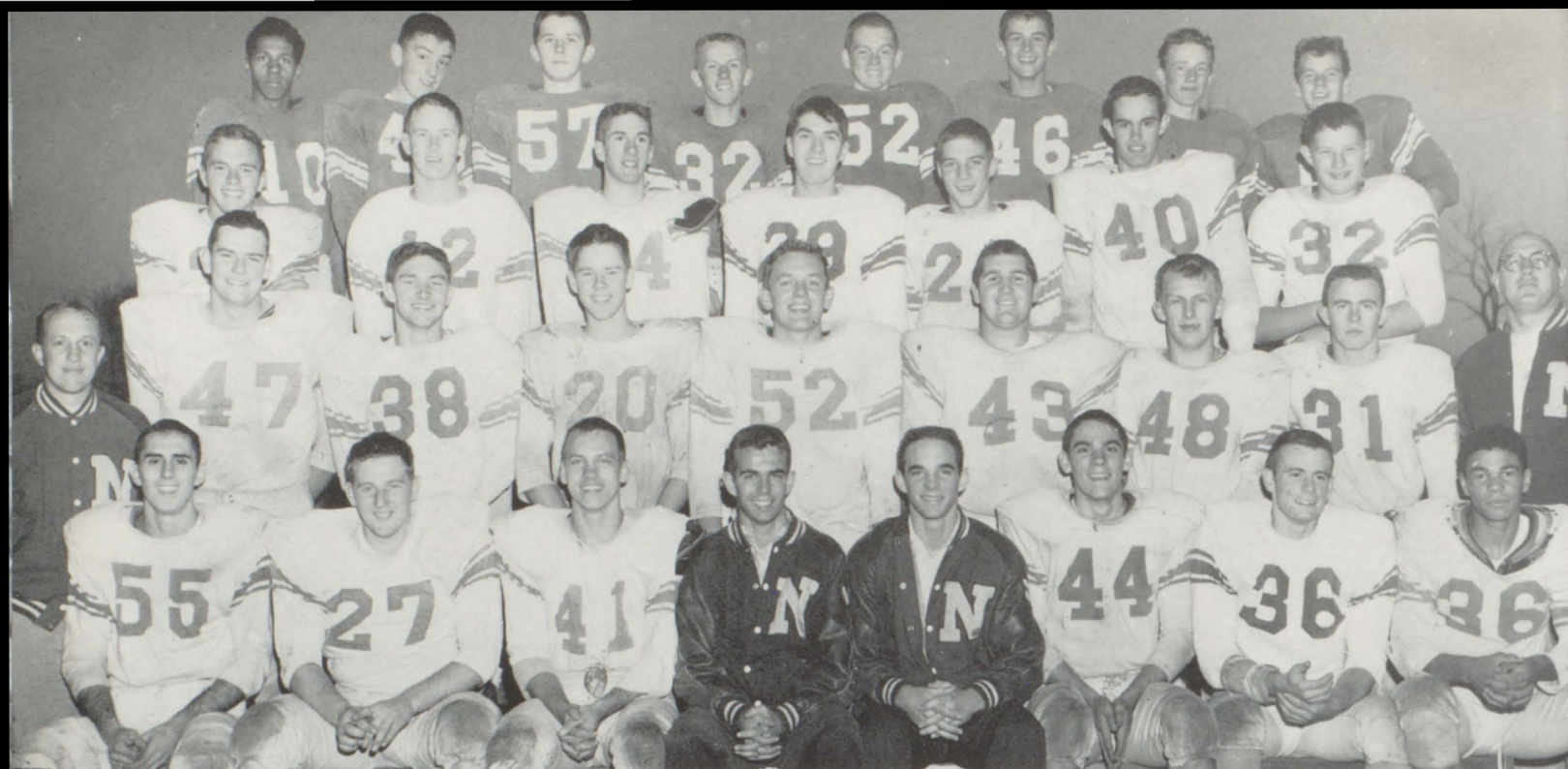

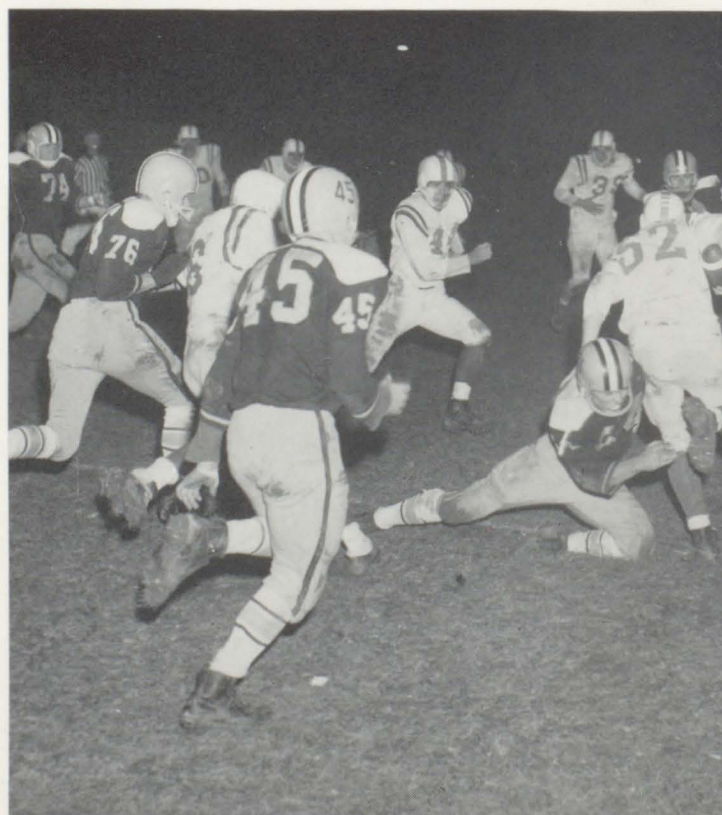

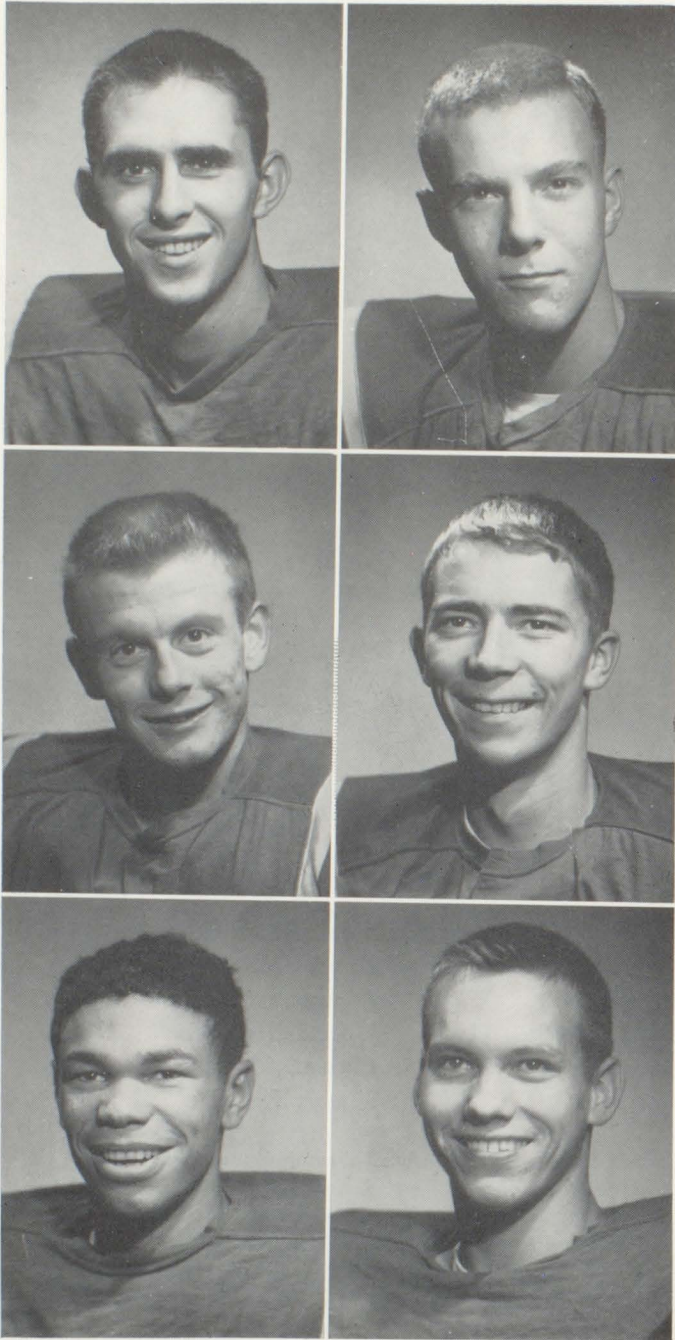

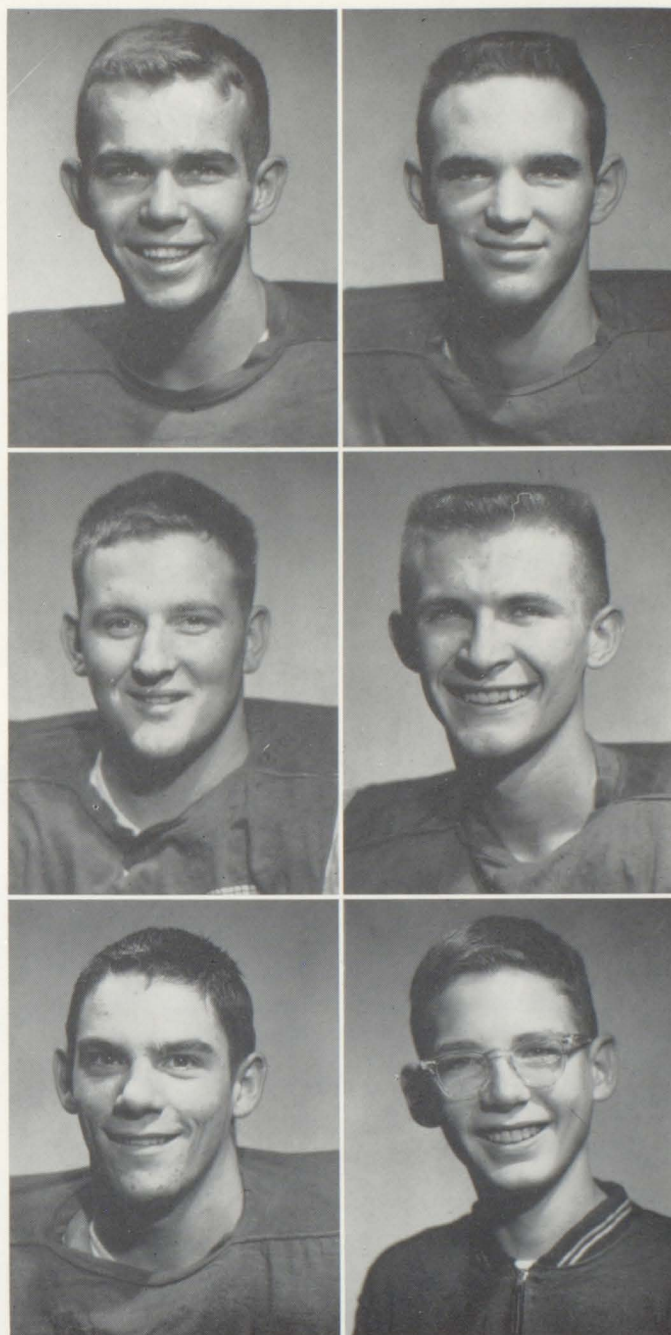

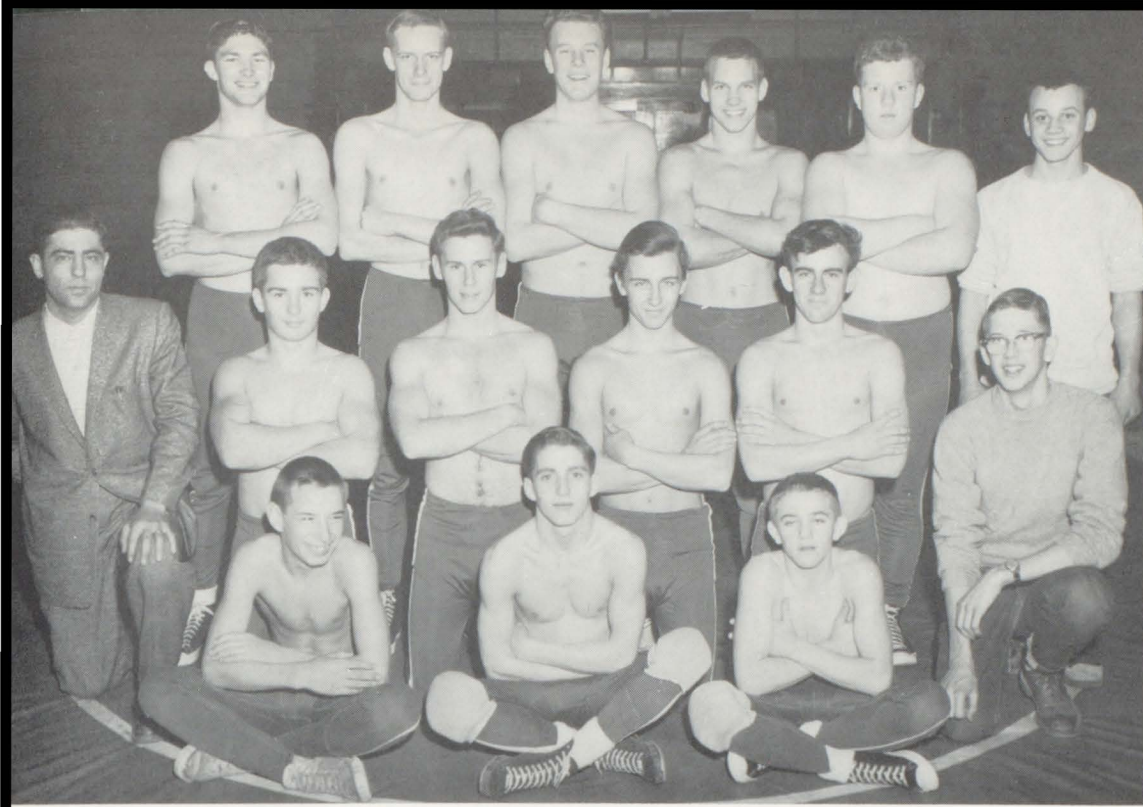
Harriers Run To Eight Victories

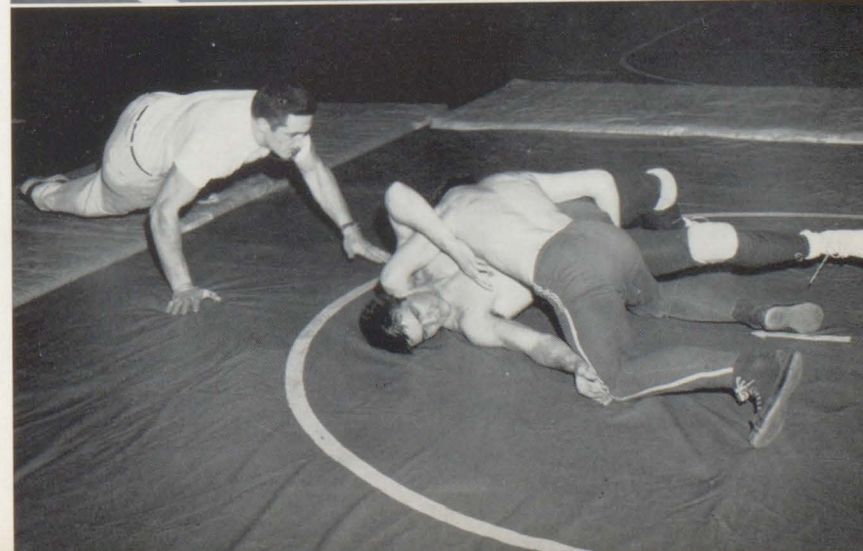
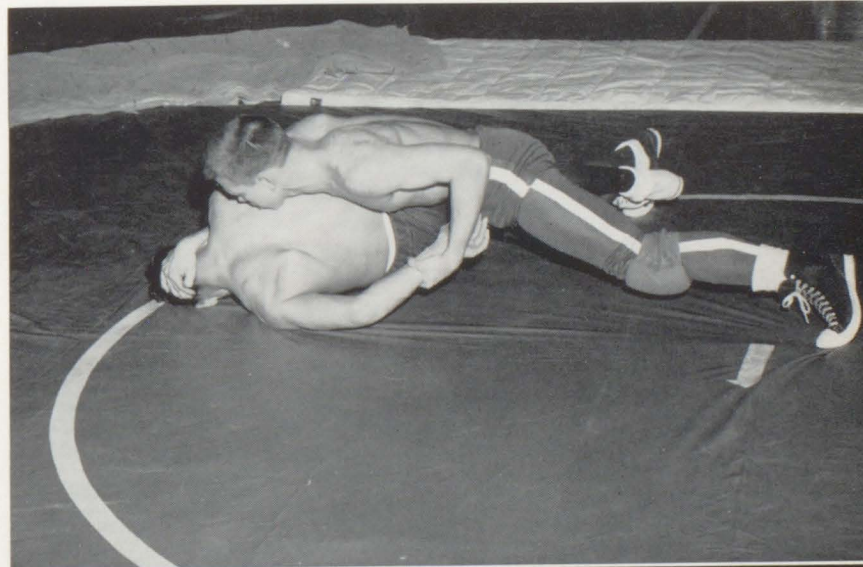
Grapplers Send Man To State

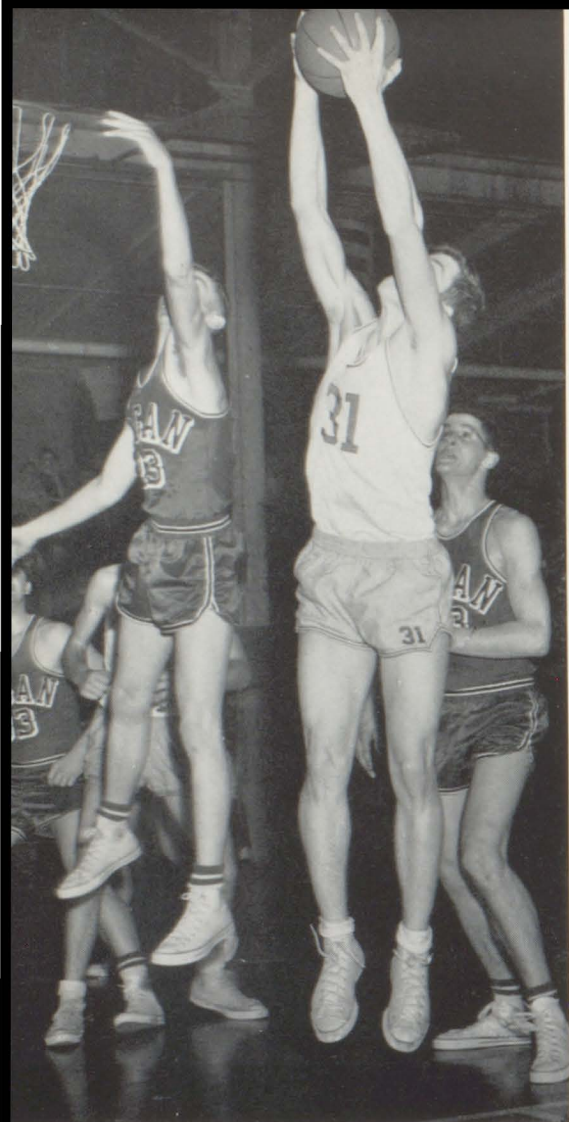

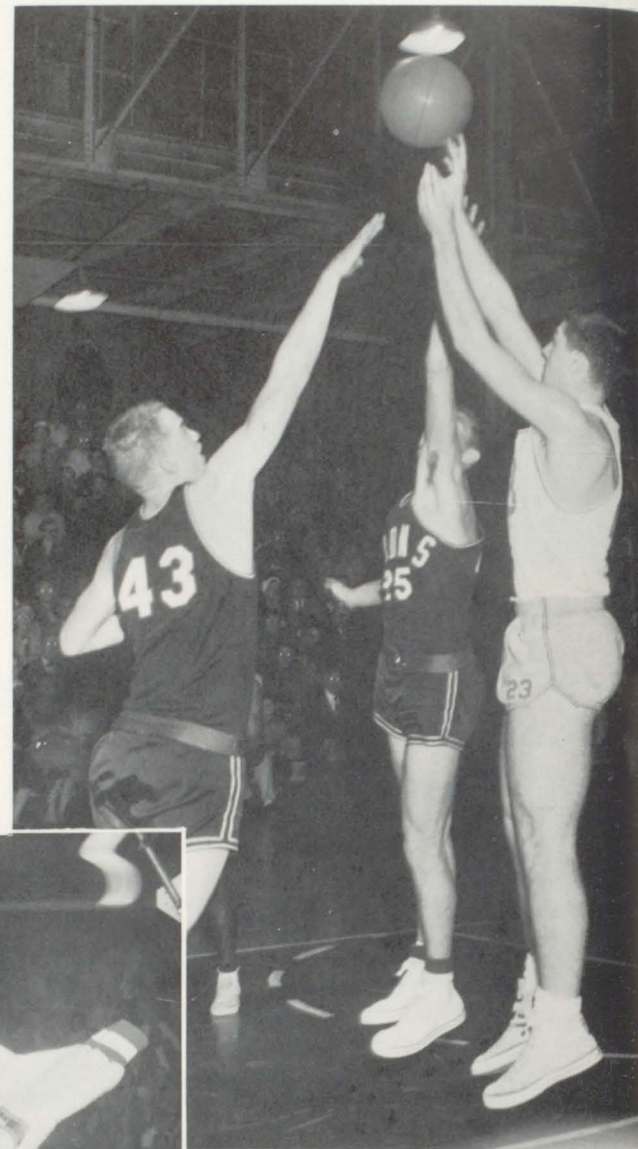

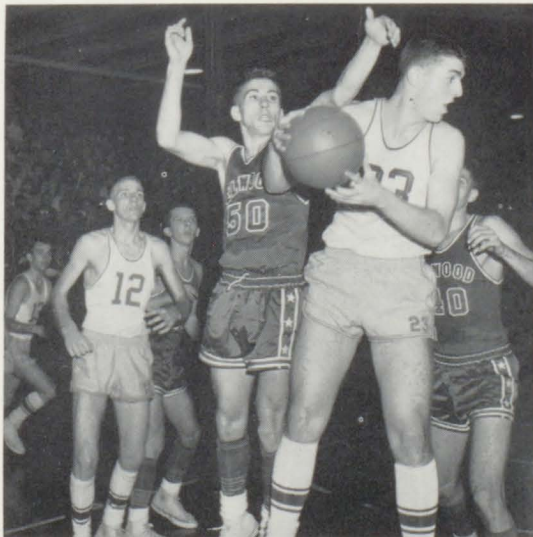

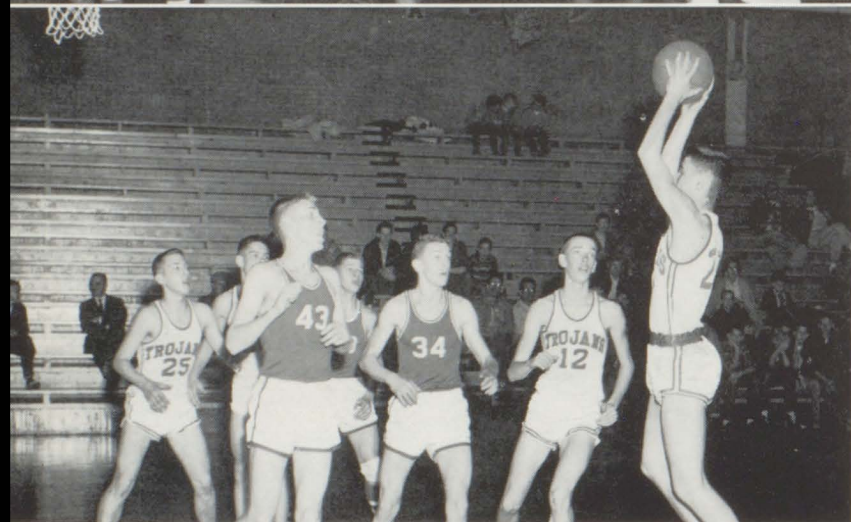

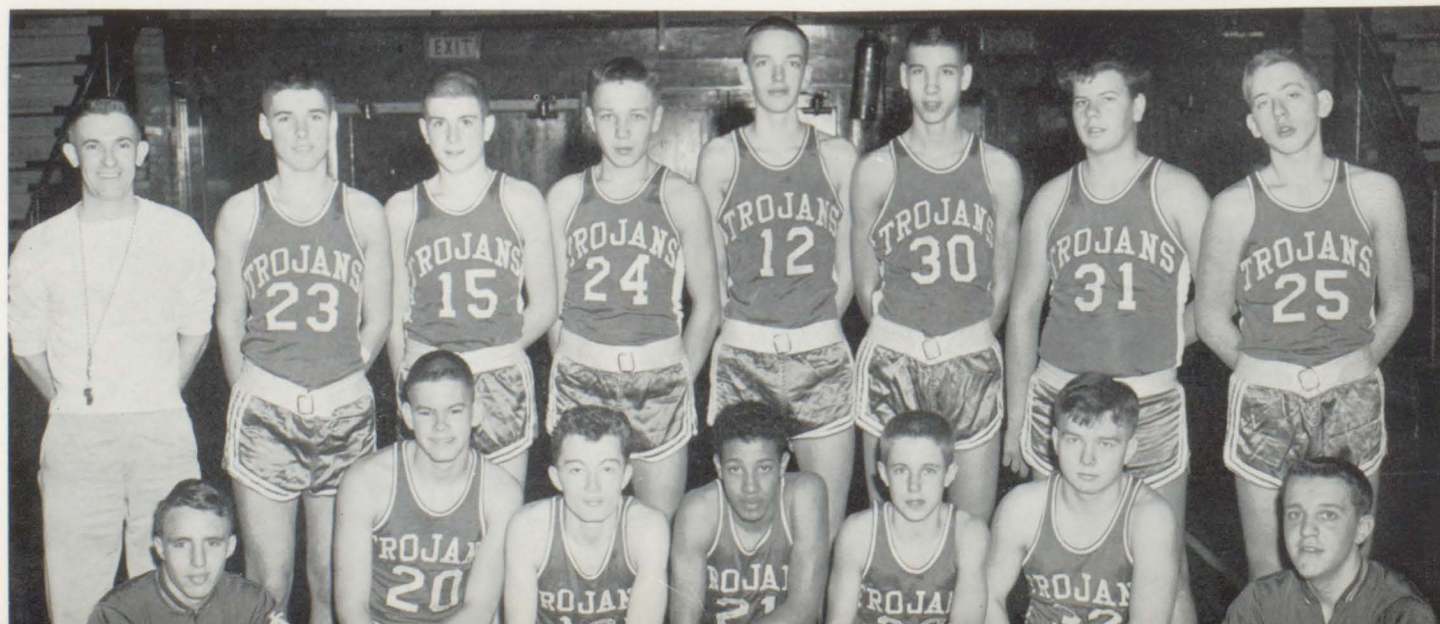
Frosh Show Great Potential

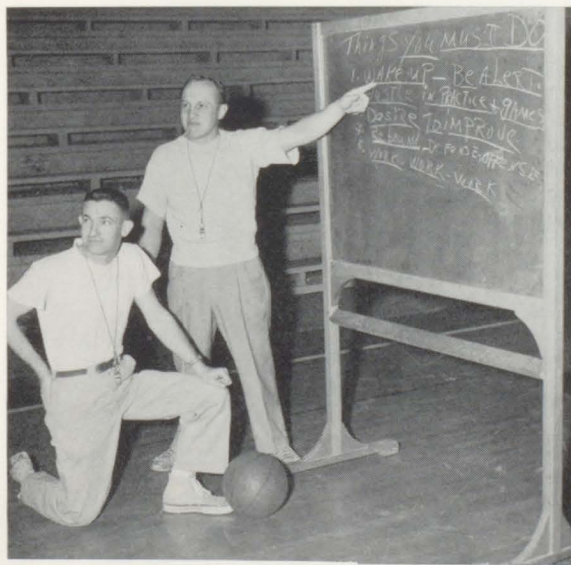

Both Teams Win Close Games

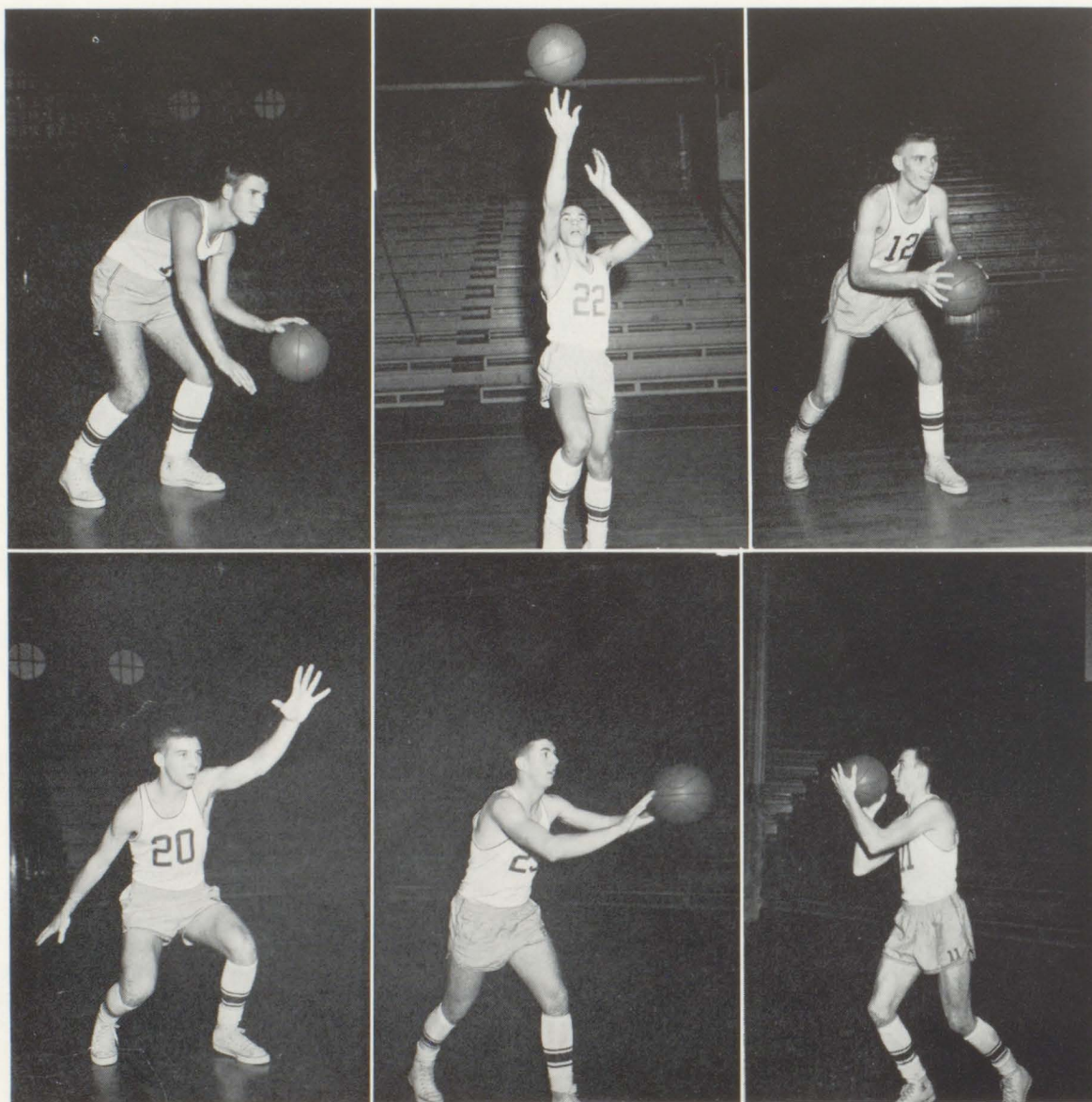

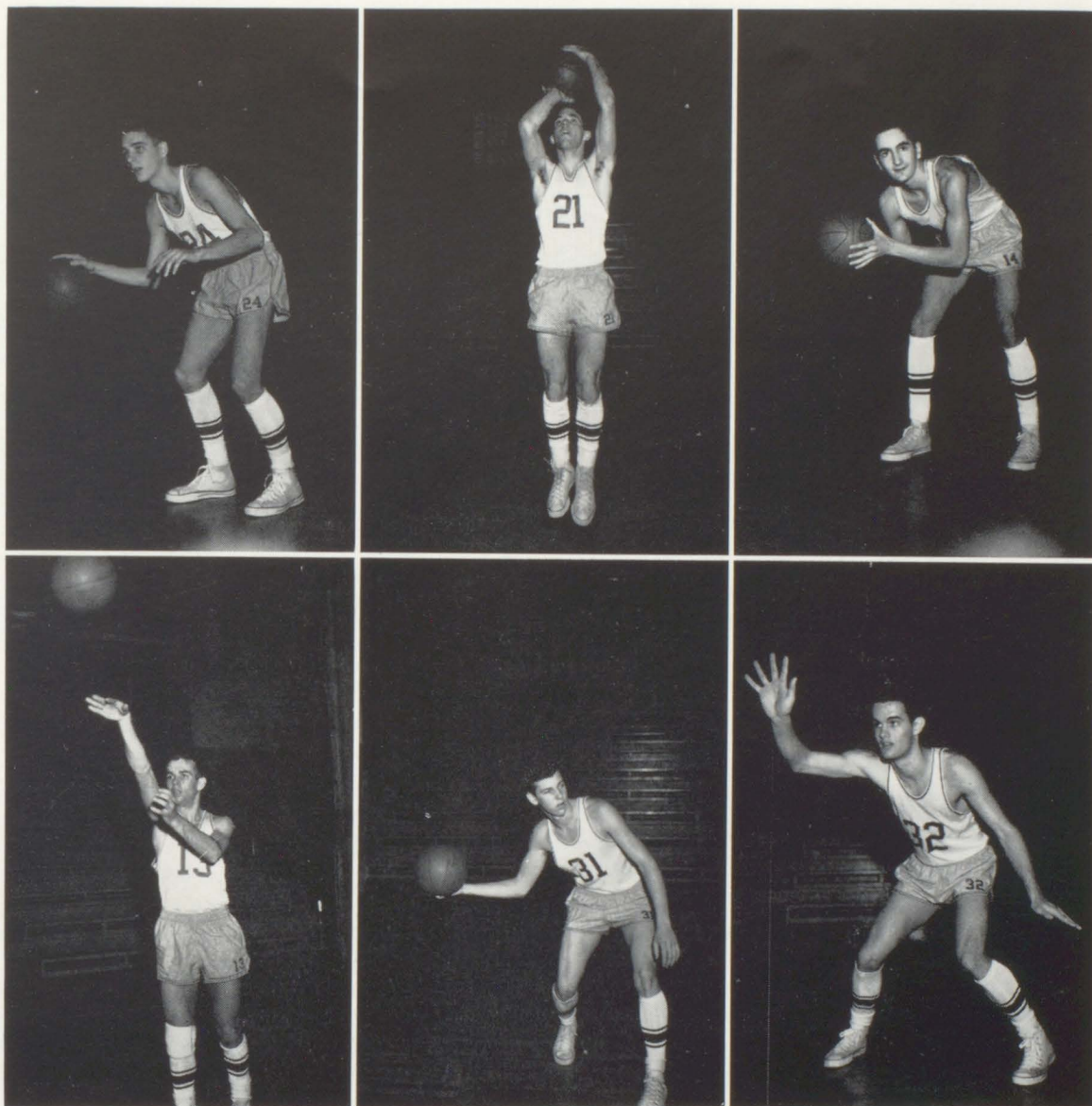

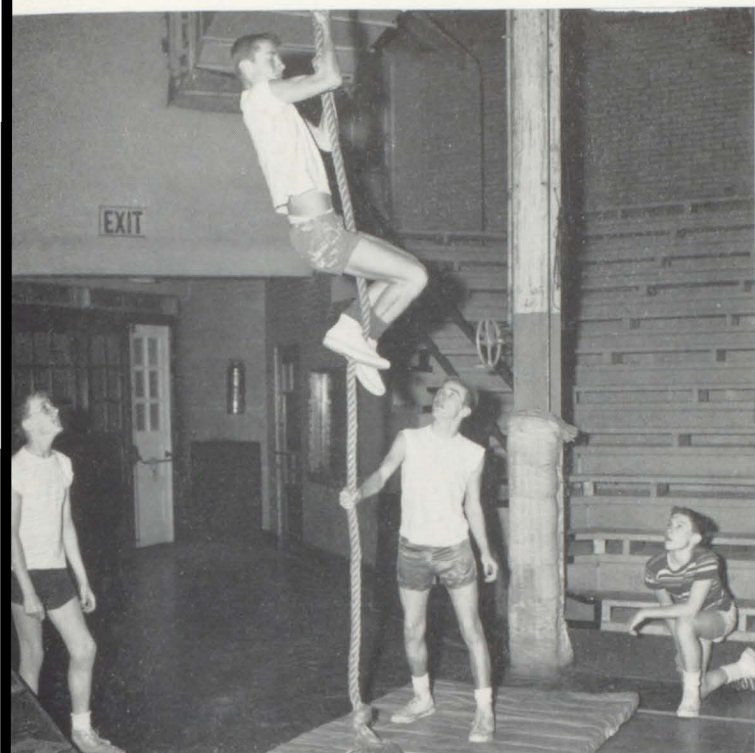

Linksmen of the New Castle and Connersville teams await their turn at the first tee of the Westwood Golf Course where the team held its practices and played its home meets.

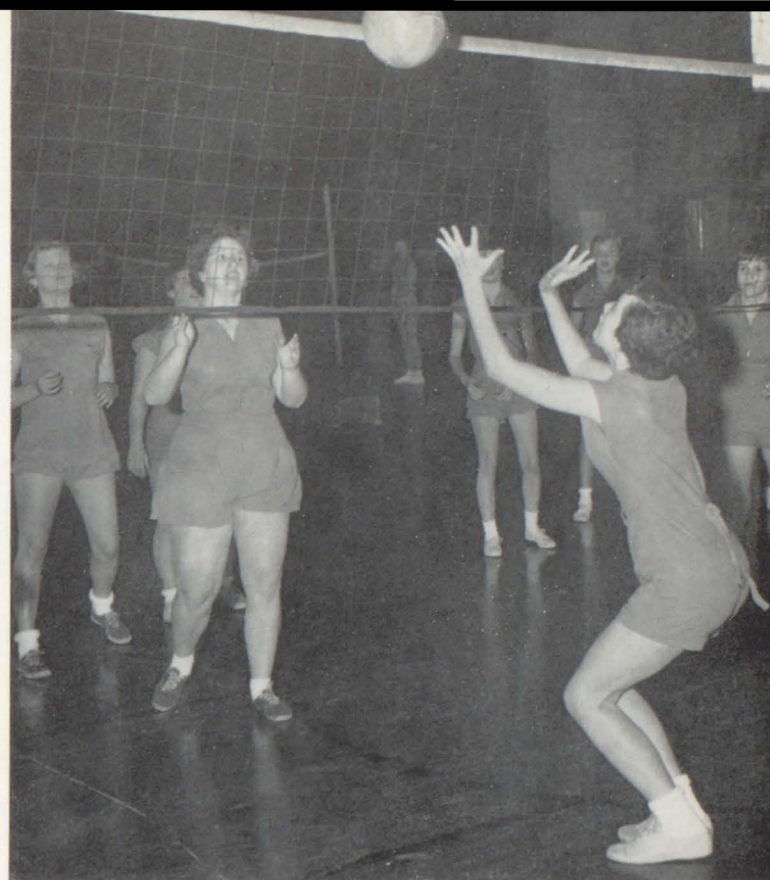

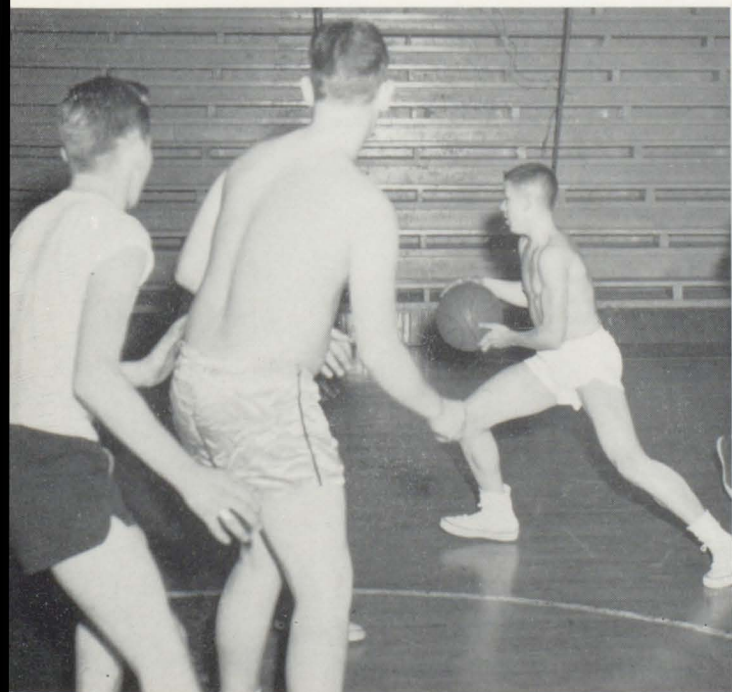
Both boys and girls are required to take two years of physical education, during the freshman and sophomore years. The activities include such sports as volleyball, basketball, and tumbling.

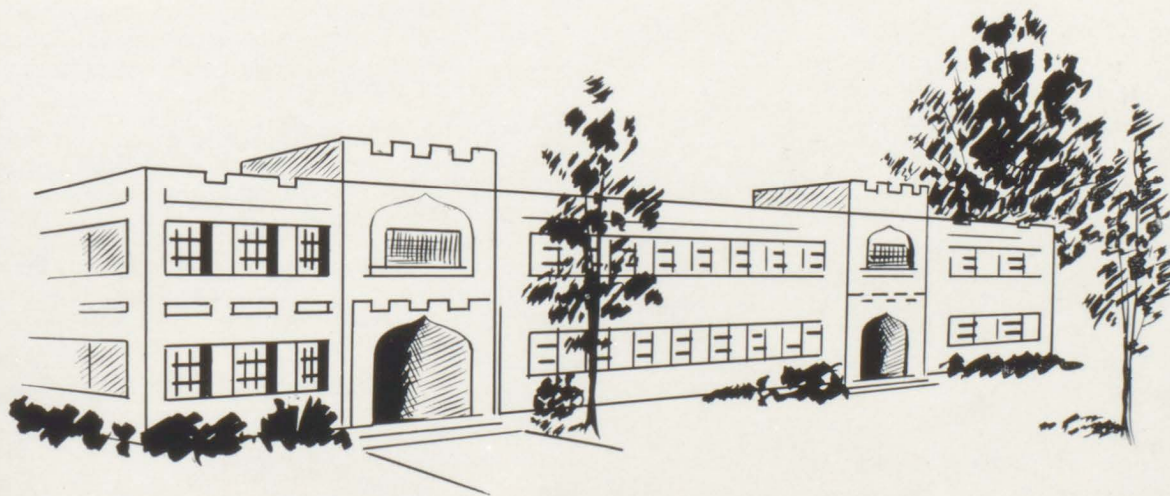

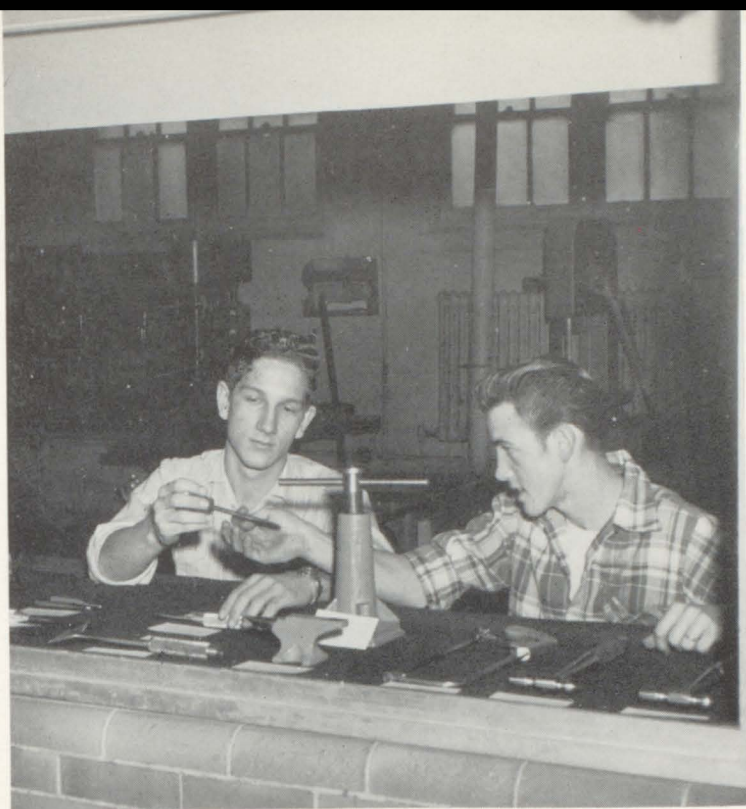
The boys participated in a lively swimming party at the YMCA swimming pool in November, and at Christmas time they prepared and delivered baskets to two needy families.
