Turchan completed his second year as superintendent, and Dr. Kenneth M. Book joined the school system last July as assistant superintendent.

Construction of two new elementary schools and completion of plans for a new junior high are evidence of the School Board and school administration at work. Better preparing students for future college and vocational plans, flexible scheduling, in its second year at CHS, operated efficiently.

The week of Feb. 5 marked the visit of the North Central Association Evaluating Committee. Preparation for the evaluation covered several months and was extensive. Courses of study were revised for each subject by faculty committees and a self-evaluation was compiled by each teacher. After three days of observation, the 12 representatives praised the facilities and curriculum and extended the accreditation that New Castle High School has proudly enjoyed since 1909. The maintenance of this honor represented a total effort from all staff members and pointed to its high standards.

During the year, each of the 1,300 students became familiar with the counseling staff. Interviewing and guiding students, conducting college entrance exams, and making curriculum improvements were among their important responsibilities.

Students and faculty members were assisted time after time by the office and library staffs. Collecting money, filing library materials, and duplicating papers were just a few of the duties undertaken by these staffs each day of school.

Preparing and serving well-balanced meals to hungry students was but one job of the cafeteria staff. Special luncheons, chili suppers, and the Senior Breakfast in May added extra work. In addition to maintaining a clean, well-functioning building, the custodial staff also has other duties including cleaning the Fieldhouse after basketball games.



With every student taking three years of English, this department had the biggest enrollment of all. Making the most of flexible scheduling, teachers used more resource materials and audio-visual aids to encourage students to express themselves in speaking and writing. A habit of good reading and an appreciation of literature also were encouraged by members of this department.

What used to be the Reading Lab became the English Resource Center, B108. Bookshelves and tables were added as well as many small desks for studying. Magazines, books, records of literary works, and a nearly complete selection of plays by Shakespeare were added.

New Closed Circuit Television Cameras Show Ancient Principles



The geometry course provided sophomores with a world of axioms, theorems, and geometric figures as their first high school math course. Modern algebra was offered to juniors who liked being challenged with logarithms and slide rules. Seniors who elected to take trigonometry or senior math explored imaginary numbers and trig functions.


Technical math was open to anyone who had successfully completed one year of mathematics and was particularly helpful to students in practical arts classes.

Attentive listening and understanding are necessities in Algebra.










Biology students probe into the unknown by utilizing lab time.

An open lab was established where biology, chemistry, or physics students could prepare their lab exercises in the same room at any time of day. Biology and chemistry lectures were presented exclusively over a closed circuit TV to approximately 90 students at one time.

The old English store room was converted into an area where students participated in small group discussions. Another room, the biology lab, was also set aside as a new area for small groups.



Students Find New Cultures In Languages










Students use imagination in weaving beautiful rugs and samplers from yarn.



Electronic students convert TV set into big screen oscilloscope.



Sophomores Keep Fit Through Exercise





reational sports.



Girls in physical education find a brisk game of basketball a great challenge.



The bandstand, surrounded with a rock wall, was positioned on a lower level of the coronation platform. Johnny McCoy and his orchestra provided music for dancing.


The climax of the evening came at 11:00, when Junior Class President David Dickey introduced the court and proclaimed Karen Wannamacher Prom Queen-1967.














Debate Team Ends Successful Season













Other activities included assisting in officiating of Intramurals and church leagues. Members also helped direct parking in November before the speech meet.







Thirteen seniors were selected as Optimist Outstanding Citizens on the basis of their achievements in the school and community.
















Coach Wayne Jones receives instructions from a spotter in the press box.

A field goal attempt by Steve Coers shows the importance of a follow-through.








Junior Duane Anderson prepares to hand off to a team mate.

After intercepting a pass, Harold Huffman gains yardage.







New Castle Third In NCC 3-2-1 Conference Record;











The Trojan basketballers under the direction of Coach Cecil Tague have molded a 41 win and 11 loss record over the past two seasons.



The squad was a loser in six outings by a total of 15 points, with two of these defeats being avenged in the second encounter.


The Trojans defeated such highly regarded teams as Madison Heights, Tech, Muncie Southside, Highland, and the Anderson Indians.


Doug Ferguson shoots over the defense in a close NCC battle.





Seniors Lead Squad To Sectional Trophy





The squad defeated three conference foes in Muncie Central, Anderson, and Lafayette. They also downed a fine North Central team.










Trojans' Starting Battery Named To All-NCC Team













Junior Class Officers Are Elected After Narrow Race



Final Year Is Decisive For 383 Graduates


A decisive year confronted the 383 members of the Class of 1968 whose future seemed clouded by war. Nevertheless, they proceeded with plans for further training.

An early highlight for the graduating class was Senior Vespers, held in December. This memorable event marked the first appearance of the class as a whole.






