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## Academics



Two years ago, Chrysler initiated a module system consisting of 13 periods a day . . . along with it came a new kind of education. CHS believes that high school people are mature enough to learn to budget and balance their time in order to meet their tasks. With classes scheduled for sometimes only five out of a possible 10 modules a week, students are faced with the challenge to reach out for further meanings in their large group sessions, small groups, and independent study time. They are faced with the need for research and therefore concentrated knowledge becomes necessary. State requirements seem CHANGELESS, but modern methods of teaching are EVERCHANGING.

## Seniors Gain Insight From

 SociologyA new course, Sociology was added to the classes within the Social Studies field. Through this elective, seniors learned more about mankind and his problems in the modern world and had a better understanding of themselves.

An experimental feature of this department was the use of large and small groups. One large lecture and three small discussions a week were designed to encourage students to think. Action programs, field trips, speakers, and instructive films provided added interest.

Various books and pamphlets were added to the department's resource center to enable students to further explore ideas in sources other than the textbook. Economics students bought stocks with an allowance of $\$ 5,000$ and learned to read stock quotations accurately as posted daily in the Wall Street Journal.

The essence of communication was stressed to students in English classes, not only verbally, but through the use of other media as well. Three teachers initiated action programs which have given students a chance to explore and experience ideas and concepts formulated in discussion. Activities ranged from a "House Expo" to several community action programs. These included a "Get Out and Vote" campaign at election time, a traffic safety drive, and several other projects involving elementary school youngsters.

Teaching in the traditional form, other English teachers centered their class time on the study of culture, with emphasis on a great deal of reading. These classes also engaged in expository writing.

Closely allied with the English department is the Speech and Theatre department. In addition to the regular class work in this area, students had the opportunity to participate in extra curricular activities such as NFL, Speech X, and Thespians.

Creating understanding and bridging the communication gap were the basic purposes of the language department. Flexible scheduling was helpful in lab practice for the 500 students enrolled in the five language areas. The language lab was remodeled to serve as a research area, in addition to being a practice room. Offered to students were four years of Spanish and French, three years of Latin, and two years of Russian. The courses dealt with teaching the mechanics of the languages as well as studying its culture. This was done through such activities as banquets, bake sales, and parties at which native foods were prepared. This department worked closely with FORSCO in the foreign student program.

## Into Practice

Various innovations have taken place in the Math and Science departments. This was the second year for Geometry labs and for television as an experimental device of communication for Geometry large groups. Algebra II students were for the first time involved in a geometry type situation. Teachers teamed for large group sessions and stressed individual work in small groups.

From nine to twelve labs were required of the Biology students during each nine week period and could be completed as quickly as desired. There was an open lab for Biology, Chemistry and Physics. An Advanced Biology Seminar was added to the program too. Stimulation of independent scientific investigation was encouraged as every student planned a project that made up the bulk of his work. This class gave the individual a chance to be involved in science activities without credit. It developed the responsibility needed for advanced work in any field.

## 700 Students

Functioning with an active staff of eleven, the business department offered twelve types of classes. Some 700 students were involved in business courses which varied from personal typing to office practice. For the first time this year, students gained practical experience by serving as secretaries for the department chairmen.

There were two vocational business programs-Office, through which students worked half days in local offices doing bookkeeping and typing, and Distributive Education, a program in which students received practical experience in retailing, service, and wholesaling jobs. O.E.A. and D.E.C.A. were the two organizations affiliated with these two business programs.

With a purpose of promoting business leadership, the Future Business Leaders of America helped to serve the remaining business areas. The best students in bookkeeping, shorthand, and typing were honored by this club. Each year F.B.L.A. sponsors the in-ter-school typing contest.

## Vocational Ed Links School And Industry

Since Industrial Arts is a study of industry, much time was devoted to working with materials and processes of industry. Students in Woods, Metals, Machine Shop and Graphic Arts classes were involved in mass production projects this year. Finished projects were croquet sets, shoeshine boxes, aluminum pencil holders, and pocket calendars. Instruction in Drafting, General Metals, Machine Shop, and Power and Transportation was conducted in both large and small groups. About 150 boys received instruction by video tape.

Eleven Machine Shop and Graphic Arts boys were the first vocational industrial enrollees, working in local businesses that gave them experience in their speciality.

## Skill Tests Help Mark Progress

Other facilities provided for outdoor activities such as baseball, football and soccer which have become popular high school traditions. There was room for a great deal of diversity in this sophomore developmental class. Its major concern was the development of physical skill and coordination, however, tests were given in order to see the progress made by each individual. In the future, the physical education department plans to originate a program in which juniors and seniors may participate two days a week as well as sophomores, all of whom are enrolled in physical education. Interested seniors took part in the department by participation as cadet teachers. Filled with 130 periodicals and 9,200 books, the library adequately served the researcher. It returned to its function as Research Center this year, with the addition of various resource rooms for specific classes. In addition to a set of music dictionaries, the library added 200 paperback bound books, as well as a new selection of fiction.
